NARRATIVE OF FACTS.
1919.

“THEY shall abundantly utter the memory of Thy great goodness.” These words are cut in stone over one of the entrance doors of the beautiful church at Bridge-of-Weir; and they may well be used as the keynote of this, another annual Narrative, which we are privileged to send forth. Certainly there is abundant cause why we should “utter” this “memory,” for it is sweet to us, and should be cheering to all who are partners in praying for and ministering to the large family in the Homes—in their threefold service for orphans, consumptives, and epileptics. His goodness has indeed been great, and in our sight wonderful. In addition to a full supply for all the constantly increasing temporal needs, God has graciously poured out upon us such rich spiritual blessings as we have not known for a long time. Early in the present year the Holy Spirit began to move amongst our senior girls and boys, and, ever since, that good work has gone on quietly but efficiently, so that a large number of the young people give evidence of a real change of heart and life. This was not occasioned by any “special effort,” but accompanied the regular ministry of the Word in the Homes, Church services, and Bible classes. This is one of the chief objects for which the work exists, and when such results are attained our hearts may well be filled with joy and our lips with thanksgiving. We are sure that the great army of our partners, scattered in almost every corner of the world, to whom this booklet comes, will read it with gratitude to God and with cheer and encouragement to themselves. Our God does indeed hear and answer every true and honest prayer, and this above all is the testimony we wish to send forth everywhere.

Our family at the beginning of the year numbered 1,771—in addition to workers—comprised of 1,534 orphan children, 141 consumption patients, and 96 epileptics. During the year we have received 255 children, 329 patients, and 53 colonists; leaving us with a family of 1,469 on 31st October. For the feeding, clothing, nursing, and caring for of all these we have received the following amounts, including payments:—

The year of the Armistice has produced many new problems, and we have reason to thank God for the devoted band of workers who have bravely carried on amid the difficulties. There have been unavoidable changes in our staff. It is with much regret we have had to accept the resignation of Mrs M'Fadzean, who, after over thirty five years untiring service for the Master as Matron of the Orphan Homes, has through ill-health found it necessary to retire. Captain and Mrs Aikenhead, formerly of the "James Arthur" and latterly Superintendent and Matron of our City Home, have gone to reside in Vancouver beside their family. Miss Gardiner and Mrs. Stewart who, "mothered" two of the Girls' Homes, and Mr. M'Quaker, father in a Boys' Home, have been removed from our midst to Higher Service.

The outstanding gifts of the year are the New Seaside Homes, Torr Aluinn and Hoop House, Dunoon, where all the children and Colonists had a happy holiday during the summer. Further particulars of this are given later on in the Narrative.

The passing of the Education (Scotland) Act, 1918 made it possible for voluntary schools to be transferred to the Education Authority, and as from May, 16th of this year the Orphan Homes School has been so transferred and will be maintained and managed by the Renfrewshire Education Authority. This accounts for the absence of the usual School report.

For the sake of friends who have not seen previous Reports of the Orphan Homes, the following states the basis upon which the work is carried on:—

In the year 1864 Mr. Quarrier began his public work among the street boys of Glasgow by the organisation of shoeblack and newsboys' brigades. Out of these developed the Orphan Homes, which to-day provide a home and Christian training for 1,500 fatherless and orphan boys and girls of all ages. In the years between 1871, when the first Home was opened, and now, 16,894 children have passed through the Homes, 6,398 of whom were sent to Canada. Something like £1,310,259 has been received; £307,000 of that sum has been expended on buildings, land, etc., and £950,000 on the maintenance of the Homes and Sanatoria and Colony, and Home and Foreign Missions. The work is carried on in dependence upon God for daily supplies. No one is called on personally, nor do we send out collectors. The needs are committed to God in prayer, and we look to Him to move the hearts of His people to send all that is required. The aim of the Homes is to witness to God's faithfulness, and to provide for the fatherless children of Scotland. No payment is necessary to secure their admission. Any child in any part of Scotland, if fatherless and destitute, is eligible, and friends knowing of such should apply to us at once, and thus help to save the little ones from want and misery.

NOVEMBER, 1918.—The conclusion of last year's narrative synchronised with the end of the darkest period in the world's history. As we begin another chapter in the record of God's dealings with His work committed to us here in the Orphan Homes of Scotland, a new light of peace is dawning, and the days of active war are over. Reverently from the depths of our hearts, we thank God for the cessation of hostilities. Just at present this seems the greatest and best of all our blessings. But were

even the least of His mercies to be withheld would we not have the same feeling of gratitude and enhanced appreciation for its return? Nor pen nor tongue of ours can fitly sound the praise of Him from whom all blessings flow.

Throughout these awful years of war, the changeless and unfailing Providence of God has been our portion. May His enriching blessing rest upon these succeeding pages, which seek to tell of His goodness for His glory.

Among the first gifts received in this new financial year are 5s. from East Linton; £5 from a wife and her husband, who is in France; £10, a thankoffering from Peterhead; and 10s. from one who writes, "I know that it is very trifling compared with the need, but He who spoke of the reward to the cup of cold water will supply 'every need of yours.'"

A young helper has remembered the Christmas-trees with 25s.; and another, the Hallowe'en festivities, with 20s.; whilst an old city friend has added £50 to our treasury for "extras at Christmas and New Year." "I sold lavender bags," says a little girl, "and gathered this amount," 5s. Another 5s., being "a little boys' savings to help the children," was handed to us at the Annual Meeting in Glasgow. A children's missionary band have sent £1; three children in Liverpool, £1 8s.; a worker, £1; Readers of *The Christian*, £2 4s.; Thankful, 2s. 6d.; a friend in Kent, £1; and another in New Stevenston, 15s., explaining that it is the Lord's tenth.

Among the familiar and frequent givers are a friend in Arbroath, who sends 30s.; Alice, Willie, and Jessie, £1; and another in Crieff, £1. Half-a-crown's worth of postage stamps comes from one in Devon, asking us to pray that God may open up a right way for him into permanent employment. 10s. is a thankoffering for God's goodness to one of our workers while absent from the village "on active service." 5s. "in memory of our only and well-beloved daughter;" £20 from Liverpool; £3 from New Zealand; 4s. 8d. "from a poor washerwoman"; £150 for the half-year's upkeep of the Oswald Home for invalid girls; £50, "a thankoffering to the Lord for His preserving care to life and property during this terrible war;" and 30s. from mill workers, whose testimony is that Phil. iv. 19 "has not failed us through all the dark time we have passed through." How many there are who can corroborate that from their own experience. Surely from His *riches* has He supplied our every need with abundance.

A pound each has come from two of our Canadian boys, one of whom is in Belgium, and the other still in the Dominion. The latter's name appears on the notepaper he is using as the inventor of a new power reversing gear. In his letter he speaks of another of our grown-up boys, the ex-Mayor of the town where they both live.

I see — quite often. He is in business in this town, and turns over more money in a day sometimes than I handle in a year. He has a large auto, fine house, stores, and other property as well. In fact he is extraordinarily well off. Of course, he has been a long time in town, and has a good trade worked up by this time. I do not expect we shall be able to go across to see you, at least so long as the present state of affairs lasts. I had an enjoyable day yesterday, Thanksgiving Day. I went up to see an old Beachburg friend, who was very pleased to see me, and insisted on me staying longer, but that is one thing I seldom do. I try never to wear out my welcome.

A cheque for £7 10s. is from a Bo'ness friend who has received from the

Mayor of a Natal town a sum of money to be distributed among various Homes in England and Scotland. £20 from Rutherglen is "in thankfulness for blessings received;" and £4 from a husband and wife, "for your little ones, as a token of our gratitude to God for four boys preserved throughout the war." A Sunday School donation from Oban amounting to £3, includes one pound, the gift of an old scholar who became interested in the work through hearing of it at the sender's fireside.

Thus from far and near, by the ministry of old and young in every station in life, our loving Heavenly Father has supplied to overflowing every need of the big family of over 1500 boys and girls within our gates.

God doth not need either man's work or His own gifts. . . . Thousands at His bidding speed and post o'er land and ocean without rest.

It is not of His need, but of His grace, that we are privileged to be "workers together with Him." What privileges are ours as His stewards and servants. As He abideth faithful, so may we be found faithful to His trust.

For the sake of friends who were prevented from sharing the inspiration and gladness of the Annual Meeting in Glasgow, we print the following from the *Glasgow Herald* of 26th November:—

The effect of bad housing in causing tuberculosis and the need for improved conditions of life for the people were dealt with by Sir Joseph P. Maclay, Bart., the Shipping Controller, who presided at the Forty-seventh Annual Meeting in Glasgow yesterday of the Orphan Homes of Scotland, of which he is a trustee and the honorary treasurer. The report stated that since last meeting 420 new cases were admitted to the Orphan Homes, making a total of 1,954 dealt with during the year. At the beginning of the year there were 140 patients in residence in the Consumption Sanatoria; 271 were admitted, 264 were discharged, and 6 died, leaving 141 in residence at the end of October. During the year 32 men, women, and children were admitted to the Colony for Epileptics, 35 were discharged, and 2 died, leaving 96 in residence on 31st October.

Sir Joseph P. Maclay, proposing the adoption of the report, said the end of the dread tragedy of war had at last come. They rejoiced that might had not prevailed against right and that the powers of darkness had indeed been vanquished. In the days to come he believed that one of the best memories of the great war would be the gathering together of the sons of the Empire from all parts of the earth over which the British flag flew. From 600 to 800 of that noble band were boys who had been brought up in the Homes. An interesting feature of the past year had been the large number of the children who had been removed to the care of friends who,

enjoying better times financially, had been able to give assistance to the children which they could not previously afford. The expenditure on current account for the Homes during the past year had been greater than ever in the history of the Homes. It amounted to £37,701. Alongside of that there had never been so large an income, which amounted during the year to £47,209. To-day the work of the Homes was being carried on as successfully as ever it had been in their whole history. Referring to the Consumption Sanatoria at the Homes, he said that all parties in the land were calling out for coalition of effort. He thought that in the city of Glasgow there was great need for coalition of effort. It was the unhealthy homes that were the main cause of the need for sanatoria. Those who knew anything of the homes of the humbler classes of the people of Glasgow knew that many of them were totally unfit for human habitation. Glasgow in the days when Sir Samuel Chisholm was in charge of the Corporation properties made progress, but since his departure from office he (Sir Joseph) was sorry to say that that progress had very much ceased, and that to-day there was practically nothing being done in the city to improve the homes of the people. When the war on which they had been spending endless millions was over, it was surely up to the authorities to face the problem in a manner such as had not recently been done. There were no doubt many other things—long hours, which in the coming days must be shorter; low wages, which in the coming days must be higher—those all tended towards the prolongation of the dread disease which was prevalent in their midst.

Sir Samuel Chisholm, Bart., seconded the report, which was adopted.

DECEMBER, 1918.—The first day of this month brought news of one of our Canadian soldier boys, and so on it has gone till the closing day has brought a gift of ten pounds from another of our grown-up children and his wife. One who is assisting a farmer in this country has sent £1; a grateful boy in Saskatchewan, £21; two sisters, 20s.; another farmer's boy, 2s. 6d.; one in London, £1; another in Sheffield, 2s.; one of the girls, £1; our first boy to earn his commission in Kitchener's Army, £10, "a little thank-offering for past happy days;" and a girl, who was a long time in the Home for invalids, 2s. Over twenty-five years ago a little girl from the "Glasgow" Home was sent to Canada after five years' residence in the village. Latterly, since she made a home of her own many of the younger girls have made it a house of call. In a recent letter she writes:—

I thought I would carry out my thoughts to-night, and write a few lines to you. I cannot blame you if you think me ungrateful for not writing before this, but I hope you will forgive me. There is no use making excuses, because it is only neglect, and indeed it is not because I do not think of you, far from it, because there is never a day of my life that I do not pray for you all and the dear Orphan Homes of Scotland. If I did not my little girl would soon tell me of it, because one morning it seems I did not mention you, and I wasn't up off my knees before she said, "Mamma, you forgot something; you forgot to mention the Orphan Homes of Scotland," and, indeed, it pleased me to see that she was as much interested in them as I am myself. Well, I hope you are all keeping well, as we all are at present. I often wish I could see you and the dear old home again. Indeed, I often dream of them. I shall never forget what they have done for me. My only regret is that I did not do something in return when I was a girl and could have done it; but there is one thing I can do, I can live up to what I learned and try to be an example to my children and whomever I may come in contact with, and if I can do what I learned from dear Mr. Quarrier's teaching, it will not be in vain.

The sender of a shilling from North Kensington says, "I myself was brought up in Mr. Müller's orphanage at Bristol, and spent many happy days there, and heard about the Homes in Scotland." From two of our fellow workers we have £2; from a former worker in the Homes and her husband, with whom she is now labouring for the Lord in China, £2;

from another on active service in France, £1; from another in a hospital in France, 30 francs; from a helper in New Zealand, who is seeking to extend the Kingdom as he travels with a Gospel carriage, 20s.; from friends in Durban, £3; from another in the same place, two guineas; from a faithful old helper who has been confined to bed for more than a year, £100; from girls in a warehouse of a border town, £3 10s.; from Orkney, 2s. 6d.; from Sussex, 15s.; from Arran, £1; from Ontario, 10 dollars; from Blackburn anonymously, 2s. 6d.; and from Bilbao, Spain, £2.

Though the incomes of many of our helpers have been reduced, owing to war contingencies, and the cost of everything we need for the big family under our care is still increasing, we have not been allowed to lack any good thing. As one friend writes, "There is nothing too big an undertaking for our Heavenly Father." With his family gift he has sent 5s. 4d., "the sole worldly possession of a baby three months old who was called away to the happy land." His mother said she could not spend it, so gave it to our friend to pass on for our children. "Instead of sending you £1 for my Christmas offering," another friend writes, "I am sending you £5 as a combined Christmas and Peace offering to be used as you most require it, knowing how expensive food is." Two Edinburgh friends, looking forward to the return of their only son from the army, have doubled their usual donation, making it ten guineas, "as a thanksgiving to God for the peace that has come to earth."

Twenty pounds is from a lady in Brisbane, Australia, for the Colony of Mercy; £1 "of the Lord's money for the work in your hands;" £180 for the upkeep of the Ashgrove Home, with £10 for the Sanatoria from the same donors; £1 from a company of the Boys' Brigade; £5 from our old friend "Fellowship"; £10 from some one in Keswick; £5 from an East Lothian farmer; 8s. 3d. from a donor in Mull; £5 from a Sergeant with the B.E.F. in East Africa, along with £1 from his sister, who sends his gift; 8s. from Carnarvonshire; 10s. in memory of the donor's nephew, who was killed in France; 30s. from the Christian soldiers of a battalion of the Scottish Rifles; 5s. "sent to me from an old aunt who is 82 years of age;" 20s. "in memory of a loved child," from a friend in Lanarkshire; and £1 from Motherwell, with 10s. from four nephews and a niece.

