

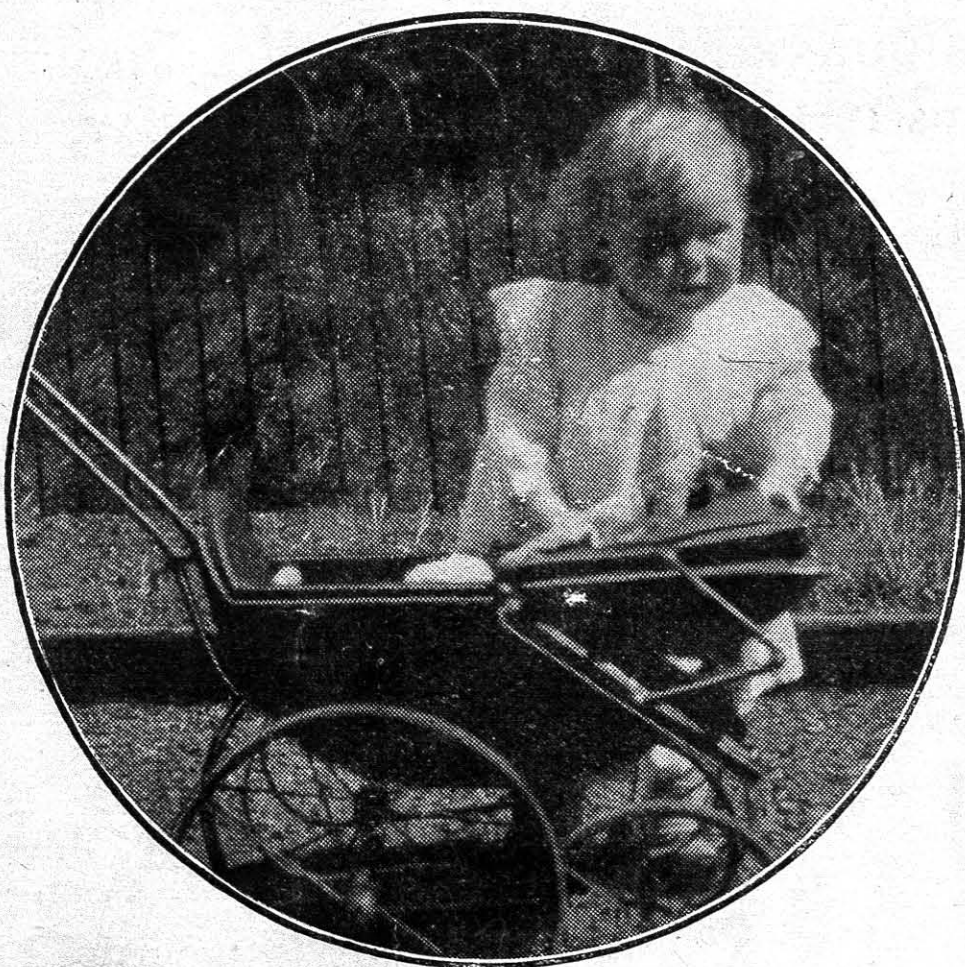

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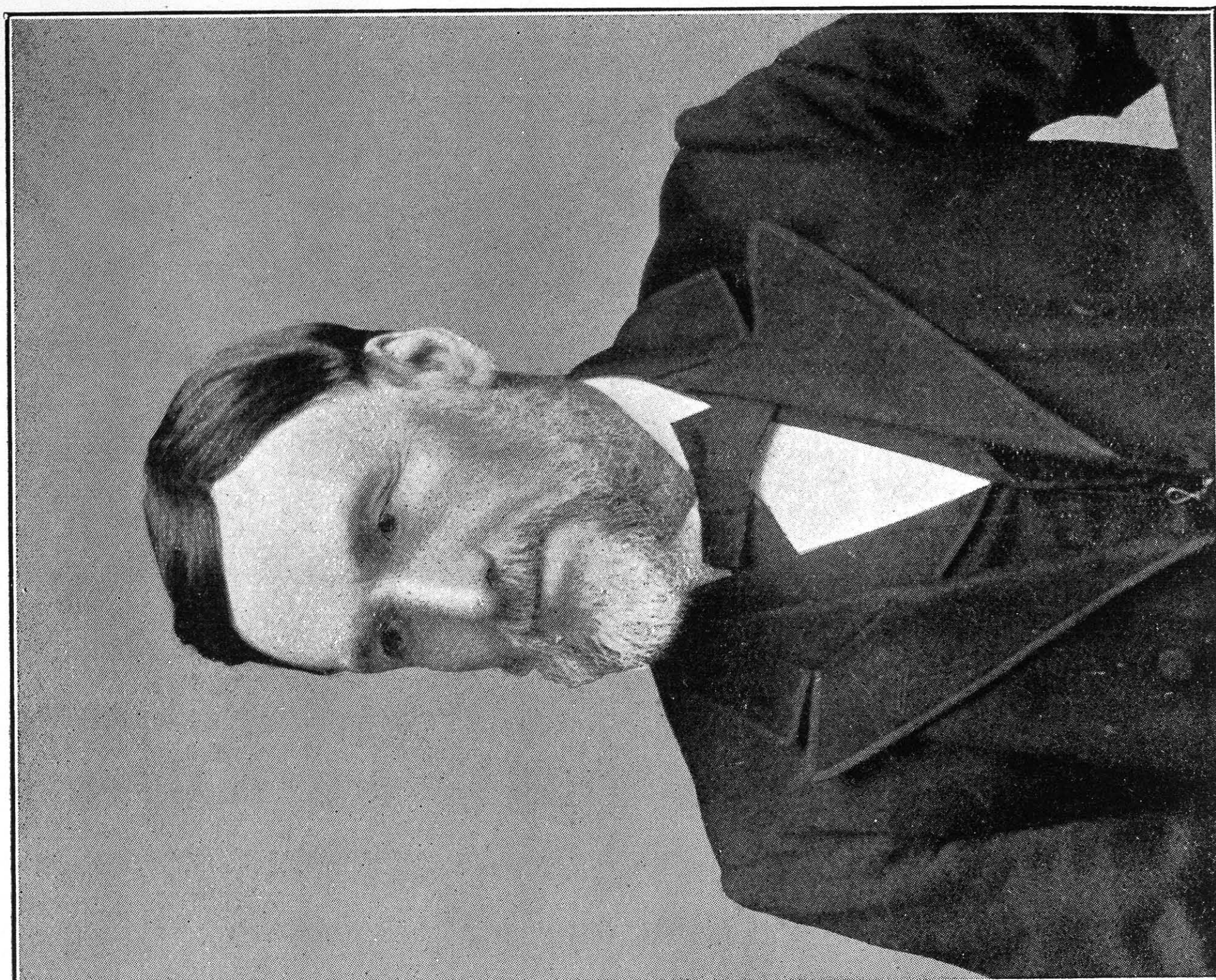

