

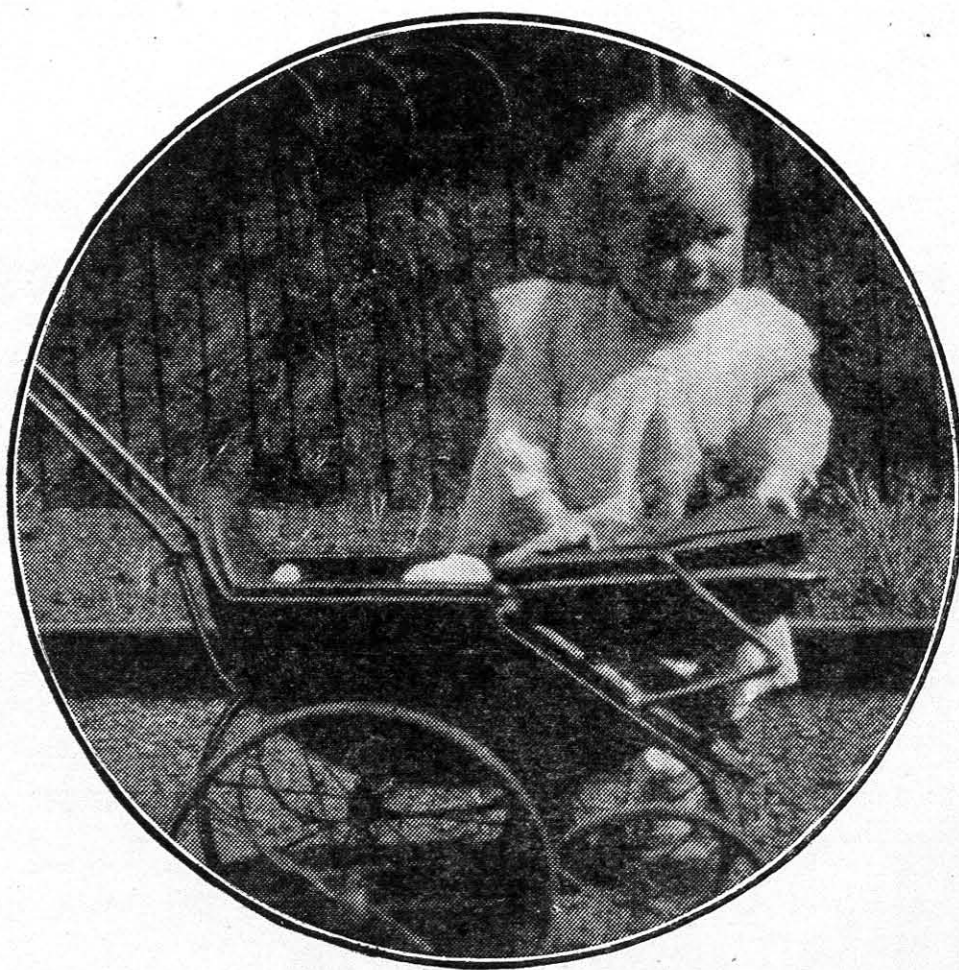

NARRATIVE OF FACTS.
1920.

THE pen which writes this preface is not the same instrument that has written the diary pages which follow, and so we may be permitted to say that the present writer has read these pages with deepest interest. What a story it is! Not a whit less wonderful because a similar story has been told each year for the long period of forty-nine years, for that which we now enter upon is the Jubilee year of the Orphan Homes. It was in our school days that Mr. Quarrier made his first essays to fill out his childhood's resolve to do something to ameliorate the condition of the poorest of Glasgow's needy children. Well do we remember our delight in being present at the annual tea meetings of the Shoe Black Brigade and the Newspaper Brigade in a hall in Trongate. Then through all the developments in Renfrew Lane; Cessnock, and Elmpark Homes, Govan; City Orphan Home; Bridge-of-Weir, and across the ocean, it has been our great privilege to be in touch with and to watch the growth of this wonderful work of God. What a "Romance of Faith" the story is, and how splendidly God has wrought on behalf of the needy ones of our land! Surely He has unanswerably proved that "He is, and that He is a rewarder of those who diligently seek Him." He has never failed and He never can fail those who put their trust in Him. He never sends anyone on a warfare at his own charges, but always provides everything that is needed for the successful carrying on of the campaign. With His work at Bridge-of-Weir He has dealt in a way that has made glad the hearts of all those who have had any share in it. The records on the following pages are just a few samples picked out almost at random from the daily story of the past year, and we feel sure that our friends in "every nation under heaven" will be cheered by a perusal of the Narrative.

Our family at the beginning of the year numbered 1,469—in addition to workers—comprised of 1,217 orphan children, 154 consumption patients, and 98 epileptics. During the year we have received 189 children, 288 patients, and 33 colonists; leaving us with a family of 1,364 on 31st October. For the feeding, clothing, nursing, and caring for of all these we have received the following amounts, including payments:—

For the sake of friends who have not seen previous Reports of the Orphan Homes, the following states the basis upon which the work is carried on :—

In the year 1864 Mr. Quarrier began his public work among the street boys of Glasgow by the organisation of shoeblack and newsboys' brigades. Out of these developed the Orphan Homes, which to-day provide a home and Christian training for 1,500 fatherless and orphan boys and girls of all ages. In the years between 1871, when the first Home was opened, and now, 17,187 children have passed through the Homes, 6,461 of whom were sent to Canada. Something like £1,386,199 has been received; £310,000 of that sum has been expended on buildings, lands, etc., and £1,025,830 on the maintenance of the Homes and Sanatoria and Colony, and Home and Foreign Missions. The work is carried on in dependence upon God for daily supplies. No one is called on personally, nor do we send out collectors. The needs are committed to God in prayer, and we look to Him to move the hearts of His people to send all that is required. The aim of the Homes is to witness to God's faithfulness, and to provide for the fatherless children of Scotland. No payment is necessary to secure their admission. Any child in any part of Scotland, if fatherless and destitute, is eligible, and friends knowing of such should apply to us at once, and thus help to save the little ones from want and misery.

NOVEMBER, 1919.—“There hath not failed one word of all His good promise” was the testimony that concluded the story of the year that has just gone. Looking into the future, “He kindly veils our eyes,” so that we see but one step at a time. It is an unknown and untried way we have to tread, but to the omniscient God, our Heavenly Father, it is neither untried nor unknown. Through war to peace He has led us. Whether the coming days be easy or difficult, He will yet our Leader be.

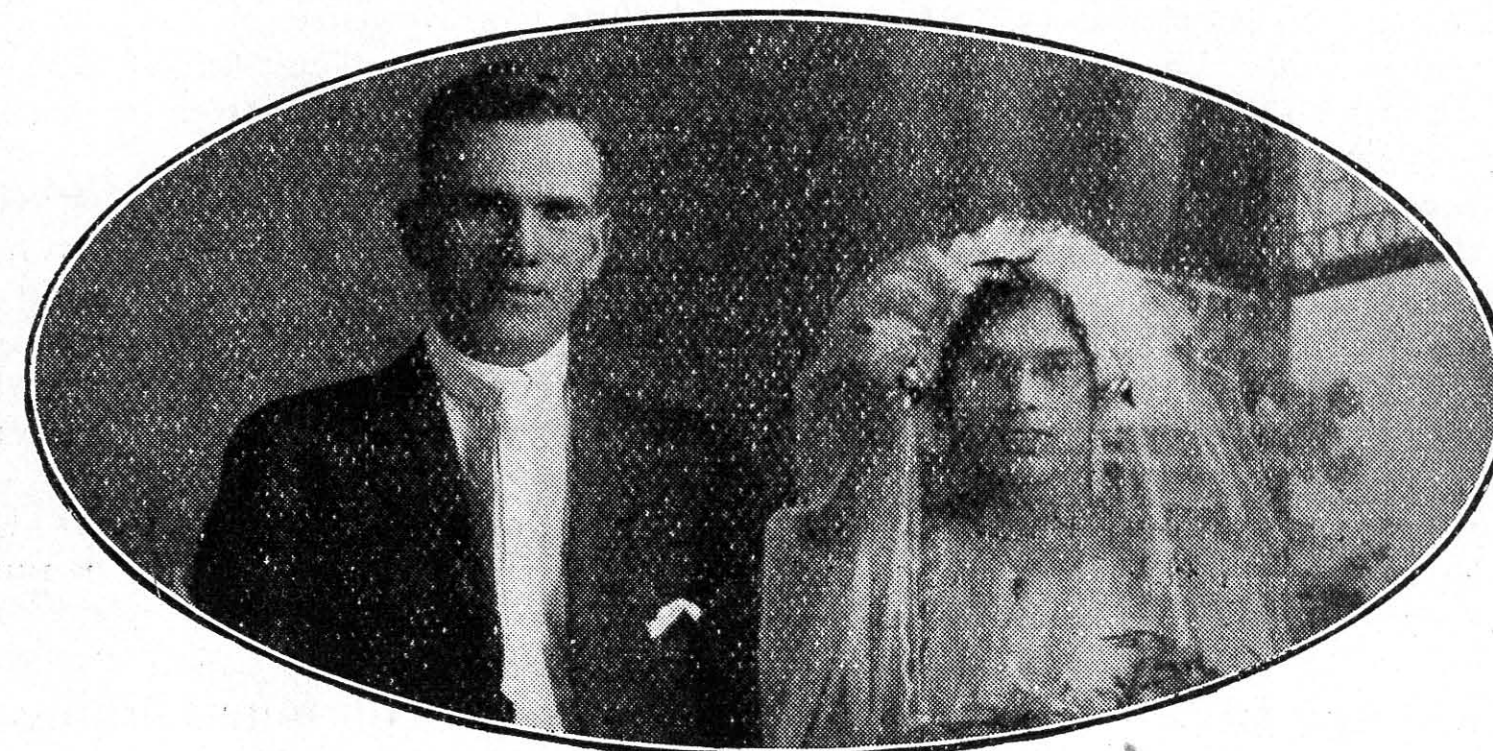
With such a record of never-failing Providence behind us, we can surely go forward in obedience to the exhortation, “Be careful for nothing; but in everything by prayer with thanksgiving let your requests be made known unto God.”

There need be no fear that the new chapter in our history will not be as wonderful as its predecessors, but we do fear lest the narrative be marred by an unworthy human instrument. To be workers together with Him is a high privilege indeed. May we be found in all things faithful, and our poor words blessed to strengthen the faith of many into whose hands these pages may go.

Among the first gifts of this new year is a shilling anonymously in an envelope bearing the Coatbridge postmark; 5s. from Swansea; £2 from one who has doubled the usual donation; 10s. from Tunis; £1 from Tasmania; 13s. 6d. in memory of a mother; £1 for the Homes, with 10s. for the Sanatoria from Lanarkshire; £1 10s. from a frequent helper of long standing in Arbroath; £1 from two friends in Sheffield; 2s. 6d. from a helper in Somerset; £50 from another in Paisley; £1 from the grateful mother of two girls; 4s. 3d. to buy something for the Christmas tree from one of the women in the Colony of Mercy; £20 for the work among epileptics from a friend in Brisbane, Australia; and ten guineas from one near by in Johnstone.

A minister in London, sending one pound, tells that “Through reading the Life Story of William Quarrier, I have been greatly interested and inspired by your work.” £5 10s. from Wei-Hai-Wei was “collected at a little Presbyterian meeting held in the hotel annexe drawing room.” One pound is the continuation of a very regular fortnightly donation from “Alice, Willie, and Jessie”; £10 to pay for athletic supplies for the boys; 10s. from a frequent helper in Tewkesbury; five guineas from readers of the *Life of Faith*; 10s. from a branch of the Y.W.C.A.; and £2 from two friends sending good news of a little one adopted by them sometime ago.

“When snow showers begin to fly round, it makes one shiver. I am enclosing 10s. to help keep one of your little ones warm.” The foregoing came from Wick, and from Cowdenbeath, “two five pound notes to help the large family God has entrusted you with.” Other five pounds was handed in at the City Home by a poor woman, the grateful mother of a boy and girl at one time under our care. Her boy is of the number of those who made the supreme sacrifice in the Great War. Out of the small

allowance paid to her by the War Office she has saved this considerable sum, which she insists can be spared, despite her poverty. There is something specially sacred about such a gift that requires scrupulous care in the spending of what has meant so much sacrifice to the giver, and must be precious in His sight.

A lady has given 10s. in loving memory of her husband; the pupils and staff of a Lanarkshire academy, three guineas; a friend in Birkenhead, 20s., “a small token of my interest in your big family”; a lady in Perthshire, £15 each for the Homes and the Sanatoria; another, £2 sent by her sister-in-law in Canada; the aunt of boys helped, £1; a helper in Dundee, £30; a frequent helper in Crieff, £1; and a Glasgow lady, £5 for the Sanatoria.

The month's legacies number six and range in amount from thirteen shillings and a penny to ten hundred and thirty-three pounds, seventeen shillings. There is, too, the half-yearly donation of £150 for the upkeep of the home for invalid girls, which also partakes of the nature of a legacy. Seventy-one pairs of rabbits and a bag of oatmeal have been added to

the grocery store, besides other useful edibles, and the drapery department has been enriched with various gifts of clothing by donors in England as well as all over Scotland.

We were greatly encouraged by the good attendance at the annual public meeting in Glasgow on the 28th inst. Many friends who could not share the inspiration of this gathering will be glad to have the following press notice from the *Glasgow Herald* of the following morning:—

The forty-eighth annual meeting of the Orphan Homes of Scotland was held yesterday in the Christian Institute, Glasgow. Sir Thomas Glen-Coats, Bart., presided. He said the Homes to-day provided a home and Christian training for 1,500 orphan boys and girls. Since the first Home was opened by Mr. Quarrier in 1871, 16,894 boys and girls had passed through the Orphan Homes at Bridge-of-Weir. Of that number 6,398 had been sent to Canada. Something like £1,310,259 had been received during that time, of which £307,000 had been expended on land, buildings, etc., and £950,000 on maintenance of the Homes, Consumption Sanatoria, and the Colony of Mercy for Epileptics, and home and foreign missions.

The printed report gave details of the Homes, Sanatoria, and Colony of Mercy. It stated that during the year the work of the Sanatoria had been widened in that the institution had been linked up with the University of Glasgow for the teaching of tuberculosis to medical students during the last year of their curriculum and to qualified medical practitioners. It was hoped that that feature of the work would continue, and that the Sanatoria, by disseminating a practical knowledge of the subject among those who were to diagnose and treat the condition in the future would give further aid in eradicating one of the scourges of the ages.

Sir Joseph P. Maclay, Bart., hon. treasurer, submitted the financial statement. He said that during the period of the war, from beginning to end, not only had the needs of the Homes been constantly supplied but they had been supplied in increasing abundance. Not once during all the period of the war was an appeal issued for funds in connection with the Orphan Homes of Scotland. Day by day and week by week the necessary money came in, justifying Mr. Quarrier's motto, "Have faith in God."