One of the girls sending 10s. writes from her place, not many miles distant from the old home:—

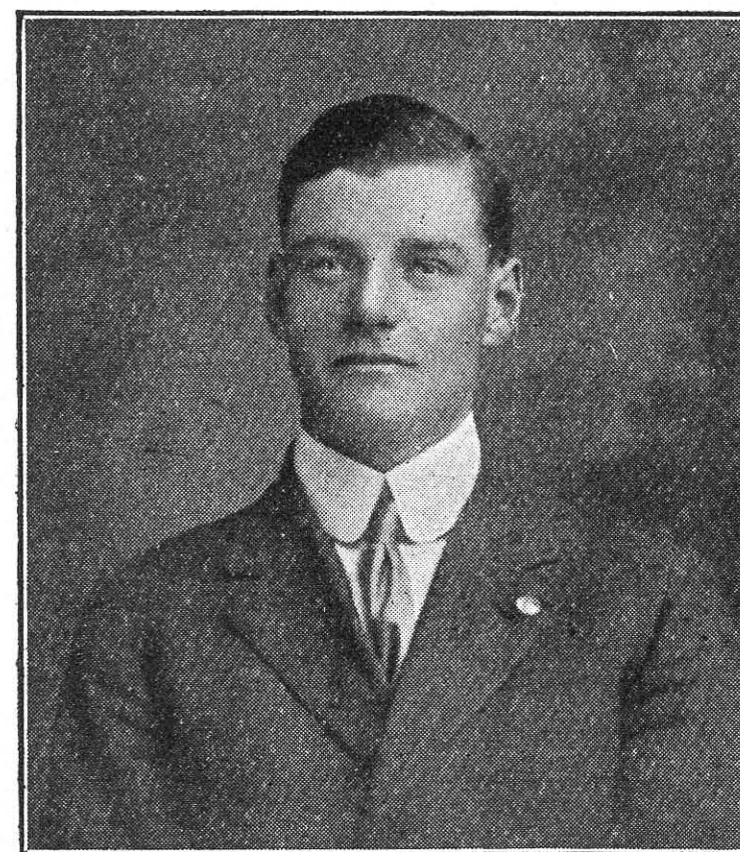
I have not forgotten the kindness I received at the Homes. It is a wonderful

place. There will be a lot of us who will be thankful that there is such a place for homeless children. This is just a little minding for the kindness I received. It is not very much, but everything is so dear, and of course I put some by for a rainy day. You will know what that means. I met — at the church to-day. She is doing fine. I will close now and hope to hear from you soon.

A large number of young people have helped to swell the treasury this month. Some of these have given collectively in Sunday Schools all over the country or at Bible Classes and similar gatherings. Pupils in public and private schools have been of the number, and not a few have given individually. A little girl friend in Kilmarnock writes, "This is 2s. for the orphan children's New Year fund. I hope they will all have a jolly time. I am looking forward to Santa Claus." Her self-sacrificing gift will leave her not poorer but richer, and Christmas will be the happier for her thought of others. From the same county another little girl has sent 3s.; the pupils of a country school, also in Ayrshire, have contributed 6s. 6d.; two friends £15, with £15 more from their boy to support a boy

in the Homes; and another friend 10s., with 14s. 6d. "from wee Davie's box." Another young helper sending half a crown says, "I got this money in a present, but when I saw the booklet I thought it would be better to give it to children who are not so fortunate as myself." Five shillings comes from a little boy aged five and a half years, "being part of his Christmas money;" and £1 8s. 6d. is the united gift of infants, juniors, and teachers in an Academy.

A multitude of other gifts for Christmas cheer in cash and kind include 2 sacks of oatmeal from a near-by farmer; half a chest of tea; a case of oranges; £3 3s. from Motherwell; £1 from Juniper Green; 10s. from Fife; 5s. from Arbroath; 10s. from Aberdeen; other 10s. from Wishaw; a quantity of toys for the Christmas trees, with £20 for the general fund; picture and story-books; and a cheque for £25 from a lady in London who always remembers our special needs at this season, and says, "I trust they will have a real merry Christmas this year."

During these awful years of war how eagerly we have looked forward to each succeeding Christmas, in the hope that it might bring us peace.

In a community such as this it could never by any combination of circumstances, however dreadful, be entirely robbed of its gladness, and that is well. Yet merriment has not seemed possible, for over the youngest and most irresponsible has hung the cloud of sorrow. Now, thank God, the terror is past, and, though for many the returning season may only serve to reopen the wounds of a sorrow-stricken soul, the joy of the Christ Child's birth radiates again to touch the remotest corners of the earth and make its happy influence felt in every sphere of life. Thanks to the abundance of our Heavenly Father's provision, our boys and girls have enjoyed a right merry Christmas.

Five pounds has been received through the bank from a helper in Alberta; £1 from a friend in Edinburgh, enclosing £2 more from another in Tasmania; £3 for the Homes, with £2 for the Sanatoria and £1 for the Colony, from Crieff; a draft on London for £50 from a needlework guild in Siam; £2.10s. from a minister and his wife; fifty guineas from a gentleman in London; 10s. from Norfolk; £60 for the Homes, with £5 each for the Sanatoria and the Colony, from two friends; £2 each for the Homes and the Sanatoria from an R.A.M.C. major; £5 anonymously in a registered envelope, bearing the stamp of an Army Field Post Office; £10 from the directors and £40 from the employees of a Glasgow firm; and £3 from a city butcher who is prevented from sending the usual gift of meat by control difficulties.

So, as the last hour of the old year approaches, we follow a well-established, but never merely formal, custom of spending it with our fellow-workers, in humble and heart-felt thanksgiving to God for all His never-failing mercies. How earnestly, twelve months ago, we prayed that the dawning year might end the long night of sorrow and bring us peace. With what depth of gratitude we praise Him, who by His own right hand hath gotten us the victory. To Him be the glory. No words could be more fitting with which to close this year that has seen the consummation of our joy than those with which a year ago we brought encouragement to our hearts—"The Lord reigneth; let the earth rejoice."

JANUARY, 1919.—

And for the things I see
I trust the things to be.

The poet's couplet expresses well the attitude of our minds as we enter upon the untried way of the New Year. Its first day has been one round of joy for the boys and girls, what with special meals and good things to eat, the loaded trees, whose fruits would brighten the duller eyes, and the entertainment in the church. Toward these family gatherings in the old home have turned the thoughts of a great multitude. Some, no doubt, have been telling to their own smaller family circle the story of their happy gatherings here in days long past, but all have lived again in the happy days of childhood, and it may be that to some, whose feet have wandered, a memory of happier days has given the wish and power to tread again the better way.

Among the gifts reaching us on New Year's Day we have £1 "from a servant, for Jesus' sake"; another £1 in an envelope bearing the Glasgow postmark; £3 in loving memory, with the encouraging words, "under-

neath are the everlasting arms;" £2 from a fellow-worker; 10s. from "a grateful boy;" £2 from another helper; 10s. from an old local friend; and £1 from two more of our fellow-labourers.

The work party of a Women's Guild has contributed three guineas towards the supply of this month's needs; a former patient of the Sanatoria 10s., with a dollar from her boy; A Perthshire farmer giving news of two of our boys, one of whom is in the army in Germany, £7; an Ayrshire lady, £50; two missionaries, who are rejoicing in the spared lives of their two sons who "joined up" early in the war, £1; two children in Newlands, 10s.; two friends in Windermere, £20 each; a Paisley C.E. Society, 10s.; a helper in Leeds, two guineas; a member of Strathbungo Parish Church, £1; a branch of the Glasgow Foundry Boys' Religious

Society, £2 1s., being a New Year thankoffering for the Sanatoria; and readers of the "Life of Faith," £3.

A girl in a Lanarkshire public school writes, "This is a small sum of money that my chums and I gathered for a concert. It is just to help the little children in your Home. When we were thinking of whom to send it to we thought of you and your Homes." A mother sends ten shillings "from the children and myself in memory of granny, who was a subscriber to the Homes for a good many years." A small boy says, "This is two shillings from my bank for the orphan boys and girls at Bridge-of-Weir Homes." With a postal order for one pound from a mother, recently bereft of a little one, is the explanation:—"In her bank there was some money which we thought we would like to send to your Homes, that some poor child may benefit." Though the year is young there are some to whom its days have already become long and weary by reason of their great sorrow. May they be comforted in the knowledge

of His will, so that they may learn the great purpose of their sorrows and see how He doeth all things well.

Fear not, faint heart, though dark the shadows fall,
God knows thy sorrows, and He shares them all.
Could He e'er fail His loving child to bless,
To give relief in hours of deep distress?
He waits, His tend'rest mercies to impart,
To comfort thee, to heal thy broken heart.

A member of the staff of a Canadian hospital in France, who went to Canada many years ago with one of our boys' parties, has written the following note to accompany his donation to help "carry on" in the old Home:—

Your parcel to hand safely to-day, for which please accept of my sincere thanks. I do hope you are not forgetting to send me the usual New Year Letter, for I would be sorry to miss it. Please accept of postal order as a small gift to your great work of mercy in the beginning of 1919, and wishing you and the friends of Bridge-of-Weir all a happy New Year.

Many years ago a lad left the old training brig, "James Arthur," to begin his apprenticeship at sea. After sailing for sometime with a master's certificate, he returned to a landsman's life and made a home for himself, but the war brought again the lure of the sea and he has rendered good service. His wife, enclosing a "small present" from him, says "He hopes you will accept it as a small token of the very sincere regard he has for you, and just to show how much he appreciates all you did for him when he was dependent on your kindness." A little girl of much more recent days has also written to say—

I am sending on to you part of my first wages to help in the work which helped me so much. I am very grateful for all you did for me and for the good start in life I have had. I shamedly confess that I did not always feel grateful when at Bridge-of-Weir, but God has forgiven that, and I think and hope that you will do the same. You will be pleased to know I have given my heart to Jesus and am seeking to follow and to serve Him day by day. I wish you to know, Miss Quarrier, that I am sending this little gift as a small thankoffering to God for all He has done for me. It is only now I really begin to understand the amount of blessings I have had.

A large number of useful gifts in kind have saved a considerable expenditure in money which would otherwise have been necessary. One friend has provided a half chest of tea; a firm of bakers in the city, seventy dozen loaves; friends in Dunfermline, 115 articles of clothing and a quantity of toys and books; another, a useful gift of bandages; a helper in Auchterarder, 24 articles of clothing; a work party in Peebles-shire, 101 articles; and a firm of milliners, 135 girls' hats. The two largest amounts added to our credit this month each amount to one thousand pounds, one being an instalment of a legacy from a friend who was keenly interested in emigration, and the other a donation to be divided between the various departments of the work.

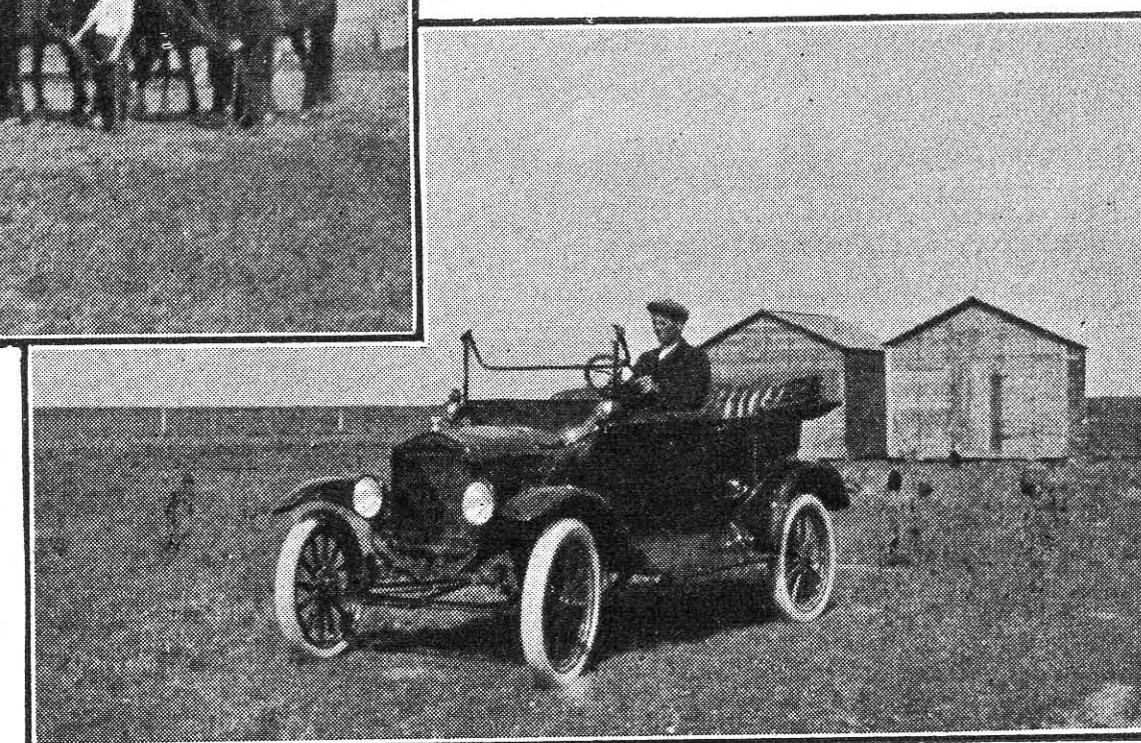
An old friend in Banffshire has sent fifteen shillings from the small Sunday School he has been conducting for forty years; two friends in Exeter, their annual gift of £3, with an extra donation of £10, and 1s. from their little boy; a frequent helper in Darlington, £25; a Glasgow gentleman, ten guineas each for the Homes and the Sanatoria; two friends, a cheque for £50, of which £7 is for the Colony of Mercy; and another friend, £1 "In memory of our first little one." The last day of the month has brought £1 from the United States from the mother of

two boys, one of whom has done well in Canada, and the other of whom is still with us; £100 from a regular donor of long standing; and £5 "In memory of the brave O.H.S. boys who have fallen."

FEBRUARY, 1919.—Though this is not the month of the year during which we receive the largest number of donations from Sunday Schools, these have been well represented in the February list, for no fewer than seventy-five different Sunday Schools have assisted in providing for the children's needs during these four weeks. It would be impossible to tell how many boys and girls and their teachers have in this way shown their interest from far and near—from Dornoch to Glenluce, Aberdeen to Inveraray, and Montreal to Bridge-of-Weir. Nor have we been forgotten by other young folks apart from the Sunday Schools. A Band of Hope in Mull has sent £2 4s.; an Aberdeen C.E. Society, 10s.; three children

in Forfar, 3s., proceeds of a concert to their young friends; and other two young helpers, 5s., "some of the proceeds" of a little sale they had held.