NARRATIVE OF FACTS.

1921—"THE YEAR OF JUBILEE."

FIFTY years ago—impelled by the love of Christ and a heavy burden for the sufferings of poor and neglected children—William Quarrier rented a flat in a brick workshop at 10 Renfrew Lane, Glasgow, and opened it as an Orphan Home to provide for a few of the needy ones with whom he came in contact in his daily walks about the city streets. Others looked on the same sights with unseeing eyes, but to him, in the early days of his childhood, a vision had been given that had grown with his years, and strengthened and deepened instead of fading away in the press of new interests. Having known something of hunger and neglect himself, he had long ago registered a holy resolve that if and when the time should come that he would have it in his power to help the helpless ones, he would do so. God had His young servant in His own care and all through the years of childhood, youth, and early manhood, He was training him in His own university for the great life-work which He was preparing for him. At seventeen years of age young Quarrier—through the faithful interest of a Christian employer—was brought under the sound and power of the Gospel and was savingly converted to God. Immediately the newly implanted life of Christ in his soul began to manifest itself in earnest endeavours on behalf of others, and naturally these endeavours soon poured into the channel of his life-long passion on behalf of the children of the streets—the burden of whose need weighed on him day and night.

It was the worthy ambition of Mr. Quarrier to build up such a successful business that out of the fruits of his own industry he might attain his heart's desire and purpose. This, however, was not according to God's plan; and so—although the young man was successful beyond many in his business undertakings—he was eventually given to know that God had other and better methods by which to answer His servant's prayer and meet the pressing needs of the children. As his own spiritual life grew and deepened, by the prayerful study of God's Word, his Heavenly Father gave him the plan which had been prepared in heaven, just as really as He gave Moses the plan of the tabernacle and David that of the temple.

Almost from the beginning, Mr. Quarrier had the vision of a group of cottage homes, built in some quiet countryside, where hundreds of Scotland's destitute orphans might be gathered and cared for in temporal and spiritual things. That vision was about to take tangible and visible form when the first Home was opened fifty years ago in a back lane behind Sauchiehall Street. It certainly did not look like it to the

eye of sense, but to the eye of faith the day of realisation was near at hand. Soon the brick workshop became too small for the growing family, and a disused church was rented in Great Dove Hill, adjoining the Gallowgate. The desirability of separate Homes for girls and boys becoming evident, a house for girls in Renfield Street, and one for boys in Cessnock House, Govan Road, were rented to provide for the steadily growing family. These and other temporary arrangements would have proved quite inadequate to cope with the rapid growth of the work, had it not been for the providential opening of the Canadian door, into which every suitable child could be passed. Over six thousand five hundred of the children have been emigrated to that wonderful land of opportunity, where the great majority of them have done well, and many of them are to-day filling useful places in almost every walk of life.

The next forward step was taken when in 1876, forty acres of land were purchased near Bridge-of-Weir, and the building of the long-prayed-for Cottage Homes commenced. As years passed, one adjoining farm after another was purchased, until to-day there are eighty houses and some three hundred and forty acres of land—where a family which sometimes exceeds two thousand, lives from day to day and year to year, on the promises of God which have never failed and never can.