Sir Samuel Chisholm, Bart., Pastor D. J. Findlay, the Rev. J. Rhys Davies, and the Rev. Gordon B. Watt spoke on the work of the Homes, and the report was adopted.

DECEMBER, 1919.—Early in the month a gift of four shillings was handed in at the door of the City Home, whilst on the closing day of the old year a gentleman left two hundred pounds in notes at the office there. From Hong-Kong we have a draft worth £112 17s. 3d.; from Ottawa, Canada, ten dollars; and from two old workers in South Africa, £1 and 10s. respectively. Still another old worker sends £1. A member of the present staff has given £5 for Christmas gifts; another, £1 towards general expenses; and two more, £4. One of our grown-up girls enclosing a gift, writes:—

My sister landed safely in Canada. She is staying in B— with my aunt. My brother is also in B— now, but he is staying at the Y.M.C.A. to be near his work. Well, I suppose you will be in the midst of the New Year preparations. N— and I will be down on New Year's day. Enclosed is a little token to help the good work among the children. I can never thank you enough for the good training and also the many happy days I had while there. I often think that we don't really realise how much is being done for us till we have left it all behind, but we can always look back with pleasure when we think of it. I'm not very good at expressing myself, but I know you will understand how thankful we all are for having been brought up at the O.H.S.

Two pounds, "a wee bit of gratitude," is from another of the old girls; thirty dollars from one of our soldier boys now back on his farm in Canada; £3 from a former City Home lad and his wife, with 10s. from

their children; £10 from another old boy and his wife; £1 from one in London, who says of the Report which has just reached him, "It cheered me to read it"; 10s. from a lad who left us more recently and is now working on a farm in the south; 1s. 6d. from a girl who used to be with us; and 5s. brought to the door one day by one of our school girls with a little note written by herself to say, "This is five shillings that my little brother has collected for the Orphan Homes, so I am bringing it to you with all good wishes for a happy Christmastide."

A friend in Carnoustie writes, "Something has been saying to me these two or three days, 'Quarrier's Homes, Quarrier's Homes.' Surely it is to send a New Year's mite which I gladly enclose, trusting it will do some little one a happy turn." To a multitude of others has come the same reminder in one way or another so that our needs have been very bountifully met.

A branch of the Railway Mission has sent £1 8s. 0d.; a railwayman, 10s.; "in gratitude for God's goodness and for His preserving care during the past year"; a Glasgow gentleman, £30; a League of Kindness, £5; a helper in Keswick, £10; a Lanarkshire farmer, £10; a farmer's wife in Fife, £1; an old helper in Bearsden, £20; a brother and sisters in Hillhead, £10; a Loch Fyne merchant, £15; someone in a Banffshire manse, 5s.; one in Crieff, 2s. 6d., for the Colony of Mercy; a helper in New Zealand, £1; "two sisters, Dalry," 7s. 6d.; a Glasgow firm with whom we have dealt for many years, £15; a Glasgow lady for the Christmas treat, £5; the aunt of a family helped, 10s., from Ireland; a minister of the Gospel, 10s. each for the Sanatoria and the Colony; a Sunday School in Arran, £1; a helper in Brora, Sutherlandshire, 7s. 6d.; a friend in India per a friend in this country, £10; another in Orkney, 2s. 6d.; two of our fellow-workers, £1; a young men's Bible class in Edinburgh, £1; a Stromness work party, £7 5s.; a Glasgow slum mission, £1 8s.; a company of the Boys' Brigade, £1; and one of our grown-up girls in a situation in this country, 5s., with the following letter:—

I am sending you a little to help at this time when you do so much to make the children happy. I only wish I could have sent more, but I have been helping a friend who has been ill for some time, and as things are so dear it took all I had. I'm sure you will understand. I received a report yesterday, and I was sorry to hear about Miss Gardiner and Mrs. Stewart. I do hope Mrs. M'Fadzean is keeping better. Please remember me to her. How often I picture her speaking to us older girls at Bible class. I'm sure she must be missed. I say the verses she taught us very often when I am alone and they help me very much. It is nice to see by the report that God has still been with you and has provided through another year. I was expecting to be with you on New Year's Day, but I won't be able to join you, although my thoughts will be with you all the time. It is nice to know that God does everything for our good, although we find it hard sometimes. I hope you are all well at Homelea. With much love and every good wish for the coming year.

Ten dollars comes from one of the 1909 girls now in a Government position in Ottawa; 10s. from South Australia; £3 from friends in Durban; £10 from Aden; £2 from Co. Down, Ireland; 2s. 6d. from Durham; £5 from sisters in Northumberland; £10 from Bournemouth; £6 1s. 6d. from a regular donor in York; £5 from Surrey; 5s. from Coventry; £1 from Kidderminster; £2 from Kent; 15s. from Sussex; 10s. from Radnorshire; £1 from Norfolk; £5 from Bury St. Edmunds; 10s. from London; other 10s. from Cardiff; 5s. from Cheshire; and

£25 from a lady in London who never forgets the Christmas trees to which the children look forward so eagerly.

Others too have been mindful of the special needs of the festive season with their gifts in cash or in kind. From Dumfriesshire has come a mixed contribution, but all useful at this time, consisting of books, balls, groceries, clothing, jam, six pairs of rabbits, and a bag of potatoes. A friend has sent half a chest of tea; another a case of oranges; a third, two barrels of apples; bakers in the city and near by, loaves, teabread, buns, and cakes; whilst from numerous helpers we have been glad to receive toys, dolls, and books for the Christmas trees. A Glasgow firm has sent a welcome gift of bulbs to brighten the gardens with spring flowers, and from Islay on the West to St. Andrews on the East have come to hand all sorts of garments and articles of clothing. Among the special Christmas gifts is one of £50 from Glasgow for the Sanatoria.

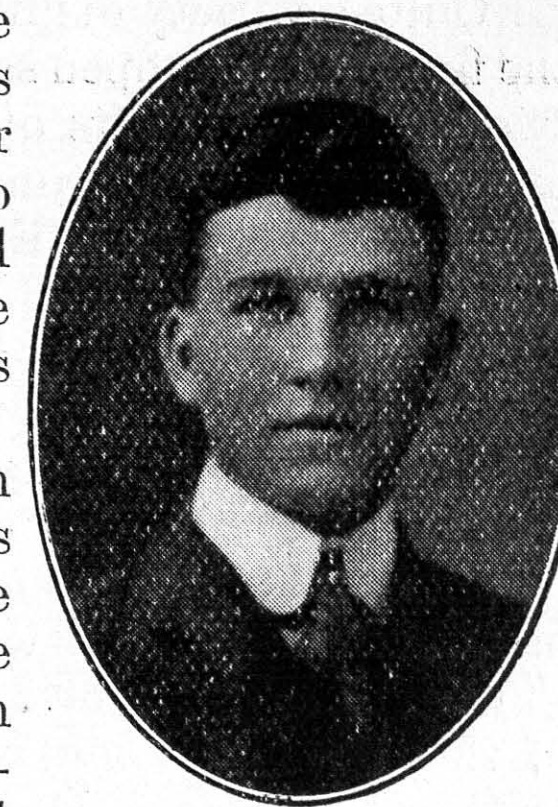
"I am sending an order for 10s." a friend writes, "7s. 6d. from my invalid sister, her first old age pension, for the Orphan Homes, with kind love and prayer for all the good work." A minister in the North sends 5s. with the explanation, "My dear old friend, over eighty years of age, poor in worldly goods but very rich in faith, with a great love in her heart for the Orphan Homes, asks me to send you the enclosed." One pound for the Sanatoria is "in memory of a dearly beloved wee nephew gone home"; 3s. from Galashiels; 10s. for the general fund with 10s. for Colony No. III. from one in Ireland who lived a few months in the Colony and "can never forget that bright spot"; two guineas "as a memorial of my two brave boys who died for their country in the Great War"; and 4s. from a boy in Norwood, London, who says in his letter, "I found that the text, 'It is more blessed to give' was quite true." It is not often that worthless stock becomes valuable, but such has been our experience, for a donor in the East of Scotland writes, "A number of years ago I think I donated to the Homes some shares which afterwards became valueless. I am pleased to now enclose cheque £100, full value of the above-mentioned shares."

Among other donations of larger sums are £50 from a lady with £20 from her son; £70 from a husband and wife; £50 from Edinburgh; £100 from an old friend in Galston; £60 from a Glasgow family; and £180 for the upkeep of the Ashgrove Home, with £10 for the Sanatoria from the original donors of that cottage. Seven legacies total £883 13s., and include one of 28s. from a lance-corporal in the army.

We have been greatly cheered by the many letters of appreciation that have been coming from friends who have been blessed and made partakers in our rejoicing as they read the last Narrative of Facts recently issued. A donor in Dundee says, "I was delighted to get your annual book and though confined to bed and forbidden to read I could not resist the temptation to open it." A new helper in Birkenhead sending £1,

writes, "Your work has been brought to my notice by a dear friend who lent me your 'Narrative of Facts,' but I should be pleased to receive a copy for myself." A letter accompanying a family gift reads, "We are sending you the outcome of our effort as a family at self-denial. While reading your Report at the fireside of how the Lord supplied your large family, my own boys and girls began to ask some questions about your home and orphans in it, and how we could help them to be happy if we did without sweets and put our sweet money all together so that some of your orphans might get our sweets. So this is our offering."

£2 14s. 0d. is the result of a family collection at the breakfast table in an Indian missionary's home; 7s. "is the Lord's own as it came to me unlooked for"; 50s. from a Bible class whose custom hitherto has been to spend 30s. of that sum on prizes for their members; £1, a small thank-offering on the occasion of the donor's diamond wedding; 2s. 6d. from a small boy in Oban; £1 from two of the workers; and a bank draft for £10, "a thankoffering for many mercies," from Peterhead. With a liberal hand our Heavenly Father has provided for all the extra needs of the Christmas season, so it is a very happy and still expectant family of little folks that our fellow-workers have tucked away in bed, ere they gather with us in the church, a people, thankful for many mercies, to spend the last hour of the old year in praise and prayer.

JANUARY, 1920.—None of the boys or girls require to be called on New Year's morning. The anticipation of this day's joys has been their constant thought for weeks past. There is no lack of appreciation of the special breakfast and dinner, but everyone remains keyed up to the highest pitch of expectancy till, in the early afternoon at the church, after the singing of the doxology and a brief prayer, the trees are stripped of their precious fruit. Half-an-hour suffices to undo the work of days. No tiresome speeches stand between the children and the enjoyment of their gifts. A hymn of praise and the benediction concludes this first family gathering of the year. Pausing, amidst the happy scene around us, to think for a moment, our feelings find expression in the words of the American poet:—

Our fathers' God! from out whose hand
The centuries fall like grains of sand,
We meet to-day, united, free,
And loyal to our land and Thee,
To thank Thee for the era done,
And trust Thee for the opening one.

During the winter months already gone many good friends have entertained us, but this is the one night of the year when we find our own entertainment. So, after more good things to eat everyone returns to the church to enjoy the programme provided by our own bairns. A few

only of our grown-up family are able to be with us. Who shall say how many have been here in spirit? Our thoughts and prayers too have been coursing the wide world over, that the Father's blessing may be their inspiration to a year brighter and better than ever before.

Quite a variety of gifts have come to hand on New Year's Day. Almost the first letter we open says, "Please accept 17s. for children's orphanage"; two anonymous gifts of 10s. and 5s. respectively bear the Glasgow post-mark; other 5s. is from one of the girls who used to be with us; £3 from Southport; £5 from Edinburgh; 5s. from Milnathort; £2 from Isle of Whithorn; 10s. from West Kilbride; 6s. 9d. for the stamp account; 10s. from Ross-shire; £1 from one of the boys' homes; £3 "In loving memory," from one of the workers with Ps. xci. 2; £1 from a helper in Devon who writes, "Is not the appointed means prayer? Is not that enough?"; £1 from one of the old boys; £2 from one of the village "mothers"; 10s. from another grateful boy; £10 from two friends who have been associated with the Homes since childhood; £5 from the two Christian members of a firm we deal with; £1 from the employees of one of the old boys; and varying amounts from Sunday schools in Strathaven, Coatbridge, Dundee, Airdrie, Edinburgh, Wigtown, Ballinluig, Carlisle, Fauldhouse, Cambuslang, and Dumfries.

During the month of January we receive more contributions from Sunday schools than at any other time of the year. But many who are much further along the pilgrimage of life than these young folks have come to our aid with their gifts. "Inasmuch," who sends £5, is eighty years of age; £1 is from a friend of very long standing on her eightieth birthday; Fellowship, who sends a useful consignment of 155 boxes of kippered herrings, and the donor of £6 to give each child an orange, are both well over the three-score years and ten and were interested in Mr. Quarrier and his work in the early days. The sender of £3 10s. 9d. from Winnipeg says, "I remember Mr. Quarrier, and had the pleasure of his friendship crossing the Atlantic some years ago." Ten shillings comes from Paisley "as a happy recollection of old days at the 'Doo Hill'." A lady in Glasgow sending a like amount writes, "Thanks for report. I remember the first one." Five shillings from a girl who used to live in the James Wilson Home was enclosed in the following letter:—

It is with the greatest pleasure I answer your ever-welcome letter, and I'm sure I will never forget the happy days spent in your care. I am very pleased to see by your letter how very well the friends of the home are getting on with their work. They seem to be progressing very well. I hope they all enjoyed their Peace celebrations, and I think they must have had a glorious time, which will be remembered for a long while yet. I was greatly distressed to hear of the death of our old friends. I am sorry to hear of Mrs. M'Fadzean's illness and earnestly hope she will recover. I enclose a small sum of money for all you have done for me in the past, and I am sorry it is so small, but I give it with a glad heart. My sister and I are still attending the Church and Bible class at home, and we find it a great help to us. I am always pleased to hear of the Homes and the friends we left behind when we came here.

A friend in Islay has sent 20s.; a Glasgow Church Women's Guild, three guineas; one of His stewards in Cardiff, half a guinea; an old helper in Kilmarnock, £50; another in Alloa, £25; someone in Bolton, 10s. for the Colony of Mercy; per the Union Bank, £1 from Pretoria; two friends in Windermere, £15 each; "to help on the good work," 5s. from Linwood;

a branch of the G.F.B.R.S., £2 7s., a New Year offering for the Sanatoria; a husband and wife in Philadelphia, five dollars; another in Calgary, seven and a half dollars; a third couple in British Columbia, five dollars; readers of *The Christian*, £4 17s. 6d.; a frequent helper in Darlington, £30; "two girls who received great blessing from reading the report," 5s.; a missionary in North Africa, £1; an army major, £25 each for the Homes and the Sanatoria; a Lerwick Sunday school, £2; one of our workers, £2; a Liverpool minister, 10s.; another minister per his agents, £100; and one of our grown-up girls with her two sisters in New Zealand, £2 10s. She says, "I am writing to let you see that I have not forgotten the happy days that I spent in Bridge-of-Weir or any of the friends I met there."

