STATEMENT ISSUED BY THE TRUSTEES IN NOVEMBER, 1903.

"At the date of Mr. Quarrier's death the trustees under the deed of constitution were Sir Thomas Glen Coats, Bart.; Sir Charles Cameron, Bart.; Mr. Robert Binnie, Ashford, Gourock; Mr. J. H. N. Graham, Larbert House; Mr. A. Cameron Corbett, M.P.; Mr. Forrester Paton, Alloa; Mr. W. A. Campbell, of Messrs. J. & W. Campbell & Co., Glasgow; Mr. R. A. Bryden, architect, Glasgow.

"These trustees all continue to act, and have arranged to assume, as additional trustees Sir Samuel Chisholm, Bart.; Mr. J. P. Maclay; Mr. David J. Findlay (Mr. Quarrier's son-in-law); and Mrs. Quarrier. Mr. J. P. Maclay has agreed to accept the position of honorary treasurer.

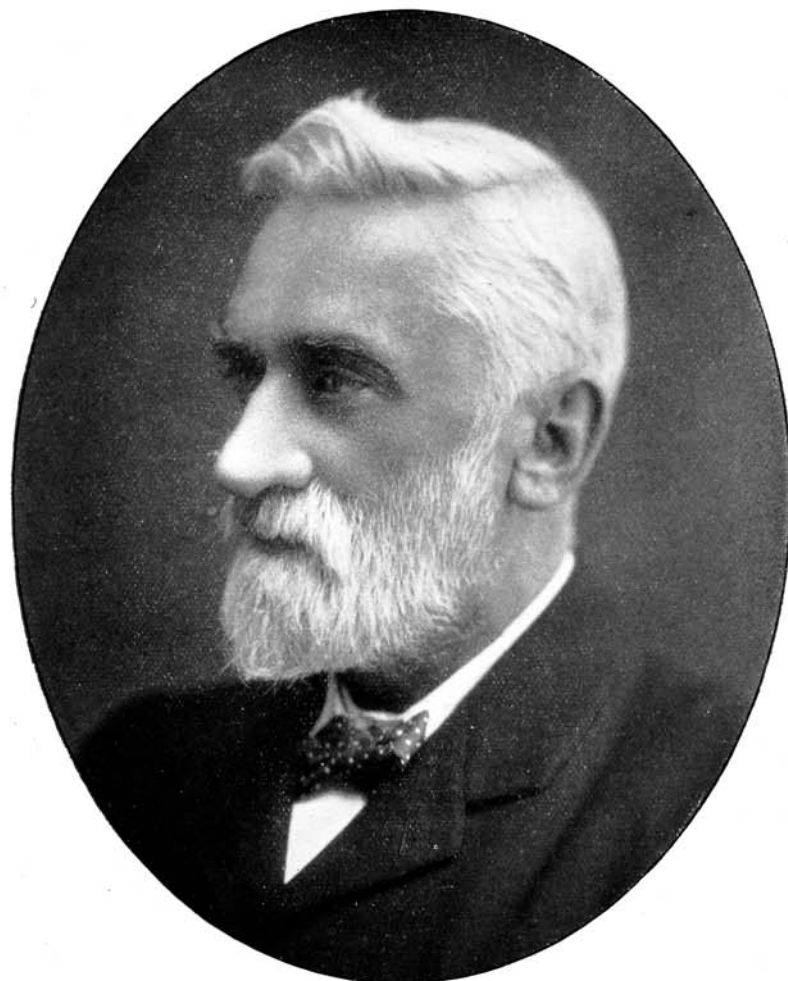
"In accordance with the desire of the late Mr. Quarrier, and with the cordial approval of the trustees, the management of the Homes will be carried on by Mrs. Quarrier and family on the same principle as in the past, and the trustees have appointed Mr. Bryden, Mr. Maclay, and Mr. Findlay as an advisory council, who will regularly report to them.

"The trustees do not propose to make any special appeal for subscriptions, as they consider that the system adopted by Mr. Quarrier of trusting to Divine Providence to provide for the maintenance of the Orphan Homes should be adhered to.

"The trustees hope that this statement will satisfy the many friends who have in the past supported the Homes by their subscriptions and donations, that no change will be made in the administration of this great and responsible trust, and they have no doubt the public will assist the trustees and the members of Mr. Quarrier's family by their contributions and Christian sympathy in maintaining and carrying on to its fullest extent the national work inaugurated by Mr. Quarrier and carried out by him with such remarkable success for more than a quarter of a century. The work of the Consumption Sanatoria will also be carried on without change."

N.B.—Since the death of Mrs. Quarrier the active management of the Homes is carried on by the Executive Council, which now consists of Miss Quarrier and Mrs. A. Quarrier Burgess, Pastor D. J. Findlay and Mr. J. P. Maclay.

Subscriptions and Donations for the Homes, for the Consumption Sanatoria, for the Colony for Epileptics, and for the Home and Foreign Mission Fund, should be forwarded to Miss Quarrier, Orphan Homes of Scotland, Bridge of Weir, or, if more convenient, to the Treasurer, Mr. J. Such contributions will be acknowledged in the same manner as was followed by Mr. Quarrier, and a statement of the accounts, duly audited by professional accountants, will be submitted at the annual public meeting, held each year in November.

NARRATIVE OF FACTS,  
1906.

ANOTHER year, the thirty-fifth in the history of the Orphan Homes, has closed, and it is once again our privilege to gather together some of the details and experiences of the twelve months and to send them forth to our fellow labourers who, by gifts and prayers, have shared with us the joy of this blessed service for Christ and His little ones. It is not necessary to remind old friends that this is now the third year that we have been without the inspiring presence of our beloved father, William Quarrier, and that over two years have passed since our dear mother was also taken from us. It is to us a matter for deepest gratitude and fervent thanksgiving to God that every department of the work has made steady advance and that every need has been bountifully met, although we miss more than ever the hands that guided and the hearts that planned, "They being dead, yet speak," and the record of their labours is still an unfinished story. The children they rescued and trained, and the sufferers they helped and cheered, do not by any means comprise the work they accomplished, great as the numbers of these were. They live to-day in many hearts, and the principles they instilled are being exemplified in many lives, while hundreds, nay thousands, of God's children the world over are to-day stronger in faith because of their life and testimony.

The thirty-fifth year has been, like all its predecessors, full of the goodness and mercy of our covenant keeping God. Daily and hourly have we been made conscious of His unfailing and unerring care over us. We asked for great things, and without any effort on our part to raise funds or any personal solicitation God has given us to rejoice in His own "exceeding abundantly above all we asked or thought." On 1st November, 1905, we needed for the year's supply £30,000, and in answer to prayer our Heavenly Father has sent us through His stewards—

Most heartily and gratefully do we thank all who have ministered to our large family in temporal things, and most of all do we praise and adore Him who has inclined hearts to provide so generously for the fatherless and needy committed to our care. In addition to gifts in money we have received thousands of "gifts in kind," and we are specially grateful to the many friends who have made and sent garments of various sorts, also to those who have instituted work parties, and who have

unweariedly met from time to time to sew and knit for our children. Frequently do parcels or bales or boxes bring to us just the very things we are in need of, and lead us anew to praise God for the sympathy thus expressed.

During the past year there has been remarkably good health among the children. No epidemic has visited our village, and, although 1671 children have been resident in the Homes, there have been only 13 deaths. Many come to us in failing health to be nursed and tenderly cared for until their short earthly journey is over, but many others find here renewed health, and in a few months can scarcely be recognised by those who knew them in their old surroundings. For physical health we have therefore cause to praise God, and for spiritual blessing also, but we long for a fuller outpouring of the Spirit of God, and that all our children may become heirs of the Kingdom. Our work is necessarily one of seed sowing more than one of reaping, but in the lives of many of our young people we have seen evidences of a changed heart and an earnest endeavour to serve God. Among the adults in the Sanatoria also there has been an awakening, and some of those who have come among us for physical health, have received the greater blessing of soul salvation. In our Mission Hall the Gospel has been faithfully proclaimed at the regular services for children and adults, and special evangelistic services were conducted in November by Mr. Wm. Thomson. Family worship is conducted twice a day in all the Homes, and Bible teaching has been daily given in the school without let or hindrance. In every way possible we have sought to bring God's word to bear on the lives of those entrusted to our care, and we believe His promise, "It shall not return unto Me void." The year closed, while full of blessing, has not been without its trials. The death on 14th April of our friend and helper, Mr. Robt. A. Bryden, was to us an unspeakable loss. None of those at present engaged in the work can remember a time when Mr. Bryden was not of the number. In 1872, after Mr. Quarrier had issued his first report in which he outlined his plan for "Cottage Homes for Orphans," Mr. Bryden wrote him offering to give his professional services as architect for any buildings to be erected. During the 34 intervening years he ungrudgingly gave his time and skill to the work, and all the 64 buildings in the Children's City, the Sanatoria, the Colony and our City Home were designed by him and erected under his supervision. He was one of the trustees appointed by Mr. Quarrier, but in 1903 he voluntarily undertook a more active part in the management, seeing after necessary repairs, alterations, roads and drainage in the village. As chairman of the school managers he was a frequent visitor to the school, and carried out many schemes for the welfare and pleasure of the scholars. During the weeks he was laid aside, and up till the last day of his life, he desired to be kept informed of all matters pertaining to his loved work, and in his weakness and suffering found time to be interested in all that concerned it. His body was laid to rest beside that of his wife in the Dunoon cemetery, and it was a melting sight on the day of his funeral, when the great family of orphan children who had known and loved him gathered within sight of the railway as the train bearing his remains slowly passed the Homes, and with uncovered heads and in silence shewed their respect for the good man whose noble, unselfish life they will ever remember.

Among the outstanding features of this year's work was the opening of the first Home in the Colony of Mercy for Epileptics, to which further

reference is made on page 68. Also the addition of the third block to the Consumption Sanatoria, making the number of beds available 132 for men, women and children.

The installation of electric light into our two Invalid Homes was another much appreciated improvement, and was the gift of a family who desired to make the lot of our delicate little ones brighter.

Through our City Home Superintendent, Mr. Douglas, a number of the boys and girls formerly in the Homes contributed upwards of £205 for a memorial of their benefactors, Mr. and Mrs. Quarrier. This money has been expended in putting electric light into the school and teachers' house, and is already proving a most useful acquisition.

We are hoping this winter to extend the electric light system to all the Homes so as to obviate the dangers of oil lamps and to lessen labour.

The enlargement of the existing work cannot be otherwise than gratifying to all who have taken a practical interest in its growth, but this year marks the beginning of a new effort in the establishment of a fund to help home and foreign missions. This new scheme is the outcome of a special gift sent to us in February, and we hope the succeeding years will witness its expansion, and that God will use it to help spread abroad His name in the dark places of the world.

Our requirements for the coming year are greater than ever. A large addition must be made to our school premises, as the lower divisions are at present overcrowded, and we are using all the available accommodation in the village. About £6,000 can be profitably expended for this purpose. £500 has already been promised for emigration, or one quarter of the sum we hope to spend on sending 200 of our boys and girls to Canada. £1,500 more will be required to complete the outlay of £10 per child for passage and outfit. The maintenance of the Sanatoria and the Colony for Epileptics will necessitate an income of £9,000, and for the upkeep of our big family of children we require £50 every day, or £16,000 for the year. Our trust is in the living God, whose love in times past has met every need.

For the sake of those who have not seen previous "Narratives" we give an extract from last year's report:—

"It is forty-one years since our beloved father, William Quarrier, began his work among the street boys of Glasgow by the organisation of shoeblack and newsboys' brigades. Out of these developed the Orphan Homes, which to-day provide a home and Christian training for 1,400 fatherless and orphan boys and girls of all ages. In the years between 1871, when the first Home was opened, and now, over 13,000 children have passed through the Homes, 5,000 of whom have been sent to Canada. Something like £670,000 have been received in voluntary gifts, of which £270,000 have been expended on buildings, land, etc., and £400,000 on the maintenance of the Homes and Sanatoria. The work is carried on in dependence upon God for daily supplies. No one is called on for money nor do we send out collectors, or resort to bazaars and entertainments to raise funds. The needs are committed to God in prayer, and we look to Him to move the hearts of His people to send all that is required. The aim of the Homes is to witness to God's faithfulness and to provide for the fatherless children of Scotland. No payment is necessary to secure admission. Any child in any part of Scotland, if fatherless and destitute, is eligible for admission, and friends knowing of such should



apply to us at once and thus help to save the little ones from want and misery."

During the past year 410 have been added to our family, making a total of 1,671 who have been under our care. In the summary on page 74 we give particulars as to the disposal of those who have been placed out.

In the following pages we give notes of some of our gifts and letters received, also special items in the daily life at the Homes so that in this form as a history of the Homes they may be preserved, and also that our fellow labourers who read the record may be stimulated and cheered as we have been by the receipt of the gifts.

Nov. 1, 1905.—We are to-day richer financially than we have ever been on the opening day of a financial year, with £1,464 in bank, sufficient to provide food and sustenance for a whole month for our big family. We take it as an earnest of abundant supplies for the year, and pray that our trust may not be in any balance, however large, but in Him whose are the silver and the gold. Among to-day's gifts are 2s. 6d., "half of my first week's earnings," from an unknown young helper; 17s. 6d. from a grateful aunt of one of our girls; also 10s. from a mother who in her poverty sought our help for her three children. They have now been in the Homes for several years, but her circumstances have improved and she is able to provide for them. She writes: "At the time they were admitted into the Homes it was one of the greatest blessings I could have received. I must thank you for all your kindness, and I earnestly hope the good training you have given them will carry them through life. I will always remember you with heartfelt gratitude." Another helper sends four garments and some material to make others. One who subscribes herself "a friend" sends £20 for the consumptives. Altogether £37 8s. 3d. has been added to our funds to-day. Several applications have been dealt with, and among others we have arranged to take a wee boy under three years of age who has already found the world a hard place. The friend who rescued him and brought him to our notice writes:—

A sense of deep gratitude fills me this evening as I acknowledge your kind letter of to-day. Thanks be to God our Father for the hope he has given us for the orphan and the friendless and the outraged children of our land in the Homes of His servants, the revered William Quarrier and his successors. For this poor boy's sake I thank you.

Nov. 3.—A dear old minister sends 6s. with the assurance that he is always remembering us in his prayers; a Christian worker in Glasgow sends £1, and a friend in Edinburgh £1, reminding us that "the work is the Lord's and He will see that the means for carrying it on are never lacking." 13th.—£5 from "one who does not wish his name mentioned;" £1 from a donor who "is much interested;" £1 from a Port-Glasgow Bible class; 15s. from a Dundee C.E. Society, and 10s. from our fortnightly contributors, Alice, Willie and Jessie, go to make up this day's supply. 14th.—One who has helped for years writes:—

Will you kindly accept my half-yearly subscription. I enclose P.O. for seven and sixpence. I have not needed so much medicine, so give you an extra two and sixpence. May the Lord bless your labours as He blessed those of the loved ones now gone home.—Yours sincerely, INASMUCH.

Another whose giving means much self-denial says:—

I enclose 10s. for the Homes—a small sum of my hard-earned money. May God put it into the hearts of those who have much to give freely to such a good

cause. I'm sure you would grieve with many more to learn of the removal of your great fellow-worker, Dr. Barnardo. Although I never saw him, no death outside my own family circle touched me so keenly. His kind letters and his brave life so often gave me courage in my many trials, as did also the kind letters of your parents. They one and all helped the young, but I sometimes think they did a higher work in encouraging us who were advanced in years. These are happy now in the Higher Service. May their example ever help us onward and upward.

Our dear friend in her own way helped and encouraged the workers, and therefore proved the truth of God's promise that "he that watereth shall be watered himself."

Nov. 23.—The following abridged notice from the *Glasgow Herald* supplies a report of the 34th Annual Meeting held yesterday. There was a large attendance of interested friends, and a company of the children represented the 1,300 in the Homes through the kindness of a friend who has for years paid the cost of taking them to the city from Bridge-of-Weir.