One of the girls whom we sent to Canada several years ago, in the course of a letter of inquiry regarding some of her relatives says, "No doubt you will be surprised at me writing to you, as I have never written since I came to Canada. I suppose there have been a great many changes since I left. I like it fine out here, and I am getting along splendidly." The following letter is from another girl who is doing very well. Her sister and two brothers of whom she speaks were also emigrated from our village, and for a time at least three of the family were living under the shelter of one hospitable roof, with an Ontario farmer and his wife.

I received your New Year's Letter yesterday, and was very pleased to get it. It is a long time since I heard from anyone in the Homes, and I must confess a long time since I wrote, but I promise to try and do better in the future. I am going to

High School. It is seven miles from this village. I come home every Friday night if the weather is favourable. The work is quite easy, but we have a great deal of it to do. I am going to try two examinations next summer, and if I pass these I will go another year, and then will be ready to teach school. Do you remember my brother —? He has been in France nearly two years. He has been in the Ambulance Corps as a stretcher-bearer. He tried to get in the infantry, but they would not take him because he is very near-sighted. He enlisted several times before they would take him at all, then only for home defence, but he kept on till they took him overseas. My youngest brother enlisted before he was eighteen, but never left Canada. He was given his discharge about two months ago. He went to Northern Ontario, and since has been doing well. My sister is still at Mrs. —. She likes it there, but is kept very busy. Next fall she intends going to business college to study for a stenographer. How is Miss —? I have not heard from her for a long time. I suppose I would hardly know anyone if I should go back. I will not forget the happy times I spent there. I still remember so well the Christmas-trees in the church and how we used to look forward for weeks to them. But this is only one of the pleasant memories I have of my childhood days in the Homes. We were all so glad to have an old-time Christmas with peace on earth, and we can't help feeling thankful and glad it is so. I hope it is not too late to wish you a happy and prosperous New Year. Give my best wishes to all the dear friends and I will be glad to hear from any of you.

Not the pen of the readiest writer can express how much such a letter as this means to us—how much encouragement it brings. We believe there is no work that is comparable with that among children. Such work is always worth while, but sometimes difficulties (of which there are many) make us forget that. The stimulus of letters like the one just quoted never fails to bring back the consciousness that it is worth while, and that means a fresh access of power to carry on with, so that we faint not, remembering that in due season we shall reap. How often, too, have our hearts thrilled at the eagerness of our boys to “do their bit for King and Country and the cause of Right.” Canada will never know how much she owes to the brave lads from the Homeland, who were the first and ever the keenest to answer the call and show an example to the young men of the land of their adoption. All honour to them. Their fame is immortal.

To meet the month's needs we have received 10s. from a C.E. Society in Hamilton; 2s. 6d. from a little girl in the County of Peebles; £4 from two friends in Cheshire, “In memory of our baby girl;” £30 from the ladies of a church working party in Hong Kong; 1s from an anonymous donor in Edinburgh; 21s. from a few Orkney friends; 10 dollars from a down-town mission in Montreal; 28s., a special collection taken at a Y.M.C.A. Bible Class; 5 dollars from a former worker in the City Home Mission and her husband, now in British Columbia; 2s. from an old boy in England; 20s. from two friends in New Zealand; £21 from another in Prestwick; £3 for the Homes, with £2 for the Sanatoria, from Ayr; £1 from an old friend's Bible Class in Airdrie; £1, “In memory of my dear mother;” £5 from Tientsin; and £1 10s. 5d. from a helper in Australia, who has asked the Secretary of Dr. Barnardo's Homes to pass on the gift, and writes. “I wish to send you one penny a day for 1918.”

With ten pounds from Queensland comes the request, “Kindly use the enclosed in connection with evangelistic work among the children in your Homes.” Now that the period of reconstruction is upon us, more than ever do we need a time of real soul-stirring revival, so that the people may come to realise that no lasting structure, national or individual, can be built upon anything less sure than the true foundation, even

Christ. He is the only Saviour of the world. By His Spirit alone can we hope to solve the problems of peace. Another gift of £10 comes from an Artillery Major in Italy, who tells how the money was raised:—

The — Concert Party, composed of gunners and drivers of this brigade who have been entertaining the troops in the village of —, decided to give one or two charity concerts, and chose your Orphan Homes as one of their objects. As the result of the concert brought in the sum of ten pounds, they have asked me to forward you the cheque for that amount with their good wishes to the bairnies, and as organiser of the troupe and a resident of Kilmacoll, accept my best wishes for your good work.

One hundred boxes of kippered herrings, forwarded at the order of our old friend “Fellowship,” have been a welcome change on the bill of fare. Twenty-five pounds have been added to our treasury, as an acknowledgment of great kindness done to the donor by a friend much interested in the Homes; £10 13s 6d., the proceeds of a doll, from Sao Paulo;

£10 from Aden; 11s., “being the surplus of money subscribed for a memorial wreath for a dear little boy who passed away very suddenly;” 5s. by one of the grown-up girls; £1 12s., the balance after a social function in connection with some Admiralty work; and three guineas for the Sanatoria, with two guineas for the Homes, and a guinea for the Colony of Mercy, in memory of the birthday of the donor's husband, who “was never so happy as when sending a subscription towards the Homes.” Three legacies of £70, £35 8s. 6d., and £1,000 have materially helped to meet the month's bills.

MARCH, 1919.—To help supply the needs of this month 10s. has come to hand as a “token of God's goodness and mercy in time of trouble”; £2 10s. from two missionaries in Africa; £7 from a Women's Foreign Mission

Association; six guineas from two friends in London; £1 from Paisley, "from our wee son on the occasion of his third birthday"; 4s. from the grateful mother of one of the boys in the Homes; £5 from Oporto; £1 from the lads and girls of a junior Bible class; 2s. 6d. in an envelope bearing postmark of Shettleston "from thankful"; £10 from a Greenock friend who wishes no acknowledgment; 2s. "For your Homes with love and prayer"; 5s. from a mother's meeting in Broughty-Ferry; a cheque for five guineas from Panama; 10s. from a regular donor, "Cable," St. Andrews; £1 from one of the boys on an East Lothian farm; and 10s. with the following letter from one of the girls:—

I hope you and Mrs. Burges are well, also all the others at the Homes. My mistress is giving me next week-end, and she thinks it would be nice if I could come down and spend it at the Homes. I would just be delighted to come if it is convenient. My sisters do not take much to do with me, and I do not care so long as I know the old girls and boys of the Orphan Homes have always a good home and kind friends to welcome them. I am getting on fine and like my place very, very much. I am so glad I was placed in such a good situation. I often think of you and the Homes and my kind mother in the cottage, and very often still feel homesick. This is a gift for the Homes. I give it with gladness of heart and send a prayer with it. I would have sent something before this but my friends have been troubling me for money and I gave, but I shall give no more. If they have none it is their own fault, but I know they have, and it was to see if I would give to them. I told my mistress and she is guiding me what to do, so they have not come near me nor written to me since they said they would pay me again, and when I asked they said I owe them more than that for when they looked after me. I think if I owe any one anything it is the Orphan Homes.

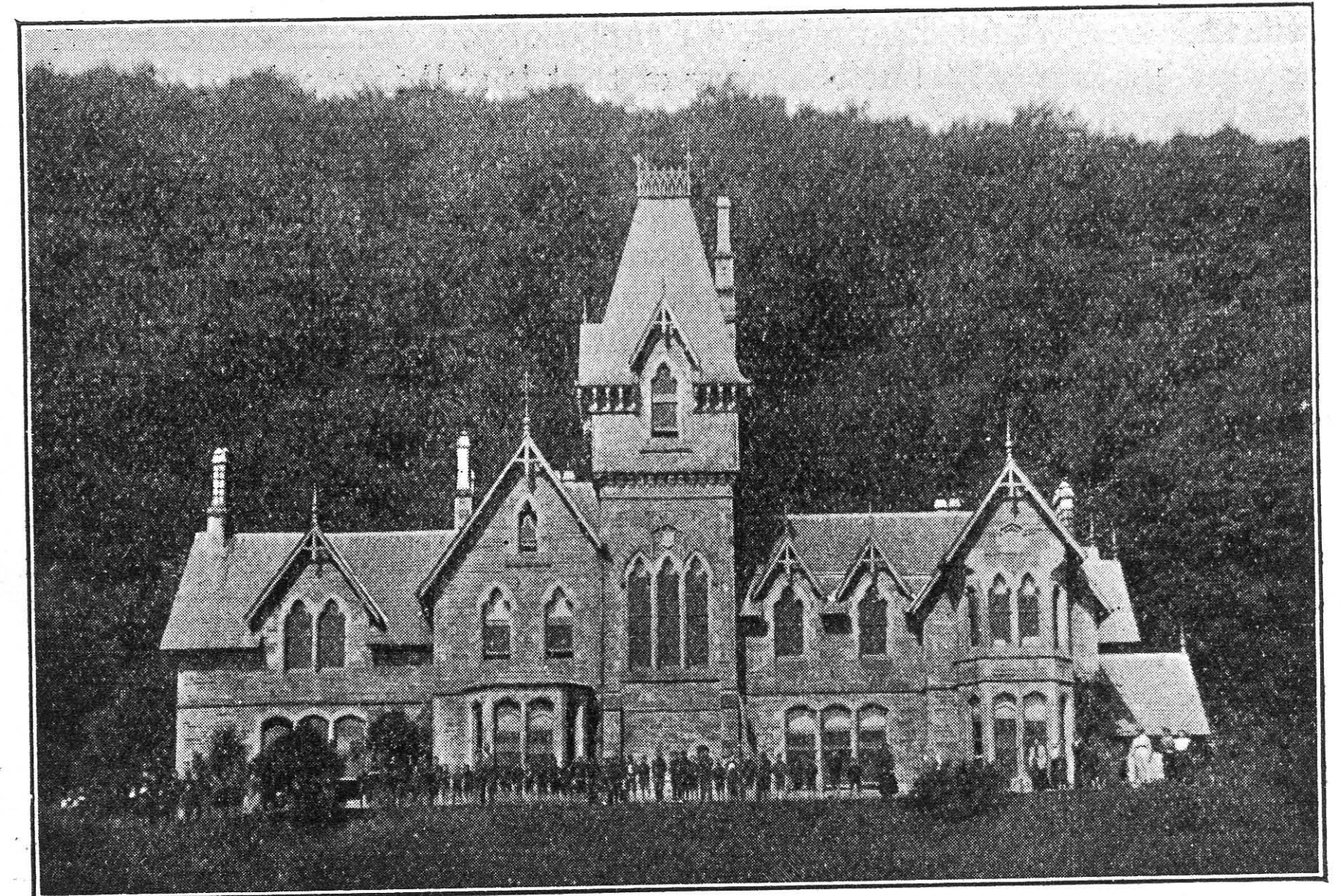
It was just such experiences as the one mentioned in this letter that constituted one of the Founder's chief reasons for commencing emigration work forty-seven years ago. Not only does the New World of the Western hemisphere offer a new beginning and a better prospect, but it also provides an adequate separation from the old environment. As a rule, at this season of the year the village would be humming with excitement and preparation for the departure of a boys' party to Canada. Though hostilities are over and the seas are safe once more, it is not yet possible to find suitable transportation. However, we are looking forward to the resumption of emigration next spring. One of the 1915 boys writes from Canada:—

Your usual New Year's Letter was welcomely received. I am glad to see that God is ever near to help those who have taken so much interest in the work. I have been out here four years and think Canada a fine country to start life for oneself. I have just arrived at my second place and like it first rate. Everything is handy. I have two hundred and nine dollars in my bank book with which I expect to spend next winter taking a business course. I was more than thankful to God for bringing Peace to the world, and I am sure that there were glad hearts this Christmas and New Year. I also regret with all at the Homes the loss of so many brave boys who sacrificed their lives for their native country. I was working at Brockville when the news of the Armistice reached us. It was about three o'clock in the morning, and many of the town's people were out on the street making a great display. I expect to see a party of boys sailing for Canada in the spring since the sea is safe from submarines. Well, I have two brothers in the Homes whom I would love to see. Please send them across if it is possible as we have no one to look after us. My dear mother died a year ago, and I think God is providing a place for us out here. Wishing you every success in the work you take so much interest in.

One of the girls in a situation in this country has sent 2s; a South Ayrshire dairy farmer, £30; a Fife work party, £5; a boys' Bible class in

Haddington, 30s.; another of our grown-up girls, £1; a lady friend, £2, in memory of her son; a worker, 5s.; a friend in the North and his family, £20 to support a girl in the Homes; missionaries in West Africa, £4 15s.; one of the old boys, now in business in London, £1; a tradesman in a neighbouring village, £5; a friend in Natal, £1; another in Bloemfontein, 20s.; "Fraserburgh Friend," £3; one of the boys who used to be with us, 1s. 6d.; friends interested in two boys in the Sabbath School Home, £7 10s.; a Sunday School in new Bedford, Mass., £5; a friend near by, £20 for the Homes with £5 each for the Sanatoria and the Colony; and a friend in Pennsylvania, £2 2s. 8d.

The month's donations in kind include some valuable and useful gifts. From a friend in England has come a quantity of material suitable for making up into girls' coats. Another friend has enabled us to effect a

saving on our drug bill with a generous gift of two one hundredweight drums of malt and oil. Helpers in Largs have added to the stock of the drapery store 166 articles of clothing and 15 pairs of stockings. Another has given 20 boys' shirts, and the girls of an East Coast boarding school 35 articles of clothing. When her mother was sending us a full-size perambulator for one of the numerous babies of the village, a young friend provided a most popular plaything for some of the girls. She says, "I thought when our big pram is going that I would send my little pram down, hoping it would give pleasure to some of the little girls." Each week this month a city bakery has sent a consignment of bread varying from 56 to 90 dozen loaves.

On the twenty-second of the month a generous friend of long standing, who has evidently been watching for an opportunity to meet one of our special needs, wrote to say that he had got an option on Torr Aluinn

and would be glad to buy it as a holiday home for the children. The house is a commodious one, situated on the sea front between Dunoon and Innellan, with a commanding view of the Firth of Clyde. As it is likely to suit our purpose well, we have accepted our thoughtful friend's kind offer. Since a prolonged annual holiday became an institution in 1911, the arrangements have been of rather a makeshift nature. Now we can look forward to spending happy days by the sea in a home of our own.

APRIL, 1919.—This month had scarcely begun till there came from the donor of the new seaside home a card with the question, "Would the furniture of Torr Aluinn be of any use to you?" Several articles quite useless for our purpose have been disposed of otherwise, and now we have got possession of the remainder of the house furnishings, valued at over nine hundred pounds. Just as the month closes there is another letter from the same friend, beginning, "I suppose you can take another Home for your big family?" but the story of that is still incomplete.