One pound has come from another of our girls now nursing in Kent;

£5 from a donor in Irvine, who writes, "I send £5 this time as you are missing my dear mother's gifts now. But I expect God has put it in someone's heart to take her place"; £1 from Formosa; 5s. from one of our fellow workers along with 5s. "from a friend who has been an invalid nearly all her life"; £1 from another of the workers; 10s. from a third; £1 for emigration from one who explains that "the enclosed was unexpectedly put into my hand just when I was wondering what I could spare to send you"; 10s. from a Boys' Brigade football team after having been beaten in a game here by our Excelsiors; and £1 from an anonymous friend who dropped it into the collection box at the church service in an envelope on which was written, "O.H.S. For His Sake."

"Please accept small donation from one of the old boys" was on the note accompanying £4 handed in by a lad recently demobilised. A St. Andrew's Society in one of the Chinese ports has sent £78 10s. "to be

applied in furthering the charitable work which the O.H.S. is doing for the children of wounded and disabled Scottish soldiers." £1 is "for the good work at these Homes from a well-wisher who is in the Sanatoria for his health." Three legacies paid during this month amounted respectively to £1,000, £1 7s. 0d., and £2,091 19s. 0d.

FEBRUARY, 1920.—"His goodness faileth never." These words, passed on by a donor, have been the constant experience of the Orphan Homes of Scotland during the forty-three years that have gone since on 10th February their first stone was laid in the Broadfield Home in the year 1877. God alone foresaw to what magnitude His work would grow. Even the beloved Founder's expectation did not reach beyond ten buildings, in the early days of the work. Yet to-day there are more than eighty separate buildings, some of which have been greatly enlarged since their foundations were laid in this City of the Children, "whose builder and maker is God." As He has provided the means to build anew and repair the old, so to us may grace be given to keep in good order the superstructure of our own and the children's lives which He has lifted from the mire and set upon the rock, the true foundation, even Jesus Christ our Lord.

From abroad we have received this month £5 from a donor whose home is in Georgia, U.S.A.; £3 from another in New Zealand; £2 from Tasmania, forwarded by the donor's cousin, who also sends £1 from Edinburgh; 10 dollars from a helper in Ontario; four dollars and twenty cents from a friend in Winnipeg; 5 dollars from California; 10 dollars from a Montreal Sunday school with 10 dollars later and other 5 dollars later still from the same mission church, whose pastor is a friend of the old days; and £2 from a patient in a military hospital in New Zealand. From the lad, whose pictures of himself, his hired help, horses, and car appeared in last year's Narrative, has come one hundred dollars in the following letter from his far-away home in Saskatchewan:—

I received the annual report and was glad to hear that the work at the Homes is getting along fine. I was surprised when I saw my own photo. and it looked so nice. I will try and send you one of my house when I get it finished. Then you will be able to judge for yourself how good God has been to me. There are times when the seasons have been against us, but it only helped to make us better men. I intended sending along a little money, but this last season has been a very hard and backward one, and I did not get things quite straightened up, but I will now send a little money. It will help to feed some little one, and show how much I appreciate your kindness to me. God has been kind and helpful to me in the past. Sometimes we may not be satisfied with our lot, but I have a lot to be thankful for. Hoping this finds you well and all the work prospering. I remain one of the family.

One of the girls in a situation in this country has sent 5s.; one of the workers with two friends, £1 9s. 6d.; another now retired from active participation in the work, £3 10s., "In loving memory." Ten shillings from Dennistoun is "in memory of our little son"; and £5 from two friends in Cheshire, "in memory of our baby girl." Along with £2 for the general fund a helper in Motherwell has sent 10s. for emigration expenses. The cost of outfits has increased tremendously since emigration was suspended owing to the war in 1916, and we have just been notified that ocean rates have been advanced by more than fifty-five per cent. Whereas we used to reckon that ten pounds would pay the outfit and

passage of a child to Canada, it will probably now run to about twenty five pounds. Fifty berths have been reserved on the s.s. *Scandinavian*, billed to sail from Liverpool about the end of March. Unfortunately this is the only suitable ship with accommodation available near the time we find it most convenient for the boys to arrive in Canada. Preparations for the outgoing party have already begun. The greatest excitement prevails in the village, and applications to be included among the emigrants are far in excess of the number required.

Three motherless children admitted to the Homes until their father's return from active service have just been handed back to him after about three years' residence with us. In reply to the letter completing the arrangement for their return he has written:—

I will meet the children at the time you state. I am sure they will feel sorry at leaving you and all the little chums they have made during their stay in your most beautiful home, and I shall do my best to try and make them as happy as they have been for the last few years they have been under your care. It's a big job for a man. Had I not lost my home, things would have been different. I shall do my very best to try and make good.

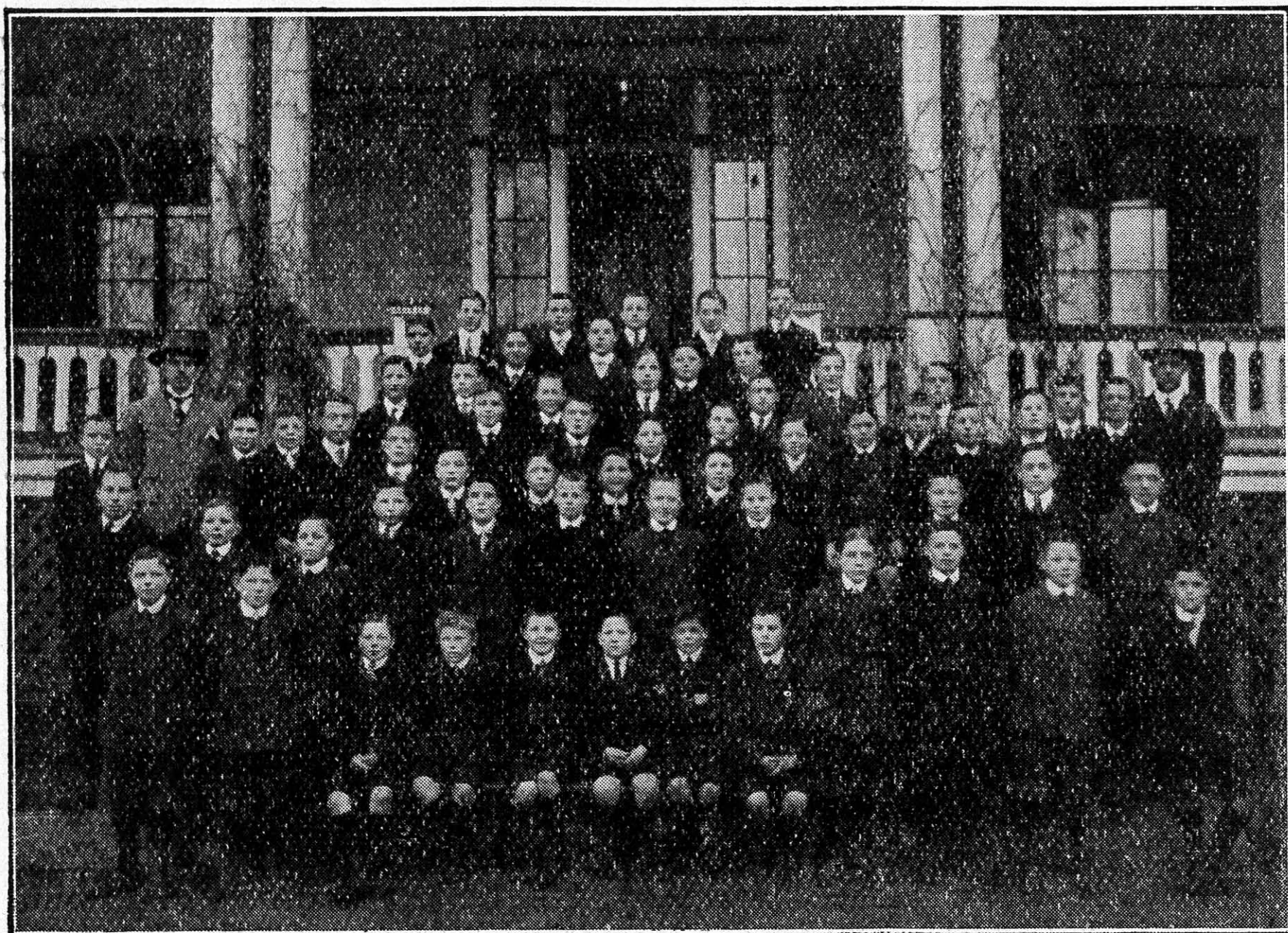
Among the month's gifts "in kind" are forty pairs of rabbits from one donor, and twenty-five pairs from another; some jewellery, which has realised ten guineas, from a friend in Aberdeen; 900 bags of pastry for the children's tea; and eight pairs of socks, the sender of which says, "These socks were given to me by a blind lady who has passed her eightieth year. For a number of years she has prayed and knitted for your children." According to the wish of a generous donor, his cheque for one thousand pounds has been divided among the various departments of the work.

"As one of His stewards I am proud to be able to send another donation of £3," writes a helper in Cambuslang; whilst a lady in London has sent 20s., "for the Sanatoria as a small thankoffering for recovery from a recent serious illness." Another lady has contributed £5, "being the proceeds of a concert given by my daughters"; a Lanarkshire Sunday school, £7 6s. 8d.; a branch of the Y.W.C.A. in Argyllshire, £5; friends in Ilford, £2; a few friends in Orkney, 14s. 6d.; two others in Dublin, 5s.; one in Kilmacolm, £20 for the Homes, with £5 each for the Sanatoria and the Colony; a visitor, 2s.; George's sisters, for the upkeep of the orphan they have adopted, £5; "M", £20; a former patient of the Sanatoria, 10s. as a thankoffering; two sisters residing in Cannes, £1 each for the Homes and the Sanatoria; a donor in Shetland, 10s.; friends in Annan, £2 1s. 6d.; a missionary and his wife, £1; an anonymous helper, £2 in an envelope bearing postmark of Annan; a friend in Southport, £3; and one who feels the need in declining health of setting his house in order, £1.

MARCH, 1920.—In a letter from one of our girls now in a situation in London, she says, "It is the Homes that has made me what I am and I will never regret being in the Homes." Another in Minnesota writes, "If I have good luck I will take a trip back home to see you all. I am just dying to see you all again. Last night I dreamed I was in the church. I thought it looked just the same. I saw you and a few others

I used to know. It seemed so real." Here is a letter from a little chap who used to live in the Peddie-Alexander Home, and is now working in the city:—

I received your nice letter about a fortnight ago, and I cannot express how pleased I was to get it. I am sure Mrs. Burges will be very interested and pleased with her visit to Canada to see the work. I have no doubt you will all be very busy just now owing to the departure of the boys for Canada on the 30th. I am not only glad but praise God for all His goodness in supplying the daily needs of the work at Bridge of Weir. I intend visiting the Homes on —, which is a holiday, and am taking with me the son of the lady I am staying with. He is a bright, earnest worker for God, and is very keen on seeing God's work at Bridge of Weir. So I will come and see you when I am down. I only wish Mr. and Mrs. Jardine were there, for I'm sure I'll miss them.

To help supply the needs of the village during March a gentleman in California has sent £20; a lady in Pennsylvania, £2; "Two of your old workers in Sheffield, a guinea; a friend in Hartlepool, 5s.; a teacher in an Ayrshire school, 12s. 6d. from her pupils and herself; a widow, £4, "in memory of a dear husband"; one of our girls in this country, 10s.; another, a similar sum; someone in Otago, N.Z., £1; the members of a women's foreign missionary association, £7; a gentleman in Ayrshire, £30; the girls of a "Y" branch of a Glasgow U.F. church, £1, and some useful garments; the children of an Aberdeenshire Sunday school, 17s. 8d.; a donor in Bradford, three guineas; another in Wigtown, £2, "in memory of father and aunt"; a Gourock wellwisher, £5; a lady in Cardiff, 5s.; another in Vancouver, 5 dollars; one of our "mothers," 10s.; and a local friend in Kilmacolm, £20.

A young lady visitor has forwarded a gift explaining, "I must have written a young Harvard friend of mine of the delightful time we had with you in the autumn and of the splendid work you are doing, for several days ago there arrived a cheque for fifty dollars in my name, with the request that I make it over to you."

Five pounds, "a small token of fellowship with you in your labour of love for the Master," has come to hand from two friends in Long Island, New York; 10s., the first of increase from one in our own village; 5s., being part of a bursary instalment "as a thankoffering for health restored"; £2 from a mother, rejoicing in the safe return of her only boy after two and a half years with the forces in Mesopotamia, and saying, "Instead of my usual £1 I'm pleased to be able to send you £2 this time. Everything is so dear, so that we should try to give more"; £2 from a lady in Bombay who writes, "I would like to send £2 annually now that you will get no more from my dear father who always prayed and spoke of the Homes with such affection"; and £2 15s. from the boys of a Haddington Bible class. The sender of this gift says, "I am glad that we have increased the amount this year, as in these days of soaring prices you will need all we can give, but our Father knows all about it, and He will send whatever is required, however large it may be." It made no difference in the old days whether it was a multitude of grumbling Israelites or a fugitive prophet that was to be provisioned. Nor will it matter in these modern times, for He is "the same yesterday and to-day and for ever." With an Edinburgh helper we can truly say, "It is wonderful how the money comes in, yet it would be more wonderful if it did not come, for not one word hath failed of all He has promised."

From one of our Canadian boys recently returned to visit his people in Scotland we have £3. A letter from one of the 1915 party contains a bank draft for one hundred dollars and the request that we make arrangements for sending his sister across to his Ontario farm home. He has been specially fortunate in finding a home with warm-hearted folks, who are sending him to the High School, and at the same time extending this helping hand to his sister without hope of any personal advantage. To help with expenses of emigration a former worker and her husband, both engaged in foreign missionary work, have given 50s. Two aunts of a small boy each left £2 when they came to pay him a farewell visit before he sailed for Canada to join his two sisters and brother who were emigrated some years ago. The aunt of one of the oldest boys of the new party also left £2 when visiting him and the younger members of the family who are to remain in this country for some time yet; and a gentleman, interested in another family, the eldest of whom, a bright Christian lad, is going with the party, has contributed £4 to help with his outfit.

The end of the month finds the boys, who are so soon to leave us, spending their last Sunday in the village, where some of them have been for many years—indeed, since infancy. Their average age is over fifteen years and the duration of their residence in the Homes works out at something over seven years. At the morning service five lads who had been duly examined and received into the fellowship of the Church sat down for the first time with us at the Lord's Table. Three of them are of the outgoing party, of whom other ten had previously joined the

Church, and no fewer than forty for a longer or shorter time have been following in the Master's footsteps. The evening service was memorable as the valedictory for the sixty young emigrants. They are not likely ever to forget that farewell meeting or their unusually long sojourn in the Orphan Homes. Nor do we ever expect to send forth a party with greater confidence or higher hopes of true success.