The annual meeting of the Orphan Homes of Scotland was held yesterday in the Christian Institute, Glasgow. Lord Provost Bilsland, who presided, said the work of these Homes appealed directly to every right-minded citizen. Whether they regarded the work among the young, among the consumptives, or that among the epileptics in the most recent effort, entitled the Colony of Mercy, it was impossible to exaggerate, even from a worldly point of view, the advantages of such institutions as the Quarrier Homes. He appealed to the citizens of Glasgow to stimulate and help the splendid work carried on in Glasgow and Bridge of Weir. Mr. Cameron Corbett, in moving the adoption of the report and statement of accounts, said he was heartily glad that they were carrying on once more with full vigour the emigration work in connection with the Homes. He could imagine no work more completely satisfactory than that which took the children out of surroundings which made them a burden on the community and sent them out to Canada, where they were of real use, and substantially assisted the trade of the Empire. That was the economic side, but the moral side was far more significant. The surroundings of the children was not what could be desired, and it was a splendid thing that they should be given a fresh start in life in specially-chosen surroundings in a prosperous part of the Empire. Sir Samuel Chisholm, in seconding, said the work carried on by these Homes was a perfect romance, alike of modern missions and modern finance. The report and accounts were adopted.

**The Consumption Sanatoria.**—Dr. Ebenezer Duncan, in moving the adoption of the report on the Consumption Sanatoria, said that at the present moment, notwithstanding everything that was said about new cures, sanatoria still held the field as the only way in which consumption could be adequately dealt with. It was stated by the medical superintendent of the Sanatoria that they were successful in curing over sixty per cent. of those patients who came to them in the earlier stages of the disease. This was an enormous advance on anything that had been done before. Dr. Duncan went on to say that the good work done in their Sanatoria at Bridge of Weir was too often undone by the patients returning to insanitary homes or occupations before they were completely cured. What was needed was a colony to which these patients might be sent, where they might work in the open air and get a sufficient supply of good food. Dr. Walker Downie seconded, and the report was adopted.

**The Care of Epileptics.**—Dr. Fraser, Paisley, in moving the adoption of the report on the Colony of Mercy for Epileptics recently started at Bridge of Weir, said that in all probability there were as many as 8,000 sufferers from that terrible disease in Scotland. It ruined many a promising life, and instead of dying, its victims often lingered on for years and years to be a burden to themselves and others. Mr. Robert A. Bryden seconded. He said that one of the last thoughts in Mr. Quarrier's mind, a thought which had been long with him, was that in Scotland there existed no provision whatever for those suffering from the terrible disease of epilepsy. With Mr. Quarrier to think was to act, and so, during the latter months of his life, he arranged for starting the Colony of Mercy, chose a site, purchased the farm of Hatrick, and arranged with a number of gentlemen to assist him as trustees. These trustees followed up Mr. Quarrier's wishes, and had erected the first home in

the Colony. The trustees had to endeavour to get a new water supply, and through the kindness of Sir Hugh Shaw Stewart a site for an additional reservoir on the Cotter Burn was made available. The trustees had obtained money sufficient, or nearly sufficient, to execute the works required, which would cost in all about £2,700, and in three or four months from now they hoped to have an abundant supply of water in the epileptic colony. Nothing had been more apparent in connection with the work carried on by Mr. Quarrier than the fact that whenever a necessity arose at the Homes, money to meet it was forthcoming. The large sum required for this water supply had come just as the others came, exactly when it was needed. The first home of the colony was a very plain building of brick and rough cast. No money had been spent in outward adornment, but inside the endeavour of the trustees had been to make it as suitable for its purpose as Mr. Quarrier desired it to be. The building contained a large recreation room, and there were two dormitories, each with fourteen beds, with the nurses' duty room between and overlooking both. There were also two private rooms for special cases, and the building contained besides dining-room, rest room, matron's room, isolation room, and the usual apartments for nurses, and these were in the upper storey. The quarters for the epileptic patients were all on the ground level. The building was the pioneer of what they trusted would yet become a real colony of mercy for Scotland. The report was adopted, and the meeting closed with a vote of thanks to the Lord Provost for presiding.

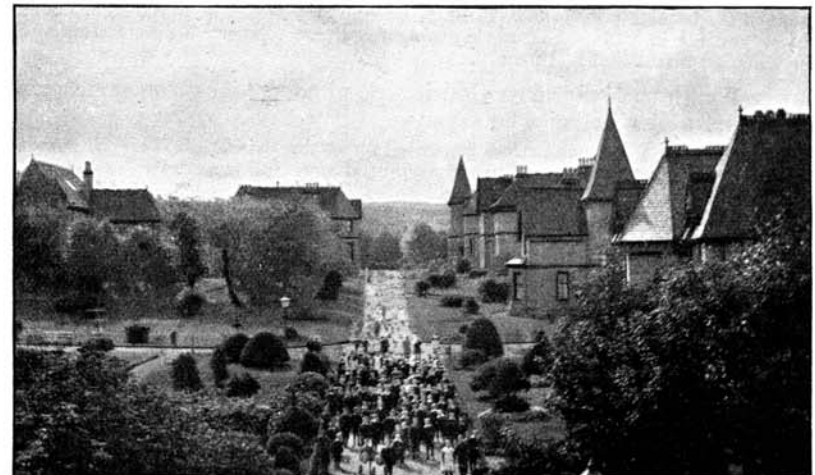
Nov. 25.—A parcel containing three articles of clothing from Kirkcaldy "in memory of a loved one," brings a note telling of the illness and death of a dear young friend who for years took a deep interest in the Homes. She had to earn her own living but denied herself much that she might (as she put it in her last letter to us), "be in some little way a fellow labourer with Mr. and Mrs. Quarrier in their great life work." Now she too rests from her labours. 29th.—£100 from a Glasgow donor who has frequently sent smaller sums; 10s from a widow who has since joined the great company of the redeemed; £2 from a Rothesay friend and one guinea from St. Andrews make an abundant supply for to-day. During the month 16 boys and 14 girls have been added to our family. Of three their minister writes:—"The mother is a widow and has struggled to maintain her family but with poor success. She is honest and very industrious as far as her health goes." Similar cases are constantly being brought to our notice, and the privilege of helping to lift the burden is one angels might well covet. When a mother is the breadwinner for the family, it too often ends in broken health for her and for the children. One cannot but admire the brave mothers who honestly strive to provide for their own, but the conditions of life, especially in our cities, are such that the children are bound to suffer not physically alone, but morally, through being left so much on the streets while the mother is at work. A case of a sadder type is that of five children in whose behalf application is made by the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children. The father has been repeatedly in prison and is now there. The mother and little ones were found in a miserable state from want of clothing, and there was no food in the house. It is utterly impossible to tell of the circumstances of many who come for help. The suffering is none the less real because it has been caused by the sin of the parents. We must pity and care for the children and try to train them to earn honestly their daily bread and to detest and keep from that which has debased and destroyed their natural guardians.

Dec. 1.—In to-day's contributions are 10s from Moniaive; £1 from an old Edinburgh friend; two guineas from a doctor; one guinea from a firm of lawyers, whose late senior partner was interested; £2 from Kirkcudbright for epileptics; £2 from Ayr; £5 "in memory of a dear husband

and as a thankoffering for thirteen years of happy married life;" and the following letter from Ireland:—

The passing of the months reminds me of a duty neglected last year, and too long delayed in the present. I am much interested in hearing from time to time of the progress and extension of the work inaugurated and for so long carried on by one whose life and energies were consecrated to the service of the Master, and dedicated to the furtherance of the best and highest good of a sadly neglected but really deserving class. I esteem it not merely a duty but a very high privilege to be permitted to assist in my small way in the furtherance of such noble work. I enclose you my check for £2 as I did not send anything last year. Wishing you God speed, and the success you and those associated with you desire.

Dec. 5.—£39 5s for the Homes, £1 for the Sanatoria, and £5 for Epileptics to-day, among which there are anonymous gifts of £1 from Eddleston; 5s from Forfar; and 5s from a working man, "a small thank offering for many blessings received;" 750 bulbs for the garden from a city firm

will help to make our grounds blossom in the spring time; six nice little dresses, six skirts, six undergarments, and two hoods will go a good way towards making six girlies comfortable for the winter, and are a welcome donation from Giffnock. Dec. 6.—£50 from a new donor was sent us to-day through a friend who takes a very practical interest in the Homes. With it comes a reminder that "our Heavenly Father ever lives," of which truth the gift is a tangible evidence; 42 garments from Glasgow, one pair of stockings and some cards from one friend in Edinburgh, and two scarves and five skirts from another, and some used clothing from Perth help to fill our quickly emptied shelves. A baker who found he had more than he could dispose of, sends a welcome present of 44 pies, 5½ dozen rolls, and 4 dozen loaves, and another sends a basket of tea bread. Our children can dispose of the 60 dozen loaves daily which our bakers turn out, and every loaf sent as a gift lessens our outlay. Dec. 7.—With Christmas and New Year's day drawing near and our hundreds of children looking to us for the usual treats our hearts were cheered by a generous gift for the purpose from friends who have for years remembered us in this way. Like many others they have found their own happiness in seeking the happiness of those who cannot recompense them. Dec. 12.—



The warehouse girls in a Hawick mill send £1; a Parish Church Sabbath School £4; a collecting bottle brings 23s 6d from an old Sanatoria patient; 5s, the frequent gift of A. G. N.; £2 from our tried friends of the Phoebe Band is an earnest of the splendid contribution of clothing which we hear is coming as the outcome of their tireless efforts for the bairns; £3 comes from one who for years has marked his birthday by sending a donation to the Homes; £4 10s from a Portuguese Sabbath School; £20 from Edinburgh; £3 10s from Ayr; £5 from Dunragit; £4 10s from Aberdeen; and £1 from "three Paisley friends," are only a few of the channels through which our Heavenly Father has sent this day's provision.

Dec. 16.—A touching gift last night was 3s 10d with the following note:—

My son has been out of work for some weeks, but is in work now, so I wish to send on a day's wage as a thank offering to God for all His care this year. I am very poor, but my Heavenly Father is very rich, and the Lord Jesus was rich, yet for my sake He became poor that I through His poverty might be made rich. May God bless you all in your noble work caring for the orphans. I lost father and mother when an infant and feel for others.

Surely "with such sacrifices God is well pleased." By the same post came £5 from a new helper who says:—

Considering the good work that is carried on at the Bridge of Weir Homes I sometimes ask myself how I have never contributed anything to assist in carrying it on. I can only say now, "Better late than never," so I beg to enclose £5 to be used as you think best. With best wishes for success in your sympathetic labours on behalf of the young.

To-day also we have £5 from Kirkcudbright; £3 from Kilmarnock; £10 from East Africa; £10 from Stirling; £4 from Paisley; 10s from Kirn; 3s from Crosshill; 5s from Millport, and the following letter from Fort Willam:—

In case I may not be able to get south as I expected, I send you a little just now of the fruits of the farm as in Deut. xiv. 22-27. It is a delight to help God's servants, especially when one is where he can do so little personally. It is very cheering to learn how the Lord is co-working with you in Orphanage and Sanatorium, etc., etc. I heard with joy from Dr. McColl of the Heavenly dews refreshing them there. My prayer is that like the oil on Aaron's head it will overflow to all the orphans and co-labourers in the work, till it becomes like days of Heaven upon earth with you all. I hope soon to be south, and would like to call if the Lord spares me. But I send you £50 just now for the orphans in case I may not again be able to help as when in the farm. Praying the Lord to uphold, bless, cheer, counsel, and prosper you and all that help in this Christ-like work.

The writer has since joined the ransomed host, and many to whom he ministered of his substance will miss his warm sympathy and fellowship.

Dec. 18.—One of our old girls who has for many years been a bright Christian and is now engaged in mission work writes:—

This time of year brings much labour in work like yours; but, oh what joy and happiness you carry into the lives of so many. My heart goes out to our God in much thankfulness when I think of Bridge-of-Weir. I wish you and all a very happy Christmas and 1906. May God richly bless you in your own souls as you look out to bless others. There is no joy like the joy of the Lord. This you prove every day I am quite sure. Will you accept this 10/ as a little offering? It is a small token of my deep gratitude for love that has been shewn to me in the past and even now. With my warmest love to you, and all whom I know and love in our beautiful children's Paradise. Yours very gratefully.

As shewing the varied ways in which our supplies come we give two letters which arrived this morning. By the same post there was a cheque for

£100, and we felt that the 3s 6d was equally if not more valuable in the sight of Him who, while on earth commended the widow's mites.

— I enclose 3/6 as part of my earnings at the potato lifting. The schools here get holidays for that purpose, and I set that aside for the Homes as a little thank-offering. It is small, but it is sent with all good wishes. You can use it for the purpose you think most needful.

Your homes have always been of interest to me, but more so since visiting them last summer; I think they are truly wonderful. Will you please accept this mite, £1, towards expenses? It is not exactly from myself, but is the result of what I call my "Penny Day," that is, I and a few friends put away a penny a week, and this Christmas, as some are Scotch and some English, I have divided the money, the one half going to Bristol and the other to you. This makes one realise more and more the value of little things.

From New Zealand £2 brings the assurance that the sender remembers the blessed work every morning at the throne of grace. By prayer distances are bridged over and the wireless telegraphy of Heaven works greater marvels than we can have any conception of. The mother of a family in the Homes brought £4 5s as a token of gratitude for help in her time of need. A gold necklace and bracelet to be sold, were sent to-day, the legacy of one who often remembered the children. A letter which brought cheer although not money was one from an old girl who writes to tell us of her decision for Christ. We have no greater joy than to hear that our children are seeking to serve God.

Dec. 25.—The past week has been one of the busiest of the year in the matter of gifts. Hundreds have reached us, and in all of them we see evidence of warm, loving hearts thinking and planning not alone for the children's needs, but for their pleasure and amusement as well. It is a joy also to believe that the poor everywhere are specially remembered at this season of "goodwill to men," that they thus share in the love which is an outcome of the great love of God's Christmas gift to the world. This week, besides £1,813 in money, there have come to hand toys and clothing in large quantities, sweets, books, tea, meat, and many useful articles too numerous to mention. It is indeed no vain thing to trust in the Lord. The children's gifts to help their fatherless brothers and sisters are always acceptable, and particularly cheering are those that come to us from the children and grandchildren of those who were donors when the work was first established. Our own boys and girls remember their old Home too, and thus seek to shew their gratitude for what has been done for them. One writes:—

I often think about the Orphan Homes, and how kind you were to me and my little sister and brothers. Such a blessing it was for us, that you took us and cared for us. I am getting on nicely in my new home and like to stay very well. I do knitting when I am done with my work. I am learning to milk. I go to church every Sabbath morning, a distance of 2½ miles. I enclose 2/6 as a small donation for your Homes. I intend, if God spares me, to send a little every year to help to repay you for your great kindness to me. After I got all my clothes for winter, my mistress got me a bank book, and put my spare money into it.

The old grandmother of two boys sends 5s. The married sister of two children in the Homes sends £1 with regrets she cannot make it a larger donation, and says—"I do not think they could have been better or happier anywhere else." Two other girls send 5s each out of their small wages. Dec. 26.—From "one who loves the Lord Jesus Christ, a thankoffering for daily mercies," 3s 6d; from one "who is always glad to be able with God's blessing to send his yearly mite," £1; "In memory of a loved one," 5s; Postal orders for 5s each, with only the post mark



to tell us that they come from Dunlop and Inverness. A friend sending £3 11s from his family circle says:—

I was one of the party which visited the Homes in the summer, and I know that every one was astonished at the wonderful and lasting monument to the reality of believing prayer. Your reports appear to be very encouraging, but still, all, like myself, must feel what a deep debt of gratitude our Scottish Nation is under for the painstaking and patient and spiritual work amongst the Orphans, which is carried out, as formerly by your revered father and mother, by yourself and Board of Management, so ably seconded in all your efforts by a devoted staff of workers.