Among the money gifts, we find £1 for the Sanatoria from Ross-shire; £2 10s. from our old friend "Inasmuch"; 20s. from a captain with the Salonica Forces; 1s. in an envelope bearing the Coatbridge postmark; 3s. 4d. from a frequent donor in Aberdeen; £5 from a Melbourne doctor; £10 from another doctor in Victoria with Isa. xliii. 2; 10s. from an evangelist who asks an interest in our prayers on behalf of a mission in the city; 7s. 6d. from one of the old girls; 20s. from a farmer in California; 10s. 6d. from Tweedside; 5s. from Tewkesbury; £100 from a friend, with 3s. from his two children; 10s. from a Shawlands mothers' meeting; and £1 from one of our Canadian soldier boys from Bramshott Camp, as he is about to return for discharge in the Dominion. Across the Atlantic recently came the following letter from one of the girls:—

I was very much delighted to get the New Year's Letter with all the news. I am very sorry I have not been able to write more regularly than I have. It is so long since I wrote to you that you will very likely have forgotten who I am. If I have not written I always think of the dear old Home. We have had lots of ups and downs since I wrote before. I have two children of my own, a boy and a girl. Sometime I will send you their picture. I have met with a number of boys and girls from our Home. You will remember ——. She is now Mrs. John — of —. She has two boys also. She used to make it her home with me when she got any holidays. She has a home of her own now. I often sit and dream of the good times we used to have in the dear Home, which we will not likely ever see again. These were the best times of our lives. I see quite a large number of our boys have given their lives to save us at home. I hear from Miss —, one of your old school teachers. She has been a very good friend. While I am writing this letter my little girl is washing and drying the supper dishes. She will be eight years old this May, and the little boy will be three this July. He is a fine big lad. Well, I think I will have to close for this time, hoping to hear from you again. I remain one of your old children.

One of the boys has sent thirty shillings; an old lady confined to bed but still able to write, 5s.; a helper in South Australia, £10; a lady in Thurso, £5 with 16 articles of clothing; a friend in Surrey, £2; another in Strathaven, 5s. for the Colony of Mercy; a Canadian Missionary to China, from his temporary abode in one of the English camps, before returning to his usual work, £5; and a former Sanatoria patient now in the Faroe Islands, £1.

One pound and a parcel of garments is the gift of a Woman's Guild;

£17 10s. of Strathblane friends who are still interested in emigration, though there has been no need to spend their gift for that purpose this year; two five pound notes of a Cowdenbeath helper, with whom we heartily unite as he says, "Bless the Lord, oh my soul, and forget not all His benefits"; 25 jackets and waterproofs of a Glasgow firm of mantle manufacturers; £25 of two friends, with £5 from their two daughters; and £10 from friends interested in one of the Canadian family.

Again this month we have received a large and welcome weekly gift of bread. The winding up of an employees' war charities fund has brought us £25, whilst the month's legacies have totalled £2,784 8s 1d. Among the gifts in kind are two large framed photographs of the donor of the Dalry Home and of his son, to whose memory the house was built. These have come indirectly through a local friend, and in due course will be hung upon the walls of the Dalry Home, No. 3 Cottage.

Not only for temporal blessings have we special cause for thanksgiving, but for spiritual blessings as well. Our hearts are very full with what God has privileged us to see of miracles of grace, as well as of Providence, in this much blessed village. For some weeks a remarkable spiritual awakening has been going on among the children, beginning with the younger and spreading to the older. No special effort has been made to play upon their emotions, yet one after another has spontaneously made public confession of faith in Christ through one instrumentality of the Spirit or another. Something like ninety boys and fifty girls of the Senior Bible classes (all over fourteen years of age) have manifested in their daily and often very changed lives the reality of their conversion. At the request of the boys themselves, a special meeting for prayer has been commenced on Thursday evenings. We shall not soon forget the first of these which we were able to attend. The earnestness, spontaneity, and directness of their prayers, as one boy followed another for half-an-hour or more, was wonderful, and such singing there never was. We older folks are humbled in the presence of God and of these young Christians whom He has called to be His witnesses. Oh that we may be more worthy of His high calling, and never be to His little ones a cause of offence.

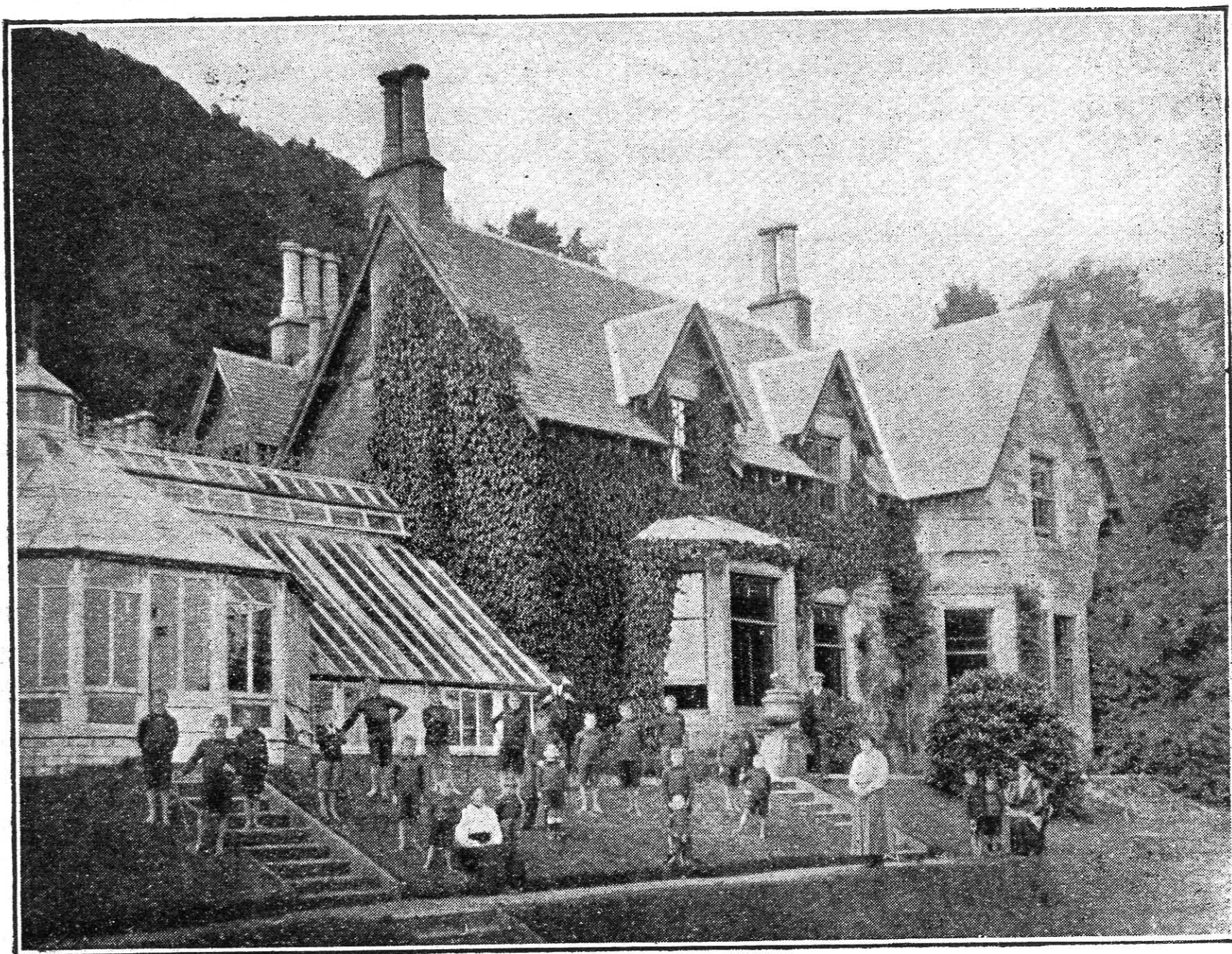
MAY, 1919.—How watchful our Heavenly Father is of all our needs, and how punctual is the supply. If He were constantly the Director of our stewardship our gifts would always be appropriate. With ten pounds from Queensland on the first day of the month is the request, "Kindly use the enclosed donation in connection with evangelistic work of the Orphan Homes of Scotland or the Consumption Sanatoria, and oblige a Christian." Lines that truly express our own experience accompany a like amount from the East of Scotland—

How good is the God we adore,
Our faithful, unchangeable friend,
His love is as great as His power,
And neither knows limit nor end.

"In the hope of His coming" an anonymous donor has sent a hundred pounds. Oh, that we might live in the light of that blessed hope. From everywhere comes news of spiritual apathy. God grant that the move-

ment He has begun here may spread to the uttermost parts of the earth to hasten the approach of that happy day.

Seven legacies, varying from 13s. 1d. to £250, have added to the children's treasury this month £585 7s. 8d. A lady in London has sent £100, which "I had intended leaving to the Homes, but on reconsideration have decided that it would be better to give it in my lifetime." There is also £2 from the Kirkwall branch of the Y.W.C.A.; 10s., half-yearly amount from Bexhill-on Sea; £1 0s. 4d. from a company of the Boys' Brigade; £2 from Ottawa; two guineas "in memory of one who loved little children"; £1 from "labourer"; £4 6s., being proceeds of an entertainment given by children in a Shettleston Sunday School; £1 from an old boy; £5 from another and his wife; £1, a "birthday thankoffering";

ten dollars from Philadelphia; £2 from a Wishaw Bible Class; 10s. from Belfast; £1 also from Belfast, being part of a widow's compensation money; and 10s. from a frequent helper in Forres.

The sender of 13s. 6d. from a Lanarkshire Bible Class says, "This is their first donation to anything." Just when we were anticipating the need of a roll top desk a lady has written offering one which was the property of her late husband, and having been a gift to him she is doubly reluctant to dispose of it in the ordinary way. On arrival it proves to be exactly what we require. Another friend in acquainting us with the home-going of one who "took a great interest in the work at Bridge-of-Weir and prayed daily for the same," says "The Lord has given me the desire to take up the work which she has left off. If you please let me

know the garments you are specially in want of I shall try to help with same Enclosed please find cheque value £2 in aid of your dear little children."

A branch of the B.W.T.A. has given 5s.; Leith friends, £15, for the support of a girl; the original donor's son, £150 for the upkeep of the Home for invalid girls; one of the girls in domestic service, 5s.; two friends in London, 10s; a regular donor, £10 for the Homes with £5 for the Sanatoria; a helper in West Kilbride, 20s and 10s for invalid children; another in New Zealand, 20s.; and friends in Campbeltown, £25 4s. 6d. which they have collected for the Homes. A Hillhead donor writes:—"It takes two pounds now to be equal to one before the war, so I enclose two for your work." One pound from Peeblesshire "is to help a little one to have a holiday," and that again brings us back to the story of the holiday homes.

As previously indicated, the donor of the first home had found another house for sale. As this was a mile distant from the first and the house next to Torr Aluinn was also on the market, we ventured to suggest that the neighbouring one (Hoop House) would be much more convenient, as the two properties could easily be made into one. On the 8th inst. came a wire from the donor saying his offer for Hoop House had been accepted, and asking us to let his agents know what furniture we required.

Though the building is not quite so commodious and the rooms smaller than in Torr Aluinn, it has the advantage of a large, well cultivated kitchen-garden and three greenhouses well stocked with grape and tomato vines, which have been a source of considerable revenue in the past. To have these two houses side by side, with only the road between them and a fine stretch of shore, will enable us to accommodate two hundred children at a time, and thus carry through the much-longed for holiday programme during the long school vacation. Little more than a month remains in which to complete all the arrangements and work extensive transformations, but grateful hearts will impel many willing hands, and every hour will be filled with joyous anticipation of the good things their Heavenly Father has yet in store for the boys and girls when they cross the thresholds of these latest tokens of His love and care.

On the 28th inst. a disastrous fire broke out in Killearn Home. Shortly after midday smoke and flames were seen on the roof, which after the long spell of drought had readily been ignited by a spark from some neighbouring chimney. The flames spread so quickly that our village fire brigade did well to confine the damage to the upper storey of the building, which has been completely destroyed, together with house furnishings estimated at about a hundred pounds. We are indeed thankful that the fire occurred at a time when none of the children were in bed; at a season of the year when repairs can best be put in hand; and when there was another unoccupied home to which the family could be removed *en masse*.

JUNE, 1919.—Not infrequently two or three or even four girls and an occasional boy have been admitted at one time to the fellowship of the Church in this place. But on this opening day of June we have been privileged to see no fewer than twenty-four of the oldest boys in the village take their places for the first time at the Lord's table. Time

will not erase from the memories of those present the scene, as twenty-four lads, whose very faces shone with holy joy, arose from their seats and avowed their allegiance to the Captain of their salvation in face of that numerous congregation. If any service could be more impressive than this Sacramental one on a summer Sunday morning, it was the church meeting of a previous Friday evening, at which the brethren, deputed to examine these lads, submitted their reports. The report of every individual case spoke of a thorough fitness for, and a clear understanding of the step which each lad wished to take. Not once, but repeatedly did the brethren remark upon the deep spiritual blessing they themselves had received, as well as the feeling of personal unworthiness they experienced in the presence of these lads. It might have been profitable, they said, for us older Christians to have exchanged places with and to have submitted ourselves to the examination of these new members of the Church. For the lads we pray—may they be kept by the power of the Omnipotent, who is able to keep them from falling and present them faultless before the presence of His glory with exceeding joy; for ourselves—"Breathe on me breath of God, fill me with life anew."

Turning to the temporal blessings of a month so well begun we find 10s. from one of the old girls; on four separate occasions 1s. enclosed in an envelope bearing Coatbridge postmark; 12s. from two little girls, aged ten and nine years, who tell us, "We made and sold thirty lavender bags"; £2 12s. from friends in Biggar; 10s. from a women's meeting in near-by Kilbarchan; also £10 from a Bridge-of-Weir donor; £1 from Stromness; another £1 from Torquay; 2s. 6d. from two friends in Stranraer; £5 "for our little orphan for April, May, and June," from George's sisters; £1 from an old worker; 14s. from a London lady "in loving remembrance of a truly good father"; 30s. from New Zealand; £2 more from a man and wife in the same country, who pass on Phil. iv. 6, which so well enunciates the Founder's principle of dependence upon God—"Be careful for nothing; but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God"; £2 5s. 8d. from Brisbane; and £4 collected by friends in New Jersey.

An old friend and faithful servant of the Lord, ever about his Master's business writes, "Received a golf club from —, who would not accept payment. Please send him an acknowledgment of 10s. herewith." The rest of the same letter tells that "a ten shilling note was found in a shop, supposed to belong to me. When in the shop I had one in my hand, but I could not say whether the enclosed was it or not. To make sure, as all money belongs to the Lord, I herewith enclose it for His work. Send receipt to —."