With somewhat mixed feelings the whole family gathered on Faith Avenue the following evening to bid them God-speed and to raise a hearty cheer as they started off for the station in a fleet of motor cars kindly placed at their disposal by local friends. Mr. Prendergast, one of the "fathers," accompanied them on board the s.s. *Scandinavian* at Liverpool, and brought news of their sailing at five o'clock on the afternoon of Tuesday, 30th inst. "He will carry you through" was the message wired to Mr. Wm. Douglas and his precious charge as they set out on their long journey.

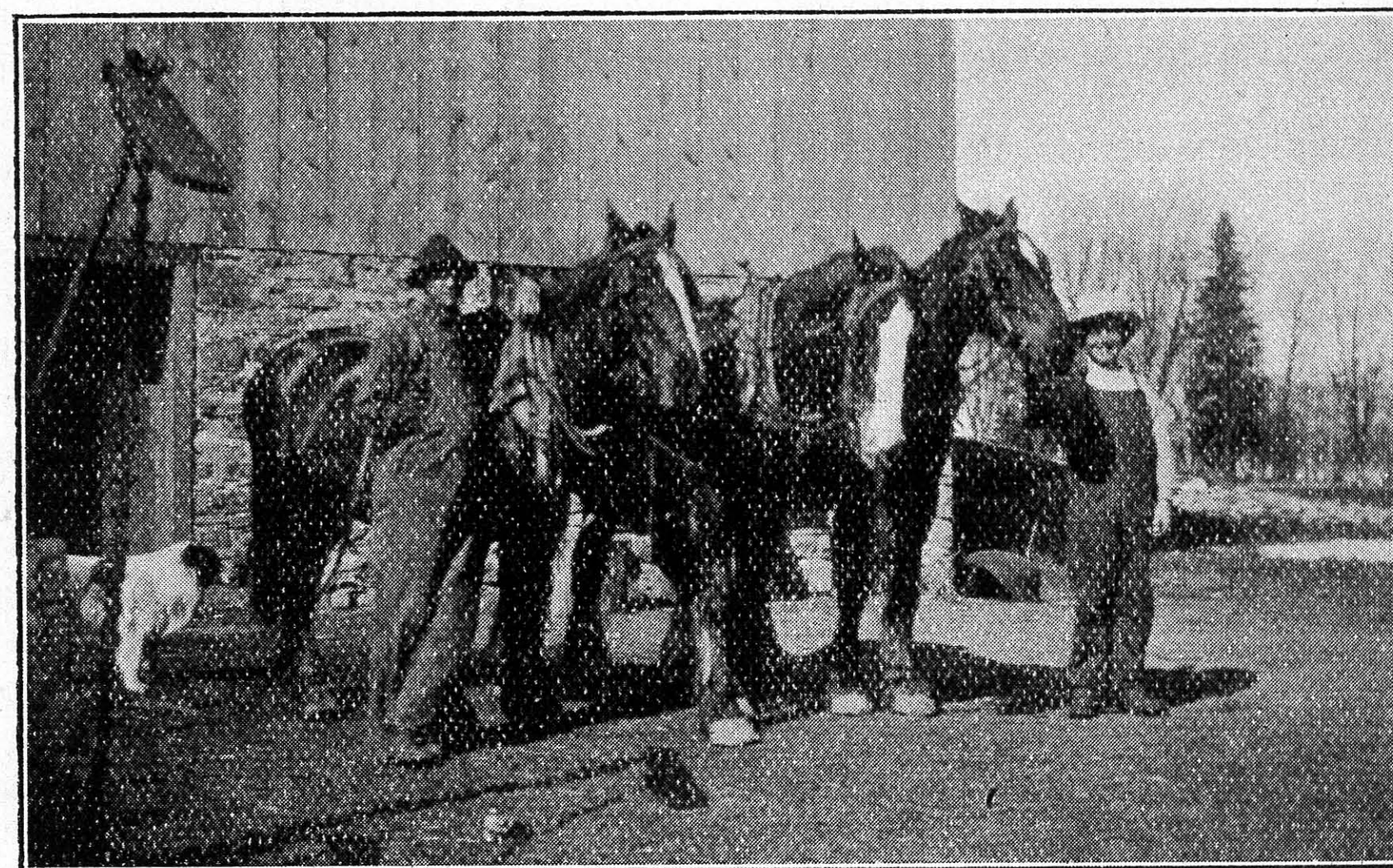
APRIL, 1920.—A friend in Elgin, who has for some years contributed sufficient to support a child in the Homes, has added £5, making his gift £25, "as food and clothing are so expensive." The junior members of a local Y.W.C.A. have contributed 5s.; a Sunday school in Thurso, £1; two sisters in Jordanhill, £25; a Glasgow gentleman, £10; one in Darlington, £30; an evangelist, 10s.; friends in a soldiers' home in Egypt, £1; a helper in New Zealand, £1 each for the Homes and the Sanatoria; the children attending a morning service in Edinburgh, £1; a helper in Victoria, Australia, £1 10s. 5d., per Dr. Barnardo's Homes; a doctor in the same part of the Commonwealth, £5; a missionary to the Interior Sudan, £1; another on the Congo, 10s.; "Mr. A.," £20 each for the Homes and the Sanatoria; an anonymous donor, whose gift bears the Lerwick postmark, £15; Strathblane and other friends, £25 10s.; a regular donor in Crieff, 20s.; a Dublin Sunday school, £1; a few friends, per one of the workers, £2 12s.; someone in Bexhill-on-Sea, 10s.; two friends in Kilmacolm, £30 and £75 respectively; and one of the boys on a farm in this country, 10s. The following letter is from a lad who lived with us for seven years prior to emigration with the 1912 party. His father, a soldier, died in South Africa when he was quite young, before he came to the Homes:—

Just a line or two to let you know I have not forgotten you although I have never written to you since I came to Canada. I visit the Home in Brockville once in a while. I came out here when I was twelve years old. I worked for a farmer for seven years and eight months. I struck out for myself this winter. I came to Chatham and am working for a large packing company, making four dollars and fifty cents per day. I like it fine out here, but it is all due to the credit of the Homes sending me here. I am very thankful. I have been enquiring of Mr. Winters if he had any trace of my parents in his books, but he cannot find any. I was taken away from them when I was five years old. I was just wondering if you had any trace of them. I would be much obliged if you could find out in any way at all. Are there any of the boys coming out this season? I still go to church and Sunday school. How are all the people down there? The Home is a fine institution. There is no mistake about that. They gave me a fine training.

Another recent letter is from the elder of two sisters sent to Canada about ten years ago. They both bear excellent characters. The writer

is a real Christian and has been all these years with the same earnest Christian mistress:—

I was so very pleased to receive the New Year Letter once more, and I enjoyed reading it, and was glad to see that the work is still going on just the same in spite of the high cost of living. Everything is so dear, but we aren't so badly off when we can buy things. I had a letter from my cousin in Glasgow, and she was telling me they could only get a certain amount of meat, sugar, and butter. However, we get along some way. I was sorry to hear of Miss Gardiner's death, because I can remember her so well. I had just been thinking about her before I got your letter. I was thinking of a hymn she was teaching us one Sunday when she was in No. 5. It was "Sweeping through the gates of the new Jerusalem," and now she has passed through. Isn't it lovely, Miss Quarrier, to know that we are washed in the precious blood of the Lord Jesus? Just to think we have the privilege of casting all our care upon Him because He loves us so well. I still live with Mrs. H——. I hope you are well and keeping free of the influenza. The weather over here has been so cold this winter that we welcome the Spring. I often think of the beautiful little village I used to

live in with so many beautiful flowers and trees, and if I ever go back to Scotland I will be sure to go and see you. Will there be any more girls coming out here this Spring? There must be a very large family now. I had Mr. Winters out to see me last summer, and I thought he was such a nice man. I have just started taking music lessons, and like it very much. I had a letter from my sister yesterday and she is getting along fine. Well I must close now. Remember me to all.

A draft for £12 has come from Ohio; £4 from New Jersey, collected by a lady from friends in Morristown; six dollars from a frequent helper in California; £17 7s. 9d. contributed by various Sabbath schools throughout the country, from the general secretary of the Sabbath School Union; £100 from a Glasgow friend; £40 from another; £1 10s., a memorial gift from Hampshire; and £1 from Bristol. The trustees of the Thomas Porter Equipment Fund have again made an allotment of £150 to help with outfits of boys and girls. At the foot of his note intimating a donation handed in at the City Home, the superintendent has written, "This gentleman will be glad if you can devote the 40s.

toward Torr Aluinn outing. His wife and he greatly enjoyed the romping of the children last year." A friend in North Berwick, enclosing £10, says, "I wonder if you will be sending many of them to Canada."

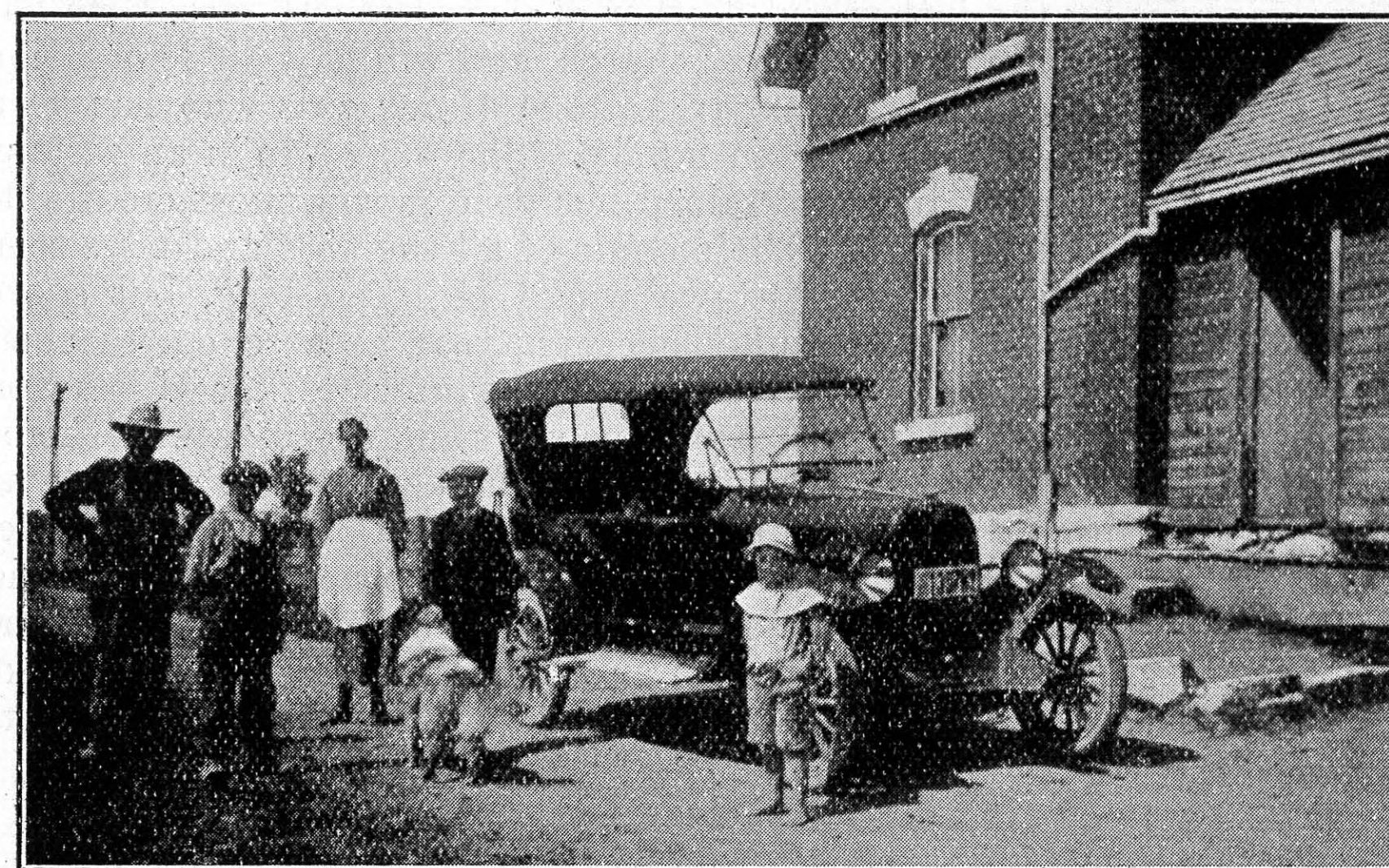
Before half the month had run its course we had the cabled news of the party's safe arrival at Fairknowe on the 10th inst., and later on a full report of the trip. In spite of the most difficult conditions ever experienced on board ship, the boys have been perfectly splendid, responding loyally to their leader's appeal. The memory of their last happy winter at the O.H.S. will never be erased from their minds. Just as the battle of Waterloo and the Great War were first won on the playing fields of our island home, so the 1920 boys' Canadian party have shown that on the athletic ground, in their Saturday entertainments, and in the Christian association, as well as at home, they have learned lessons of unselfishness and good sportsmanship that are already helping them to play the game of life as becomes true Christian gentlemen. No better party ever set foot in Canada. In the few days spent at Brockville the townspeople vied with each other in giving them a real welcome to the land of their adoption. To these as well as to the many friends who entertained the older children during the winter evenings at home, we say from our hearts in the name of the boys and girls whom they helped to make happy, "Thank you."

MAY, 1920.—"Whosoever shall give to drink unto one of these little ones a cup of cold water, shall in no wise lose his reward." The Master himself who gave this guarantee will not fail to command a blessing on the Glasgow boy whose note reads:—"I went messages during my Easter holidays, and my first pay was four shillings. I wanted to send it to help in the work carried on among the orphans at Bridge of Weir." One hundred guineas in memory of her husband is the gift of a lady not many miles distant from the Homes; £10 of a helper in South Australia; 5s. of one of the boys on a farm in Arran; other 5s. of a girl in domestic service; 10s. of an old worker; £10 of a Shanghai business man on a trip to England; £1 of a friend in Bloemfontein; 2s. 6d. of two helpers in Stranraer; £1 of a lady in Ross-shire who frequently helps; 6s. 6d. of a Campbeltown Sunday school; £2 of a lady in Hertfordshire; and other £2 of another of our boys in this country.