Absolute dependence on God was the principle on which the work was commenced, and that has been abundantly proved to be a true principle throughout the fifty years which have since elapsed. None but God has ever been appealed to for money, and the "Father of the fatherless and Judge of the widow" has honoured the faith of His servant, during his own lifetime and since his death eighteen years ago. Never has there been at any time a penny of debt in any department of the work, and never has any creditor had to be asked to "call back" for payment of an account. Nearly a million and a half pounds sterling have been sent in answer to prayer for the carrying on of the work, of which large sum about one-fifth has been spent on houses and lands and four-fifths on maintenance; while nothing at all has required to be expended on advertising or appeals.

Fifty years ago William Quarrier set out to erect a monument in the midst of the land to the God who hears and answers prayer, and here it stands to-day in the sight of the many thousands who pass to and fro on the roads and railway. As one said recently in our beautiful church, "This is probably the greatest sermon that was ever preached in Scotland." The message that this "sermon" has carried into the hearts and lives of multitudes at home and abroad is only fully known to Him who searches the heart and tries the reins. Mr. Quarrier and his greatly beloved wife have now been many years enjoying their well-earned rest, but there are still four at least taking active part in the work who were identified with it from the beginning. To them and many others it is a great thing to have been brought to this "year of Jubilee," and to be able to look back and retrace the wonderful way in which God inspired, instructed, guided, and provided for His servants and all the needs of the work throughout the fifty years of its history.

After a long and faithful period of service—in Glasgow and at Bridge-of-Weir—extending to forty-two years, our valued Superintendent, Mr.

David Douglas, retired at the end of the year. He is succeeded in this important position by his son, Mr. William Douglas, who, having been born and brought up in the work, is thoroughly familiar with all its details and well qualified to follow his father, the benefit of whose counsel he will still have, we hope, for years to come.

Dr. Walker Downie, the eminent throat specialist, who had for many years given his most valuable help on our Medical Council, and also in the practical work of the Sanatoria, died in July. He was a great Christian as well as a great surgeon, and we shall for long mourn his loss, both as a personal friend, and on account of the generous help so freely given at Bridge-of-Weir.

Although the death of Mr. William A. Campbell occurred a few days after the close of our Homes year, we cannot omit mention of his name in this Narrative. Mr. Campbell, as well as being one of our Trustees, was for many years one of the outstanding Christian workers in our city. Although engrossed in the management of a vast business, he made time for the constant and successful preaching of the Gospel and teaching of the Word of God in and around the city, and doubtless many of his spiritual children were waiting to welcome him when he entered the "rest which remaineth for the people of God." The memory of such men is blessed indeed, and we pray that many others may be raised up to serve Christ as this great man of God was privileged to do.

In other parts of this Narrative our friends will find statistics and details, all of which will, we are sure, be read with deep interest and thanksgiving to God.

Our family at the beginning of the year numbered 1,365—in addition to workers—comprised of 1,115 orphan children, 148 consumption patients, and 102 epileptics. During the year we have received 185 children, 269 patients, and 39 colonists; leaving us with a family of 1,336 on 31st October. For the feeding, clothing, nursing, and caring for all of these we have received the following amounts, including payments:—

NOVEMBER, 1920.—From last year's Narrative, with its final word a note of praise, we turn to commence a new chapter in the story of the Lord's dealings with the Orphan Homes of Scotland. On the threshold of their fiftieth year of work, what a retrospect is ours! May not the prospect be better still and we, in confidence, expect this year of jubilee to be *annus mirabilis*; indeed.

Looking BACK I trace God's hand,
Guarding, guiding, all my past;
Loving kindness marks the track,
First and last.

Looking ON I have no fears,
He who kept will ever keep,
God's love is unchanging still,
Full and deep.

As each new day is given us from the unknown future, may He perfect us in the knowledge of His will and grant the grace to be obedient thereto.

Especially in this place, so rich in proofs that God is and that He is a rewarder of them that diligently seek Him,

Often have I thought it odd
That men should ask, "Is there a God?"
The need of man is eyes to see
The presence of Divinity.

May the record of Providence in these succeeding pages supply the need of some—the vision to see and know the God, who in Elijah's day answered by fire, but in these modern materialistic times, by Orphan Homes.

The first donation of this new financial year from one in our own village was accompanied by the words, "I will go in the strength of the Lord God." We could hardly do better than make this our motto, to be constantly before our minds, lest the continual recurrence of the same familiar round of duties tempts us to lean to our own understanding and trust to the frail arm of flesh. Five pounds is "just a wee gift to begin the New Year"; and with the familiar fortnightly donation of our old friends, "Alice, Willie, and Jessie" is the reminder, "But David strengthened himself in the Lord, his God." One pound from Portobello is "to help feed your large family"; £8, per an Edinburgh branch of the Commercial Bank of Scotland; seven and a half dollars from a couple in Calgary, Alberta, saying, "His banknote, Phil. iv. 19, cannot fail"; 10s., "in memory of our dearly beloved and only daughter"; other 10s. from a helper in Wick; £100, from another in the same place; 5s., the proceeds of a show got up by three children in Bearsden; 15s. from the grateful aunt of a family, two of whom were emigrated to Canada, and the youngest of whom is still with us in the village; and £1 for the Colony of Mercy from a donor in Morven.