A mother rejoicing in the return of her sons and that her daughter is now able to work sends 10s.; an anonymous friend, £1, through an Edinburgh church; the members of a junior Bible class, 30s.; a widow, two guineas, "In loving memory of a dear husband"; a London friend, £10; one in Dennistoun, a thankoffering of £1; a mother's meeting in Dunfermline, 10s.; various contributions amounting to £13 4s. 4d. from the Secretary of the Sabbath School Union; and 10s. from one of the grown-up girls.

One of the Canadian boys who left a good farm in a Western province in order to "do his bit," has written on his return to Canada:—

Just a few lines in answer to your welcome letter which I received last week. I arrived home safe and found everything in good condition. I will just work around this district till harvest is over. Then I will be able to take the farm over and work it myself. Everything was too far advanced to take it over this spring. We are having very windy weather, and we need rain in the worst way, but the crops are looking good, so guess we can't complain much. I am sending you fifteen dollars for the work. This is the first time I have been in the village through the day since I came home, having been so busy working on the land.

The sender of 10s. from a soldier tells that "He desired me to give it to a Scottish Home for poor children." One pound "is in memory of a subscriber, an old lady now entered into her rest." Twenty-eight shillings comes from a blind friend in Aberdeenshire. The sender says, she "ekes out a living by knitting and sets aside her tithe for the Lord's work. In this way her soul is kept fresh and in constant touch with her Lord though she is far removed from the ordinary means of grace and the fellowship of the Lord's people." Among the larger gifts are £100 from a Glasgow gentleman; £180 for the upkeep of Ashgrove Home, with £10 for the Sanatoria from the ladies who gave it; and £108, a very precious gift, being the total savings in Canada and Flanders of one of our splendid boys who gave his best in his country's hour of need. He was one of the last to volunteer, for, when others went earlier in the day, he was still young and slight. Like many another, his natural disposition was for peace, but all honour to him, he was not found wanting in true courage when the call came to him yonder in a peaceful farm home. An agent of the Royal Bank in Ayrshire writes, "I have been requested by an anonymous donor to remit you £5 towards furnishing of your Holiday Home." Though the donor of the new Homes has done so splendidly, there will be ample opportunity to spend this and many other gifts before everything is transformed to meet the peculiar needs of such a place.

JULY, 1919.—This year our boys and girls were just as jubilant as their American cousins over the "Glorious Fourth," for on that morning the school closed for the summer vacation, and in the afternoon the first party of about two hundred boys, with their "fathers and mothers," set out for the new Holiday Homes at the coast. Such excitement there was and speculation as to what the place would be like. On the following morning a small supplementary party of girls went to the old home at Ardnadam. Twelve days were allotted to each party, so that others followed on the 16th and 28th insts. The last need was met, when, after failure to rent a rowing boat, a suitable one was purchased.

How beneficial the change had been was evinced by the bronzed faces, whilst the sparkling eyes spoke of "the best holiday ever" during which they had spent the livelong day upon the sea-shore, where was always something new to see—ocean-going steamers, yacht races, or Admiralty trials. Fishing, bathing, boating, and all sorts of games filled in the periods before, between, and after three hearty meals that were always served "on time." Trips to Innellan, or better still to Dunoon, held a big place in the programme, for everyone had withdrawn some-

thing from the bank and was eager to spend it in a real shop, even if things did cost a lot more than in the stores at home. It was a novel experience for some also to find themselves in an ordinary church of one denomination or another on Sunday morning, and sometimes in the afternoon one of the local ministers would come along to conduct service in the open-air in the grounds of Torr Aluinn.

To help to defray the cost of this best of all treats, as well as meet the ordinary needs, we have received this month £1 "In loving memory of our dear little boy," from a Glasgow mother; 15s. from a Dutch friend in South Africa; £1 from a lonely widow, seventy-three years of age, who lives in a single apartment house; 30s. each for the Homes and the Sanatoria from a Sunday School in Uddingston; 10s. from London

on a departed little one's birthday; £32 7s. 1d., the proceeds of a jumble sale in Hong-Kong; £1 from a mission meeting in Leith, where one of the colonists used to attend; 11s. from girls in a Bathgate Bible class; £50 from an old helper in Glasgow; 20s. "in remembrance of my beloved and saintly mother"; 12s. 7½d., "just a tenth"; £9 from friends in Largs, Fairlie, and Manchester; with £1 from the sender for the Colony of Mercy; 5s., the contents of a little boy's bank in Prestwick; £1 from a lady in San Francisco, asking the costs for maintenance of a child in the Homes now and before the war; and 10s. from one of the girls. Another writes:—

I am sending you a little gift. It is not very much, but I know it will be thankfully received. I can never hope to repay you for the good training and happiness I enjoyed while in the Homes, but with God's help I hope to be able to send you a little more soon. I have a great deal to thank God for, for the way He has taken care of

me and now enabling me to give a little to help the good work being carried on at Bridge-of-Weir. I hope you are all well. Give my love to all.

One of the boys home on a trip from Canada after a long absence has left a thankoffering of £1; one of the girls, 10s.; whilst £10 is from another of the old boys and his wife. A sailmaker in the Navy, "having heard that the Homes were started through faith in prayer to a living God and therefore akin to Müller's Homes of Bristol," asks us to accept £3, "just from a thankful heart for God's mercy." Twenty-five pounds of a cheque for one hundred is "specially for our sailors and soldiers' little ones," the remainder to be used for the hospital or for emigration work if that had been resumed. One in Shanghai has forwarded £4 7s. 1d., which is part of a friend's prize-money; "Cable," St. Andrews, a guinea for the holiday fund; a widow in Arran, £5, in "memory of my dear husband"; a helper in Sussex, 10s.; and another in Orkney, 2s. 6d. A dear old lady, also in Orkney, who is still able to write but lost the power of speech a year ago, sends 10s. "God has given me to trust in Him for over sixty years," she says, and "through the long lifetime of eighty-six years He has never failed with His goodness."

A recent visitor to the village, enclosing a cheque for twenty pounds, writes, "Allow me to thank you for giving us such a splendid day yesterday. It was quite an education. I had never seen anything like it before. The thing that perhaps struck me more than anything else was the substantial goodness of everything about the place." A donor in Forres writes, "I noted with great pleasure the news in your last note of the boys becoming members of the church"; and another in Aberdeen, "For the spiritual blessing God is sending you amongst the boys we rejoice with you and thank God and pray that the good work begun may go on until all are brought in."

The good work still goes on. This month ten girls and one boy have joined the church, and there are still a number to follow later.

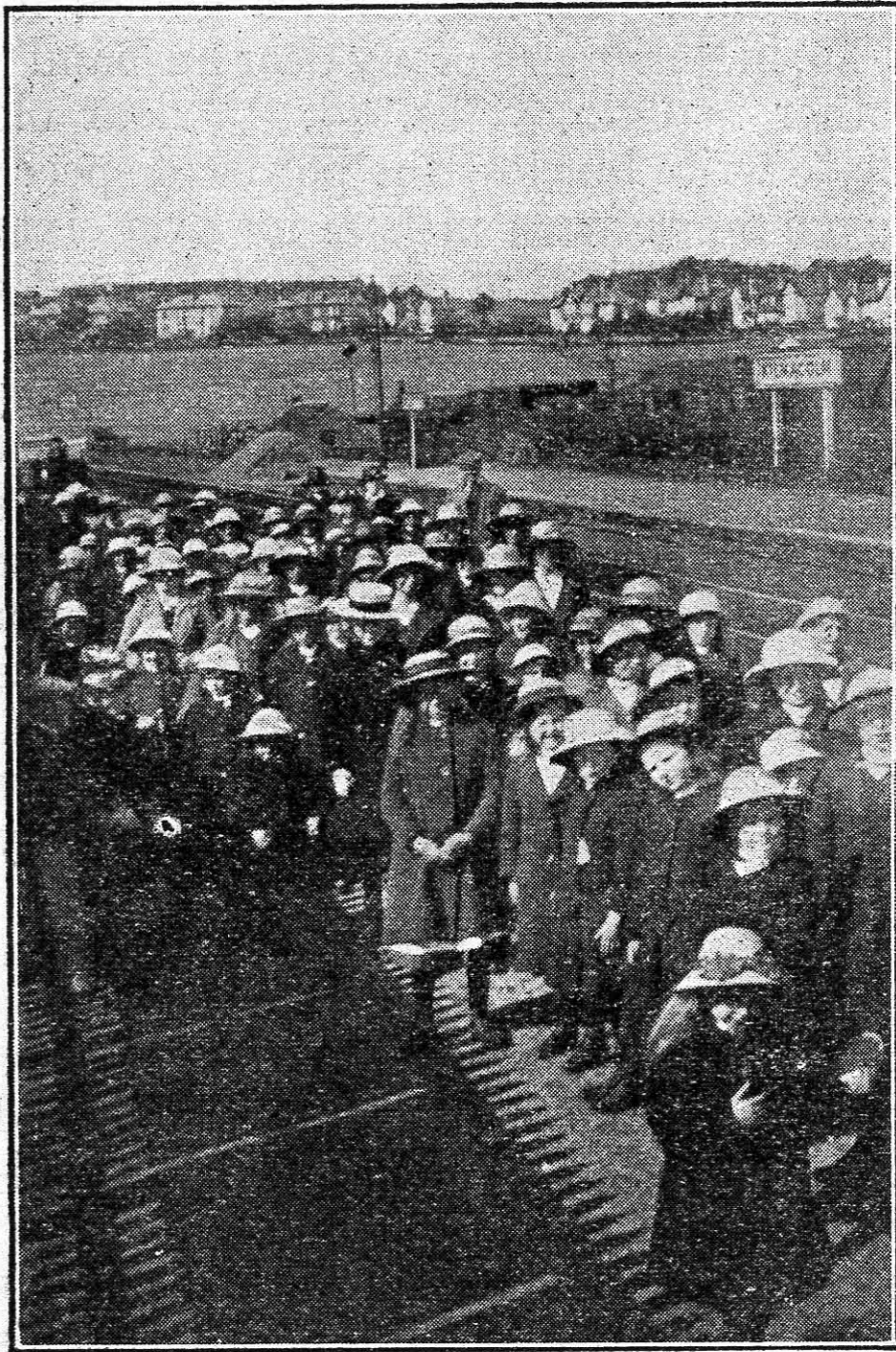
We have been readily obedient to the King's command to observe the 19th inst. as Peace Day. Individual meat pies and potatoes, followed by an ample supply of freshly picked local strawberries formed the mid-day treat. It being also Glasgow Fair Saturday, each child had his usual "Fairin" of a bag of sweets, which a kind friend, with memories of his own young days, always provides. At the end of the afternoon's play, the big family assembled by cottages around the Shelter in the Park for a real pic-nic tea, with more good things to eat. From this spot the Peace Procession began to wend its way around the Elise Hospital, along the private road and through the grounds of the Sanatoria, re-entering the Homes by the new gateway on the hill, passing along Peace Avenue on which the latest homes have been built, and finishing around the oval in front of the church with singing the National Anthem.

AUGUST, 1919.—Once again hundreds of flags—jacks, standards, tricolors, etc.—have been pulled down from the shelves for another Peace Procession on the fifth anniversary of the Declaration of War. This time it was an evening function, so the very little ones could not participate, but about eight hundred boys and girls, with a number of the grown-ups and the Colonists accepted the kind invitation of Sir Joseph and Lady Maclay to be entertained in the grounds of Duchal. To the

thrilling strains of the bagpipes we marched through the avenues till we reached a spot where lemonade and bags of good things to eat were distributed. Then came patriotic songs around the steps of the old mansion house, followed by ice cream, and last of all the lighting of a great bonfire and a display of fireworks. Though every one was tired, for it was eleven o'clock at night when we started for home, none of the young folks will ever forget that Peace Celebration when they were allowed to stay up late.

From an old nurse we have 10s. "for the children, my peace celebration"; from a company of the Boys' Brigade in Leith, other 10s.; from the pupils of a Lanarkshire public school, £4 8s. 10d., which is the

proceeds of a concert they had given; from two sisters in Tayport, interested in two of the boys, £3; from "Two grateful parents" in Devon, £10; from the employees' charities fund in a Government ordnance store, £10; from Kilmacolm, £1; from Tasmania, £1; from a nurse in Dublin, 5s.; from one of the workers, £1; from a Bible class in Thurso, 5s.; from a friend in Pennsylvania, £2; another in Hong Kong, £10; a lady in Malvern, £9; someone in New Zealand, £4; an old worker in Natal, a guinea; and another guinea also from South Africa, from an old subscriber and a Scotsman, asking advice as to the management of an extensive new orphanage that has lately sprung into existence as the result of the war, and the influenza epidemic which together have made 400 children of railway men orphans in that land.

"Off my first pay," says a girl who recently left us, "I thought it would be a pleasure for you to have something for what was showered on me, so I enclose a postal order for 5s. Perhaps the day will come when I will be able to send a larger sum of money. The girls will have arrived home. I hope they had a good time and nice weather and all able to start their duties again." A pound each has come from another of the girls in this country and one of the boys, whilst two of the Canadian grown-up family have sent similar amounts. A very useful gift of 100 boxes of kippered herrings came to hand last month, and again this month the same friend, who makes a specialty of this gift has repeated it. A chaplain to the Forces in Mesopotamia writes, "I have pleasure in enclosing cheque for £4 12s., being amount of offerings on behalf of the Homes at the voluntary services in the Presbyterian and Non-

conformist church hut. The men themselves desired that the offerings for one month be given to 'Quarrier's' and I send it along now with their good wishes for the work."

Some Sunday school teachers have sent £1 14s. after their visit to the Homes; a friend in Belfast, £1; one in Norfolk, £5, in memory of his wife; another in China, a draft worth £33 10s.; A Glasgow gentleman, £100; another with his wife, £25, saying, "You must have a big increase in cost of feeding all your bairns, but I know that enough will be provided to meet all their wants"; another Glasgow helper, £10, to be used at our discretion for either the general or the emigration fund; someone, 20s. to help with the holidays; and one of the old girls going on her own holiday, 10s. She says, "I remember some of the happy days we spent at Ascog."