It is only by visiting that friends can have a true idea of the extent of the work and the beauty of the children's village. We are always glad to welcome interested friends and to show them the provision God has made for the fatherless children. From Aberdeen £8 5s collected by an old helper who does not get weary of her self-imposed task. A large quantity of useful clothing has also come through the same channel; 5s and a box of toys and warm garments are the gifts of some school children "who have a soft corner in their hearts for the little homeless ones whom you tend and cherish;" a Sabbath School class contributes 10s, and 9 dolls, 10 boxes, 12 books, 8 pairs stockings, 2 pairs gloves, and 6 other articles of clothing; a happy band of Sabbath School children send from Saltcoats their heartiest greetings and good wishes accompanied by a large box of fruit—always a special treat to bairns; a neighbouring proprietor donates 24 pairs rabbits; a draper forwards 20 hats towards the 600 needed to give our girls one each; four children brought 16 dolls, toys, etc., for the 'Xmas trees, purchased with money which they made from work done by themselves and sold among friends, and their parents added 40 silk ties; a class in a public school at Brechin sends 10s; a Fort-William donor 5 lbs. tea; from Ecclefechan 2 lb. cake, 9 tins of beef, 1 lb. tea, 1 lb. coffee, and 2 lbs. soap; from Ardrossan and Dennyloanhead warm stockings; and from Strathaven other garments, which all go towards making provision for the feeding and clothing of the family.

Dec. 30.—From Saltcoats a friend writes:—

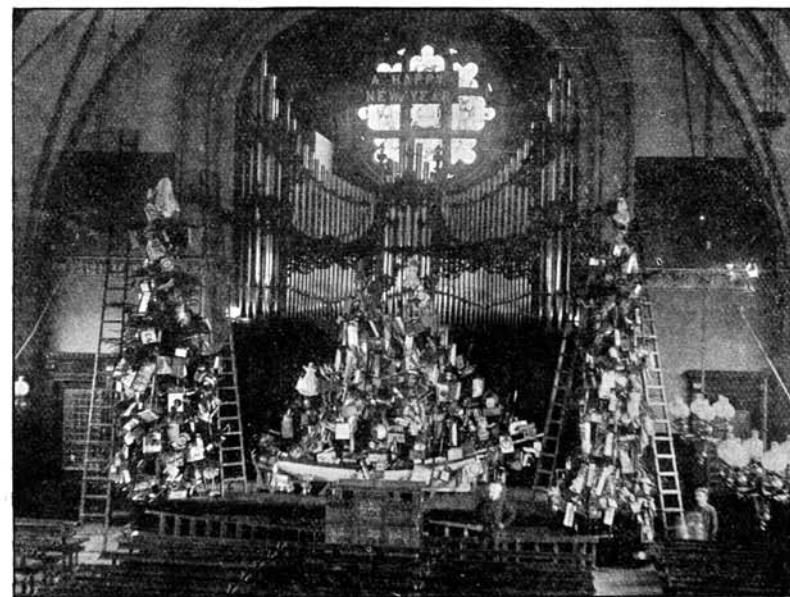
The Annual Report of the Orphan Homes duly received, and which I have read with much interest. I think it might be used as a striking proof to our Rationalist friends that there is a God on the earth, and that He hears and answers prayer. Though there are none so blind as those who don't wish to see.

I am enclosing P.O. for 5s., my usual contribution to the Children's New Year treat, and hope the good work will continue to prosper as in the past.

A dear old friend brought £25; a Christian worker with many claims upon him sent £1; a scholar in Fossoway Public School forwarded 12s 6d, the fourteenth annual collection made by children attending it; and a school teacher sends from her old and present pupils two parcels of toys, dolls and clothing, with 4s 6d from their box. We heartily appreciate the work and real self-denials involved, and feel sure the festive season will be happier for all who have helped to add to the happiness of those for whom nothing would otherwise have been prepared. Among the last gifts of this the last working day of the old year are 12 pairs of socks, the work of a devoted helper who contributes 100 pairs annually. Our cup runs over, as looking back over the past year, we call to mind the many tokens of love that have been showered upon the work. God has indeed bountifully supplied our needs, and He is the same "yesterday, to-day, and forever." Among those for whom application for admission to the Homes has been made recently are two boys 13 and 9. Their father died five years ago, and the mother is not now able to provide for or control

them. Two other boys, also 13 and 9. Their father who has just died gave instructions that his laddies should be placed in the Homes and not handed over to relatives. Three little children, 9, 8, and 6, motherless and now destitute through the death of their father a week ago. These and many others will within our gates find a home and a hearty welcome, and amid new surroundings will, we trust under Christian training, grow up to be helpers of others. To save "one of these little ones" is work dear to the Saviour's heart, and surely dear also to His followers. The possibilities wrapped up in the children cannot be estimated, and if we can translate these into Christian living and doing, our efforts will be amply rewarded.

Jan. 1.—New Year's Day in the Orphan Homes is *the* day of the whole year, and from early morn till late at night it was a round of enjoyment. Through the kindness of friends special treats were provided for breakfast,

for dinner, and for tea, and best of all the immense Christmas trees and ship's boat rigged and laden for the occasion made many eyes sparkle and many hearts beat with delighted anticipation. Everybody shared in the spoils and fruits, and the day will long be a happy memory. A pleasant evening was spent in our large church, the children themselves contributing to the enjoyment by their sweet singing, etc. At the close heartfelt thanks was offered to the "Giver of all good," and we did not forget the friends whose gifts had furnished the feast. The familiar words of the children's evening hymn, with which they always close the day, were never more heartily sung, and they found an echo in the hearts of all present—

"All this day Thy hand hath led me,  
And I thank Thee for Thy care:  
Thou has kept and clothed and fed me,  
Listen to my evening prayer."

The gifts to-day amount to £295 1s 7d for the Orphan Homes, £2 4s for Emigration, 10s for the Consumptives, and £28 17s 3½d for the Epileptics, a total of £326 12s 10½d, truly a bountiful supply for the first day of a new year. The boys in one of the homes sent 22s 3½d of their saved pennies to help the epileptics. A girl now in a situation sent £1, another 3s 6d, and one of the old boys 10s. A dairy farmer whose name is withheld from us sent £10, an old worker 10s, an unknown helper 1s, and a little worker in the Master's service 5s; while not a few of the gifts come from Sabbath Schools, Bible Classes, Christian Endeavour Societies and other gatherings of young people, "workers together with God" in feeding the hungry and clothing the naked. Jan. 3.—From Leith and Dumbarton we have £4 10s and 30s, the contents of boxes; a working man sends 10s he "was going to spend on whisky but did not." May he never again yield to the temptation to waste his money on that which destroys so many of his comrades. A legacy of £500 from one who in his lifetime was unknown to us, and £150 from "an anonymous donor," are welcome gifts at the beginning of a new year. Jan. 5.—£37 1s 8d has reached us to-day. A father writes:—

It gives me great pleasure to forward to you a little semmit which my little daughter has knitted for your children. I was pleased to see her so industriously engaged these many days back. I am anxious she should think of others not so well cared for as she is. Her mother, now in Glory, would, I am sure, have sought continually to train her to think of the needs of others, instead of selfishly seeking to please herself. Her older sister, aged 9, is busy knitting a pair of brown stockings for some of your children, I expect to be able to forward to you about middle of week. I enclose small sum—1/6, sorry it is not more. God will use it, small as it is, for His Glory, for I give it willingly.

On this New Year on which you have entered by faith, looking to God for all your needs, my humble prayer is that His presence may be your portion continuously day by day.

"A Postman" writes:—

Please accept enclosed sum (10s.) as my donation and thankoffering for God's loving kindness during 1905, and as part of my tenth to the work. Trusting you may have rich and abundant blessing in labouring amongst the homeless children.

From a Sabbath School Superintendent we have the following letter:—

I have pleasure in sending you postal orders for 30s., being sum collected by Sabbath School for the Homes. Being much interested in your noble work for God among the young, I gave the Sabbath Scholars an account of a visit which I paid to the Homes some years ago, and asked them to give their offerings for the next few months for their support. This was readily agreed to, and the above is the result. I am hoping to pay another visit to the Homes, which have grown greatly since I saw them. On that occasion I missed seeing your much esteemed father; but I seem to know him all the same, being familiar with his photograph, as well as his writings and addresses. I have for long read the annual "Narrative of Facts," in which I am greatly interested, and my wife sends yearly a parcel of clothing. How you ever manage to get through the enormous amount of work (not to speak of the care and responsibility resting upon you) is a marvel to many.

Jan. 8.—Of the £54 to-day £10 has come from one of our few friends in New Zealand, 15s is part of the Lord's tenth to help the colony for epileptics, 12s is from a family who keep "a King's bank for barefeet children," and the money is to be spent on boots for some of our family. 1300 children get through many pairs in a year, and we have reason to praise God that none have to go barefoot, and that the store shelves are never quite empty. A friend writes:—

I have much pleasure in enclosing cheque for £5—my annual subscription of £2 10s. towards the Consumption Sanatoria and £2 10s for the children. I had the great happiness of visiting the Homes last year. It was the realisation of a desire

of many years, and everything I saw added deeply to my interest in the work. One has to see it, I think, to fully understand what an atmosphere of love and home life surround the little ones.

Jan. 11.—From Peebles £12 for the keep of a child for a year, and yesterday we received from Kelso the same amount for maintenance of a little girl. From Largs a splendid donation of clothing which will fill up empty shelves, and from Ayrshire £50. Jan. 13.—From Wishaw a guinea; from Castle Douglas £2 2s 6d; from Greenock £20; from Bellshill £1; from Strathaven £4 12s 3d; from Arbroath £1; from Lonmay £2; from "Inasmuch" 10s; from Coatbridge £12 for the support of a child; from a grateful mother 3s; and from Helensburgh the following letter:—

I am pretty old and cannot do much, but I send you the widow's mite—a postal order for 2s. 6d. Sorry it is not more, but I know the Lord will bless you as He has done in the past, for He never fails those who put their trust in Him.

Jan. 17.—From Elgin £12 for another year's maintenance of a little girl the same age as the donor's daughter; from Newport a widow's mite of 4s; from Dunoon £5, with the words "a friend in need is a friend indeed." Jan. 20.—£45 13s 6d for the Homes and 10s for the Sanatoria to-day. Jan. 23.—£64 0s 2½ for the Homes and 30s for the Sanatoria; £13 is prize money gained for sheep last year. A Bible Class in Aberdeen sends 113 articles of clothing, and a warm-hearted friend who has very often remembered us in the same way before sends 52 nicely trimmed hats. Having no uniform for our children we are able to use to advantage all such gifts, and through the kindness of this friend and some others our outlay for hats is only a small one. Jan. 29.—Boxes and parcels to hand to-day from Callander, Lesmahagow, Langholm, Lochgilphead, Musselburgh, and Helensburgh, with clothing of various kinds, all bring fresh help and encouragement telling us as they do of willing helpers who have been working on behalf of our big family. We cannot express how much we feel our indebtedness to all who thus labour for us or rather for the Master whose "Ye did it unto Me" will more than repay. A bag of meal from Rothesay and an orange for each child in the Homes from a Glasgow friend were specially welcome gifts this week.

Thirty new members have been added to our number this month, and a great many other cases have been dealt with. No fatherless, destitute child is ever turned away, and many a widow's load has been lightened by the admission of some of her children to the shelter of the Homes. Our open door is a wide one, but we never think it desirable to relieve a widowed mother of all her family unless when her own health is so impaired as to prevent her earning a living for herself. Nor do we take children whose father is alive except under special circumstances, such as may result from illness, mental or physical, or when there is great moral danger to the children.

In our busy life the letters which come to us from week to week from our boys and girls in Canada are interesting and encouraging. They tell their own story of the great changes which have taken place in the experiences of many who but for the helping hand of the Homes might have made shipwreck of their lives. The following have recently come to hand:—

I received your kind and ever welcome letter, and was glad to hear from you. I have been a long time about answering your letter. But mother has been busy, and she wished to teach me better writing when answering my letters. Well, I have had a very pleasant time since I came to Canada. I got a nice home, situated



on the St. Lawrence River. I go to Sabbath School every Sabbath. I got first prize at the Christmas tree entertainment for regular attendance in my class. I got a number of other presents as well. My prize is a beautiful handkerchief box. Also, there was a tree at home, and I shared well with the rest. I went to my sisters, and had a fine trip in our new yacht. I stayed all night with my sister. I was glad to hear that the children had a good trip to Largs. I have been thinking all this day about our Christmas trees and entertainments at Bridge-of-Weir. We have three little children in my new home—two little boys and one little curly-headed girl. Alva and I go to the every day school every day. We only have about half a mile to go. We have had quite a lot of snow and some good sleighing and some pretty cold weather. I guess I will now close.—Wishing you a prosperous New Year.

I was glad to get your letter, and I am very much obliged to you for your interest in me. I have all your letters, and I read them sometimes. We are all well here, and I like this place—they are good to me. It is my home as long as I live here. It is a very nice country out here—you could not find a much better place. We are having very fine weather now. They say they never saw nicer. My sister is living in Ottawa, and I often see her. She lived with us for three years. One of my brothers works in the woods. The other rents a farm, and is doing nicely. Although I did not write, I did not forget your kindness to myself and others. I have not been very strong, and am young, and my money is not plenty, but I send you one dollar. I try to do what is right. I was sorry to hear of Mr. and Mrs. Quarrier's deaths. I have their photos that was sent to me. I just wish every orphan was as well off as I am.

I promised to write you a letter before leaving the dear old home, and I delay no longer. This is my first letter. I still keep praying every day that God will keep the wonderful work going on, and I can look back to the happy years that I spent in the Orphan Homes at Bridge-of-Weir. New Year's Day was a high time too, the great Christmas trees and the boat laden with presents for every one. I have got a very good home—there are seven of us in it. Mr. T—has three little children of his own, and his brother helps us to work the farm, and we are all happy. There are two Home boys living quite near to me, and they have not written yet, so I will tell them to write to you, and I am sure you will be glad to hear from them how they are getting along. I am keeping well; hoping all are the same. We have had a little snow, but not very much.

One thing I miss very much, that is the lovely church that I used to go to and hear the preachers speak of the wonderful Giver, and the lovely singing, and the Holy Scriptures read every time we gathered together. I must close my letter by wishing all a merry and a happy New Year.

It is such a long time since I have written to any of you that you will scarcely remember me. The last letter I had from any of you was from Mrs. Quarrier, and that is a good while ago. However, I never forget you, nor forget to pray for you. I am always sorry that I have never been able to give anything to help on with the work. But if God spares me I hope to be able to help some day. I just got the annual New Year's letter from Mr. Findlay the other day, and it was really a very nice letter, and very helpful, too. It just made me feel as if I would like to go back to the Homes again for a while. Perhaps you will remember that I came out to Canada in the year 1897 (just nine years ago). We generally have about twenty cows milking in the summer, and the milk goes to a cheese factory, and about eight cows in the winter, when we use a cream separator, and make butter. It makes a lot of work, too, but if we don't work we can't live. I was glad to hear that your work was prospering so well. It must be an awful responsibility for a woman to have on her shoulders. But, then, we know we can always have God's help when we ask Him for it. I was very sorry to hear of the deaths of Mr. and Mrs. Quarrier, and also Mr. Burgess. It just seemed to me as if it was my own father and mother that had gone from me. I suppose you have never heard anything about my mother? It is nice to be on a farm in the summer, but I don't care much for it in the winter. Well, I think I have given you all the news I can think of. Remember me to all the rest of the folks. Hoping this will find you all well, as it leaves me at present, I will close, wishing you all happiness and prosperity throughout this year.

Feb. 3.—From a sewing meeting in Bute £6; from an Angling Club, £1; from a minister, 10s; from a grateful aunt, 15s; and from a mother, 6s; from two little boys and their father, 4s; from an anonymous friend in Strathmiglo, 10s; from Edinburgh the following letter:—

I have pleasure in enclosing herewith Money Order for £7 2s 10d as our annual contribution. Of that sum, £5 2s 10d has been collected in the Children's Boxes throughout the year, and is sent specially for the Children's Homes. The other £2 is a donation from a former Superintendent of the School who has had a

very warm interest in your work for many long years. It can be devoted to any special object which you may desire. It gives us very great pleasure as a School to be able once more to help you in your work among the children, and teachers and scholars unite in the prayer that the blessing of God may continue with you—even in more abundant measure than in the past.