At a time when the incomes of many old friends have been reduced owing to various causes—the aftermath of war—so that their gifts must now be less than formerly, it is encouraging to find the Lord has touched the hearts of others of His stewards to increase their donations with their growing means. Friends in Dundee write, "Please receive out of our prosperity the sum of £2 of the Lord's portion"; and another, "I have deposited £35 in the Union Bank, payable to you for the benefit of your Homes. I have been able to give £5 more than last year." In this or other ways deficiencies are made up so that the work is not permitted to suffer the lack of any necessary thing, "for there is no restraint to the Lord to save by many or by few."

Four shillings were handed in at the door of the City Home. Two friends in Kent, who recently visited us, have each sent £25 in appreciation of what they saw; another in Peterhead, £10, "a thankoffering for many and continued mercies received"; a lady in New Zealand, recently bereft of her husband, £5; a friend in Upper Norwood, fifty guineas; and another, £150 towards the upkeep of the Oswald Home for invalid girls.

From the income of a bequest fund we have received £75, and towards the outfits of boys and girls placed in situations during the half year, £150 from another bequest fund. In an envelope bearing the Kilmacolm postmark, was an anonymous gift of 10s. Enclosing £1, a friend writes, "To-day would have been mother's birthday, so will you please accept

this, which would have gone to buy some gift for her, for one of your little ones. God bless you and all of them." One pound, a token of gratitude from an old Bridge-of-Weir boy, comes through the City Home; and in the Canadian mail, thirty dollars from another of our grown up sons, now a farmer in a Western Province. Ordinary income during the month has been supplemented by seven legacies totalling £1,347 10s. 2d., and ranging in amount from thirteen shillings and a penny to one thousand pounds.

Never has there been a larger attendance at an Annual Meeting of the Orphan Homes than at the forty-ninth, held on 29th inst. in Glasgow. The following extract from *The Glasgow Herald* of next day will furnish a

brief account of a very inspiring gathering, to the multitude of friends unable to be present:—

The large hall of the Christian Institute, Glasgow, was crowded yesterday afternoon on the occasion of the annual meeting of the Orphan Homes of Scotland and their allied agencies. Mr. Alexander Sloan presided, and those with him on the platform included Sir Thomas Glen-Coats, Sir J. P. Maclay, Sir Samuel Chisholm, Pastor D. J. Findlay, Dr. Ebenezer Duncan, and Dr. W. L. Reid. The printed report gave details of the work during the year, and these were summarised by Sir J. P. Maclay, the hon. treasurer, who mentioned that the total income to the Homes during the period under review was £42,347, while the expenditure had been no less than £51,439. That was mainly due to the increased cost of food-stuffs and to the money which had been spent upon necessary repairs, which had been practically suspended during the war. In the Consumption Sanatoria the income was £19,767 and the expenditure £21,003; in the epileptic colony the income had been £4,324 and the expenditure £4,869; and to the Foreign Mission Fund there had been contributed £1,475, while the amount distributed had been £1,469. Sir Joseph Maclay added that a gratifying feature was the considerable sums which they received from old boys and girls who had been educated in the homes. (Applause.) Pastor

Findlay, who also spoke of the work, remarked that notwithstanding the great advance in the cost of maintenance—it had risen from £13 per child in Mr. Quarrier's time to £42 per child last year—there were balances on hand amounting in the aggregate to almost £50,000. (Applause.)

The Chairman said that the two outstanding features of the report were the overflowing streams of Christian liberality which afforded evidence of widespread interest in the work and the spontaneity of that liberality. The country and the Empire were immeasurably indebted to these homes, which had sent out into the world hundreds and thousands of boys and girls who in responsible positions were maintaining the high standard of life which they first received in the homes. (Applause.)

The reports were adopted, and appropriate addresses were delivered by the Rev. J. Somerville Smith, Dr. Ebenezer Duncan, and the Rev. Paul Rader, Chicago, who paid tribute to the excellent work which had been and was being done at Bridge-of-Weir, and to the testimony to Christian faith and liberality which that work represented. With particular reference to the Consumption Sanatoria, Dr. Duncan declared that they were making considerable progress in the curative direction. The number of recoveries which were now being obtained was larger than in the past, and they were also achieving much in the direction of educating not only the general public but also the medical profession in the proper treatment of this disease.

DECEMBER, 1920.—The following is from one of our grown-up boys who served in the war and was present at the annual meeting referred to above:—

I write this letter just after attending the meeting in the Christian Institute, Glasgow. Although not much of a writer, I feel it is my duty to pen this short note. I am quite sure you would be proud (and well may you be) of the many tributes paid to your father. My only regret is that I was not able to see Mr. Quarrier in the flesh, but still I reaped the benefit of his labours and I can assure you I am truly thankful. I have before me as I write a copy of the yearly report which no one can deny is a tribute to the Almighty God. I have often used Quarrier's Homes as an object lesson when trying to convince an unbeliever. I will conclude this letter by hoping that you and Mrs. Burges will be spared in the best of health to carry on the great good work. Thanking you again for your many kindnesses to me while in France.