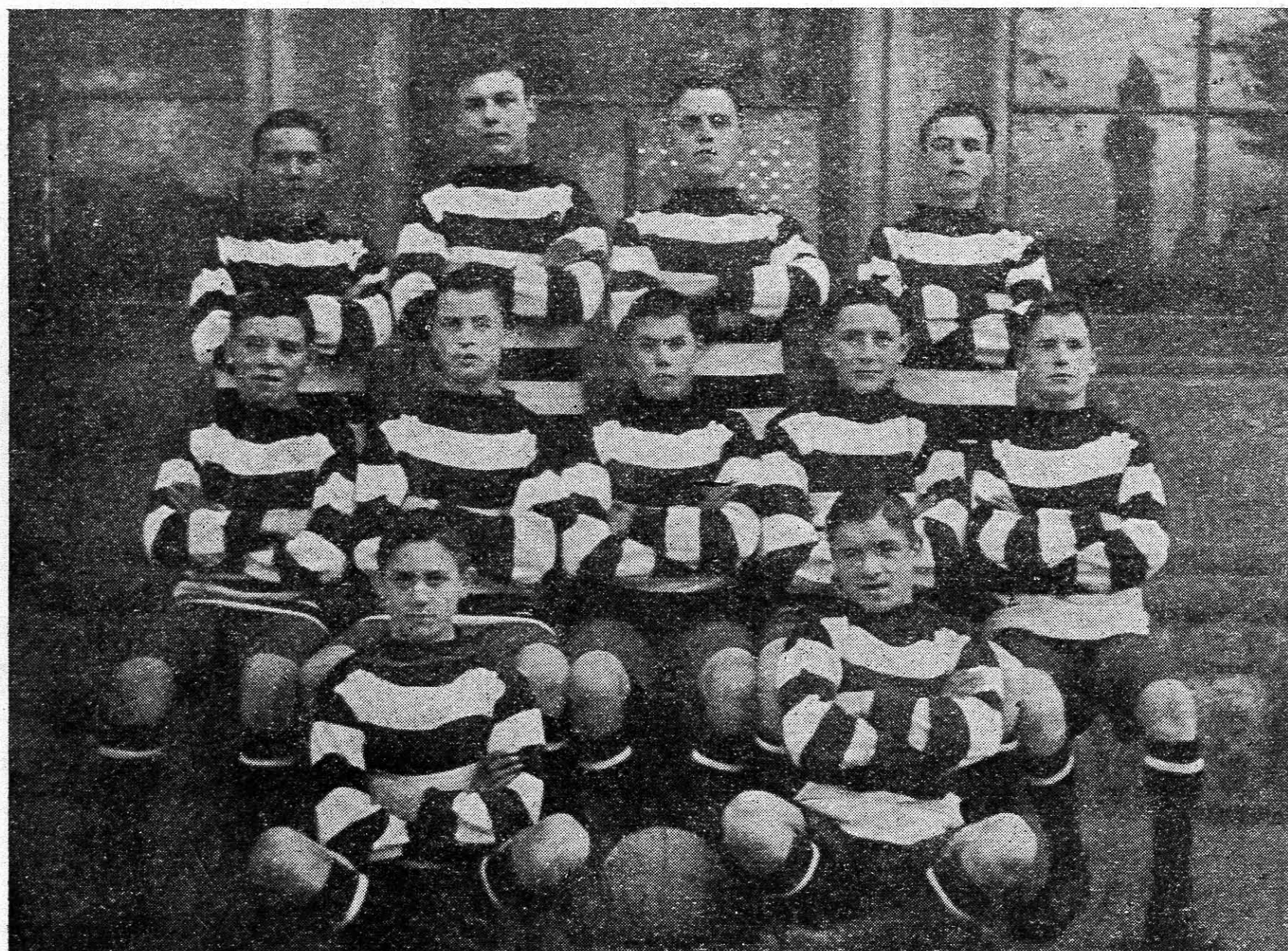
SEPTEMBER, 1919.—Holidays are over and another session of school has begun. Some weeks ago prizes were offered for the best essays on "My Holiday," and there have been many first-rate efforts. One of the oldest boy competitors begins his essay thus:—"It is certainly delightful to think of going away for a holiday, and when the day arrives in which we go away we have a certain habit of watching the clock and thinking how long it seems to be taking to move round, and we also have a look at the weather with doubtfulness and uncertainty." In his description of the seaside homes and their surroundings occurs this appreciation of human nature, "There were also splendid hot-houses with gorgeous bunches of grapes and flowers, besides a garden where there were raspberries, plums, gooseberries, and black currants, all of which you may be sure are very enticing to us boys, and notwithstanding frequent warnings, I am rather afraid many of them vanished in a rather mysterious way." A girl aged 13 years concludes her essay with the sentence, "There are lots of nice things we could speak of, but if we told them our story would be too long." A twelve-year-old boy describing the first meal on the evening of their arrival says, "There were two hundred and one of us and the piles of bread soon disappeared." Another boy's opening paragraph contains an explanation of their excited anticipation. "Others went before us and brought back fascinating stories." Although only thirteen years of age his report of the Sunday morning service he attended at Dunoon would shame the majority of hearers:—

The minister had a special address for the young people, the subject of which was contentment in whatever estate you are placed. His subject for the older people was Paul's exhortation to the Philippians to be, as the minister put it, "Imperial thinkers." His text was Phil. iv. 8. He spoke of the need of such thinking in Britain at the present time and also in the building up of the League of Nations. He denounced the habitual "girling" of all classes in Britain, and remarked that if business and duty occupied all our time, and that we had really no time for deep thinking, the way to be Imperial thinkers is to think on Christ, for whoever thinks of Him has the purest possible thoughts. He reminded the congregation of the condition of the Philippians when Paul wrote this epistle; poor, ignorant, with hardly a thing to call their own, little better than slaves, and yet the apostle, without hesitation urged them to think on things which are "pure, holy, and of good report." If it was possible for them to fulfil this, what is to prevent people to-day from doing the same even if they have a lot of business to see to.

We feel sure that our readers will appreciate these original expressions of the children's attitude towards the holiday, and in consequence a little girl of eleven years will not be disappointed when she writes, "We

are all looking forward to next summer so that we may get down again to have another nice holiday."

When the Corporation of Glasgow were entertaining the school children of the city in the public parks in celebration of Peace, they were not unmindful of those in the Orphan Homes. One morning a motor delivery van arrived at the Stores with 1,500 bags of teabread, 1,700 cakes of chocolate, and 1,500 copper medals. Of money gifts, five dollars is from a man and wife lately emigrated to Hamilton, Ont.; 10s. from a lady in Hull; £2 10s. "War Bond interest to the kiddies with best wishes" from Milnathort; 7s. from a Sabbath morning children's meeting in Ayrshire; £5 from "a fisherman, a lover of the work"; £15

from "Sympathisers" in Largs who have given an extra £5 on account of high prices; £2 from Hertford; £20 in a registered envelope bearing the Peterhead postmark; 10s. in memory of a Belfast helper's mother; 10s. from Worcester; 10s. for the Colony of Mercy, in memory of the donor's sister, who was a regular contributor; 5s. in stamps for the Mission Fund; and 10s. from friends in Edinburgh who write, "It is nearly thirty years since we heard your father speak on the Homes at a small meeting in one of our church halls here, and we have followed the wonderful story year by year since then."

The twenty-ninth instant being the ninetieth anniversary of the beloved Founder's birth, the big family, having partaken of a special tea, assembled in the church for a commemorative meeting. Here the prizes for the best of the beautiful cottage gardens were distributed, and this generation of children, who have not been privileged to know the Founder, listened with enthusiastic attention to the illustrated story of his life and

work. The day has brought a number of memorial gifts, ranging in amount from one to ten pounds, from old friends who cherish the memory of the dear ones, who still serve the Master, but in higher sphere. At this season next year we hope that very many friends and helpers will be with us for the biennial thanksgiving day. The month's largest gift is a cheque for five hundred pounds from distant Hong Kong.

OCTOBER, 1919.—A gift of £5 from a South African friend has been left at the City Home. A Johnstone lady sends £10; one "praying daily for God's blessing on your work," 5s.; a friend in Darlington who often helps, £30; a girls' guild, £2, part proceeds of a sale; a donor in British Columbia, 15 dollars; another in the same province, £1; a frequent helper in Greenock, 5s. 6d.; one of the girls, 10s.; an anonymous friend, 10s., under the postmark of Inverallochy; a lady in Cambuslang, £20, in memory of her parents; a soldier, who spent several years of his boyhood in the village and has just returned from Germany, 20s.; a women's guild, £5 for the Killearn Home; an old worker, 20s.; and one of the girls in a situation, 10s.; a bright boy who left the village a few years ago writes from California for the first time since we bade him good-bye:—

I was one time a member of your large family. I was located first at Cottage No. 27 and then transferred to Cottage No. 9. I have been away from you about four years now, but I often look back at the days I spent on the football field, the school, the church, and home. I have a lot of thanks to offer the Homes for the training I received, which will never be forgotten. There were times when I was in the wrong and got punished and thought I was right. I can look back and see where I was mistaken. I have never met anyone in San Francisco that I knew in Bridge-of-Weir, but I know quite a few in Canada, and I wish you would send me the address of J———. He had a brother in the same cottage I was in, and I wish to be remembered to him. Also please remember me to W———, who used to drive the trap, and my teacher. I would like also to be remembered to the singing teacher. Many an ear test he gave me. I am now a private secretary for one of the rail-roads in this part of the country. I remember when cottage No. 40 won the shield for football, and No. 22 was a close second, and No. 9, the cottage I was in, was third. I will be awful glad to hear from the old-time friends.

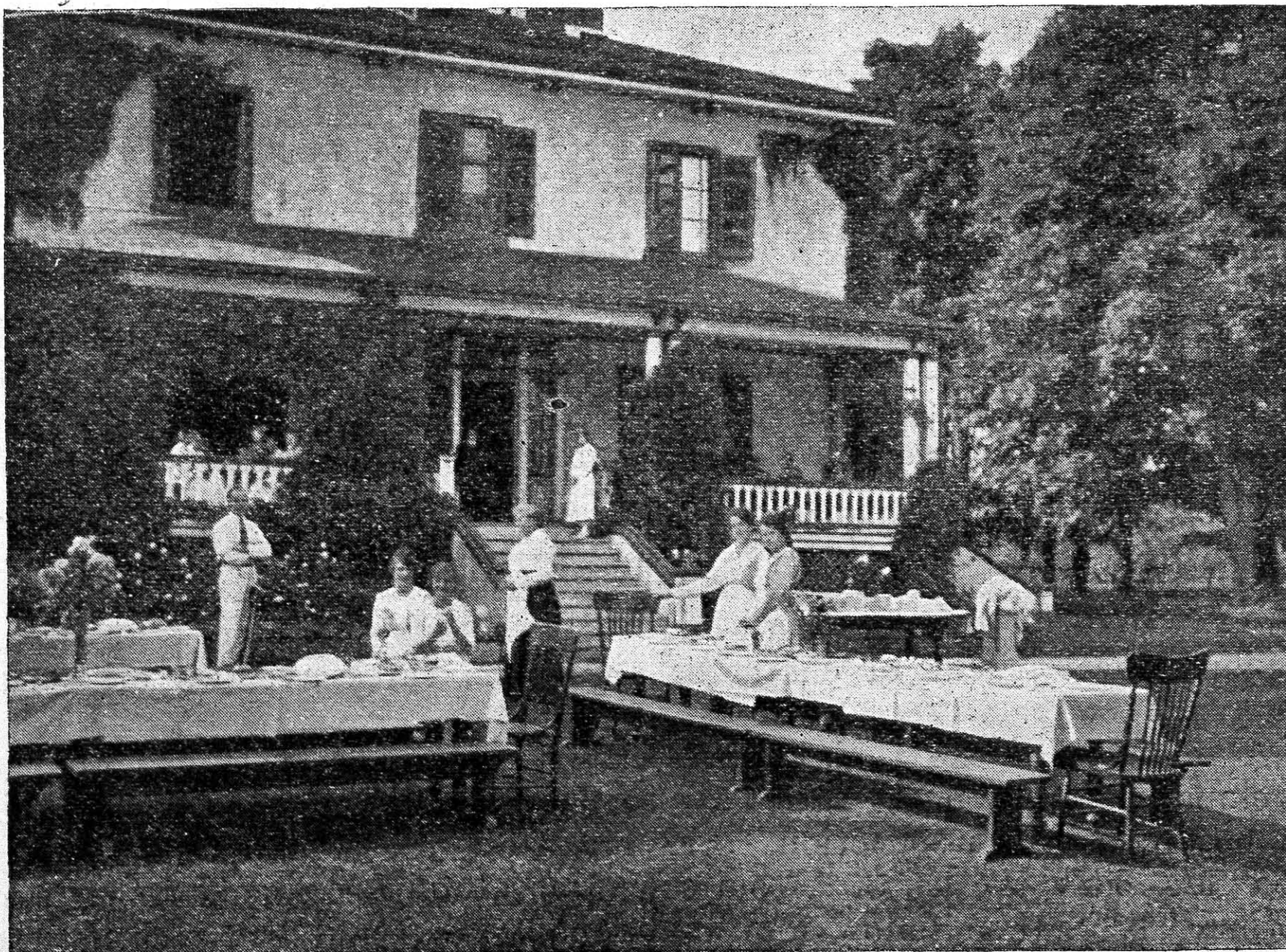
A photograph of the two brothers he refers to appears elsewhere in the Narrative. Now that the winter season is approaching, arrangements have been made to re-organise games for the boys in the hope that, side by side with religious training, a strong, healthy physique may be built up and a good character broadened and enriched by the generous spirit of clean British sport, which did so much to make the heroes who were the first to fill the breach in the days of the Empire's greatest peril. A series of educative lectures and musical entertainments have been planned for the benefit of the older children on alternate Saturday evenings in the Central Hall. We trust these things will be beneficial and that as days go by we shall be able to amplify such efforts at a harmonious development of character along the three avenues of spirit, mind, and body.

A minister of the U.F. Church sending £16, has pencilled on the envelope the eight items which go to make up the total. The first is "a post Sacrament collection," £12 11s. 9d.; the second, "a knitting bee," 12s. 6d.; the third, "from a heart grateful for a good father and mother," 5s.; then follow four individual gifts; and the eighth, "to make it even," ninepence. Very shortly after came from the same

source, £1, "handed me by a medical student who had got through his second professional as a thankoffering." From one of the grown-up girls, now married to a doctor, in Florida we have five guineas; a friend in Motherwell, 18s., saying, "It is the Lord's tenth"; one in Sydney, N.S.W., 10s. each for the Homes, the Sanatoria, the Colony, and the Mission Fund; "In memory of our little girl," 10s.; George's sisters, £10, "for our little orphan"; a visitor, £1 for the boys and girls in Elise; and two different friends in Paisley, £50 each.