By this time the Canadian party have got comfortably settled in their new homes, but the rush of the Spring season and the novelty of everything prevents the majority from writing home till later on. In a letter from one of the oldest of the party, who has been placed in the home of a very well-to-do Christian farmer, are these sentences:—"I have landed safely at my farm. I am getting on splendidly with Mr. F. We have family worship every morning before breakfast. I hope that sometime I shall be able to come back to the Orphan Homes of Scotland for a holiday. When I arrived at the farm I was crying to get back to the Homes, but it is passing away and I am getting into the way of it. I can milk the cows already." As a matter of fact, when our visitor drove up to the farm one evening he found this lad sitting on a stool milking a thoroughbred Jersey cow. One of the younger boys, who has found a home in one of Ontario's beauty spots with a native-born Scotch farmer and his

wife who have not yet lost their brogue, has written:—"I think of you by day and night, and commend you to God in my prayers. The house is situated beside the Rideau Lake. The scenery is very picturesque, but it isn't so good as the Homes. My master and mistress are Christians, and are very nice to me. My work is to feed the calves and do other jobs. This morning I was at church, and it was a Scotch minister."

Accompanying our visitor, when he called on this boy, was a bright little chap of the 1916 party enjoying a well-deserved half holiday in our new motor car. He is now working his own way through high school with a little assistance in the way of board and clothes from the old couple to whom he was first sent. His ambition is to be a civil or mining engineer, and he hopes by dint of hard study to miss the next form when promotion time comes. By assisting in an engineer's office at the graphite works,

near home, during the holidays, he earned enough to pay for his room and other expenses in town during the session. This summer he expects to do still better.

After three months' absence on a trip right across Canada Mrs. A. Quarrier Burges has returned home full of all she has seen and heard not only of that wonderful land of inexhaustible resources, but more especially of the men and women and boys and girls, who still delight to count themselves of our great Canadian family. It has been an inspiration to hear of her meeting again after the lapse of years with so many in every part of the Dominion. Time did not permit of making a tour of all the younger children still under our care, but Mrs. Burges was able to see a few of them. In the course of one day in and around a small manufacturing town by the side of the St. Lawrence river some fourteen or fifteen were visited. The first call was most encouraging. In her younger days this girl had been a great trial, but the good lady, who cared

for her with a wonderful Christian patience and optimism, is now able to give a splendid report of her, and says she would not forego all that is past nor does she know how she could get along without her. The young lady is now head of a millinery establishment and makes several business trips every year to New York and other cities.

Serving in a doctor's family and highly respected in the town, twin sisters were found. At four years of age they came to the Homes where they were familiar figures for eleven years prior to emigration in 1914. Out in the country, stopping at a blacksmith's shop to ask a direction, its only occupant, one of our ex-soldier boys told that he was negotiating for the purchase of the business from his boss. Not far away, the baby of this year's party was seated at supper in the comfortable home of a young farmer and his wife, just across the road from one of the oldest boys of the party. From the age of eighteen months he had been brought up as their own by the father and mother of one of the Homes. He has already found a useful niche in a local church, and will have little occasion to feel lonely with the cheery company of one of our girls who has been many years with the same Christian family. She was quite in an ecstasy over seeing Mrs. Burges, and entertained her visitors to a most creditable supper all of her own making. The records of all the girls and boys seen on another day in the city of Ottawa would be interesting, but space forbids. One girl was just finishing her first year as a school teacher. She is an earnest Christian, actively engaged in church work, and has won the hearts of the community by her winsome ways and up-to-date methods. Part of the afternoon was spent with one of our boys of the early days, now a highly respected and very able minister of the Gospel, and his wife. A fellow traveller on the homeward journey was another of our splendid soldier boys lately demobilised after a long term of active service. At the last junction before reaching Brockville another of the girls came to shake hands with Mrs. Burges as she passed through. This young lady expects to graduate as a fully trained nurse early next month.

Other donations of the month include 2s. 6d., part of a Prestwick boy's savings; 20s from Belfast, which "is just giving back a little bit of what the Lord has given me"; other 20s., a birthday thankoffering bearing the Glasgow postmark; 20 dollars "to help with the bairns for Jesus' sake"; 5s. "for the babies, a thankoffering"; £75 with £25 for the children of sailors and soldiers from a friend who wishes to be anonymous; £2 "as a thankoffering for an increase in salary"; and £1, "a birthday gift in memory of our little one." The total of the month's eleven legacies is over two thousand five hundred pounds. The Master's question, "Where are the nine," might oft be repeated here. Such letters as the following, from the father of children admitted to the Homes for the period of his service in the army, are ever helpful.

I am glad to say my children arrived home safely, and I must ask you to accept my grateful thanks for all your kindness to them and for sending them home so well and splendidly clad. This means a great deal to me as I have been trying to get together a home for them, and my plans were rather upset by our trade being on strike several weeks. I hope you will accept the enclosed contribution of £1. I shall ever remember gratefully your services to me in a needful hour, and when possible show my practical gratitude.

JUNE, 1920.—In the early days of the month a soldier's two girls after a stay of nearly three years with us, were handed back to their father, who, having returned to civil life, has married again and made a home for them. Here is his letter of thanks:—

I now write to thank you for the way in which you have treated my two children. I got them from your messenger yesterday at St. Enoch Station. I cannot express my thanks to you in writing for the kind way in which they have both been treated while under your care. They are both perfect little ladies in their speech and manners, thanks to your training. I really can't put it down in words how much I appreciate all that you have done for them, but I shall never forget what has been done. I am living through here now, having acquired a little business which is suitable for my health. I would like to thank Mr. — and Miss —, also any other of their teachers for the kindness shown to my children. Enclosed find £5 from their mother and myself which we had saved up for them coming out, to get clothes, etc., but as you have so kindly looked after the clothing of them for coming away, we would like

you to accept it as a small donation. The gentleman who brought them up to Glasgow said that you would perhaps like to see them at some time. As this place is out of the way, if you send me a p.c. saying when you would like to see them I will bring them up to Glasgow to see you. Again thanking you and all your staff for your kindness.

To help supply the daily needs of the large family there has come to hand £3 from one of the teachers in our own school; £2 from an old man of seventy-six years and still at work in Rhodesia; 10s. for the Colony of Mercy from a friend in Strathaven; other 10s. from St. Boswells "in memory of my mother who loved little children and whose birthday falls next week"; £25 being the proceeds of a jumble sale in Hong Kong; £2 "from a lover of little children" in Methil; £10 from Northern Nigeria; two guineas from Hertford; £1 "from a Homes boy"; £1 from one of our grown-up girls; £4 7s. from friends in Newcastle, Natal; 20s. from Belfast, "in memory of a beloved mother"; £8 "in memory

of my sister"; 20s. from New Zealand; 10s. from a lady in Saskatoon; £10 1s. from friends in Largs, Fairlie, and Manchester; £15 from a personal friend of long standing; 30s. from a Birmingham Sunday school; £15 from Leith friends towards the support of a girl in the Homes; two guineas "in loving memory of my dear husband"; 30s. from the infants in a Lanarkshire school; £1 for the Colony of Mercy from Bolton; and 4s. forwarded by another of our school teachers who says, "The enclosed was given to me yesterday by a poor invalid woman I met. She asked me to pass it on to you for the children."

Out of ten legacies, the largest of which amounts to £2,786 12s. 6d., one of a hundred pounds is for the Sanatoria. A K.B.E. in London has sent £100; two Glasgow ladies, a half-yearly donation of £80 for the Homes and £20 for the Sanatoria; someone in Aberdeen 10s. "conscience money"; a friend per one of the workers, 10s. to help the children's holiday; another in Hong Kong who still has "pleasant memories of a visit to the Homes one afternoon in 1916," £5; the friend who never forgets the needs of the Home for invalid girls, £150; and a girl who has benefited by its care, 20s. The following letter has been received from a girl who was emigrated in 1912, and has been most of the time in the same Ontario farm home:—

I suppose you will be surprised to hear from me. I am very sorry to have kept you waiting for an answer to your most welcome letter. I am always glad to hear from you or anybody over there. How is everything going on these days? I hope you are all keeping in the best of health. I had a terrible surprise yesterday. When I was going out of the kitchen I saw a car driving in and who stepped out but Mr. Douglas. I did not know him at first. I was very glad to see him indeed. We had a long chat together and he stayed for dinner, but I did not like the idea of him starting away. I wish I could have gone with him. He brings back old times so much that I couldn't keep from crying after he left. He said Mr. and Mrs. Findlay were coming over when the girls come and I hope they will be able to get down this far. I feel I must tell you that I have surrendered myself to Jesus, the One who died to set me free, and the One who is guiding me on unto righteousness. I can fully thank Him to-night for all He has done for those who call upon His name. Our preacher's name is Rev. T. A. W—. Perhaps you have heard of him. He is a very good man and we will miss him when he goes away. He is leaving us shortly to travel out west to the small places. We have a car now so we will be able to get out oftener. Please give my kindest regards to all over there at home. May God help you all to pull through in these trying times.

On the day following receipt of the above letter our visitor returned from Canada with firsthand reports of the children still under our care. Thanks to the expedition of our new car, it has been possible for the first time for the conductor of a party to see them after they had got happily settled in their new homes. To detail even briefly all the interesting reports about these young Canadians would fill the whole of this Narrative, so we must confine ourselves to mentioning one of the last and most striking of the visits. Ten years ago at the age of thirteen, a boy who lived in the Glenfarg Home was placed with a farmer in a prosperous district about twenty-five miles from Brockville. He was one of the first to heed the Empire's call, and cross to France with a Canadian contingent. After years of active service, during which he earned his commission on the field, he returned to Canada with the rank of an officer and received a public welcome and a gold watch from the community who were as glad to have him back safe and sound as they were loath

to see him go. It was a very rare pleasure to call at his old home to which we sent him as a boy, and find in possession not his former master but John himself and his bride, the daughter of a well-to-do neighbour, for the old folks have moved elsewhere and he has bought the place. Surely a wonderful record in ten years for an orphan boy not yet twenty-four years old.

JULY, 1920.—On the afternoon of Friday, 2nd inst., the school closed for the long summer vacation. Next day the first family of boys set off for Ardnadam, and the first large party of about two hundred girls for Torr Aluinn and Hoop House, where they spent a delightful time by the seaside before returning home to make room for even larger numbers, who occupied the seaside Homes for the second fortnight of the month. The inopportune falling in of the railway tunnel between Lynedoch and Princes Pier stations added considerably to the difficulties of transportation but rather enhanced the pleasure of the trip for the youngsters.

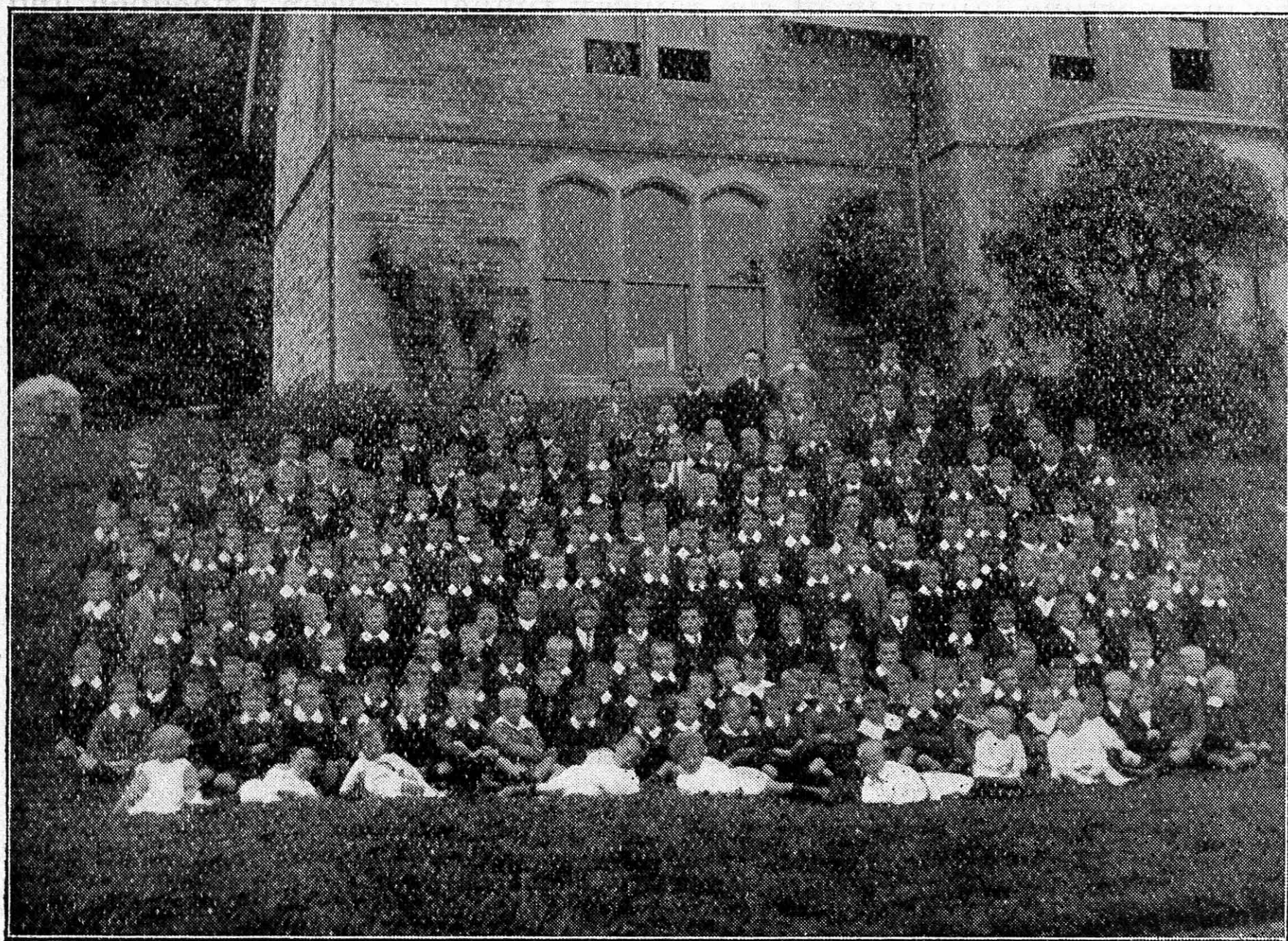
Already some of our neighbours at the coast are getting to know us better and we trust they will come to appreciate the children more as the years go by. Explaining the delivery of a most welcome assortment of games to Torr Aluinn, a Glasgow business gentleman has written:—"A few friends and I combined to send you a box of games for the use of the children. These will be sent carriage paid to Innellan Pier. The Pier-master has instructions for delivery. The friends who combine all stay in Innellan. So does the writer of this note."

The donor of £2 says, "I should be glad if it could be used in helping to meet the expenses of the holiday." A friend, who has made it her business to stir up interest in the Orphan Homes among her fellow-employees in a manufacturer's wareroom of a Border town writes:—"I enclose this sum of money £6 18s., which is the largest sum yet. I have a good many more names and they never miss the penny, and it is a grand help to the children. It will help to get a nice holiday along with other donations. It will take a good amount of money to keep everything

going at the price goods are just now." A note, enclosing £10 from two friends, reads, "We are again going on our holidays, but have not forgotten the little ones at the Homes."