A friend in the city writes, "I enjoyed the annual meeting and have pleasure in enclosing £100 for the Homes"; whilst another says, "I have just finished reading the report of your work for last year, and I have pleasure in sending you enclosed herewith my cheque for £100." The little note accompanying £1 from a friend of the very early days reads, "The report is most interesting. Every good wish for your wonderful work. I well remember the starting in Renfrew Lane." Two sisters send enclosed 30s. for work in the Colony of Mercy, "through reading Report and hearing of the wonderful work done for the Lord in the Homes at Bridge-of-Weir, we are greatly interested and wish to help a little." Ten shillings is "a thankoffering for resumption of work"; £3, "a thankoffering to the Lord for all His mercies to us," from two of our helpers; 5 dollars from a lady in Alberta, who used to be a worker in the City Home Mission; £1, from an old worker in South Africa; £13 10s. from one who constantly renders valuable voluntary service to the children; £1, from two others of our own workers; £2, "a tithe" from another; £1 each from two others; and £5, "a New Year gift for the work," from yet another.

A glance through the donation list for this month alone would suffice to show interest in the Lord's work here to be world-wide, as for instance, £2 from an old man in Buluwayo, rejoicing that he is still able to work; £8 from a number of missionaries in Nyasaland; £1 from Morocco; £10 from a friend whose home is in Arabia; £1 for the Homes, with 30s. for the Sanatoria, from two sisters in Cannes; £1 from Otago, New Zealand;

3 dollars towards the Christmas treat, from a helper in Vancouver; 10s. from a friend in this country, along with 5 dollars from her son in Medicine Hat; 10s. from two friends in Winnipeg; 8 dollars 40 cents from Toronto; £2 from Pennsylvania; other £2 from one of our grown-up girls in Massachusetts; and £1 from another, now resident abroad with her husband. From her letter we quote,

I write to convey to you our good wishes for a Merry Christmas and a Glad New Year and to enclose £1 for the Homes. 'Tis such a mite to your needs that one feels almost tempted to omit it. I guess your great work increases. I often think of all those whom I knew when there, and wonder if ever I return how many shall I meet whom I know. Life here is interesting in a way. We are in the very cradle of religion and yet never farther in a way (save that God is everywhere) from it. We get good boating, fishing, swimming, shooting, hunting—scarcely ever drive over the plains after dusk without getting a fox. We are anticipating our vacation in the early summer, hoping thereby to escape the heat. The vineyards here are wonderful. Fruit and vegetables grow in abundance, but they are given little or no care. We prepare to go to Serres next week, and hope to attain Constantinople in the early spring. With sincere good wishes and blessings on your work.

From another of our girls we have received 10s.; from a grateful boy, £1; from another and his wife, £5; from a girl of long ago, £2; from two others, £1 each; from a lad in Southend, who recently visited the old home, 3s.; from one on a farm in Dumfriesshire, 10s., lamenting that there is no such Christmas for him now as he used to enjoy here; 5s. from one of the girls; 3s., with 1s. for work among the Jews, from another who has little from which to give; 4s. from yet another, trying to repay what was done for her by the Homes; £3 10s. from an old City Home boy and his wife and children; £1 from another of our married sons in Ottawa; and £10 from one of the old Cessnock boys and his wife. After a somewhat chequered career he has achieved comfort and success, and what is of more value still, a good name as a public-spirited Christian citizen in the large community where he lives and works.

Two pounds eighteen shillings has been voluntarily subscribed by the men in training and the staff of a Government instructional factory, to help brighten the festive season for the children, and in the hope that the spirit in which it has been given will encourage "those responsible in your gigantic undertaking." A footnote to a letter, enclosing £10, from the employees of a Partick firm, reads, "Although not receiving any appeal from you we thought at our meeting that your home deserved a grant to help the good work along." A helper who wishes no acknowledgment of his gift remarks, "I am amazed how you get so much money without begging." The reply is not far to seek—"Your Heavenly Father knoweth that ye have need of these things. He careth for you. He is able to do exceeding abundantly above all that ye ask or think." The sender of half-a-crown from Aberdeen passes on "two texts I came across connected the other day, 'The Lord hath done great things; thou shalt see greater.' May this latter be your experience during the coming year or till He come."