For many years this Sabbath School has ministered to our needs, and it is interesting to note how the past record of good work is maintained. Feb. 5.—From Thornhill £5 5s, the proceeds of the Christmas collection in a Parish Church; from two workers, £4; from a mother in memory of her little girl who fell asleep on 4th February, 1904, 15s; from a Leith children's church, £1; from one engaged in the work as a thankoffering, £4; Feb. 8.—From Forfar, £20 for the Colony for Epileptics "in memory of a loved one gone home;" from numerous places, £32 7s 2d for the Orphan Homes, and £3 12s for the Sanatoria; from a firm of bakers, 24 sultana loaves, and from another 29 loaves; from Dunning 9 warm semmits and 4 jackets; from a Kilmarnock shop-keeper, a useful parcel of dressmaker's supplies collars, etc. Feb. 12.—From China, £2; from Carluke, £50, with the following letter:—

I have much pleasure in enclosing a cheque for £50 towards the expenses of the Orphan Homes. The money is part of a fund left me by my late uncle to be spent, at my own discretion, upon the bringing up of friendless children "under the influence of the Christian religion." Apart from the wonderful good done by the work undertaken by Mr. Quarrier, I have always felt that the *spirit* and *principle* in which the work has been and is carried on has been a witness to the living presence of Christ amongst us, so that in sending you a contribution my uncle's wishes are being fully carried out.

This is one of the ways in which God inclines hearts to supply our needs, and we bless Him anew for the hearty co-operation of our fellow-helpers throughout the land, without whose loving practical sympathy the work could not be accomplished.

Feb. 14.—One of our old boys writes as follows:—

I hope this letter will reach you safely, and find you in perfect health, both of body and soul. That you are striving to follow the footsteps of your dear father, William Quarrier, is quite apparent, in the rescue of fatherless children, and, above all, in the steps of Almighty God. He it is and by whose power Father Quarrier has left a name behind him which cannot be tarnished with age—an example that will bear weight before the throne of God in heaven in the blessed hereafter. Words fail to express what God has done for me, through the agency of your father, and I am only one in hundreds—might I say thousands. He was a genuine man, a man whose name should be forever inscribed in the hearts of those he has helped and befriended, whose souls he rescued and brought to a knowledge of Jesus Christ as their Saviour. Many and many a time I have heard him preach in that beautiful church, Mount Zion. The little graveyard behind the hill is not forgotten. I suppose you laid him to rest among the children he gave his life's work for. We cannot but wonder at the works of the Lord, how He takes His servants who are accomplishing in this world good for His Kingdom. We must agree with the hymn, "God moves in a mysterious way, His wonders to perform; He plants His footsteps in the sea, and rides upon the storm." God be blessed for such men as William Quarrier. Would to God there were more in the land. Pure religion and undefiled is to visit the fatherless and mothers in their distress. I hope God will spare you long life and close communion with Him in your work, and keep your trust in God, and in the hour of need he will not desert you. I have bought a farm, and am married; have a wife and child. I expect some day, by the Lord's help, to send some money to the Homes in return for the manifold blessings I have received.

By the same post £5 has come for Emigration, which will help to place some other lad on the same ladder of success as the writer of the foregoing letter. From Leslie, £8. The sender says:—

No doubt you will wonder at me sending this letter to you, with £8 enclosed, but after you get this explanation it will be made clear. As a Friendly Society we had a member who was unable to work for a long time, and was in reduced



circumstances, so we took up a donation for him, and got a good sum to assist him. But he died at the end of last year, and we had this sum over, and as you have been good enough to make a home for his three children, we decided to send it on to assist you in your good work.

We took the children not knowing there was any fund in reserve, and the aid was therefore unexpected, but none the less welcome. Feb. 21.—From a girl trained in the Homes and now in service, £1; from an old patient, £7 15s, with the following letter:—

It gives me great pleasure to be able to send you the sum of £7 15s, which I have collected among friends for the Sanatoria maintenance. It is now four years since I left the Sanatorium. I cannot but feel deeply grateful for the treatment which I received at the Sanatorium, and to my Heavenly Father for restoring me to health and strength. I am very glad to see by the report the work is still prospering under your care. I am glad to let you know that I am feeling quite strong now.

Feb. 28.—Through another month every need has been met, and 27 children have been added to our family. In addition to abundant provision for all branches of the existing work, this month a new department has been formed through the gift of £1000 designated for "home and foreign missions." Further on in the report a fuller account will be given of this new effort. Among this month's letters from our children in Canada are the following:—

I now take the pleasure of writing to you, as I received your kind and welcome letter, and was glad to get it. I am quite well at present, and have had very good health since I came out here, and the time has passed so quickly that I can scarcely realise that it is eight months since I left Scotland. I think nobody need be afraid of the Canadian winter, as we have had beautiful weather until now; it is snowing to-day. I had a good time on Christmas. I suppose you would like to know how I spent it. I went with Pa and Ma to a party, then in the evening I went to the Christmas tree. I took part in four pieces, and also sang. Santy Claus brought me lots of candies, nuts, and raisins, and popcorn. For my Christmas presents, Pa gave me a pair of deerskin moccasins and rubbers, and Ma gave me a blue dress, a pair of mitts, and a hair ribbon. I also got two books and a blue ribbon. I got a nice text and a little book from my Sabbath School teacher, and I scarcely missed a Sabbath not at Sabbath School. I am going to try and have a flower garden this spring. Please would you send me some nice seeds to plant in it? I like going to school here very well. We have a very nice teacher. I like my new home very well. It is a large two-storey brick house. It is all fixed up nice inside, and Ma let me stand my big doll on top of the organ. I am the only girl in the house, as the other two girls are married. Oh, I must tell you about New-Year's Day. We had a nice party. We had roast goose and roast chicken, and a lot of other good things; I have not room to name them all. Oh, yes; Pa and Ma went to town a few days ago, and bought me a new dress and pinafore, a heavy woollen undershirt, and a felt hat. I also received the book you sent me, and I am trying for the prize. I have eighty of the texts found. Good-bye for this time, with love to all enquiring friends.

I write you these few lines to let you know that I am keeping well, hoping this letter will find you the same. I thank you ever so much for the nice letter you sent me, and all that you sent in it. I live on a farm of nearly two hundred acres, with thirty-three head of cattle, seventeen pigs, nearly a hundred hens, five turkeys, six sheep. I have been down in the woods quite a few times this winter, and helped to saw some big trees, and when they fell they made a noise like thunder. I can milk the cows quite quick, and often milk five or six, and I go and get the cows pretty early in the morning in summer, and go and get them at night again. Would you kindly send me the thick life of Mr. Quarrier, and tell me the price, and I will send you the money. Please excuse my writing. This is all I have got to say at present, only to wish you good this year of 1906. Enclosed is one dollar.

I received your letter safely. I was glad to hear that the boys and girls had a good time on New-Year's Day. I had a good time out here. I got a present from my school teacher and others. I am getting along all right now. I have not been sick for a long time. I received a letter from Mr. McIntosh not long ago. We got some oranges, apples, and nuts. I had just as good a time out here as the children had there. We all went away in the cutter to one of Mr. C—'s daughters for Christmas dinner. We all had a good time over there. There are three boys and four girls, and the father and mother. I have all the letters that you sent me. I must close now.—One of your orphan boys.

I will try and write a small letter to you. First of all, I wish you all at Homelea a very happy and prosperous New Year. Although the first month has almost come to a close it will not matter. Have you had a very severe winter in Scotland? We have not had it so severe as yet. I suppose you will be glad to hear that my sister is living with me now, so I feel quite happy. I like this country very well; we are chopping down trees in the woods. I saw Mr. Findlay the last time he was in Brockville, but we were in a buggy, so I could not get a very good chance to speak to him. I received your printed letter, telling all about the Homes, and about the new Epileptic Home, which was in construction before I came away, but which was completed as the letter said. I like farming very much now. A boy will like anything when he gets more and more acquainted with it. I have seen quite a few boys from the Home since I came out, and they all seem to be doing well. My sister goes to school, and is in the third book. Well, I guess I must come to a close, as this is all I have to say at present.

I write you these few lines in answer to your New-Year's letter I received some time ago. It is with the greatest of pleasure I read it from year to year, hearing how the Homes prosper so well, with every need supplied. I am sending you a small sum (one dollar), but it may lay one stone. I was much pleased with the little text-book you sent me. It is my delight to read little tracts and things like that. I have not been at church to-day, so my thoughts have been wandering over to Scotland, as they often do. We have had a great thaw, and all the snow has disappeared, and we have no sleighing. I think I have said all this time, and will close, trusting you and your friends will have a very happy and prosperous year.

March 31.—Much of our time and thought have been taken up this month selecting and interviewing the lads whom we purpose sending to Canada shortly. Many things have to be considered in coming to a decision regarding each individual case. In the first place the boy himself must wish to go; then his character in the Home, in the school or the workshop must be of the best; physically and mentally he must be sound and must pass a rigid medical examination. After that relatives may have to be consulted, and therein often lies our greatest difficulty. However the day has passed when Canada was considered a place of exile and possible slavery and the thousands of our fellow countrymen who are now "going west," know that there work, which will provide an honest living, can be found by all who seek it. The selected boys are now being outfitted, and as £10 each has already come in for all we will be able to send in this party, we are without anxiety as to the financial side of the question. Needless to say great excitement prevails in the village, and that the "fathers" and "mothers" and teachers need an extra supply of patience goes without saying. This week we have had to say good-bye to our dear friends Dr. and Mrs. Stewart MacColl who are returning to Melbourne. They have been co-workers with us for the past year in the Sanatoria and the Homes. God has used them to bless souls as well as bodies, and they leave behind them a fragrant memory of kindly deeds, helpful words, and inspiring fellowship. Our regular Friday night gathering took the form of a farewell to the Doctor, and at it reference was made to the interesting fact that our devoted superintendent, Mr. M'Fadzean, had completed 25 years work in the Homes, and was therefore celebrating his semi-jubilee. For the faithful, self-sacrificing service which he and his like-minded wife have given to the work all these years, we thank God and earnestly hope that they will be spared for many years yet to come. The following extract from *The Christian* written by our friend Mr. Climie, gives an account of another celebration which took place in connection with our City Home:—

On Thursday evening last an interesting gathering of Christian friends and well-wishers, numbering about four hundred, was held in the Orphan Home Hall, James Morrison Street, Glasgow. Bailie J. P. MacLay occupied the chair. The occasion was the thirtieth anniversary of the opening of the building of which the Hall forms a part. Built by two Christian ladies, who have since gone beyond,

as a token of their confidence in the late Mr. William Quarrier, and in the philanthropic and mission work which he carried on, it has ever since been used in a double capacity—first, as a training home for big lads and girls and for receiving all the children who are passed on to the Orphan Homes of Scotland at Bridge-of-Weir; and second, as a place in which Gospel work is carried on all the year round.

In the Hall, in past days, preachers who now rest from their labours, such as Richard Weaver, Henry Holloway, John Thomson, and others, have served in the Gospel; and of those who remain, "Fiddler Joss," Charles Cook, George Williams, and many others have given help in sounding forth the Word of Life.

The Hall itself, though not the work, sprang almost directly from a letter which Mr. D. L. Moody wrote to the *Glasgow Daily Mail* in October, 1874. He was then evangelizing in Dublin, his letter being written from there. One of the *Mail's* special commissioners had written an article a few weeks previously entitled, "Little Maggie's Home," in which the horrors of a drunkard's home were graphically portrayed. A copy of the paper having fallen into Mr. Moody's hands, he wrote a thrilling letter to the *Mail*, full of tender, telling appeal, on behalf of children like little Maggie, asking that a Home should be built for them.

Two days later Mr. Quarrier, who had been engaged in rescue work for ten years, wrote to say that little Maggie's wants had been attended to, but that to establish a Home would mean at least an expenditure of £3000. Within twenty-four hours the appeal was nobly responded to by a mother and daughter, in memory of a loved one gone before. The building, however, with the site, cost more than three times £3000 before everything was made complete, the two ladies defraying every penny of the cost.

Mr. Maclay referred in detail to the great and good work carried on by Mr. and Mrs. Quarrier, and described them as two of the noblest and best citizens Glasgow had ever known.

The mission work has been carried on for some years under the superintendence of Mr. David Douglas, who has been for over a quarter of a century connected with the institution.

April 3.—From an anonymous donor who has sent similar gifts before, £1 "to help replenish the meal bag." We use two tons of oatmeal every month, and have never been without what was necessary to replenish each barrel as it became empty. The Lord does indeed provide. We were greatly cheered to-day by a gift of £1000 for the work among the epileptics and consumptives. £800 of this will be used to pay for the water supply for the new Colony which is now nearing completion. April 7.—For weeks past we have been preparing for the outgoing of the party of 104 boys who left us to-day for Canada. A finer band it would be difficult so find anywhere, and they easily passed the medical and Dominion Government examinations to which all would-be Canadians are now subjected. We had a touching and long-to-be-remembered farewell meeting with the lads on Wednesday, and as one after another rose to testify to their faith in the Lord Jesus and their purpose to serve Him, we could not but feel that it was worth all the labour involved. To have a share in sending good citizens to our own great Dominion across the sea is worth some thing, but we covet a higher honour for our lads—the citizenship of Heaven.

Mr. Douglas, Superintendent of our City Home, his son, and one of our "fathers," Mr. Giffen, went in charge of the party. A number of friends accompanied them as far as Greenock and saw them settled in their comfortable quarters on board the Allan Line *Sicilian*. Many hopes and prayers follow the ship and its precious cargo of boys, and we trust these will be as abundantly fulfilled in their lives as in those who have already made a good name for themselves in the new land. A legacy of £1800 was paid to-day from the estate of a generous helper, who, 18 years ago built one of the Homes in the Children's City, and from year to year contributed to the upkeep of the 30 girls residing in it. £25 for the Colony for Epileptics also reached us to-day, besides £11 15s for the Homes.

April 18.—For ten days our receipts have only amounted to an average of £7 a day, and we need £60 every day for maintenance alone. This week, too, we have been passing through trial and bereavement through the death of our friend and devoted helper Mr. Bryden. We asked life for him and hoped that he would be spared to us for years to come, but the Master had need of him. In our time of sorrow we were freed from worry or anxiety regarding temporal supplies through the generous gifts that have reached us to-day. A cheque for £800 from Yorkshire, £100 from an old donor for the Colony, and £150 for outfits from the "Thomas Porter's Equipment Fund," fill our treasury. In connection with the £800 there is an interesting history. Shortly after Mr. Quarrier's death there appeared in *The Monthly Visitor* an account of his lifework, and a copy of the little paper fell into the hands of this friend in Yorkshire. He wrote asking for the address to which gifts should be sent and soon after forwarded a cheque for £100. Now this larger gift has come to gladden our hearts and to remind us what great results may follow the sowing of even a small seed. The following letter from one of our boys came some weeks ago:—

I now take the pleasure in writing a few words to let you know I am keeping well. We all had a very happy time at New Year's day, and I hope you all had a very pleasant day too. You were telling that you had the electric light in the church. I think it will be beautiful now. I wrote to the father and mother of the cottage and they sent me the photo of the boys in the cottage. No trouble happened to me all summer to keep me from work. I will be learning how to plough and drive the horses next spring, and I hope I'll be able to earn my own wages next year. I will be going to school soon. I am very far back in arithmetic, but I hope I will get on in it by the end of this winter. I would like to ask you if you could tell me my birthday and my right age. I am very sorry to say that I am not a follower of the Lord, but I hope to be soon, and I will write to you when I think I am a Christian. I will now close by wishing you all a Happy New Year.