Thus very inadequately have we told the story of God's Providence for another year. From the preceding pages some idea of the number and the variety of the gifts that have come to us as well as of the spirit of the givers may be gained. Whether it be the half-crown or the rich man's hundred, or the £22 5s. left by a missionary brother "for the daily bread," the source of all is to be found above. On the table before us lies a statement for the last day of this financial year, showing the balance to be larger than ever before in spite of the most adverse conditions the world has ever experienced. Better than the largest balance there lies before us the unbroken word of God—the Father of the fatherless. So with the wise man we say, "There hath not failed one word of all His good promise. The Lord our God be with us, as He was with our fathers; that He may incline our hearts unto Him, to walk in all His ways, and to keep His commandments."

EMIGRATION WORK.

THROUGHOUT another year we have been obliged to content ourselves with openings in the homelands for our older children when they have reached a suitable age for leaving the shelter of their cottage homes at Bridge-of-Weir. Any one not in close touch with the work would naturally suppose that there must be a great congestion in the Homes after four years, during which the Canadian outlet has remained closed against the children. This, however, is not the case, for although sometimes the accommodation has been strained to the utmost extent, we have never had to refuse any needy and suitable applicants for admission.

Now we are looking forward—if the Lord will—to re-opening emigration, possibly in the spring of 1920, and many of our friends on the other side of the ocean are eagerly hoping that we may be able to do so. The Canadian Government urges that, if possible, we should greatly increase the number of children sent across, to enjoy the welcome that our kindred over seas are waiting to extend to all we can send out. The cost per child for emigration will necessarily be much higher than in those happy pre-war years which now seem so far distant. As nearly as we can estimate the cost per head for outfitting, passage, and placing in Canada will not be less than £25, perhaps even more may be required.

In the past summer Mr. and Mrs. Findlay were able to pay a short visit to Canada to arrange about an accumulation of matters that had been gathering up since their last visit in 1915. They found everything going on satisfactorily at Fairknowe, where Mr. and Mrs. Winters and their helpers never find time hang heavily on their hands, even in years when no new parties can be sent out. There is a constant and large correspondence in connection with schooling, situations, wages, and many other matters, so that it is not always easy to find time for the important and necessary work of visiting the younger children.

A large number of old boys and girls were seen during this hurried visit—some of them in their own homes and others who came to call at Fairknowe. Most of these were doing well, some of them particularly so, and it was cheering indeed to see how well much of the seed sown in past years is growing and prospering.

Around our Canadian Home are some sixteen acres of excellent land, and in the scarce war years this has proved a boon indeed. It was delightful to see the ripening fields of Indian corn, potatoes, oats, many sorts of vegetables and fruit.

Never were we more convinced of the wisdom by which Mr. Quarrier was guided in sending out the thousands of young people who have gone from Bridge-of-Weir to help to solve the immense problems of our great Dominion across the seas, and we trust it may still be in the will of God that many more thousands shall follow in the same direction; for in that land the "average boy and girl have more than an average chance of doing better than averagely well."

HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS FUND.

THIS fund has gone on with its quiet and useful ministry throughout another year, and its administration has been a joy to all connected with it. Its income, unlike that of other departments in the Homes, has not grown with the times as we could have wished it had done, but has remained practically stationary. The cost of living in all parts of the world has soared quite as high as in our own favoured land, and in some places to a much greater degree. This should be taken into account by all those who recognise themselves as the Lord's stewards, and who seek to minister to the temporal needs of those who are doing our work in distant harvest fields.

Five of the six missionaries who are wholly supported from the fund are or have been at home on furlough in the past year.

Mr. and Mrs. Cuthbert Nairn, of Marraksh, Morocco, came home in the spring, but could only be persuaded to remain a few months, and are now back again at their arduous work. Although they have no baptized converts to report, they are able to tell of wonderful changes which have resulted from their long and faithful labours on behalf of the people to whom their lives have been so freely given.

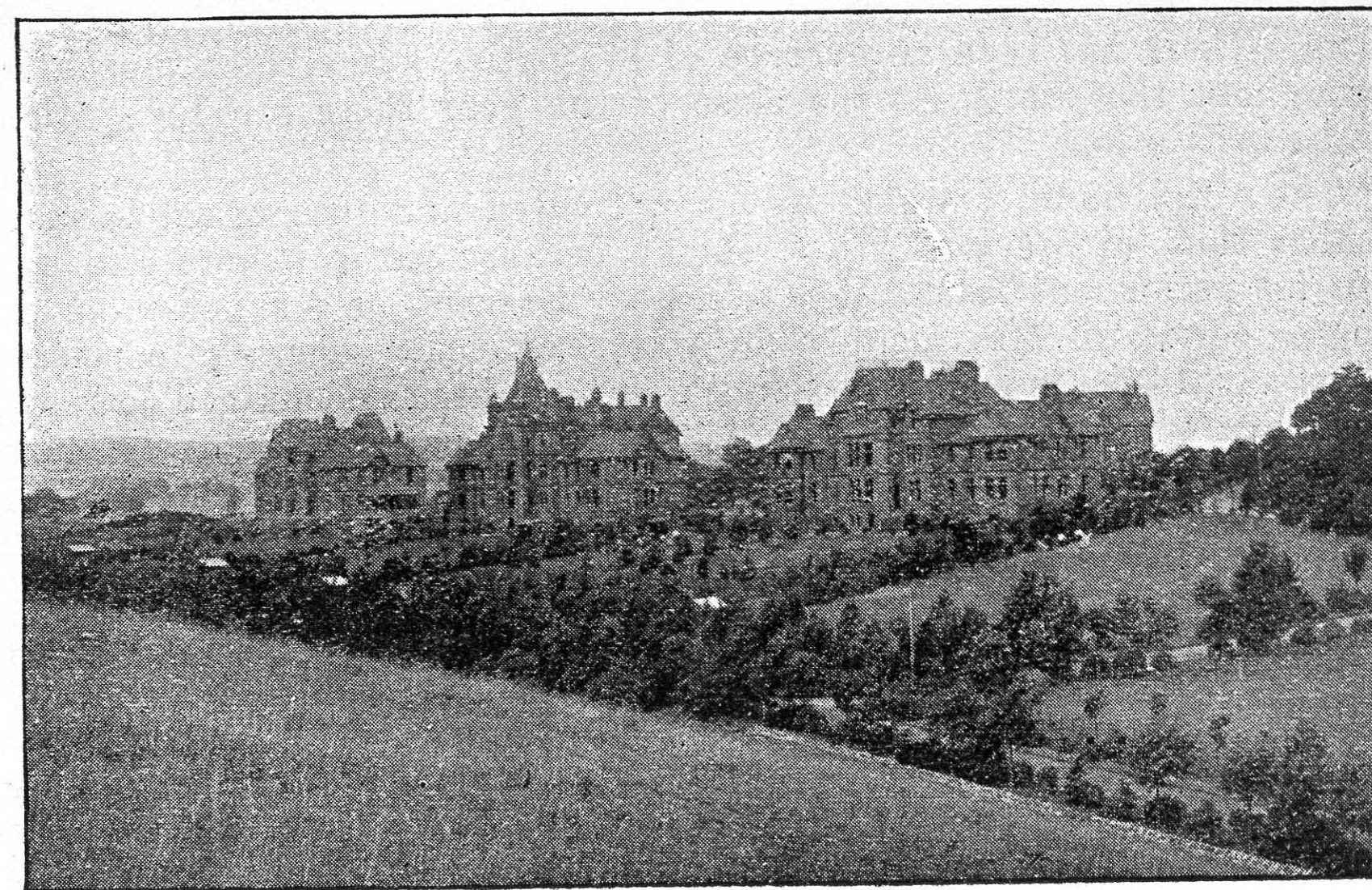
Mr. and Mrs. John Ritchie, of Lima, Peru, arrived in London last May, with their four children. Since then both of our friends have undergone serious surgical operations, so that it is likely to be a considerable time before they can wisely return to their work in South America.

Mr. and Mrs. James H. Haldane, of Pernambuco, are also on furlough, after a prolonged period of service in a specially trying climate. They bring three little children with them—all born since last we saw them.

Miss Jeanie Smart has considerable encouragement in her work at Loping, on the Kwangsin River, China.

THE war has ended since our last Annual Report was written, but the battle against Tuberculosis, the age long enemy of the race, still goes on. As an aftermath of the recent world conflict there seems to be an exacerbation of this fight. There has been throughout the country as a whole a progressive increase in the death rate from the disease, and, no doubt, of the incidence rate as well. Never were applications for admission to the Sanatoria more numerous than they have been during the past year; at no time has the institution seemed to meet a real need in the country more than it does to-day. We have treated and discharged 294 patients suffering from pulmonary tuberculosis. Many of these had to wait for weeks and months before they could be taken in, and many more have been unable to secure a bed. Ten other cases were admitted and discharged who did not suffer from pulmonary tuberculosis, but from other conditions, such as Hodgkin's disease, scoliosis, hip-joint disease, tuberculosis of the kidney, and tuberculous sinuses; and twelve cases did not remain in the institution long enough to receive any treat-

ment. There has been an average of 145 patients in residence each day throughout the year. At the close of the year there are 154 patients in the institution.

The total number which we have treated and discharged is rather smaller than in previous years, chiefly because we feel more and more that for permanent results it is necessary to insist on a much more prolonged period of treatment than was previously generally considered essential. Patients who were doing well have been encouraged to remain on as long as they possibly could. Of the 294 patients, 166 were males, and 128 females. Many of the male patients were ex-service men who had contracted the disease or had the disease aggravated by life in the Army or Navy under war conditions. Fully 70 per cent. of the men in residence at the end of the year are such.

On admission to the Sanatoria, 123, or 41.8 per cent. of the patients were in an advanced state of the disease; 138, or 46.9 per cent. were in an intermediate stage; only 33, or 11.2 per cent. were in an early stage, or to put it in another way, on admission, 19 of the cases had the whole five lobes of the lungs involved; 62 had four lobes; 70 had three lobes; 122 had two lobes; and only 20 had one lobe of the lung affected. In the majority of the cases the disease had been going on for a very long time prior to admission. Only 72, or 24.5 per cent. of the cases had had the disease for less than six months; 60, or 20.4 per cent. had had it from six to twelve months at least; the others had suffered from it for varying periods from one up to nine years. The fact that the majority of the cases continue to come thus well advanced is very unfortunate, for, although Tuberculosis is undoubtedly remarkably amenable to remedial measures in the incipient stage, it is very resistant to all efforts in advanced stages. The causes of such a condition of affairs are many. The insidious character of tuberculosis is perhaps the chief one. The seriousness of the disease is usually not realised, and advice is very frequently not sought until it is too late, till the disease has progressed throughout both lungs and till the constitution has been irretrievably undermined by the toxins produced by the tubercle bacillus. Many foolishly, while aware of the fatal nature of the disease, dread the thought of entering a sanatorium, and defer the supposedly evil day till they can do it no longer, and then only too often sanatoria can do nothing for them.

The results which have followed on our efforts, it is very difficult to tabulate. We cannot honestly use the word *cured*. It is impossible to declare that a person is cured of the disease unless that person be carefully watched for several years. In an apparently "cured" case there may be present unrecognised active foci which at any time may light up afresh and evince themselves by a sudden hæmorrhage or pneumonic condition. The results as recorded demonstrate the value of early diagnosis and treatment. 22 of the 33 early cases had the disease apparently arrested and 11 were improved; none of the early cases were worse on discharge or died. 28 of the 138 intermediate cases had the disease apparently arrested; 81 were improved, and 27 were discharged not improved. Two of the intermediate cases died in the Sanatoria. Three of the 123 advanced cases had the disease apparently arrested;

59 were improved, and 51 were not improved on discharge; ten of the advanced cases died in the Sanatoria. 245 of the 294 cases increased in weight while under treatment; 49 lost weight or were *in statu quo* on discharge. Practically all the cases on admission were unfit for work. On discharge, 163 out of 294 were apparently fit for work.

It is an interesting fact that Tuberculosis to-day retains many of the characteristics for which it was noted in the earliest historical times. Hippocrates who lived five centuries before the time of Christ, pointed out that it claimed its victims chiefly between 15 and 35 years of age. 80 per cent. of the deaths from Tuberculosis to-day take place then; 40 per cent. of those who die from all causes from 15 to 35, die of Tuberculosis. 227, or 77.2 per cent. of our patients were from 16 to 40 years of age; 31 were below 15; 28 were from 40 to 50; 8 were from 50 to 60. The fact that the disease claims thus the lives of young men and young women is a particularly sad one. It speaks of blasted hopes, of wrecked careers, of ruined homes, and of a tremendous financial loss to the nation. Any effort that is made to stem the progress of the disease and any expense involved that will hasten its ultimate eradication can scarcely be too great.

The causation of the disease is not merely that of infection with the tubercle bacillus, although that of course is of prime importance. For the disease to develop there must be *pari passu* a lowering of the resistance of the individual. Many of the patients who have been admitted lately to the Sanatoria trace their condition to the influenza epidemic of last winter. Many others owe their disease to the strain and privation of military life and of war work. A few of the men trace it to their trying experiences as prisoners of war in Germany. In each instance there can generally be elicited some factor which had a debilitating effect and reduced the resistance of the individual prior to the manifestation of the symptoms of tuberculosis. The first symptoms of the disease evinced by the patients varied very greatly. Only in the case of 128, or 43.5 per cent. of the patients was it a cold or a cough and spit. It was pleurisy in 32 cases; hæmoptysis in 14 cases; bronchitis in 14 cases; pneumonia in 10 cases; laryngitis in 7 cases; and asthma in 2 cases. In 21 cases it seemed to be ushered in by a sense of fatigue and general malaise. In 8 cases the first symptom was referable to the digestive system, and in 7 cases to the circulatory system. In 16 cases the disease followed on tuberculosis of the glands of the neck.

The treatment of the disease has been along the lines of that followed by athletes who are in training, only of course very much slower and less strenuous. The patients are first of all kept resting, then gradually allowed to exercise until they are able to do hard garden work without fatigue or anything adverse resulting. Tuberculin has been administered to a very large percentage of the cases and has undoubtedly helped. While it is a powerful weapon for evil, it can also be a potent influence for good. Radium and ultra violet rays have been frequently used for various conditions. Artificial pneumo-thorax has also been extensively used with very remarkable results in a number of instances. There is no definite cure that is applicable to every case. Every individual has had to be studied and treated according to his or her personal peculiarities.

During the year the work of the Sanatoria has been widened in that the institution has been linked up with the University of Glasgow for the teaching of Tuberculosis to medical students during the last year of their curriculum and to qualified medical practitioners. Three courses on the subject have been given. Those who have attended have shown a keen interest in the work, and taken full advantage of the opportunities presented. The autumn course for post-graduates was especially successful. Thirteen doctors, chiefly ex-service men, attended three days a week and showed great appreciation of the opportunity offered to study the various phases of the subject with the abundant clinical material which the Sanatoria always contain. It is to be hoped that this feature of the work will continue and that the Sanatoria, by disseminating a practical knowledge of the subject among those who are to diagnose and treat the condition in the future, will give further aid in eradicating one of the scourges of the ages.