A lady in County Antrim has sent £1; a helper in Manchester, 2s. 6d., with Phil. iv. 6 and 7; a couple of friends in the village near us, five guineas; one in Brora, Sutherlandshire, 10s.; another in Harrogate, £10; a couple who adopted a little girl thirteen years ago, 10s.; an old friend in Kilmarnock, £100; someone in North Wales, £2; one in Cork, 10s.; a little girl in Carnoustie, 6s. 6d., "to help the children's Christmas";

a helper in Torquay, £2; a friend who thinks of the sick ones, £5 for a Christmas treat at the hospital; a lady in London, £25 to buy Christmas presents for the children; a girls' auxiliary in an Aberdeenshire church, 13s.; a friend in Cambridge, who recalls with pleasure a recent visit, one guinea; the members of a Lanarkshire mission band, £1; two helpers in Shetland, 10s.; a work party, £20; a boy in Strathaven, 5s.; an old friend in Peeblesshire, 4s.; a donor in Belfast, two guineas; two firms we deal with constantly, £10 and £15 respectively; the donors of one of the boys' homes, £80, with £20 for the Sanatoria; and an anonymous donor in Forfar, 7s.

Sometime ago a Y.W.C.A. girls' club were anxious to have the name of a child in whom they might take a special personal interest. The name of little Carol, aged three, was sent them. Ever since they have been working for and thinking of him, and now there has come a parcel of cosy things to wear by day and night, with sweets and toys enough to fill both his stockings on Christmas morning. A Dickens night at the club "in aid," as they say, "of our living Carol," realised £4 12s. towards his maintenance in addition to their other gifts.

Well-filled stockings, bulging with all sorts of pleasant surprises, to greet our big family of little folks as they come downstairs on Christmas morning, extra Christmas fare, and special entertainments, in addition to ordinary necessities to eat and wear and warm, have come to us from the ever bountiful hand of our loving Heavenly Father, through the instrumentality of a multitude of friends—partners with Him, co-partners with us, in this blessed work for the children that is His and ours and theirs. Thanks be to God who daily loadeth us with benefits. May His reward—the joy in giving—be the portion of all who remember the needs of His little ones entrusted to our care.

Though somewhat wearied in body with the strenuous weeks of extra work behind us, it is with glad and grateful hearts we join our fellow workers in the church to spend the closing hour of the year together in praise, and meditation, and prayer. At such a season we need to be concerned not so much with the making of new vows as with the keeping of old ones and the renewing of our allegiance to a Master ever faithful. Forgetting the failures that are behind, let us press on looking unto Jesus. The message given us to-night to nerve us for the coming days is a new translation of an old text—"In Him who strengtheneth me, I am able for anything."

JANUARY, 1921.—Regular readers of the Narrative have doubtless grown almost as familiar as we are with the routine of New Year's day at the Orphan Homes. For us it can never be monotonous. One never tires of it, nor does the scene lose its charm, as we gaze upon twelve hundred happily expectant children's faces. Moreover, it should be borne in mind that for many of the young folks it is their first, and for as many more their last New Year's day in the village. This consideration, added to the exuberant joy of the bairns makes all the weariness of preparation seem well worth while. When this day of feasting and good things is far spent and eventide draws nigh, with lightning speed our thoughts encompass the world as at the family altar we commend the absent members to our Heavenly Father's care. What a multitude

would be in the church to-night could all whose thoughts have focused here to-day be with us in the flesh!

Jesus, Master, meet and bless us,
As the unknown path we tread;
We are children, hold us, lead us,
Put to flight the ills we dread;
May we through the untried way
Prove Thy power from day to day.

Meet us, Saviour, every moment,
For we dare not walk alone,
Through the great untried before us
Guide us ever safely on,
To our Home beyond the tide
Meet us on the other side.

In our New Year's mail we find £3, "In loving memory towards the support of one little one"; 10s., "to assist"; 2s. 6d., a mite from a well-wisher; 20s., "from a fellow worker with all good wishes"; £1 from eight carters per one of our old boys; £1 from a "Boys' and Girls' Own" in Coupar-Angus, with another £1 from the sender; 10s. from a former

teacher in the school; £5 from Arbroath; 5s. from Oban, "from my little boy out of his own money as a New Year gift for your large family"; 3 guineas for the Sanatoria; £5 from Coatbridge; 5s. each for the Homes and the Sanatoria, from Brodick; and £5 to buy an orange for each child in the village. Next morning a good friend in London writes, "In our first prayer in the New Year, my wife and I were much drawn out in praise and supplication for the beautiful work of God at Bridge-of-Weir, and my first letter is this note to wish you and all your fellow-workers God-speed in what cannot but be an eventful year. The small cheque is just a token of the prayerful interest of two hearts that are stimulated to faith and hope and love by every memory of happy visits paid to the Orphan Homes of Scotland."