It was a great joy to us to have another letter from him written a month later in which he says—"You will be glad to hear good news that I have received Christ as my own Saviour. I have been happy since I received Him, and I was at the Lord's supper." We have indeed no greater joy than the fulfilment of our heart's desire that all our children may be saved. Sometimes we have to wait long years for the answer to our prayers, but in the case of others there is early decision for the Lord, and for this we labour. The following letter is from an old Home boy who was sent to Canada when he was 13 years of age in 1879. After some time he moved West and there married and settled down. Like many another young man he did not keep in touch with his friends at home, and therefore did not hear of Mr. Quarrier's death. He says:—

MY DEAR FRIEND AND KIND BENEFACTOR, MR. QUARRIER,—I feel that I have been very ungrateful in not occasionally writing and letting you know my whereabouts. I have no excuse to offer but criminal neglect. It is a long time since you sent me to Canada. It will be 27 years next May, if my memory serves me correctly. In that time I have had varied experiences. I have had rough and pleasant voyages on life's sea. You see by the letter head I learned a trade. I am at present carrying on a blacksmith business that I have been conducting for the past ten years. I am a married man and have had two children, boy and girl. My boy died. So you see I have also gone through the refiner's fire. My girl is five in May. My wife is 27 years, and I am 36, as near as I know. I have a fine shop 70 feet long, where I carry on my blacksmith business. I have a fine house across the street from my place of business. There are 9 lots, 100 feet by 42 front in my residence property; 63 feet front by 100 feet in my business property. My house is well furnished. I have a piano that cost me \$345, and my shop is well equipped with tools—two blacksmith's



outfits and a wood-worker's outfit. I don't owe a dollar on anything. I do not say this boastfully, but to encourage you and anyone who may be interested in the great work you are engaged in. Above all, I want to say I am an ordained minister in the Methodist Episcopal Church, and superintendent of Sunday school. I would like to know something of my relatives. I have not heard from anyone for twenty years. I am a monument of your kind benefaction. Your great work will never be fully realised until you go to your eternal reward, and God shall say, "Well done thou good and faithful servant." May God bless you and your family.

The writer of the next letter was adopted in Canada when she was six years old and she is now a comfort to her adopted parents, and much thought of by those who know her.

Although we seem like strangers now, for it has been so long since I left the dear old place, the Orphan Homes of Scotland, yet I feel it my duty to show my appreciation for what has been done for me in the past, and also what is being done for me at present by writing to you to let you know that you and the Orphan Homes are not forgotten, although so many miles divide us. I have not written before since Mr. and Mrs. Quarrier's death, and was very sad to hear of their death, as I know they will be greatly missed in the Orphan Homes, as I know they were a good father and mother to the orphans. I received the welcome New Year letter, which I was very glad to get to hear how the work was being carried on. I am still in my home where I have been ever since I left Scotland, and have a lovely home and a good father and mother. I have been organist in the Methodist Church here for four years. It is a very nice place here, and I like it splendid. I suppose you know about Torrey and Alexander, the great evangelists who did so much good in England, being in Toronto, Ont. Father takes the *Toronto Daily* and we get the sermons every day in the paper. It is nice to read them and to learn of the great work they are doing. Well, I think I will close for this time, hoping to receive an answer soon, as I like to hear from the Homes.—Please find enclosed 7 dollar postal note as a New Year's gift to the Orphan Homes. With love from Jean.

In March the donations to hand amounted only to £495 8s 8½d. for the Homes, but during April we received £3,203 3s 10d., which more than made up for the seeming lack in the previous month.

May 1.—During the past eight weeks 69 children have been admitted, and the 104 vacant beds of the boys sent to Canada are fast filling up. This month we have to arrange for the outgoing of a party of girls, and so far as we see ahead we will require over £200 before the day of sailing to complete the amount required for passages and outfits. To-day a friend who regularly sends £10, doubled his gift, and the added £10 will pay for two of the Canadian band. It will be remembered that over a year ago a generous helper who believes heartily in emigration sent us £2,000 to be used in paying half the expenses of sending out 400 boys and girls. We have already emigrated 348 of that number, and have therefore only 52 "halves" on hand, but in addition £300 has been sent in for outfits, and we have no doubt the balance required will be forthcoming if the girls are to go. To-day one of our old girls has sent £5 which will help another. She and many others will, as the writer of a letter to hand says, "always be glad and thankful that there was such a place as Quarrier's Homes." May Day celebrations were observed as usual on the first Saturday of the month. The weather was good, and after the usual treat of curds, etc., games and sports of various kinds filled in a happy afternoon to which the young people will long look back with pleasure. May 4.—From Orkney an unexpected legacy of £165 15s 6d. May 8.—£20 for Emigration. May 9.—£10 for the same purpose. The following letter brought a welcome gift of clothing, and a word of cheer:—

I have very much pleasure in sending you our annual gift of work for your dear orphans—88 garments in all. I do hope they may be helpful and useful. We do not

attempt anything very elaborate, as the work is done at a meeting of our association. An old woman over 80, to whom we give wool, said it had been a great pleasure to her to do them, and that she had begun and finished them all herself. Another old woman with hands decrepit by pain did 2 beautiful pairs. I do earnestly hope you are being cheered and blessed in your work. I do trust you will have a rich harvest on the other shore. Here we see darkly the fruit of our labours, but yonder all will be made plain, and to the faithful ones there will be many surprises.

May 11.—£5 for emigration; and £1 from one of our old girls. May 12.—From Greenock a legacy of £661 7s. 6d. left by a dear friend who for years helped by gifts and otherwise; from a grateful mother £1. May 16.—£4 11s for the Homes, is all that has come to-day in money. Some nice warm garments for the little travellers accompanied the following letter:—

A few things for your ever needy family, trusting that all of you, both bairns and workers, are in fair health of body and soul, and that amid all the trials and difficulties that arise day by day you are greatly cheered and encouraged by the help and sympathy of friends far and wide, who rejoice in every good gift we see left you. Above all may Jesus Himself be very present with you day by day as a guiding hand, for I am sure you need Him in your great work. Oh, what a wonderful helper He is to all who call on Him, and all things are under His control, all the birds and the cattle upon a thousand hills, and then He is both able and willing to supply all our needs out of His great fulness that never gives out, but always more to follow. Oh to trust Him then more fully, for only those that trust Him wholly find Him wholly true. What matchless grace bestowed upon us, and how many have never tasted of it.

May 17.—£16 for emigration. May 18.—£17, with £4 10s 6d for maintenance, of which 7s 6d is from "Inasmuch," Edinburgh. May 19.—£5 for emigration. May 22.—From North Berwick £10 for emigration. May 29.—£13. May 30.—£10. May 31.—£20.

June 1st.—£57. With the exception of a small amount promised, but not yet paid, this completes the amount required for the 86 girls who are to sail on June 8th. With full hearts we praise God for again setting His seal to this part of the work. The following account of the farewell meeting written by one of the teachers will be interesting to many:—

On Wednesday evening a large company of children, workers, and other friends assembled in Mount Zion to bid farewell to eighty-six girls who left for Canada on Saturday. On the platform were Pastor and Mrs. Findlay, Sir Samuel and Lady Chisholm, Bailie and Mrs. Maclay, Mr. Mackeith, Mrs. Burges, Miss Quarrier, Mr. M'Fadzean (the superintendent of the Homes) and Mr. Robertson (conductor). Last to enter the church were the "emigrant band," who, looking very shy and pretty, took seats in front reserved for them, while Miss Macintyre played a suitable march on the organ. Miss Macintyre comes twice a week all the way from Ayr to add to the brightness of the services in Mount Zion, and has endeared herself to all in the "Children's City." After opening exercises six of the "emigrant" girls sang most sweetly:—

"When we gather at the Saviour's throne."

Sir Samuel Chisholm then addressed the children, speaking chiefly to those about to leave. He said that the occasion was a very solemn and at the same time a very glad one. The girls were leaving familiar and much-loved sights and friends behind, but not the love of these friends; that they would carry with them, and every nook and corner would be photographed on their hearts, and live in their memories so long as life lasted. Hundreds of thousands of Scotland's best men and women had preceded them to that land, and the British flag waved freely there, so that, although separated by the wide ocean, they would still be fellow-subjects to those in "bonnie Scotland," and, better than all, they would still be under the loving protection of "Our Father."

At Pastor Findlay's request the little "emigrant band" stood up and sang very softly and tenderly:—

"Lead me, lead me, Saviour."

Mr. Mackeith next spoke some wise parting words, clear and practical as always, and then Bailie Maclay delighted his audience with an interesting account of his first visit to Canada, and graphically described Niagara and the great river St. Lawrence. He urged them to look upon themselves as little missionaries of Jesus Christ. Mr.



M'Fadzean, who, with his wife and Miss Turner, a much respected worker, will accompany the girls to Canada, requested the friends left behind to follow the voyagers across the ocean with their prayers. Pastor Findlay then asked the children if they remembered what they had agreed to pray for since last Wednesday? The show of hands which followed the question showed that they not only remembered but had acted. "You remember," he said, "I told you last Wednesday that there were seventy-two and a half girls paid for. Who the 'half' was I can't say, but, as we wished to send out eighty-six girls, we agreed to ask the dear Lord to send the rest of the money, if it were His will the girls should go. Well, after the meeting the first donation was received, and within two days every penny was sent. The smallest donation was £5 and the largest £50. Every girl is now definitely paid for. No one had been asked for a gift; no one had been told of the want but the Lord. After the pastor had offered up a thanksgiving prayer, he intimated that their kind friend, Mrs. Maclay, who was always planning and carrying out some good thing for the Orphan Homes, invited them all to spend two hours in the church the following evening, when cinematographic views of Canada would be shown. Then the "emigrants" remained seated, by request, while their companions and friends rose and sang with great feeling:—

"God be with you till we meet again."

Mr. and Mrs. M'Fadzean and Miss Turner go in charge of the party, and many prayers follow them. Mr. M'Fadzean has crossed the ocean with former companies, but Mrs. M'Fadzean, although she has for 22 years superintended the outfitting of all the thousands of children who have been sent to Canada, has not yet set foot in the Dominion. Miss Turner has "mothered" successive families of girls in Overtoun Home for 18 years, and both she and Mr. and Mrs. M'Fadzean will get a warm welcome from many of their former proteges.

June 8.—The party consisting of 86 girls and one wee boy, sailed to-day on the Allan Line *Corinthian*.

June 23.—Yesterday was the second anniversary of our dear mother's home going. Many besides those in the inner circle of her home have cause to bless her memory. It was comforting to have a special gift to-day in a legacy of £200 left by an Edinburgh lady, and the more so that only £2 16s had come from other quarters for the day's supply. Among the week's donations there is one of £50 and another of £20 5s for the epileptics; and early in the month there was paid to us £135 for the same good cause from the estate of Major-General Lockhart, along with £450 for the Orphan Homes in which he took a warm, practical interest. In view of the early opening of the Colony for epileptics it is encouraging to have this financial help. June 30.—Recent gifts include 80 boxes of kippered herring from "Fellowship"; from Crail, 56 lbs. of butter, the first and only gift of its kind this year, and it is an article of diet we use in large quantities. One of our old girls called and left 10s; another sent 5s, "a little minding of the old Home"; from Tewkesbury a silver watch valued at two guineas, to be sold for the good of the Homes; from a few warehouse girls in a Hawick mill, 12s; from Buckhaven, "a cup of cold water" in the shape of a cheque for £5; from Glasgow, 4s, with an unsigned note in handwriting we recognise as the same that has accompanied a number of similar donations; from Paisley the following letter:—

Only a line to explain how this money has come to you to help to carry on the Lord's work among the little ones. A few months ago a friend of mine asked me if she would make toffee, put it up in pennyworths, would I sell it in the mill to help a bazaar. I did so, and after the bazaar was over and the proceeds given, the girls asked me to continue the toffee, which I did, not knowing where the profits would go. However, we thought we could not do better than send the first £1 to the Homes.

Every one thought the same, so we rejoice to be able so easy to send you £1, and hope the Lord will bless and prosper you in all your work of faith and labour of love.

June 30.—School closed yesterday, and our bairns like all others are rejoicing in the six weeks' holiday prospect. To-day a friend who desires to be called "an anonymous donor," sent us £100 to give our big family an outing to the seaside. The wherewithal to meet expenses having been provided, the next important matter is to decide when the great event will take place and where we will go to; and there are, of course, many conjectures and much excitement in all the Homes. It is a great pleasure to us as workers that generous friends make it possible for us to give our children special treats. It is a much more serious matter than it would be if one had only to plan for a family of 30 children or even 100, but with 1300 who must all be treated alike, one has to count the cost before beginning to build. We have a bountiful Father in heaven who daily loads us with His benefits.

July 31.—This is holiday month with others besides the school children, and the donations received only amount to £532. The daily receipts have been lower than at any other time of the year, varying from £1 on the 20th to £20 6s 5d on the 24th, but in addition two legacies of £270 and £50 were paid on the 19th and 20th, so that we have much to be thankful for. During the Fair Week holidays our City Home boys were at Ballantrae, and the girls were entertained at Bridge-of-Weir, and needless to say the outings were greatly enjoyed. In June and July 69 additions were made to our numbers. Among them a girl of 14, motherless, and deserted by her father who has not been heard of for 12 years. Three children about whom a minister writes:—"Their father died this week, their mother some years ago, so that the children are now utterly desolate and destitute." "A Father of the fatherless" is God, and He will provide for them.

August 3.—To-day was chosen for the girls' trip to the coast, and arrangements having been made beforehand, the party, numbering 600, were conveyed by brakes and wagons and farmers' carts kindly loaned for the occasion to Kilmacolm, where a special train was in waiting. Reaching Greenock about 9.30 they sailed from there up the Kyles of Bute, and returning landed about mid-day at Port Bannatyne. Dinner was served on the shore green, and afterwards some of the party visited Ettrick Bay, others went to Rothesay, while boating was provided for those who remained. At 4 o'clock all gathered again for tea, and immediately thereafter the return journey was begun. Beautiful weather added to the pleasure of the outing, and the day was a happy one for all.

To-day the first Colonists for the Epileptic Home arrived, and this evening our large band of workers gathered in the Recreation Room of the Home and commended to God in prayer the new Home, its inmates, and all the staff. Our one regret was that the beloved Founder on whose heart God had laid the needs of the suffering ones was not spared to see the fruit of his labour and faith. His works follow him, and we earnestly hope the new effort will extend until there are sufficient Homes for all the afflicted ones in our land. August 7.—Our boys' party, 700 in number, had their trip down the river to-day, and enjoyed it to the full. August 25.—The only gifts that have reached us to-day are 5s from "a sympathiser" for the Sanatoria, and the £29 5s 9d referred to in the following letter:—

Enclosed you will find £7 7s. 3d., the amount our dear Winnie had on hand towards her next sale of work, which she hoped to have this year and for which she was working.

Indeed, she just lived for the Homes. It was her great delight to work and get others interested in the work. There is also £1 18s. and 6d. sent, instead of flowers, from a few friends who knew she had expressed a wish that when the Lord took her home she hoped people would rather send the money to Quarrier's Homes than buy flowers; but that was not generally known, and there were a large number of beautiful wreaths, etc. There is also £20 from her father and mother, which amount we think she might have realised from a sale of work. I wish it were more, for you have our deepest sympathy in all that is done at Bridge-of-Weir to help the helpless. I think Winnie would have wished that you use this money either for Colony of Mercy or Homes, just as you think best.

Our dear young friend was herself a sufferer from epilepsy, and we have placed her precious legacy towards the new Home. Her life was short and her affliction a sore and trying one, but she forgot herself in working for others, and in so doing found much happiness. For many years she ministered to the needs of the Homes, and her gifts and bright letters were greatly appreciated by our dear Father and Mother. Now she too has entered on the rest above, and freed from her frail body, has joined the company of those who came out of great tribulation, and now serve Him day and night in His temple. Another recent gift which greatly touched us was £15 from a dear aged saint of God, now in his 98th year. Three legacies amounting to £1127 have been paid this month, which added to the £780 of donations received, rather more than covers out outlays, which were £1775 for the Homes alone. Sixty-five children were admitted during this month, and of that number 40 came from the N.S.P.C.C. Home in Edinburgh, which is being closed. We are glad to be helpers together with this Society in its endeavour to protect the children from undesirable and often cruel guardians. Many little ones, who never knew a mother's love, and never heard of the Saviour who died for them, have found a shelter in the Homes. A friend writing about a family admitted, said the mother was so depraved and hopeless that one might as well try to turn the Atlantic with a pitchfork as to turn her from her evil ways. No wonder the children for a time lived in dread that she would come and remove them from their new home and friends. The following letters from a boy and two girls now across the sea have come this month:—

I write to tell you how I enjoy to live here. It is a fine country, although there is quite a lot of hard work to do. I tell you, Mrs. Burges, there is never a night passed but I always get down on my knees and pray to my Father in heaven to bless those in the dear old home in Scotland. I wish you could send me one of the books of the life story of William Quarrier, then I would pay it after. I go to Sunday school every Sunday, and I am trying to learn all I can. I milk from four cows up to nine or ten. My master says that I am the best boy he ever had to learn anything quick. I can drive the horses, and I have to get the horse all ready to go with the milk in the morning at seven o'clock. I hope you are getting on well just now. There are four or five of the boys near the place I stay. My uncle wrote to me and told me that there are some of the boys who were brought up in the Homes who have risen to be great and wealthy men in the world. He tells me to stick in and learn all I can. I must hurry up, for it is about ten o'clock, and I have to get up early in the morning, at half-past four to milk. There has been a good minister up here a few weeks ago, and a lot of people have been converted. I have been up a couple of times to hear him. I think this all I have to say at present.—Your sincere friend.