While the younger children enjoyed themselves on the West Coast, the older lads of the City Home have spent a jolly, health-giving ten days camping at a farm above Burntisland, overlooking the Firth of Forth. To add to their good time we are grateful for a number of special gifts in cash and in kind.

The outstanding gift in kind of last month was a splendid new 30 ft. by 16 ft. marquee for use at the holiday Homes. It has been pitched on the beach at Torr Aluinn and is already proving a great acquisition. With such a roomy tent at hand, it is now no longer necessary to run across the

busy public road into the houses for shelter from the not infrequent showers of this season on the Clyde. During July we number among the gifts in kind two drums of malt and oil for the dispensary from a kind friend who keeps our village supplied in this way; 60 dozen loaves from a city bakery; 39 garments from the girls of a boarding school; 24 boxes of kippered mackerel; a football; a quantity of curry powder; teabread from various Glasgow bakers; and sausages from a butcher in Wishaw who often adds to our supplies. Of a large assortment of articles for the drapery store, one donation, comprising a dozen helmets and twenty-one jackets of varying size, has all been knitted by an old lady in her ninetieth year.

Glancing through the money gifts, we notice four and a half dollars from a minister on holiday in Calgary, Alberta; 10s. "in memory of our

precious little daughter"; £1 for the Colony of Mercy from Newton-Stewart; £1 from a gentleman in South Australia; 10s. from the bath-maid of a hydropathic establishment; £14 8s. collected from friends in Largs; £15 for the Homes with £1 for the Colony of Mercy from "Sympathisers" in Largs; four dollars from a helper in Ottawa; £1, a thankoffering from one of the workers; another £1 from Co. Tyrone "For Jesus' sake"; 10s. from Natal; 4s. with the words, "Mine eyes are unto Thee"; 5s. from a missionary in China; £2 10s. for the Sanatoria from Blairgowrie; 10s. from an Helensburgh Band of Hope; 2s. 6d. "for the funds"; and a Glasgow firm's annual donation of £50 each for the Homes and the Sanatoria, and £20 for the Colony.

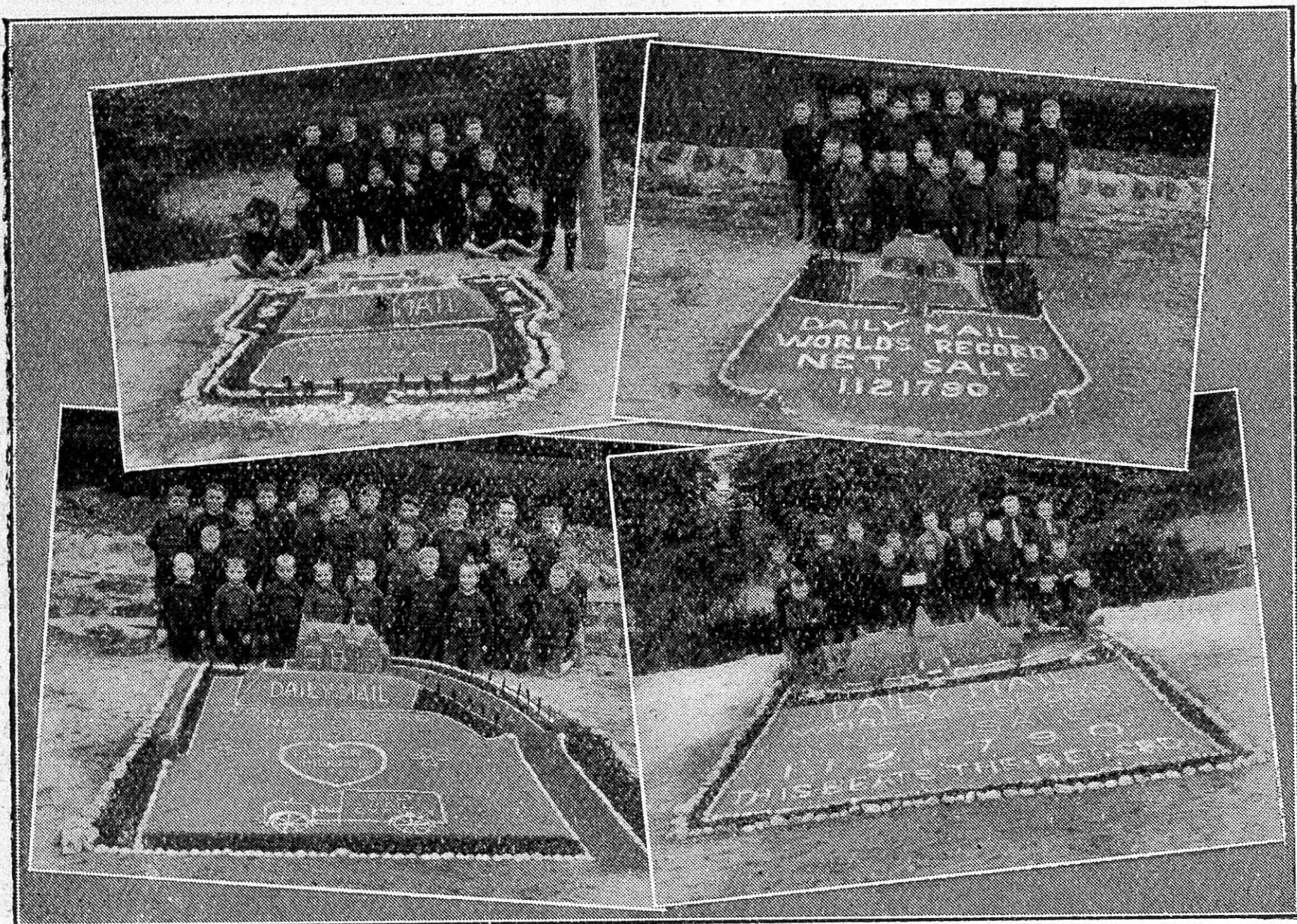
Ten shillings was left by one of the old boys when paying us a visit. A school teacher has sent 20s. "from my infant class and myself"; a Girls' Guildry Bible Class, £1; a Sunday school in Birkenhead, £6 6s. 10d.; an Orkney branch of the Y.W.C.A., 21s.; and an anonymous donor in Kilmacoll, 10s. A one hundred pound note for the Sanatoria is "savings from two subscribers." The sender of £5 "in loving memory" writes:—"This marks another milestone, the fifteenth, in my widowed journey, but I can truly say that goodness and mercy have never failed, and I know, we shall dwell in the house of the Lord for ever." Another letter says, "As the Lord is still prospering us, we send you £2 out of His portion."

AUGUST, 1920.—Almost the first money to hand this month was a legacy of one thousand pounds. Five pounds is to complete the amount necessary to pay for the maintenance of the girl whom friends in Leith have undertaken to support for the year; 5s. from a brother and sister; £1, a memorial gift for the Sanatoria, from Oban; 5s. from one of our grown-up girls who has been visiting at the old Home; £1 each for the Homes and Sanatoria, being first-fruits of increase, with other 10s., from a friend of the donor; £3 for the general fund with £2 for the Sanatoria from Lanark; £1 from Stronsay; £1, "a portion of a little money left me," from a Glasgow nurse; £5, "In memoriam," from a minister in Aberdeen; £5 15s. from readers of *The Christian*; 10 dollars from Montreal; £5 from a Major-General in memory of his wife; £5 from Balmore for the Colony of Mercy; and 2s. 6d. from one of our own girls. Here is part of a long letter from another now settled in a home of her own in Western Australia.

Nearly a year has elapsed since I left "ma ain countrie," and although you have been with us in thought many, many times, we have not written you a single letter. I am sorry. You may be sure I have met many kind friends here and already am quite a known inhabitant. My hubby enlisted from this town and lived here previous to the war for several years so that there was some excitement when it was learned he had brought back a Scotch bride. You wouldn't believe the fuss they make over the Scotch folk. We had a visit from the Prince of Wales here. My hubby was one of twelve soldiers selected to act as a guard of honour on the arrival of the Prince at the station. He shook hands with him and asked what he won his medal for, but he was very shy and said he didn't know. There are quite a few Scotch folks in this district. It is quite a town and has a population of 4,000 people. My hubby is in business for himself and getting along nicely. We have a comfy home, plenty to eat and wear, and that in itself is all we need, especially when we have our health. I don't know whether you have heard of my illness. I often wondered if you were praying for your old bairn, especially last February. Somehow I think you must have been. I was in a private nursing home and had a little son, but he died

just after birth and I never saw him. I have much to be thankful for and feel sure God had a purpose in sparing me. You will remember me as one of your old bairns in prayer always, and it will be nice to know I have someone who is interested in me, and thinks of me at the old Home. We have a little Presbyterian church in our district with only a very small congregatlon, but we are all very happy and have nice times together. There is such a lot to write about I'm afraid I'll require to write more regularly. July—I suppose the flowers and all nature are lovely, and probably the bairns will be enjoying themselves at the seaside. Please remember me to Miss ——. I will be looking for a letter, so don't disappoint me.

From another part of Australia has come £10 with the remark, "I appreciate your noble work. It is a pleasure to assist." One hundred pounds to be divided between the Homes, the Sanatoria, and the Colony, is from a friend in London; and another one hundred pounds from "teach us, Lord, how much we owe."



SAND-CASTLES ON THE SHORE.

With the re-opening of the school on 30th inst., the children's holidays are once more at an end. What a delightful time they have had, as well at home in the big playfield as during the much-talked-of fortnight by the seashore in spite of somewhat broken weather. Readers will glean but a faint idea of these happy holidays from the four illustrations we have space to publish. From the large group of boys on the terrace in front of Torr Aluinn will be seen what a big family were accommodated in the two houses during the last period alone. Each of the nine Homes in this party competed in the *Daily Mail* sand castle competition, and all were awarded prizes. We have never seen anything to surpass these sand castles, though the photographs have not done them justice. We are indeed grateful to God for journeying mercies and protection from any sort of accident, as well as for touching the hearts of His stewards to send the means to provide such a great and beneficial treat for the children.

SEPTEMBER, 1920.—We pass on some sentences of a letter that has meant much to those who know the writer's early history. At the age of fourteen years she fled from an evil environment in which she had known only neglect, and which had deprived her childhood of all the happiness that should have made its memory bright. After five and a half years she went forth from us, as well equipped as the Orphan Homes could make her, to fight life's battles on her own. Now, as the mother of a family residing in a near-by town, she writes:—

I hope you and Mrs. Burges are well. It's so long since I wrote to you, but I am always thinking of you. I am married now and have four children, three boys and one girl. I tell them all about the Homes and they listen. I do try to bring up my little children with the training I got. There have been many changes, and married life fills you with a little more sense. I tell them all about the cottages and all the ways we had, and they love me to tell them. R— will say sometimes "What will the wee ones be doing at this time and what night would this be down at the Homes?" and then I tell them. It sounds wonderful to them. I keep thinking of you all because I know you pray for all your old girls. God bless you and the dear old Home.

Another of the girls has sent £1; friends in Campbeltown, £24 9s. 0d.; a helper in New Zealand, £4; a Glasgow donor, £100, "In memory of my mother and my elder son"; someone in Sydney, N.S.W., £2; an old worker, 10s.; an old friend in Huntly, 2s. 6d., after his eighty-first birthday; a helper in Vancouver, 5 dollars; an anonymous helper, £15 in a registered envelope bearing the Peterhead post-mark; "Labourer," £1; a Lanarkshire working boys' and girls' religious society, £4 15s. 0d.; and another in Fife, £5 10s. 0d.

A new donor in Manchester has written, "Will you kindly accept the enclosed guinea as a donation to your orphan schools from a few members of B—— Sunday Schools, as a memento of a pleasant holiday in Scotland, when they had the pleasure of meeting a number of your children returning from their holidays on a Clyde steamer, the memory of which will always be treasured by those who were present on that occasion?" A somewhat unusual occurrence in these days is to receive a donation from Germany. This is the short note that accompanied it—"1911. I have been in Scotland and in Bridge-of-Weir. It was for me one great joy to see the love of God in Bridge-of-Weir. I send for the orphanage in your home, 20 mark." Eight shillings and sixpence is "from a few school children from a concert in a back court in Govanhill, Glasgow." From Partick has also come 10s., the proceeds of another "back court" concert, the promoter of which was a small boy only ten years old.

The ninety-first anniversary of the beloved Founder's birth has brought a number of special memorial gifts. £5 is "From mother and children in loving memory of Mr. Quarrier"; other £5 from two of our old workers; £1, a birthday remembrance; £1, "In Memoriam birthday offering"; £3, "In memory of three loved ones gone home"; £1 from one of our fellow-workers, "in loving memory"; £2 from an old worker, "In loving memory of the dear ones"; and 10s. from another, saying, "I shall be thinking of you all to-morrow." Other gifts to hand on the 29th inst. include 10s. left by a visitor; £20 from Lesmahagow; 6s. from Cullen; £1 from a Wishaw Sunday school; another £1 from one

in Shettleston; and a guinea from a third in Tollcross. On the same day we had a cheque for £500 from a donor who wishes to be anonymous. He says, "Most of us are more or less feeling the difficulty of these times, but our contributions to the provision for your orphans should be the last thing to be reduced."



ONE OF THE CANADIAN BOYS.

The biennial Thanksgiving Day should have been observed this year, but, in view of the impending coal strike and consequent dislocation of traffic, it was felt unwise to make any arrangements for or issue invitations to a public gathering. Moreover, next year will be the jubilee of the work which Mr. Quarrier began when he opened the first home for children in a transformed workshop at 10 Renfrew Lane, Glasgow, in the year 1871, and it is hoped that some special service of thanksgiving can be planned for this day next year, when we shall welcome in the village as many of our friends as can make it convenient to join with us.

This year the children celebrated Founder's Day with sports in the afternoon in our play park, then a special tea, followed by a meeting in the church, where the garden and cricket prizes were distributed, the winter programme outlined, and an appeal made to show their gratitude to God for all His goodness by a liberal response on next Saturday's flag day in aid of the Lifeboat Fund.

It was a great joy to the children to hear that another anonymous friend had that day promised to pay for an up-to-date cinematograph equipment, and that on the Halloween holiday the pictures of the Prince of Wales' Canadian Tour would be shown by the new machine.