The following letter, from an Ontario farmer's wife, though bearing

sad news, we prize highly for its testimony to the life and character of another of our splendid boys who was not deaf to duty's call :—

Your annual letter of greeting came at the New Year for W. A. Ferrier, and so we are sure you have not yet heard of his death. Willie came to us from you in the spring of 1905—a tiny little boy. He spent his first years in school, and after that did farm work for us as one of the family, but always getting the usual wage paid at that time, and which he deserved, as he soon became a good Canadian farmer and would no doubt have made a success had he been spared. In the fall of 1913 he visited his homeland, and had a pleasant visit with his father's relatives. He returned in the spring of 1914, and as war broke out he enlisted as soon as an opening came. He crossed to England with the 21st Battalion, and was in France from September, 1915, serving first in the 21st and then being transferred to the 3rd Canadian Tunnelling Company. He was well fitted for his work and was several times offered promotion but wished to keep just one of the boys. He was one of what was spoken of as the Lost Tunnelling Company, being under Hill 60 during all the work there and left it just two weeks before the British fired the mines under it. On 21st June, 1918, while working underground a cave occurred and Willie was caught and pinned down by a heavy piece of timber. There was a great deal of water, the cause of the cave, and though his companions worked desperately to rescue him, he was held as the water rose inch by inch. He talked as his companions worked and wept. He prayed and pleaded for us all while lying there. At last his voice became faint as he said, "Good-bye, lads, I am going to leave you." And so his life went out. He was buried in a small quiet French cemetery. I tell you this because you can tell the boys there with you now that while in Canada he lived a clean manly life and died a hero's death. He was one of your boys of whom you have every right to be proud. Your boys made excellent showing in the defence of our country.

Ten dollars from another Canadian farm brings news of two more of our boys—"James is with us yet and is keeping well. He was away to see Charlie yesterday. He is well also." Five shillings, "wishing you a very happy New Year," has come from one of our recently emigrated Canadian girls; other five shillings from another in this country; £2 from a third in New Zealand; 10s. from one in a situation in Fife, saying, "Many a thing the Homes have done for me and many a good chance I have lost, and it's only now I feel it and I am real sorry for it"; a draft for £24 from one of the boys whose farming operations in Canada God has prospered; and 10s. from another girl in domestic service at home. In her letter she says,

I am sorry in being so long in writing to you. It has been on my conscience every day. I cannot explain to you how thankful I am for the care that you and all the dear friends have taken over me, but I appreciate it all very much. I felt like to break my heart when I left my dear mother, but I have got another real good mother and father who both are very good and kind to me. Mrs. — takes great patience in teaching me how to do everything right, and I am doing my best to please, and am so grateful to you for sending me to such a good place. I pray every day for you and the Homes, and thank my Heavenly Father for all His goodness in sending me to the Homes, where I was cared for, then sending me here, for I am so happy and comfortable.

Four shillings is to hand "from one who has seen your father and watched his progress since the formation of the Parcels and the Shoeblack Brigades and has shaken hands with him." To £4 1s. 6d. from a Christians' meeting in Paisley, the sender has added 10s., "my own thank-offering for 47 years' mercies since converted in Fiddler Joss' meetings." On Christmas day the 392 children, ranging in age from 1 day to 14 years, of a Banffshire parish, were given a tea and treat, "and in return the children gave a collection for your Homes of £4 3s. 3d." An old Sanatoria patient, still well and very grateful, writes, "I want to thank you first for sending me the report. I always enjoy reading it so much and then

pass it on to others. Will you please find enclosed 25s., 10s. for the Homes and 10s. for the Sanatoria from myself, and 5s., also for the Homes, from my son. I was so glad when I got home from business to-day. He told me he would like to send 5s. out of his pocket money. He is only 15." A friend in Worcester, whose faith has been wavering, sends 3s. 6d. with these encouraging remarks, "I thank you very much for copy of report, which reads like a song of victory. It cheered me."

It is our constant prayer that this simple Narrative, with no pretensions to literary elegance, be blessed of God to strengthen the faith of some one of His children. If even one such has been cheered along life's way, we have had our reward for all the work entailed.



BY THE BURNSIDE.

FEBRUARY, 1921.—From distant South Africa has come another encouraging note of appreciation regarding last year's Narrative. Under date 25th January the writer says, "Do you observe the date? I think the spirit of Burns (who was humanitarian as well as sinner) would approve me keeping his birthday by sending along my little bit for your children. Your report came last mail and is more fascinating than fiction. It is a great lesson in faith to me, for I have been tempted to despair." Ten dollars, the gift of the young folks, and fifteen dollars, that of the older people attending the services of a mission in the city of Montreal, have been forwarded by a friend of the old days; £2 by a lady in the Bombay Presidency of India; £13 2s. 6d. by a number of missionaries whilst in conference on the West Coast of Africa; 40s. by a helper in New Zealand; £2 15s., being the Sunday morning offerings of the children resident in a home in India; £13 2s. 1d. by the worshippers at a union service in Hankow, China; £19, the proceeds of a jumble sale in Hong Kong;

and £63 17s. 7d. by a gentleman in London, from a society in Canton. This money is "to be used for the benefit of the children of disabled Scottish soldiers." The sender adds, "The society gives no explicit direction as to the disposal of the money, but I venture to think no worthier centre than your Homes can be found for focusing the charitable gifts of Scotsmen in China."