As I write to Brockville occasionally and Mr. A. Burges sends me the Bridge-of-Weir New Year's letter, together with information concerning the work, etc., I hardly think it wise to trouble you at Bridge-of-Weir, because I know you have a great deal to do, but I do want to trouble you some this time, and if you can give me any light on what I want to ask you, I will await your further reply one way or the other. You probably have a record of my name and age at the time I was taken into the Home in 1885. I am thankful every day of my life that Bridge-of-Weir Homes ever received

me, for I am sure my life and name since have been a credit for what your good work has done for me. Well, I want to ask you if in some way you could get a copy of my registered lines containing year I was born in and date of birth. I do not feel satisfied at guessing how old I am. If you can do this for me I will appreciate it very much, and will be willing to pay well for what trouble and expense it costs you. My husband was 30 years old last March. I think I must be 30 or near there. Our home is small, but we own it, and it beats paying rent. We both worked hard to pay for it. Guess I told you I married into a minister's family. I will close now with love to all.—Sincerely yours.

Many changes have happened since I left the dear Homes, but though I have left Scotland I still keep to my Scottish ways. I was at church on Sabbath, and I did not like it near so well as my own Scottish church. I pray and read my Bible every day, and ask God's blessing through the week, and I am always telling my master and mistress how good you are to us. I know that though you and all the kind friends are not with us, you are always praying and thinking of us. I thank you for the care over me when I was there. I have given myself entirely to the Lord Jesus, and I am happy and singing in my heart to my Saviour for the nice home He has put me in. My master and mistress are very good to me. I have 20 cows, 12 pigs, 85 chickens, 2 horses and 1 dog, 2 little children, boy and girl; the boy is 2½ years old, and the girl is 11 months.—I still remain your Scotch girl.

September is our "Thanksgiving" month, and the return of it reminds us of many landmarks in the history of the Homes. The 29th of Sept., 1829, was the birthday of the beloved founder. On the 13th of Sept., 1871, he received the letter promising the £2000 which he had asked God to send him as a sign, and he then began the work of the Orphan Homes. On the 17th Sept., 1878, the Central Building and the first two Homes in the Children's City at Bridge-of-Weir were publicly opened and dedicated to God's service. Each alternate September since that date (with the exception of 1896), has witnessed successive "Thanksgiving Days," and the dedication of new buildings. Nor can we forget that Mr. Quarrier's last public address was given in Glasgow on the 17th of Sept., 1903, a few days before the beginning of his last illness. Thanksgiving Day this year was fixed for the 26th of September as being the nearest suitable day to the anniversary of the founder's birth. The following account taken from *The Greenock Telegraph* describes the proceedings:—

#### THANKSGIVING DAY AT THE ORPHAN HOMES OF SCOTLAND. OPENING OF THE EPILEPTIC HOME.

It serves to show how near to the heart lies the interest taken in the charitable work at Quarrier's Orphan Homes when so many subscribers and friends attend the thanksgiving day services held every second year. Here are no charity-givers who console themselves that they have done all when their names are on subscription list, but people whose sympathy lies deeply in the good work they are glad to help. Well over 2,000 people—the majority from Glasgow, but many also from Greenock and other places—must have been present in the Homes yesterday. The occasion was of peculiar interest. Over and above the fact that it was the day set apart for thanksgiving, made to coincide as nearly as possible with the anniversary of the birthday of the late William Quarrier, the service in the church included the dedication of the first home of the "Colony of Mercy" for epileptics, the third pavilion in the Consumption Sanatoria, and the new water works. Since yesterday Quarrier's Homes consist of three distinct divisions. First, there are the well-known Orphan Homes for destitute children; secondly, the Consumption Sanatoria, situated a little distance from the Homes proper, which will now be comprised of three pavilions, for men, women, and children respectively; and thirdly, the new Colony of Mercy. This last scheme for the treatment of epileptics had its origin in the same source as the others, in the mind of William Quarrier. Within three years of his death the first house has been built solely by voluntary subscriptions, and has now been formally opened. Twelve young men, colonists (as they are called), are now actually installed in the house, which will be gradually filled up as suitable applicants are brought forward.



The weather was kindly to the proceedings yesterday, the day being bright and clear. Many of the visitors arrived in special trains from Glasgow, and drove out to the Homes from Bridge-of-Weir in brakes. Shortly after noon, the boys and girls marched in procession from the Homes to the Colony of Mercy, where the formal opening of the First House took place by Mr. J. P. Maclay. Visitors then walked back to the church in time for the thanksgiving and dedication service at two o'clock. Sir Thomas Glen Coats presided, and he was accompanied by Sir Samuel Chisholm, Rev. J. E. Campbell Colquhoun of Killermont, Mr. D. J. Findlay, Mr. J. P. Maclay, Mr. MacKeith, Dr. Howie, Mr. Orr-Ewing, Mr. W. A. Campbell, Mr. Alex. Sloan, Dr. E. Duncan, and others. The church, which holds over 1,500 people, was crowded. After the singing of the Hundredth Psalm, Sir Thomas Glen Coats, as chairman of the meeting, welcomed all those who were present. The object of their meeting that day showed, he said, that the good work begun by Mr. Quarrier had not ceased at his death, but was being carried on most efficiently by Miss Quarrier, Mrs. Quarrier Burges, Mr. Findlay, and Mr. Maclay, and by a devoted number of assistants. Since last meeting they had suffered the loss of one who had taken a most active share in the work, Mr. Bryden. Sir Thomas then said he was sure they would all rejoice that an outlet had again been found in Canada for many of the children, which was, he thought, a most hopeful phase of the work. They could never send a surplus of children there. From the opportunity those present had that day of seeing over the buildings, he was sure they would all take a still more deep interest in the work, and would evince an active sympathy, not only directly but also in the direction of interesting their friends in it.

Mr. Findlay said that during the three years since the work was bereft of its great founder and father, God had most manifestly helped those upon whom his mantle had fallen. So they had to testify that afternoon that every need had been supplied. In fact there had never been a year that so goodly a balance lay in their hands as there was at the present moment. He did not know whether he should have told them that in case it might have an evil effect upon some. From what he said it could be seen that that meeting was in the very fullest sense a thanksgiving service. During the two years since last they met they had received into the Homes 719 children. 379 had gone to Canada, and in that connection he said he was an enthusiastic emigrationist. They had splendid homes there, and were well cared for, and during the last two years they could have found homes for ten times the number. He did not know one child who had expressed a desire to come back to the old country to live. In addition to these, 394 had been placed in situations. At the present moment their family numbered 1,270 children. They also had received 350 patients in the Consumption Sanatoria. Their two years' receipts—all voluntary donations from friends—for the Homes amounted to £46,764; Sanatoria, £15,141; and Colony of Mercy, £4,703, the total income being £66,609. The new Colony of Mercy house, he said, was good value for the £4,000 and upwards which it cost. There were new sewage works, new water works (costing about £3,000), and electric lighting of certain parts of the village. The new block in the Consumption Sanatoria cost upwards of £10,000. After referring to a new fund which had been started for Home and Foreign Missions, Mr. Findlay spoke of the new epileptics' Home. The first Home was for young men. They had at present about 20 openings, and they made a definite charge of 10s. a week. Where that could not be paid by the Colonists or their friends, the amount might be supplemented by Parish Councils. He concluded by requesting names of young men who would be eligible for the new Home.

Other speakers followed, including Sir Samuel Chisholm, Rev. Dr. Howie, Dr. Duncan, and Mr. Orr-Ewing.

After the service and during the afternoon, the village chime of bells played sacred and national tunes while the visitors were shown round the buildings and over the ship, which always attracts an amount of interest. An exhibition of drill was given by children in the school, and in the evening a meeting was held in the church at which the children sang and recited. Refreshments were provided on the grounds.

Sept. 29th.—Many gifts, with encouraging words of sympathy and cheer have come to-day, and although the sum total of money is not large, being only £30 1s 10d, the love in the offerings is worth a great deal more. From "one who thanks God for the memory of your beloved father," £1; from mother and children in one of the Homes, £2 13s 6d; from two workers, £3; from Paisley, a birthday in memoriam, 5s; from two helpers,

£2 each; from another, £1, and from a friend, 10s; from Stonehouse, some material for garments, sent in memory of a dear sister who died a year ago, and who sent annually some clothing for the children; from the mother of a devoted helper who has also finished her earthly course, 8 articles of clothing; from Montrose, 6 Testaments, 13 pairs of stockings, and 6 ties; from London £1, and 10s; from profits on photographs, 10s; from Leith, £2; from "one who truly reveres your worthy parents' memory," £3; from Huntly, 5s. It was peculiarly gratifying to have on this special day the promise referred to in the following extract from a letter:—

"In regard to 1907 I would like to contribute one fourth of all the emigration expenses in sending as many of your young folks to Canada next spring and summer as you are able to send, say, about £2 10s. each. I hope that the number will reach about 300. I will send £500 in advance at Christmas, and will look forward to your being able to call on me for £250 at least more by the early summer."

The writer is the same kind friend who paid half the expenses of the 400 boys and girls sent to Canada since Oct., 1904. At £10 per head 200 "one fourths" are included in the promised £500, and the same number of "three fourths," i.e., 200 times £7 10s will be required before next summer if we are to send 100 boys in spring, and as many girls in May or June. God will guide in this matter as He has ever done by the supplies He sends.

One of our invalid boys who is paralysed, was to-day made happy by the gift of a beautiful invalid chair in which he will be able to wheel himself about. A friend home on a visit from South Africa when going through, the Homes noticed the little lad and asked if there was anything he could get for him, and when told that the boy was praying for a chair he generously provided it.

October.—The last month of our financial year brings with it extra work and sometimes extra anxiety, but this year we begin the month with a balance on hand more than sufficient to cover all our expenses. We are reminded of a New Year letter from an anonymous friend in Kilmarnock who sent £1 with the wish "that we might see the work prosper in the coming year, and that we might be saved from all worry in having all our needs regularly and suitably supplied." God has abundantly answered this prayer. To Him be the praise. In looking back over the year we find there has not been a single week-day without a gift. It has been impossible to refer to more than a few of these, but they will serve to shew in what a variety of ways God has provided for His work entrusted to us. We sometimes say if "receiving" is so blessed what must the "giving" be, for we remember the words of the Lord Jesus how He said "it is more blessed to give than to receive."

## EMIGRATION WORK.

THIS department of the work has gone steadily forward, and we have been able to send to Canada in the past season 191 boys and girls. The boys' party sailed in the spring in charge of Mr. Douglas, our City Home Superintendent, and the girls' party in the summer in charge of Mr. and Mrs. M'Fadzean, our Superintendents at Bridge-of-Weir. Both parties met with a cordial reception on the other side, and all of the children were speedily placed in the new homes where their arrival was eagerly anticipated.

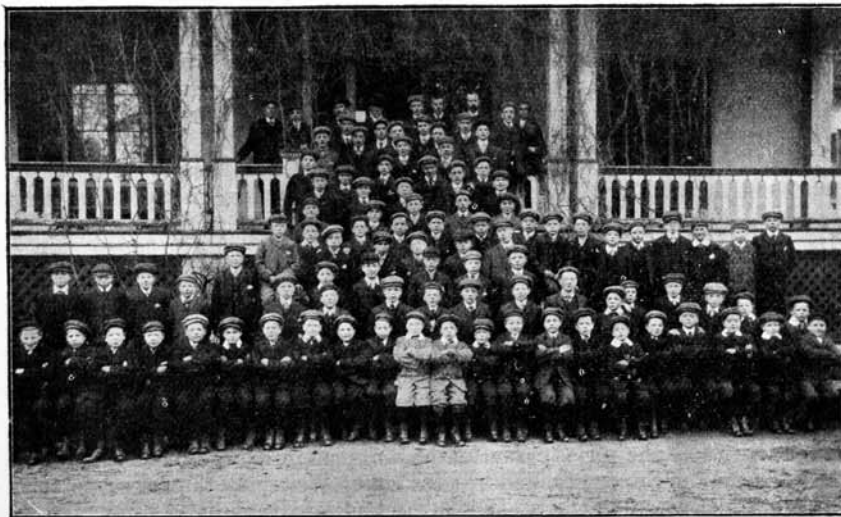




FAIRKNOWE HOME BROCKVILLE ONT.

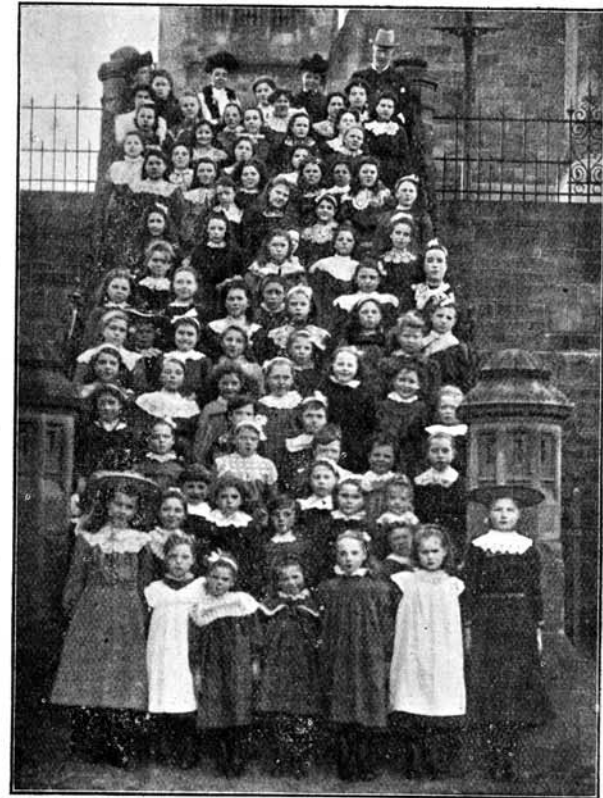

The more fully we become acquainted with the conditions into which the children are transplanted on the other side of the ocean, the more are we convinced of the wisdom of sending as many of them as possible to that splendid and healthful land. The average boy or girl gets a chance in Canada such as very few of them could ever receive here

Mr. Burges, our excellent Superintendent at Fairknowe Home, and his assistants, carry out a regular and thorough system of visitation of the children until they are eighteen years of age, and every care is taken to see that they are placed in the right class of homes. Nearly all of them spend, at least, the first few years of their life in Canada on farms, where the conditions of physical life are healthy, and there are not the same abounding temptations which life in the city surrounds them with. From time to time we meet with our old children here, now men and women, living in such conditions and surroundings as we have never seen in Canada, and would not know where to look for there.

We are already looking forward to the emigration parties for next year, when we hope to be able to send out at least two hundred carefully selected and trained children. For the passage and outfit of this number we shall require special donations of not less than £2,000. Towards this sum a generous friend—who has largely helped in past years—has promised £500 to be used in meeting one quarter of the outlay on each child. No child has ever been sent from the Homes to Canada without being first specially paid for, and we have no doubt that before the sailing day comes round again God will indicate by the supplies sent in how many each party should consist of.

## HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS FUND.

It has for long been in our hearts to do something more for Foreign Missions in connection with the Homes—not that nothing has been done, for the children and workers have for years been giving upwards of £200 per annum to this object. In the beginning of the present year “A friend of Home and Foreign Missions” sent in a generous donation of £1000 with the expressed desire that we should open such a fund as that named above. This we took as clear guidance to go forward, and already the

new fund has brought added cheer and brightness to the lives of some of the noble men and women who are doing our work amongst the heathen and godless in various parts of the world. We have no thought of inaugurating a new mission—our purpose is to help existing organisations by supporting, in whole or part, as we are enabled by gifts sent in, missionaries at work under their auspices. We have for many years carried on a wide correspondence with missionaries in various parts of the Home and Foreign fields, and have exceptional opportunities of knowing where needs are great, and where a little extra help may be of special value.

In this way it has already been our privilege to send help to 46 missions or individual missionaries in sums ranging from £2 2s. to £100. In addition to this occasional help we have undertaken—should funds be forthcoming—the entire support of four missionaries, and these will, it is hoped, be added to from time to time. Meantime “our own missionaries” are :—Mr. Cuthbert Nairn, Field Superintendent of the Southern Morocco Mission; Mr. John Ritchie, at present located at Arequipa, Peru, and working in connection with the Regions Beyond Missionary Union; Miss Agnes G. Leith, at work in Kwei-Ki, Kiangsi Province, China, in connection with the China Inland Mission; Miss Margaret E. Tomlinson, working in Pernambuco, Brazil, in connection with the “Help for Brazil” Mission.

Mr. Nairn is a tried and valuable worker who has done some sixteen years of excellent work in Marrakesh, the capital city of Southern Morocco, and it is a privilege indeed to be permitted to minister to him in temporal things. He has recently returned to his difficult and arduous work after a very brief furlough at home. Mrs. Nairn, with two of their children, has since joined her husband, and we would specially commend them and their devoted fellow-workers to the earnest prayers of the Lord’s remembrancers.

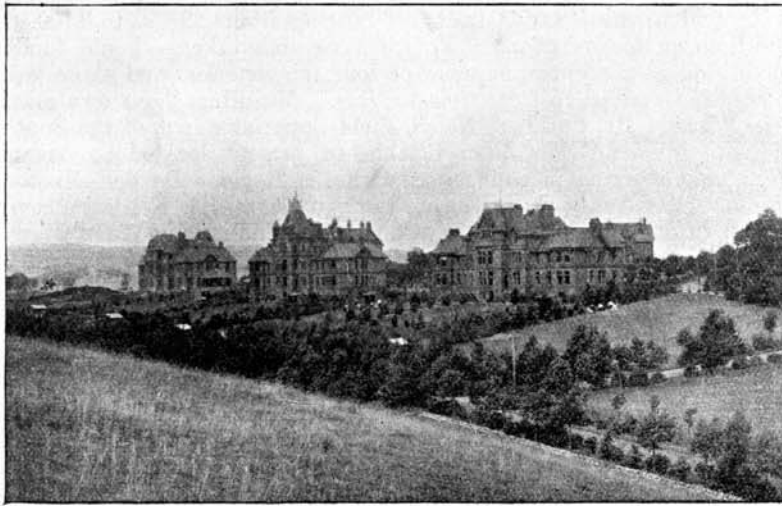
Mr. Ritchie has only recently reached the field of his future work. He was born (John iii. 3) and brought up at the Tabernacle (Glasgow), and underwent three years of special training at Harley College, London, before going forth to the work to which he has devoted his life. He has already had a little taste of persecution for Christ’s sake, and is finding that it is not likely to prove an easy matter to live and witness for Christ in what is reputed to be the most bigoted of all the Roman Catholic states of South America. “Brethren, pray for him.”

Miss Leith was for some years House Mother in one of the cottages at Bridge-of-Weir before proceeding to China, which she did three years ago. She is working in connection with Miss Marchbank on the Kwangsin River, and is chiefly occupied in school work in which she has already had much blessing, not a few of her pupils having been happily converted.

Miss Tomlinson has been just over a year in Pernambuco. There is a strong native church in the city, planted originally by Dr. Kalley, and carried on for many years under the spiritual ministry of Pastor Fanstone. Here our sister finds a congenial sphere of service. Much of her time is spent amongst the young, some of whose hearts have been opened to the reception of the Saviour. Need we say that both of these sisters will be thankful for prayer?

These are samples of the kind of work we propose to do through our “Home and Foreign Missions Fund.” We do not appeal for subscriptions, and of course we shall never ask any one for money, but if the plan commends itself to any of our friends, and they feel drawn to send some of their Lord’s money through this channel, we shall gladly be their almoners, and think we may assure them that whatever sums are committed to our care will be made a wise use of for the extension of the Kingdom of God in the regions beyond.

ANOTHER year of the fight with the terrible disease of consumption has not diminished our estimate of the need or value of this department of the work at Bridge-of-Weir. At date of writing all our available accommodation is occupied, and a number of suitable patients are awaiting vacancies. When—in a few months—the third large block is ready for occupancy, placing forty more beds at our disposal, it is the purpose of the Trustees to throw the doors open to men, women and children as suitable cases are brought to our notice.

The results of the work are three-fold—educative, remedial, and curative. While only a proportion of those who pass through the Sanatoria can be spoken of as “apparently cured,” most, though not all, get some physical benefit; but whatever the results of the treatment may be in individual cases, all should go forth as apostles of hygiene, and with a practical training as to right methods of living which should prove most useful in the social and family circles to which they return.

We cannot give any guarantee of physical blessing to any of those who come seeking our help, but we can promise to all who are willing to receive it a spiritual blessing, and it has been a deep joy to know that during the past year not a few hearts have here been opened to the Saviour and have gone back to their homes with the new found joy of salvation, making life worth living indeed.

It is satisfactory to find that the income, composed of many generous donations, large and small, together with the partial payments of the patients, has fully met the year's expenditure, which has fallen considerably below the estimate, principally on account of a modification of the diet.

The interesting reports of the medical officers on the following pages, give the record of a year of strenuous work, faithfully carried out, with the desire to help and bless these afflicted sufferers.

Two important changes have been made in the staff during the year. In the spring Dr. D. Stewart MacColl left on his return to Australia, and was succeeded in the medical superintendence by Dr. John Guy; and Miss Lennox, who has been Matron since the beginning of the work, and whose services were greatly appreciated by Mr. and Mrs. Quarrier and by the Trustees, has just retired on account of advancing years, and her important post has been filled by Mrs. Wyatt.

The building of the new block will soon be off our hands, leaving us free to proceed with further buildings as soon as the Lord may move the hearts of His stewards to send in the means requisite. Similar houses to those already erected cost about £12,000 each, including furnishing.

## ANNUAL REPORT OF MEDICAL OFFICER.

### CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF ADVISORY BOARD,

GENTLEMEN,—The following is report for the 12 months ending 31st October, 1906.

The year began with 76 patients in residence; and during the year 152 patients were admitted and 153 discharged, and at the close there were 75 under treatment.

**DURATION OF RESIDENCE.**—The period of treatment varied in length considerably in each individual case, but the average term was 178 days or approximately 5½ months. The minimum stay was 56 days, and the maximum 442 days. The latter term of treatment indicates forcibly the oft repeated statement of the necessity of beginning the treatment of Pulmonary Phthisis at as early a date as possible, as delay means, at the very least, a much more prolonged period of treatment and what might have been remedied in three or four months requires, as in the above case, 14 months and gives a much less satisfactory result.

**RESULTS.**—With the 153 patients discharged during the year the following results were obtained:—

Apparently Cured.	Disease Arrested.	Improved.	Not Improved.

The terms descriptive of the results are similar to those in use in previous years, and their meaning is appreciable by the following definitions:—

“Apparently Cured” includes all those cases in which the physical



signs of active disease have disappeared; temperature, pulse and respiration are normal; cough and expectoration are absent.

"Disease Arrested" includes those where physical signs are still present but greatly modified and indicating quiescence; general condition good and patient fit for work; sputum giving negative results on last examination shortly before leaving.

"Improved" includes all those in which the physical signs are only slightly modified, but with the general condition greatly improved, as evidenced by increase in weight and the absence of constitutional disturbance; tubercle bacilli still present in the sputum.

"Not improved" includes all cases showing no signs of betterment locally or constitutionally.

**Stages of Disease on Admission.**—In the cases of the 153 patients discharged this year the following is an analysis of condition on admission:—

1st Stage (Early)	2nd Stage (Intermediate)	3rd Stage (Advanced)

On comparing the above figures with those given as to the relative proportions of the numbers cured, it will be at once apparent that the comparatively small numbers of apparent cures, namely 19%, could be much increased if a larger number of the cases were admitted in an earlier stage of the disease, as it will be perceived that during the past year out of the total of 153 treated only 59, or about 38%, were in an early stage. As these apparent cures, almost without exception, are found in the patients in an early stage, it will be seen that if we could deal only with early cases the apparent cures would mount up from 19% to 50%.

There is something monotonous in the iteration and reiteration of the importance of the early recognition and treatment of this disease, but the justification for it is that it so often falls on deaf ears, and it would appear that the vital importance of this fact is unknown or forgotten, judging from the cases which are sent as "likely to be cured." It is not fully appreciated, for instance, that a patient with a cavity in one lung, no matter to what degree cure may take place, remains somewhat crippled, as the lung has been permanently damaged and cannot be restored to its original structural integrity, although such a cure is quite compatible with a fairly useful and moderately active life.

**Weight of Patient.**—To this, there is not now so much importance attached as there was formerly, when forced feeding was used as the easiest part of the treatment to increase the patient's weight, but unfortunately the increase of weight is not always a proportionate sign of the amount of betterment in the lung condition. The point aimed at is to get the patient up to the usual weight in health, and then if possible, to a few pounds additional.

**Treatment.**—On this point there is little new to be said as it is, substantially, as in previous years. Dietetically there has of course been a total departure from the methods in vogue at the beginning of the "open air" treatment, for from a diet with a heat equivalent to 5000 calories, it has been gradually reduced until now it stands at from 2500 to 3000 calories for women and 3000 for men. The result is quite satisfactory from every standpoint, and the patients gain weight on it steadily.

**After History.**—Through the kindness of my colleague, Dr. Thomson, I am enabled to present a few facts as to the present condition of some patients who were under treatment during part of the years 1902 and 1903.

Altogether 65 patients were enquired into, but of these 27 could not be traced, chiefly because of change of residence. Of the remaining 38 from whom replies were received, the following is the result:—

## REPORT BY MEDICAL ADVISORY BOARD.

THE Board met in February, May and October, when the Medical Officer's Reports, previously circulated amongst the members, were considered, and points arising discussed. In May the Board met at the Sanatoria and inspected the new Block for Consumptive; then building. The other meetings were held in the Hall of the Faculty of Physicians and Surgeons in Glasgow. Monthly visits by the members of the Board to the Sanatoria have been maintained during the year. The Board much regretted losing the services of Dr. Donald Stewart MacColl as Medical Officer, on his return to Australia, of Professor J. G. M'Kendrick from the Medical Board, on his retiral from his professorial chair, and of the deceased Mr. Robert Alexander Bryden, who had been associated with the work since the inception of the Sanatoria. Dr. John Guy, formerly of Leeds, assumed the duties of Medical Superintendent early in April. Since last report, an improved system of dietary has been inaugurated, and a resolution passed expressive of the Board's cordial approval of Compulsory Notification of Consumption.

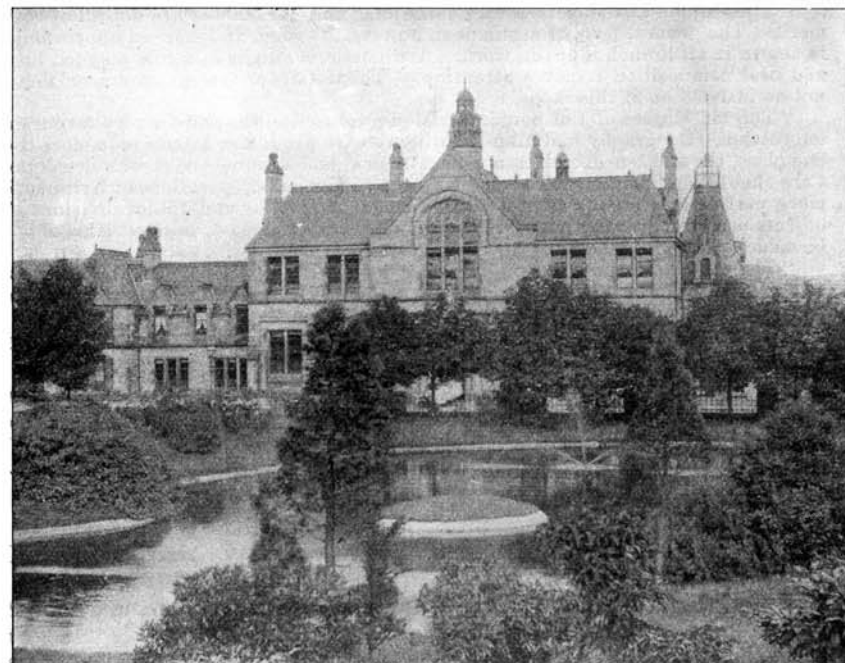


### COLONY OF MERCY FOR EPILEPTICS.

WE give our friends above a more finished picture of the first house in the Colony than we were able to furnish in last report. It will be seen that the place is gradually taking on a more "homelike" appearance. This house was opened more than three months ago and is proving well suited for the object for which it was designed.

There are already some sixteen young men in residence, and additions are being made to the number week by week. They have come from different parts of Scotland, and from different walks in life, but most of them seem to be the sort of men it was in Mr. Quarrier's great heart to help when he planned this latest development of his wonderful work. Each Colonist—we have no "patients" here—contributes ten shillings per week towards the cost of his board, and keeps himself in clothes. Their work—which is under the direction of the medical superintendent—consists of such household duties, garden work, assistance in the joiner's and shoemaker's shops, the bakery, or any other work as they may be found fit for. A considerable portion of time is devoted to open-air games, and already this healthful round of regular work and play is telling beneficially on most of the Colonists, some of whom look like different individuals than they were three months ago. There is, alas, little human reason to look for many complete cures among these terribly afflicted ones, but we may expect much improvement in many and cure in some cases, and it is at anyrate something to have made it possible for them to spend their days in such delightful surroundings and conditions.

This first house will soon be full, and what is to be done then? More houses should be proceeded with at once, but this cannot be done until money is in hand. Houses on the same lines will cost about £4,000 each, and we shall rejoice if it is made possible to proceed with a second in the spring of 1907. Gifts will also be welcomed towards the supply of daily needs, which are only partially met by the payments of Colonists.



### REPORT ON THE ORPHAN HOMES OF SCOTLAND SCHOOL.

THE Board of Management for the School beg to report as follows:— During the year ending 31st October, 1906, good progress has been made in the work of educating the scholars, under the care of Mr. J. Gordon Kennedy, M.A., Headmaster, and the staff of teachers under him. There have been many changes owing to the departure of two large contingents of the children for Canada, and the influx of new children, many of whom are behind in their education when they come to the Homes. During the past session, the average number on roll has been 943, with an average daily attendance of 892.3, giving a per centage of 94.6. There are at present 953 children on the roll, and as this number greatly taxes the present Classroom accommodation, the Trustees are considering the advisability of making an addition to the school building.

The staff consists of the Headmaster, twelve certificated teachers, four assistants, 3 pupil teachers, a teacher of Drill and Singing, a teacher of Cookery, and a teacher of Laundry Work. The Managers are gratified to be able to state that the work done has been favourably reported on by H.M. Inspector for Renfrewshire, Mr. D. Munro Fraser, who with several assistants has throughout the year inspected the school. Mr. Fraser's last official Report was as follows:—

"The School is steadily rising in efficiency. There has been a perceptible strengthening of the staff, and one and all seem devoted to their duties. The supervision of the Headmaster is constant, effective, and thorough and his wholesome and elevating influence is felt throughout the School.

"An excellent impression was formed of the Infant Department. The untiring vigour of the Headmistress deserves special recognition.



"The Junior Division is a very large one, and the classes are not all of equal merit. The general level of attainment, however, is good, and marked improvement is shown in all branches of the work. Arithmetic is taught as a rule on good lines, and oral composition receives attention. The details of formal Grammar should not be insisted on at this stage.