OCTOBER, 1920.—On the donation list for this last month of the financial year we find a mixed gift consisting of eggs, kippers, cakes, and sausages for the lads in the City Home from a Glasgow friend, who has been interesting himself in them and their various activities; 21 pairs of rabbits from an Argyllshire estate; £2 from friends who adopted a little girl and still keeps us posted in her progress; £4 8s. 0d., "a widow's mite in memory of her daughter"; £1 from a former worker in Arbroath; £12, "a wee gift for the bairns" from two life-long friends; 15 dollars from one in British Columbia, "glad to hear that our Heavenly Father never lets you want"; £2 from one of the "mothers" as a thankoffering;

5s. "in stamps for the orphans, praying daily for God's blessing on your work"; £2, being part of the surplus funds of a disbanded church athletic club; a guinea from a Glasgow lodge of Freemasons; 10s. "from the old wreck"; five guineas from a Caledonian Society in the North of England; 10s. from Glasgow helpers now resident in Kent; a guinea from a barrister in Saskatchewan; and £6 10s. from one of our oldest helpers in the work.

Seventeen years have run their course since the beloved Founder was called to his reward; nor has anything yet transpired to shake his faith. During no period have conditions been more difficult, and still God has been better than His promise. Mr. Quarrier's oft-repeated assurance that God could bury His workers and carry on His work has surely proved prophetic. Not only for the daily bread and other necessary things do we look to Him as "the eyes of all wait upon Him, who giveth them their meat in due season," but for the workers, too, we must resort to God. Already for some of our faithful band the grasshopper has become a burden. If they are to enjoy the quiet eventide of life which their long service for the children has earned, younger helpers must be raised up to take over their duties. Will those who remember our needs in prayer be mindful of this too, so that consecrated men and women may be led to offer their services to the Master in this corner of the great vineyard?



ONE OF OUR CANADIAN SCHOOL GIRLS.

A donor in Glasgow writes, "I have been thinking of the Homes more this last week than usual, and it seems to me God wants me to send on to you my mite." Five pounds from "Gratitude" is "a thank-offering for having recovered my suit case lost in the railway." A letter from the North reads, "Circumstances have prevented me this summer from getting any articles of clothing made, but I enclose £15 in lieu, and hope it may be just as useful to you. Given in the name of a disciple, may it receive a disciple's reward." Another old friend asks us to divide ten pounds between the General Fund and the Colony of Mercy, in memory of a loved one "who did what she could for the Homes." Through a Glasgow firm we have received £15, which is "restitution" money. An Edinburgh lady writes, "I enclose three pounds now instead of at Christmas. I have generally a good many things to do at that time and my memory now is not good."

The largest of the month's legacies, amounting to £785 18s. 0d., is for the Sanatoria. Continuing the annual donation of an old friend, now no longer able to direct his own affairs, his attorney has sent £50. A like amount has come from a Paisley friend; £25 from another in Wemyss Bay; £30 from one in Darlington; and £100 "In memory, 15-10-04." At a very reasonable price for these days, we have been able to buy a sufficient supply of apples, which, together with a welcome gift of Barcelona nuts, have provided the extras required for the Hallowe'en festivities.

Once more we find ourselves at the thirty-first of October, celebrated in the New World as Thanksgiving Day. Well may we of the Orphan Homes unite with our friends across the sea, for who should be grateful to our Heavenly Father if not we. To-day we close another chapter of a wonderful story of Providence, but the end is not yet, for just as long as the needs remain, so long, we believe, will the miracle endure. Good business requires an annual reckoning and the calendar marks a new beginning, but His mercy is from everlasting to everlasting—continuous, unbroken.

For the privilege of service where our lot is cast; for the fellowship of all who have been instruments to make this story possible; and for the fresh blessing that has been ours in telling it, we thank God. May that blessing be multiplied with each copy of the "Narrative" sent forth to the ends of the earth in His name with His message: "Oh that men would praise the Lord for His goodness and for His wonderful works to the children of men."

EMIGRATION WORK.

Elsewhere in the "Narrative" it has been mentioned that this branch of the work has been resumed with the emigration of a party of boys of whom our Canadian superintendent writes, "We were glad to welcome the party of sixty boys who came to us last spring. A finer lot of boys have not come to Canada. With one or two exceptions they have fitted into their new environment remarkably well and are much appreciated. We could have placed many more boys and we have a large field for girls as well." In view of existing conditions on both sides of the Atlantic it was deemed wiser not to emigrate any large number of girls this year. We are looking to God for special guidance in the matter for the future.

After a lapse of thirty-three years since the property was acquired, the Canadian Home has come to need considerable repair. Together with the purchase of a small motor car for use in visiting the children and the advance in the cost of necessities, this has added greatly to the sum usually transmitted for the upkeep of Fairknowe.

The following are further extracts from the report submitted by our Canadian superintendent, Mr. C. A. Winters, B.A. :—

Many successful lives are being started on their way. In the race there are some brilliant starts and some falterings and some recoveries.

An increasing number are attaining their majority and claiming their savings which have been held in trust for them. It would appear that our responsibility in regard to these savings has a distinct advantage that we have scarcely realised until now, namely, that boys and girls are kept in comparatively close touch with us until they are better able to appreciate what has been done for them. We have had many letters this year signifying appreciation and gratitude. The savings of the children continue to be most creditable, and we believe that habits of thrift are being inculcated, which will contribute materially to their success as citizens of this Dominion.

There are very few children of school age, as practically no young children have been sent to take the places of those who have left school. However, several beyond the legal age are continuing at school. Good progress may be reported. Several have resumed their education by studying at Business College.

An event of importance to all here was the visit of Mrs. A. Quarrier Burges. It was a pleasure and inspiration to us to have her with us even for so short a time.

The visitation of the children in their homes shows that with rare exceptions they have homes in the strict sense of the term. Though in most cases the older child is sought primarily to help out with the work on the farm, a real parental care and interest is assumed by the foster parents. In many instances as time goes on this interest takes first place and the original motive is sacrificed to higher ones, such as the education of the child. One of our boys was sought after by a farmer now growing old. Recently the lad placed with him was converted and thinks of being a missionary. In this he is encouraged by his employer, and is being helped on with his education instead of being kept home to help as was the original plan.

It would not be fitting to close this report without expressing our gratitude to Almighty God for help and guidance in answer to prayers, both ours and those of many others whom we know to be keeping us constantly before the Throne of Grace.

HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS FUND.

THIS, like all the other departments of work at Bridge-of-Weir, brings blessing to all who share in it. Every child and worker in the Homes is a contributor; and there are also a few of our larger constituency who take a practical interest in the fund. When it was commenced—some fifteen years ago—we hoped that many of our friends outside might be led to take a share in this ministry; but we must accept it as being the Lord's will that they should not do so. Of course we know that thousands of our contributors are as keenly interested in Foreign Missions as we are ourselves, and that they have other channels in which to pour their gifts. If we can do anything to intensify that interest we count this a privilege indeed, even if the expression of it does not come through our hands.

We are satisfied that the inception of this fund came from our Lord Himself. If we had any doubt on this head the hundreds of letters which have come to us from missionaries to whom it ministers in all parts of the world, would long ago have set such doubts at rest. Year by year gifts are sent to workers in some thirty missions operating in Japan, China, India, Arabia, many parts of Africa, Brazil, Peru, Bolivia, Canada, Solomon Islands, and the New Hebrides; the Jews are not forgotten, and a number of Home Missions are helped. We are always in close touch with a wide missionary circle, and frequently hear of urgent needs which are not met from ordinary funds, and for which it is our joy to send help as we are enabled.

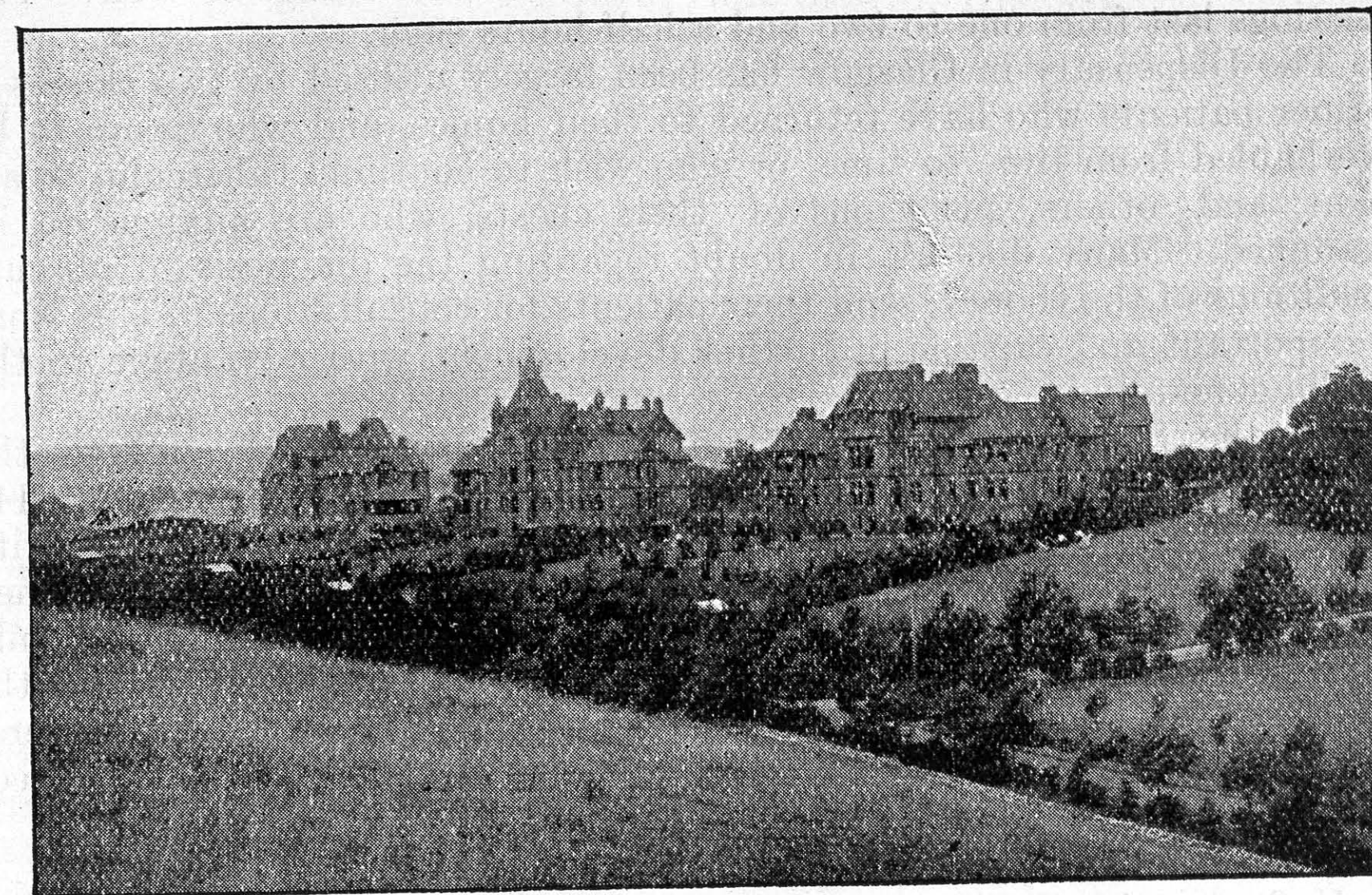
Most of the little band of missionaries, who are wholly supported by the fund, were at home when our last report was written. These have now all returned to their fields of service.

Mr. and Mrs. John Ritchie (Lima, Peru), who were in very poor health during most of their furlough, have now regained a good measure of strength, and were able to sail with three of their children (leaving the eldest at school in London). They ought to be arriving in Peru about this time and will be thankful for much prayer as they again take up their arduous work, in which God has greatly honoured them in the past.

Mr. and Mrs. James H. Haldane (Pernambuco, Brazil) spent a happy and useful year in Scotland. They are now back in Brazil, where they met with an enthusiastic welcome from the church and other friends. There is awful need in Northern Brazil where there are many fewer missionaries than in the South. Mr. Haldane urgently requires a colleague, and we hope soon to hear of some earnest and capable young man, or men, being "thrust forth" into this needy field.

Mr. and Mrs. Cuthbert Nairn returned to Marraksh, South Morocco, more than a year ago. Mr. Nairn has been at work in this fanatical Moslem city for some thirty years; and it would probably be true to say that he is the most popular man—certainly the most popular "Doctor" in it. Day by day his doors are thronged by hundreds of the sick and suffering, and to all the Gospel is preached, and everything that can be is done to relieve their sufferings.

Please take these devoted men and women on your heart and make earnest prayer on their behalf that they may be more and more used to extend His Kingdom.



CONSUMPTION SANATORIA OF SCOTLAND, AND COLONY OF MERCY FOR EPILEPTICS.

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THE work at the Consumption Sanatoria of Scotland during 1920 has been of a four-fold character. It has embraced not only the treatment of those affected with tuberculosis, and the training of those who were convalescent from the effects of the disease, in outdoor work especially. It has aimed at securing the earlier diagnosis of the condition in those affected, through the Dispensary at the City Home, 13 James Morrison Street, Glasgow, and the training of medical men and students in tuberculosis work generally, especially in diagnostic methods and therapeutic procedure.

There have been held during the year three separate courses of instruction, and it has been interesting and encouraging to note the appreciation and enthusiasm shown by those attending. Full advantage is generally taken of all opportunities given to study the subject. A course on tuberculosis generally consists of 24 meetings. Eight of those take place in the University of Glasgow; eight in the Dispensary at James

Morrison Street; and eight at the Sanatoria, Bridge-of-Weir. The meetings last from one to two and a half hours each.

The Dispensary in Glasgow has been largely utilised by two classes—former patients who have returned to their homes, and who desire to be overhauled from time to time, or who wish to continue tuberculin treatment, and others, suspicious of their chests, who are anxious to be examined. Many doctors, in doubt regarding the diagnosis of obscure conditions of the thorax, send their patients for consultations. This work is important and capable of further development with advantage to the public generally.

At the Sanatoria we have had a very busy time throughout the whole year. There have been during that period an average of 148 patients in residence each day. 294 patients in all have been dealt with in the period—158 males and 136 females. 18 of that number, 14 men and 4 women, either did not suffer from tuberculosis, or remained only for a short period in the institution. During the examination and the treatment of the remaining 276—147 males and 129 females—several important facts were elicited relative to disease which fall to be reported.

A.—OCCUPATIONS AND SOCIAL CONDITIONS OF THE PATIENTS.

It will be noted that the range of occupations is an exceedingly wide one. Tuberculosis in Scotland is associated with home conditions more than with definite occupations. Farm work, gardening, and other apparently ideal open-air forms of employment, are by no means a prophylactic against the disease if the home conditions be not right. It apparently matters little, both in the production of the disease and in the prevention of relapses, how or at what the 8 or 9 hours per day at work be spent, if the 15 or 16 hours remaining, and the week ends while at home or elsewhere be spent hygienically, and if nourishment be adequate and abundant.

B.—THE AGE DISTRIBUTION OF THE DISEASE.