The Dispensary at James Morrison Street, Glasgow, has continued during the year one day each week, and has been fairly well attended. It has been of special value for keeping in touch with those who have previously been in the Sanatoria and have returned home. They very frequently come there to be re-examined in order to make certain that they are keeping quite well or to receive further advice and treatment.

The success of the work during the year has very largely been due to Miss Taylor, the matron, and the efficient band of sisters and nurses who have stood by her. There have been many and recurring difficulties, especially on account of shortage of staff. Much has had to be sacrificed by them. It is good to realise it has not been for nought.

COLONY OF MERCY FOR EPILEPTICS.

THE Colony of Mercy for Epileptics has, on the whole, had a successful year. We began the year with 96 patients in residence. 48 of these were men, 26 women, 14 boys, and 8 girls. There were admitted 53 patients, 44 males and 9 females, and there were discharged 48 patients, 41 males and 7 females. Three men died of epilepsy. At the end of the year we have 98 patients in residence, 47 men, 29 women, 15 boys, 7 girls. The work, as in previous years, has proceeded more or less along three lines—medical, industrial, and social. The patients, suffering as they do from a chronic and very intractable malady, generally remain for long periods; consequently every phase of life must be planned for.

The fact that they are in the Colony for treatment is never permitted to be forgotten, and each patient is studied individually and prescribed for as is thought necessary. As epilepsy is a symptom rather than a disease, and a symptom that is produced by many conditions, what affects one favourably may not be beneficial to another. We use a good many drugs. Those which we have found most useful are the following:—the bromides, borax, chloral hydrate, silver nitrate, palladium, calcium chloride, hyoscine, and in one or two cases, tuberculin.

Success has attended the efforts in a few instances. There are at present in the Colony half-a-dozen patients who, apparently as the result of drug treatment, have had the fits arrested for a period of eighteen months to two-and-a-half years. We make it a rule to keep patients for three years after the cessation of fits before discharging them as probably cured. This is a severe test, but in our opinion a necessary one. Unfortunately in the majority of cases, drugs have merely a palliative effect; they modify the severity of the seizures but do not cure. A fairly large number of the patients are much better without any medicinal treatment except during an acute attack. Much research requires to be done on the etiology of the condition before satisfactory progress can be expected therapeutically.

We only admit patients to the Colony who are able to work, or if children, to attend school. The special school at the Colony is under the Scottish Education Authority. Not only are the children educated along the usual lines, but various forms of manual work receive special attention. The adult male patients are chiefly occupied at garden work, particularly vegetable growing; a few work at home, and two are engaged in the laboratory. The female patients are principally occupied in the laundry or in the sewing room. As a whole, the Colonists do very well and get through a great deal of real work. The benefit is mutual. Their labour tends to keep down the expenses of the institution, and the Colonists are kept at a higher level mentally than would be the case were they allowed to loaf about and do nothing. There is no doubt that epileptics deteriorate mentally much more rapidly if allowed to be idle than they do when their time is fully occupied in some form of productive employment.

During the year 19,626 fits were recorded, an average of 214 per patient on the female side, and 192 per patient on the male side.

A feature of the social life of the Colony during the year was the visit of the patients for a week to the two houses at Dunoon recently gifted to the Orphan Homes of Scotland. Every one was able to go for that period, and a very happy time was spent. The Colonists greatly enjoyed and profited by the change. Although it was no easy task to take so many subject to fits away in such a manner for a holiday, it was well worth while.

The religious life of the Colony has been kept at a high level. The privilege of attending divine worship at the Orphan Homes Church on Sundays and during the week has been fully taken advantage of. The patients have conducted a Christian Endeavour service of their own each week in the Colony, and have found great interest in the discussion of the topics.

There has been a very large demand for female beds throughout the year. Nearly every week one or more applications have had to be refused. The need for additional accommodation is undoubtedly great.

The matrons and nurses at the Colony show great interest and enthusiasm in the work. Their endeavour to make the lives of those who are so sadly afflicted, happy, comfortable, and to some degree useful, has been well rewarded by the spirit of contentment and real home likeness which characterises the Colony.

SUMMARY OF THE YEAR'S WORK.

ORPHAN HOMES OF SCOTLAND, BRIDGE-OF-WEIR, AND CITY ORPHAN HOME, GLASGOW.—On 1st November, 1918, there were resident in the Homes, 1,534 boys and girls. During the year 255 new cases were admitted, making a total of 1,789 dealt with.

These have been disposed of as follows:—Outfitted and sent to domestic service, trades, and situations, 61; deaths, 8; children under 5 years of age adopted, 2; returned to relatives now in a position to provide for them, 467; left to go to relatives, etc., 18; enlisted, 15; sent to other institutions, 31; leaving in the Homes on 31st October, 1919, 1,217; of whom 696 are boys and 521 girls.

From the above it will be seen that 63 boys and girls were provided with outfits, given a start in life, and placed in positions to make their own way. The older girls having been trained for domestic service, situations were found for them, and the older boys were apprenticed to trades, or sent to farms. Most of those returned to relatives were the children of soldiers, who, on being demobilised, were able to take charge of their families again. Amongst those returned to friends many were old enough to work, and where necessary, we helped with outfits, so that a large proportion of these might be added to the number of the permanently helped.

CONSUMPTION SANATORIA OF SCOTLAND.—The year began with 141 patients in residence. 329 were admitted, 304 discharged, and 12 died, leaving 154 in residence on 31st October, 1919.

COLONY OF MERCY FOR EPILEPTICS.—The year began with 96 colonists in residence; 53 men, women, and children were admitted; 48 were discharged; and 3 died, leaving 98 in residence on 31st October, 1919.

THE YEAR'S INCOME.

The amount received during the year is as follows:—For the General Fund, which includes the maintenance of the Homes at Bridge-of-Weir and the City Home, including £1,709 15s. 7½d. earned by working boys, and sundry amounts, as per Cash Statement, £53,240 11s. 5d.; for Consumption Sanatoria £14,213 4s. 5d.; for the Colony of Mercy for Epileptics, £3,393 5s. 2d.; for Home and Foreign Missions Fund, £1,393 18s. 7d., making the total amount for all purposes £72,240 19s. 7d., besides large quantities of clothing, provisions, and other useful gifts.

For the work accomplished we are, under God, indebted to our devoted fellow-helpers in the various Homes, and to the practical generosity of friends throughout the country; to ministers, evangelists, and all who have aided in the Church services and other gatherings; to Sabbath School superintendents, teachers, and scholars; to ladies who have made up garments for our little ones; to the Press which has given notices of the work; to the members of the Medical Advisory Board, and the Doctors who have freely given their time and skill for the benefit of the sufferers in the Sanatoria and Hospitals; and to the accountants Messrs. M'Farlane, Hutton & Patrick, who very kindly act as Honorary Auditors.

IN CONCLUSION.

“The aim of the Homes is to witness to God's faithfulness and to provide for the fatherless children of Scotland.” These words are always included in the opening statements of this Narrative, but they may well find a place at the end also as they deserve to be specially emphasised. God's faithfulness has never failed, but has rather been increasingly manifested from year to year throughout the long history of the work; and because of this it has never been necessary to close our doors against any needy fatherless child. When one compares the blessing that has been scattered through the world and brought into the lives of so many thousands of needy ones by the expenditure of little more than a million and a quarter pounds, with the foolish and useless expenditure of so many millions in these days, how thankful we are for the privileges which come to us at Bridge-of-Weir.

The budget for 1918-19 was overflowingly filled out; so far as we can see, that for 1919-20 will probably include:—

£50,000 for maintenance of Orphan Children in Glasgow and at Bridge-of-Weir.

£2,500 for Emigration and maintenance of the Canadian Home.

Gifts towards maintenance of Consumption Sanatoria.

Gifts towards maintenance of Colony of Mercy.

Christmas-Tree Gifts for 1,300 boys and girls at Bridge-of-Weir. Required early in December.

£2,000 for Home and Foreign Missions Fund.

Consecrated Christian men and women to fill vacancies as they occur for “fathers and mothers” in the cottages.

As this is the one annual touch which we are privileged to have with thousands of the friends whose names are in our address book, we wish to tell them here how much we value their fellowship in prayer and gifts. We do not appeal for the gifts, but we do appeal for a constantly increasing and deepening interest in their prayers. If we have this, all else will continue to come right. Not less do we value the splendid devotion and help of all our fellow workers, without whom we could not carry on at all.

1920 should be the occasion for our next annual Thanksgiving day at Bridge-of-Weir; if it is found possible to arrange it, due notice will be sent out to friends.

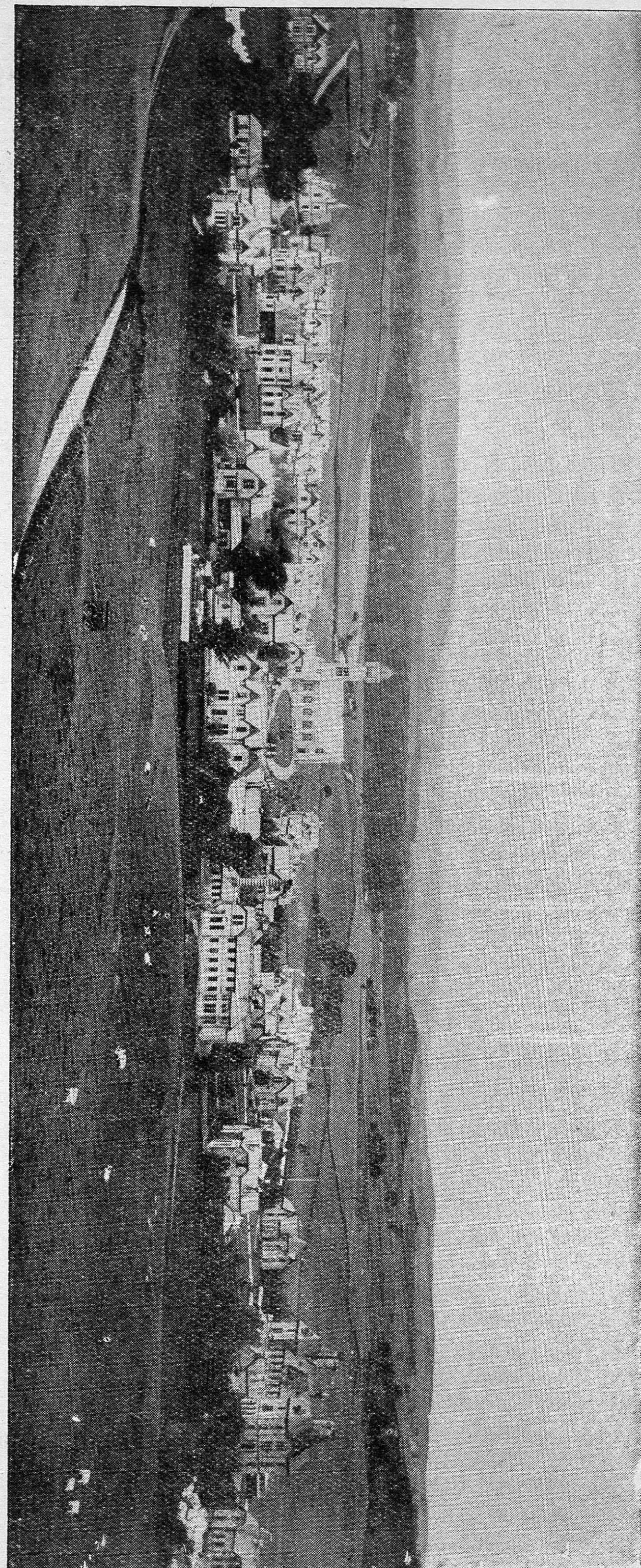

There are 80 Buildings already connected with the work.

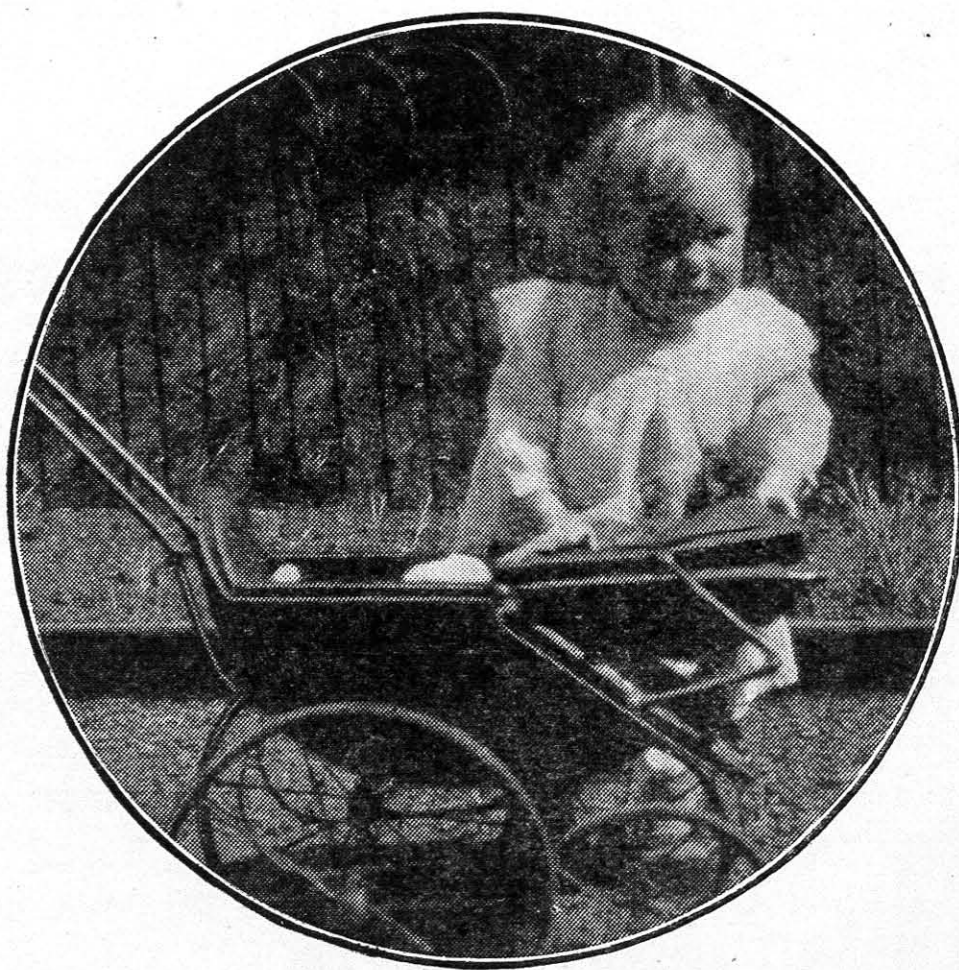