"The six classes of the Senior division produced in the main a very favourable impression. Geography and Map Drawing receive particular attention in more than one class, the written exercises are usually neat and intelligence is well developed. Care should be taken to revise constantly the fundamental operations of Arithmetic, more particularly on the mental side. In both the Senior and Junior divisions the objects used for drawing purposes should be carefully graded, and provision should be made (where it is lacking) for drawing on large surfaces.

"The classification of the pupils is attended with more than usual difficulty—so many pupils entering school and so many leaving—but the difficulty is resolutely faced and successfully dealt with."

In connection with the Day School a sub-committee of ladies has been appointed to supervise the needle work in the school.

For the education of scholars over 14 years of age, the series of classes under the Continuation Classes Code, has been continued. The number of enrolments during last session was in all divisions 326. In Division I. there were held six classes for the completion of General Elementary Education. 54 girls were given instruction in the Cookery class; 15 lads resident in the "James Arthur" ship on land, studied Navigation under Captain Korn, all in Division II., while 13 lads were instructed by him in Band Music under Division IV. In Division II. there was also held a class for the instruction of the older girls in Household Management, and an "Ambulance" class, mainly for the benefit of those lads going out to Canada, was carried on by Dr. H. Hyslop Thomson. Certificates, as approved by H.M. Inspector, were presented by the Managers to those students who attained sufficient proficiency in the various classes in Division I.

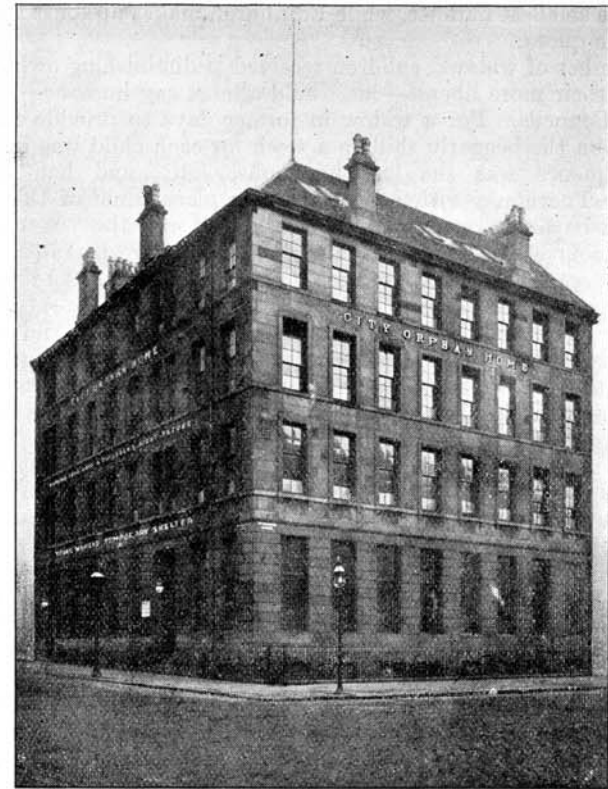
The Managers' expenditure in connection with the Day School for year ending 31st January last amounted to £2,203 9s 1d. Against this they had on hand £1,612 12s 1d., being Parliamentary Grant brought forward from previous year; and have received Grant in Relief of School Fees, £609 4s; General Aid Grant, £139 10s; Aid Grant, £138 6s; and Bank Interest, £11 8s 10d—leaving a balance on hand as at 31st January last of £307 11s 10d available towards school expenditure during 1906-07.

Towards the expenditure of the Continuation Classes which amounted to £156 6s 2d., the Managers had on hand £1 14s 6d, and received from the Department a grant of £116 14s 4d, from the Renfrew County Council, £3 10s, and Bank Interest, 19s. The balance was defrayed by subscriptions amounting to £35, leaving £1 11s 8d to carry forward.

In closing this Report, the Managers would refer to the loss the school has sustained through the death in April last of their chairman, Mr. Robert Alexander Bryden, who had occupied this position since the school was re-organised by Mr. Quarrier in 1903. One of his last public acts in connection with the school was to deliver an address on "Progress" at the Annual Musical Demonstration of the scholars held on 21st December, last. The Managers also record with regret the death of Mr. R. B. Smith, F.E.I.S., who for two years kindly conducted a control examination in connection with the Continuation Classes.

Mr. J. P. Maclay has been elected Chairman, and during the year Mr. W. A. Campbell, Pastor D. J. Findlay, Miss Mary Quarrier, and Mrs. A. Quarrier Burges have been added to the Board.

### CITY HOME—SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

FULLY occupied as we are with the daily routine of necessary duties, it is difficult to know what would most interest our co-workers who read the report.

Nothing is more surprising even to those who, by experience, have learned to expect it than the faithfulness of our Heavenly Father in fulfilling His promise, "a Father of the fatherless is God," by sending through His stewards an abundant supply for every need. As has often been expressed, many feared when the human Head was removed the funds would diminish, but instead there never has been such superabundance. Compared with many others who have to curtail expenditure for lack of support we cannot but feel grateful, and ask all who read this to join with us in sincere thanksgiving.

The total number of children admitted is rather above the average of the last few years, but appears only temporary owing to some special circumstances, especially the receiving of the inmates of Murrayfield Home, Edinburgh, now closed. As the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Children has now no permanent home, we anticipate an increase of cases through it—a class of children who for their own sakes much need help, and who from the indifference and worthlessness of their natural guardians are the very class who should be emigrated. From many of the branches we have been appealed to. Glasgow proportionately

sends us the smallest number, while Edinburgh makes up for it by sending a very large quota.

The number of widows' children received is diminishing owing in part at least to their more liberal—one would almost say humane—treatment by Parish Councils. For a widow in former days to provide for herself and family on the beggarly shilling a week for each child was impossible. The consequence was she lost her house, etc., and had either to go into the Poorhouse with her children or place some of them in the Homes and be free to earn a living for herself and the youngest child. The latter course was almost invariably taken by respectable mothers. Now the allowance granted, by frugality and care, keeps the mother and children together. Mr. Quarrier often said he would not be satisfied until not a single child was left in any Poorhouse in Scotland, and to-day it seems nearly accomplished. Whether admitted or not, the work done and the sentiment created by the Homes and similar institutions have had much to do with the boarding out and removal of children from the custody of profligate guardians by the Parish Councils.

A good many we have rescued from surroundings and circumstances where good training was impossible, and although from such we can scarce expect the best results, we believe careful training in early days will do much to eradicate inherent evil tendencies.

Some of our friends thought—especially as we had plenty of accommodation—that we should open the door a little wider in dealing with lads who were, while not strictly-speaking orphans, without proper home and chance of doing well. We took quite a few from various low lodging-houses, etc., but in every case it was a failure, confirming our fixed opinion that there is a class who are and will remain "lawless ones" unless dealt with by legal restraint and removed from their present surroundings. Voluntary help such as we can give is absolute waste so long as there is the possibility of evil associations exerting an influence.

The number of applicants for admission to our Young Women's Department is so few that we can scarcely get sufficient to do the work of the house. It is to be hoped the need is less, but we fear the multiplicity of agencies now at work has something to do with it. In many cases we are of opinion that a temporary shelter without training only fosters an evil among a class of girls who move almost monthly, and never gain a character or rise above the need of assistance when out of employment.

When last report was issued we were in the midst of a month's special effort in the Mission. It is impossible and unwise to tabulate spiritual results. A few are now active workers who were led to decide for Christ at that time, but our attendances have not increased as we had hoped. The district is systematically visited by our Biblewoman, and there must be direct good done in addition to the increase of interest in and attendance at the various meetings held. We have been greatly helped by many speakers and singers who have kindly lent us aid. Our Young People's Meeting continues to prosper outwardly, and we earnestly hope that the good seed sown may have some visible effect in reducing the apparent lawlessness which abounds.

Almost half of our mission workers were once boys and girls in our pews, and for this we thank God, and from it take courage in going on, although we do desire to see many more take a decided stand for righteousness and truth ere they get beyond the stage of attending the Sabbath morning meeting.

## SUMMARY OF THE YEAR'S WORK.

ORPHAN HOMES OF SCOTLAND, BRIDGE-OF-WEIR, AND CITY ORPHAN HOME, GLASGOW.—On 1st November, 1905, there were resident in the Homes 1,261 boys and girls. During the year 410 new cases have been admitted, making a total of 1,671 dealt with.

These have been disposed of as follows :—Outfitted and sent to domestic service, trades, and situations, 39 ; outfitted and sent to sea, 6 ; outfitted and sent to Canada, 191 ; deaths, 13 ; children under 5 years adopted, 5 ; returned to relatives now in a position to provide for them, 89 ; left and dismissed, 25 ; sent to other institutions, 3 ; leaving in the Homes on 31st October, 1906, 1,300, of whom 698 are boys and 602 girls.

From the above it will be seen that 241 boys and girls have been given a start in life and placed in positions to make their own way. The older girls having been trained for domestic service, situations were found for them, and the older boys were apprenticed to trades, sent to sea or to Canada. Amongst those returned to friends many were old enough to work, and, where necessary, we helped with outfits, so that a large proportion of these might be added to the number of the permanently helped.

CONSUMPTION SANATORIA OF SCOTLAND.—228 patients were treated during the year, and there were 3,201 attendances at the Dispensary, showing a large increase over previous years.

COLONY OF MERCY OF EPILEPTICS.—The first Home was opened at the end of July, and 16 Colonists are now in residence.

### THE YEAR'S INCOME.

The amount received during the year in answer to prayer is as follows :—For the General Fund, which includes the keep of the Homes at Bridge-of-Weir and the City Home Refuge and Mission, including £705 17s. 4d. earned by working boys, and sundry amounts, as per Cash Statement, £25,010 16s. 5d. ; for Consumption Sanatoria maintenance and Building Fund, £6,725 0s. 8d. ; for the Colony of Mercy for Epileptics, £2,105 2s. 4d. ; for Home and Foreign Missions, £1,005 5s., making the total amount for all purposes, £34,846 4s. 5d., besides large quantities of clothing, provisions, and other useful gifts.

In connection with the City Home work, regular Sunday and Week-day Gospel Meetings have been held in our own Hall, and thousands of tracts have been distributed ; nights' lodgings were given to homeless wanderers, and many visits were paid to the homes of the poor by our workers. Sick and ailing ones have been provided with lines for Infirmarys and Convalescent Homes, and many others have received help and advice in their time of need.

For the work accomplished we are, under God, indebted to fellow-labourers, and to the practical generosity of friends throughout the country ; to ministers, evangelists, and others who have aided in the Gospel work ; to Sabbath school superintendents, teachers, and scholars ; to ladies who have made up garments for our little ones ; to the accountant who audits the books ; and to the Press which has given notices of the work. Their ministry and helpfulness have brought joy and blessing to many lives, and we trust the record of what has been attempted will add glory to our Lord and Master.

## CONCLUSION.

The year, which from our poor human standpoint presented insuperable difficulties to look forward to, has come and gone, and as we look back there is no room for anything but praise in our hearts. Every need has been met, and met in God's overflowing measure, even extra needs involving considerable outlay, and which we could not foresee, were foreseen and provided for by Him who daily bears our burden and at the same time loads us with benefits.

Seven of the items of need mentioned on this page in last Report were fully met, and we now mention a few of the special wants which lie before us as far as we are able to forecast them :—

£16,000 is the sum required for maintenance of the Orphan children.

£8,000 for maintenance of the Sanatoria.

£1,000 for maintenance of the Colony of Mercy.

£1,500 for Emigration.

£6,000 is urgently needed for enlarging the School.

£4,000 for installing Electric Light all through the village.

A Gymnasium and Swimming Pond for the older boys and girls would be of great service.

£12,000 each to build and equip further blocks for Consumption Sanatoria.

£4,000 for an Executive Block at Colony of Mercy and £2,500 to £4,000 (according to size) to erect additional houses.

Those who are the "Lord's remembrancers" and delight to carry the burden of the needy and fatherless before Him, will take these matters to Him in prayer, and as He sees fit He will move the hearts of His stewards to send in all that is required.

The financial needs of the work would be much larger than they are were it not for the great quantity of gifts in kind which are sent in in the course of each year. The millions of stitches which are put in by loving hands which delight to work for the orphan children, tell of a wealth of love that must be an acceptable sacrifice to Him who sees in secret and rewards openly. No gift of any kind ever comes amiss in our large and varied family.

Above everything else we covet for the children, our fellow-workers, and ourselves spiritual blessings ; pray that these may always abound amongst us, and that in the midst of outward prosperity and supply there may never be a condition of spiritual barrenness.

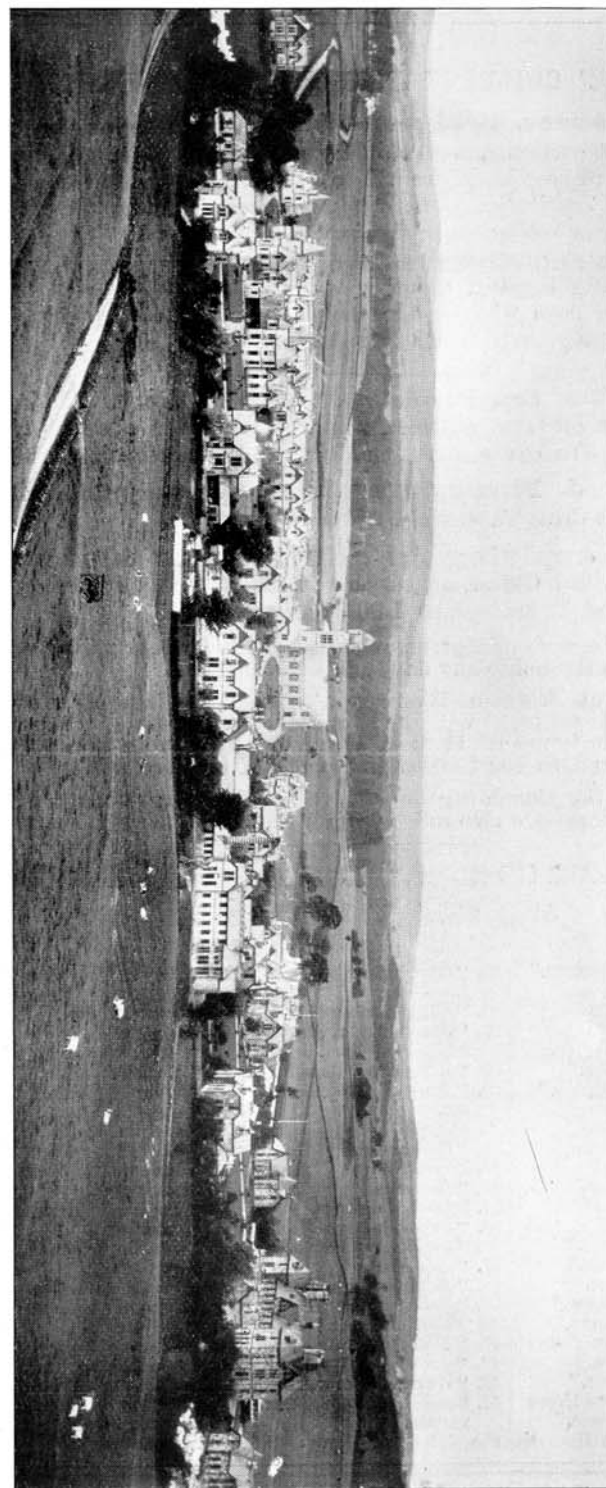

## CLASS OF CHILDREN ELIGIBLE FOR ADMISSION.

**Orphan Homes, Bridge-of-Weir.**—Orphan boys and girls deprived of both parents, and children of widows, with no relative able or willing to keep them, from 1 to 14 years of age, from any part of Scotland. *Destitution is the title for admission, and there is no subscriber's line or voting paper required.*

**City Home and Night Refuge, James Morrison St., Glasgow.**—Children found begging, sleeping out, or destitute, from 2 to 13 years; working boys who have no home, from 14 to 18 years; and virtuous homeless young women, from 14 to 30 years of age.