Thirty-two or 11 per cent. of the patients were from 5 to 15 years of age. 148, or 53 per cent. were from 15 to 30 years of age. 70, or 25 per cent. were from 30 to 40 years of age. The remaining 26, or 9 per cent. were over 40 years of age. Again we must note that the disease is as formerly—most virulent from 15 to 40 years of age, that period when development is proceeding rapidly, when efficiency is manifesting itself, and when the individual is becoming or has become of the greatest value to the nation and the world. 160 of the patients were single, 87 were married, 29 were school children.

C.—THE EXTENT OF THE DISEASE ON ADMISSION.

Classified according to the Turban scale, 27 were in an early stage, 115 were intermediate, 134 were advanced.

In only 19 cases was the disease definitely one sided. Of the five lobes of the lungs, in 24 cases one lobe was involved; in 83 cases, two lobes; in 82, three lobes; in 72, four lobes; and in 15 cases the whole five lobes were involved. This widespread and advanced condition of the disease in such a large percentage of the cases before patients come under treatment, is one of the factors that makes the work difficult and leads to the danger of relapse after a patient leaves the institution.

In 71, or 25 per cent. only had the symptoms been present for less than six months. In other 45, or 16 per cent., they had been present for from six to twelve months. In the remaining 59 per cent., there had been symptoms of the disease for from 1 to 14 years prior to coming under treatment.

Sanatorium treatment should not be looked upon as a last resort, as the final thing to be tried when everything else fails. It is a magnificent weapon when the disease is closed, or when a small area of the lung is involved. Nothing in the realm of therapeutics can produce results so satisfactory. In the later stages when the disease is well established, it is much less effective and satisfactory.

D.—THE RESULTS OF TREATMENT.

We do not use the word "cured" in the Sanatorium. Time alone can definitely pronounce a patient to be quite cured. An active lesion may be so deepseated or so obscure as to give no signs nor symptoms of its presence. 33 or 11.9 per cent. had the disease apparently quite arrested; 170 or 61.5 per cent. were definitely improved; 60 or 26.4 per cent. were apparently not improved. 13 patients died while in residence. Several of those who died passed away very shortly after admission.

These results are not so disappointing as they might appear. Many of those who were classified merely as "improved," have since leaving the institution gone on improving, and become very well in every way. Others who were discharged as apparently "not improved," after returning home have gone ahead, and done remarkably well. Space forbids the quoting of examples. Many could be given to show that the full benefit which accrues from Sanatorium treatment does not always show itself during the period of the patient's residence.

E.—METHODS OF TREATMENT.

In treatment, we have relied mainly on graduated rest and exercise, and the control or inducing of auto-inoculations thereby. Work is prescribed for those patients who are able to accomplish a six miles walk per day without any evidence of toxaemia. This work is of an outdoor character—farming, gardening, poultry and rabbit work chiefly. The patients show great interest in their various duties. Very rarely do any object to the most menial tasks. The fact that they are allowed or delegated to work is an encouraging feature which is a stimulating factor of real personal interest.

Tuberculins of varying kinds—chiefly Bacillary Emulsion, have been given to 145, or 41 per cent. In 79 per cent. we were of the opinion that great benefit accrued therefrom, although arrest did not result attributable to that alone.

Artificial pneumothorax was attempted in many advanced or hopeless cases, at times with marvellous results, not only alleviating distressing symptoms, but apparently leading to the arrest of the disease.

Ultra-violet rays and X rays were used largely in gland cases, in the treatment of tuberculous sinuses, and in dealing with persistent pain such as pleurisy and neuritis.

Many complications and concurrent affections had to be dealt with, both tuberculous and non-tuberculous. Chief among these were—indigestion, 110 cases; pleurisy, 93 cases; laryngitis, 47 cases; haemoptysis, 43 cases; adenitis, 23 cases; abdominal tuberculosis, 17 cases. We had 10 cases of bone and joint tuberculosis; spine, 2 cases; hip, 2 cases; knee, 2 cases; wrist, 2 cases; and dactylitis, 2 cases. These were treated in every case by immobilising in plaster of paris, and by aspiration when abscesses formed. The results of the treatment of those conditions along these lines were eminently satisfactory.

Our share in the great national campaign against this scourge of the ages seems a comparatively small one. As a Sanatorium we can deal with 157 cases out of probably 76,000 cases of the disease, for there is at least that number affected with tuberculosis in Scotland alone. We feel that our work is however by no means inconspicuous. Every patient who comes to us we try to make a convert to the right method of living, not only to cure the disease but also to prevent it, and we want each patient who leaves, to go out as an apostle of the fresh air cult. Our patients come from all parts of the country, from the Solway in the south to the Shetlands in the north, therefore we reach a wide circle. Further, by our educational measures, particularly through being linked up with the University of Glasgow, we are influencing some of the rising generation of doctors, and have reason to expect that our efforts will have some effect, not only in leading to earlier diagnosis being made, but in effective prophylactic measures being taken which will lessen the incidence of the disease.

For the effective working of the institution much credit is due to the Matron, Miss Taylor, and the excellent band of sisters and nurses who loyally co-operate with her. They, by their untiring efforts contribute much to the comfort as well as to the recovery of those under their charge.

COLONY OF MERCY FOR EPILEPTICS.

THE Colony of Mercy for Epileptics has had an uneventful year. When it began there were in residence 98 Colonists—47 men, 29 women, 15 boys and 7 girls.

During the year 25 Colonists were discharged. Four patients—3 men and 1 woman—died. There have been admitted 33 Colonists.

The work is difficult and at times discouraging. At no period, night or day, can quietness or order be depended upon. That may be judged from the fact that during the year 19,544 fits were recorded as having taken place in the institution. 9,173 of those were major fits, and 10,371 minor fits. These seizures in the majority of instances take place without the slightest warning. Constant watchfulness and care are therefore at all times—night and day—essential if danger or harm to the patient is to be avoided.

The direct treatment of epilepsy proves in the majority of instances, with our present knowledge of the disease, rather futile. Everything known to, or even reputed to have any effect on the disease is tried; in most cases without the slightest encouragement.

Two of the patients discharged, fortunately, were apparently cured, having had no fits for three consecutive years. Both had been with us for very long periods—one since the opening of the Colony. It is interesting to note that in the one case the cure seemed to result from the administration of tuberculin. This was given on account of advanced and widespread tuberculous cervical adenitis and pleurisy. It had a specific effect on the glandular enlargements and the pleurisy, causing them to disappear, and *pari passu* with that the fits ceased. In the other case silver nitrate proved the effectual remedy. This was given over a very prolonged period, and had the effect of producing well-marked argyrisms. The discolouration of the skin, however, the patient did not object to. Both have continued well since their discharge in the month of April. They are fully employed each day.

The Colonists are not treated as patients in a hospital. Convinced of the excellent therapeutic effects of work, if not in arresting the onset of seizures, in maintaining mental and physical fitness, all those in residence are required to take up some form of useful work. In the case of men this is chiefly in the vegetable garden, and in the case of women in the laundry. That that is a wise course there is no doubt. Idleness in epilepsy leads to degeneration and insanity.

A school, under the direction of the County Education Authority, is provided for all under 16 years of age. Night schools are conducted for adults in the winter evenings.

There are in residence at the close of the year 102 patients—47 men, 27 women, 20 boys, and 8 girls. To the matrons, the nurses, and the attendants, who day and night watch over those so unfortunately afflicted, much praise is due. Their work is indeed a labour of love—a work of mercy. The reward is that of seeing so many hitherto on account of their affliction neglected, and leading inefficient lives, happy, contented, and to some degree useful to themselves and to others.

SUMMARY OF THE YEAR'S WORK.

ORPHAN HOMES OF SCOTLAND, BRIDGE-OF-WEIR, AND CITY ORPHAN HOME, GLASGOW.—On 1st November, 1919, there were resident in the Homes 1,217 boys and girls. During the year 189 new cases were admitted, making a total of 1,406 dealt with.

These have been disposed of as follows :—Outfitted and sent to Canada, 63; domestic service, trades, and situations 54; deaths, 6; children under 5 years of age adopted, 4; returned to relatives now in a position to provide for them, 129; left to go to relatives, etc., 33; sent to other institutions, 4; leaving in the Homes on 31st October, 1920, 1,114; of whom 631 are boys and 483 girls.

From the above it will be seen that 121 boys and girls were provided with outfits, given a start in life, and placed in positions to make their own way. The older girls having been trained for domestic service, situations were found for them, and the older boys were apprenticed to trades, or sent to farms. Most of those returned to relatives were the children of soldiers, who, on being demobilised, were able to take charge of their families again. Amongst those returned to friends many were old enough to work, and where necessary, we helped with outfits, so that a large proportion of these might be added to the number of the permanently helped.

CONSUMPTION SANATORIA OF SCOTLAND.—The year began with 154 patients in residence. 288 were admitted, 279 discharged, and 15 died, leaving 148 in residence on 31st October, 1920.

COLONY OF MERCY FOR EPILEPTICS.—The year began with 98 colonists in residence; 33 men, women, and children were admitted; 25 were discharged; and 4 died, leaving 102 in residence on 31st October, 1920.

THE YEAR'S INCOME.

The amount received during the year is as follows :—For the General Fund, which includes the maintenance of the Homes at Bridge-of-Weir and the City Home, including £1,680 6s. 5d. earned by working boys, and sundry amounts as per Cash Statement, £50,367 18s. 9½d.; for Consumption Sanatoria, £19,767 1s. 4d.; for the Colony of Mercy for Epileptics, £4,324 14s. 7d.; for Home and Foreign Missions Fund, £1,480 2s. 0d., making the total amount for all purposes, £75,939 16s. 8½d., besides large quantities of clothing, provisions, and other useful gifts.

For the work accomplished we are, under God, indebted to our devoted fellow-helpers in the various Homes, and to the practical generosity of friends throughout the country; to ministers, evangelists, and all who have aided in the Church services and other gatherings; to Sabbath School superintendents, teachers, and scholars; to ladies who have made up garments for our little ones; to the Press which has given notices of the work; to the members of the Medical Advisory Board, and the Doctors who have freely given their time and skill for the benefit of the sufferers in the Sanatoria and Hospitals; and to the accountants Messrs. M'Farlane, Hutton & Patrick, who very kindly act as Honorary Auditors.

IN CONCLUSION.

“Scotland spends as much on intoxicating drink every week as it has cost to carry on the great and beneficent work at Bridge-of-Weir from the beginning until now!” We read words like these on some of the literature of the recent Local Veto campaign. Surely this is an appalling statement, and the pity is 'tis true. To us an income of £75,000 seems a large sum, but what a drop in the bucket it is compared with the vast amount spent in foolish pleasure and worse. Money spent on work like this is surely “making friends of the mammon of unrighteousness,” and is an investment which in time and eternity shall yield great dividends.

Every need of 1919-20 was abundantly met; so far as we can forecast, the budget of 1920-21 is likely to include :—

£50,000 for maintenance of Orphan Children in Glasgow and at Bridge-of-Weir.

£3,000 for Emigration and maintenance of the Canadian Home.

Gifts towards maintenance of Consumption Sanatoria.

Gifts towards maintenance of Colony of Mercy.

Christmas-Tree Gifts for each of our large family of boys and girls. Required early in December.

£2,000 for Home and Foreign Missions Fund.

Consecrated Christian men and women to fill vacancies as they occur for “fathers and mothers” in the cottages.

Our hearts are full of praise to God for His overflowing kindness to us during the past year, and we know that as we continue to live according to Matt. vi. 33, the great promises of that scripture and of Phil. iv. 19 will continue to be literally fulfilled. Our sincere thanks are also rendered to all our fellow workers, who by daily devotion in service, and by prayer and gifts, have made possible the writing of this Narrative.

September, 1921, will complete “The year of Jubilee,” and we shall hope to hold at the end of that month a special “Thanksgiving Day,” of which due notice will be given.

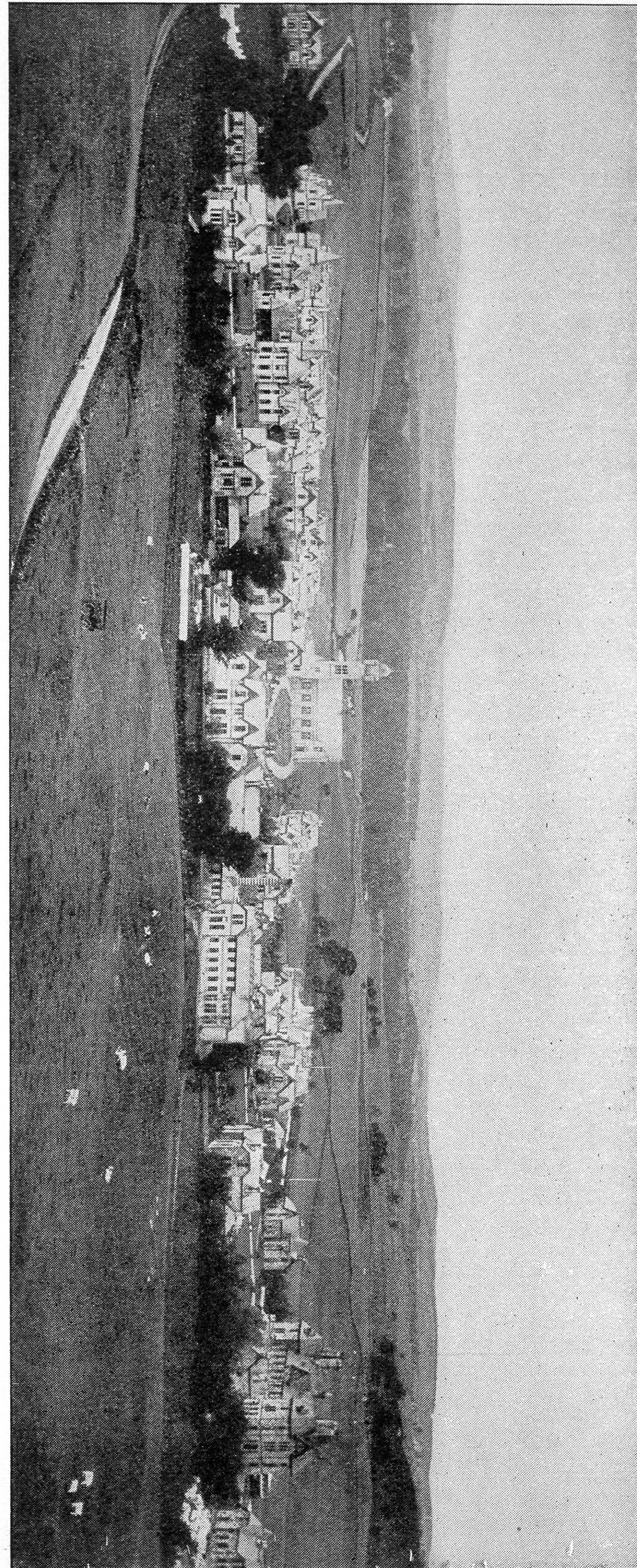