Among the other items on the February donation list are, £5, part of the balance from a girls' club; 6s. 6d., from Clachan, Kintyre; 5s. from a junior branch of the Y.W.C.A. in Aberdeenshire; £5, accompanied by the words, "Teach us, Lord, how much we owe"; 5s. "for the orphans from two little boys' and a girl's bank in Spain"; £2, "in memory of a little one"; two guineas from a friend in Bushey, Hertfordshire; 8s., "just a small offering from an old working country joiner for the children"; £5 from a helper across the hills from us in Glengarnock; £20 for the Homes, with £5 each for the Sanatoria and the Colony, from a friend who often worships in the church; £10 from a firm we deal with constantly; £14 15s. from readers of *The Christian*; £1 "in memory of daddy's birthday"; £5 from an old friend in Cambuslang; a deposit receipt for £20, with two parcels of clothing, from Helensburgh; £1 from a helper in the village; 30s., from a faithful donor in Arbroath; £1 from one in Orkney; 2s. 6d. "for your Homes with love and prayer", with the added request, "Pray for me"; five guineas, the proceeds of a concert held under the auspices of a Galloway Band of Hope; £1 for the Sanatoria from a Bute Women's Guild; and 10s. from Galashiels from the mother of boys helped.

With a cheque for four pounds comes the following letter with good news of one of our grown-up boys:—

We were cheered on reading the Narrative of Facts sent us, to praise the Lord for His care and needs supplied you through another year. We had a call from Alexander — who was sent to Bridge-of-Weir quite a baby. He is such a nice lad and on the Lord's side. To see him cheered my heart and encouraged me to pray more earnestly for the large family under your care.

A friend in Fife writes, "Enclosed find 10s. order my little girl found on the sands last summer. She gave it into the police office and there has been no applicant for it, so she has got it back for herself and she has a great pleasure in sending it on to you to help your orphan children." Two pounds has come as an acknowledgment of the care bestowed upon a little chap recently handed over to a relative who tells us, "John arrived home safely. We are pleased to see him looking so well. Enclosed you will find a small donation. Thanking you once more for all the kindness rendered to John."

Accommodation from Glasgow having been reserved for a party of fifty of our boys on the Anchor-Donaldson steamer *Cassandra*, billed to sail on 10th March, this month has been busy with preparations, and the whole village is in a turmoil of excitement. To begin with, selection of the first draft containing considerably over a hundred names of eager candidates for emigration has to be made. This is followed by a careful process of elimination by medical, dental, and other examinations until the list has been reduced almost to the required number. Then relations, interested friends, and responsible authorities have to be notified regarding the proposed arrangements, so that they may have

opportunity to visit the children before their departure and discuss the conditions under which they will be placed in Canadian homes with someone who has a thorough knowledge of that branch of the work. Finally the party must be inspected, and each member of it personally interviewed by an agent of the Canadian Government.

MARCH, 1921.—During the first few days of this month interest has centred on outfitting the Canadian party, packing their boxes, and completing the numerous preparations necessary for such an exodus. As is usual on such occasions, the feelings of all present at the valedictory meeting in the church on Wednesday evening, 9th inst., were somewhat mixed between hopeful joy and the sadness of farewell. For those who go forth, novelty of the long journey and anticipation of all the future in a new land holds for them, keep under the memories of bygone years and the heartbreak of parting with old friends. That will come at a later

date with the final separation from their companions, when amid things and people new and strange, we pray they may realise the friendship of Him who hath said, "I will never leave thee." Wise words of counsel are spoken; our favourite parting exhortation sung in the hymn, "Take the name of Jesus with you"; and each commended to the care and guidance of our Heavenly Father.

Owing to postponement of the sailing, it was Saturday morning, 12th inst., ere the 1921 Canadian Party, comprising forty-six boys and four girls embarked on board the *Cassandra* at Princes Dock, Glasgow. After a lapse of several years we were glad of the opportunity to convoy them as far as Greenock, where we bade God-speed to Mr. William Douglas and his precious charge, and watched the vessel disappear in the mist on its way out to sea with these children of so many prayers.

In a note enclosing a pound for the work, a lady in Saltcoats tells of

the recent loss of her husband and how many years ago he was a fellow passenger with Mr. and Mrs. Quarrier and a party of children on a trip to Canada. From a man in Ontario, who signs himself "Lovingly one of your boys," ten dollars have come in the following letter:—

No doubt you are thinking I have forgotten you and the Homes, but such is not the case—just merely a little neglect. We have had a very trying year. Our oldest girl who had been ailing for almost three years went home to be with Jesus in August. I am pleased to note in looking through the report of the Homes that God has abundantly supplied the needs of the orphans, and I am sure if we keep faith in Him He always will. I must tell you we have a Scotch Baptist minister at our church, and while I sit and listen to him preach on the Sabbath day I am carried back in fancy to Bridge-of-Weir, listening to your dear departed father. While I don't write very often my mind turns back quite often to the scenes of my childhood and my heart breathes a silent prayer that each boy and girl will thank God for the love and care bestowed upon them in the Orphan Homes of Scotland. Enclosed find ten dollars as a token of remembrance. Wishing you and all connected with the Homes a prosperous year.

Twenty-three dollars has been collected amongst Scotch girls and friends in Morristown, New Jersey. The lady who used to forward the gift of these friends has moved to Albany, New York, but has not forgotten the work, for about the same time we have received her personal cheque for fifty shillings "to help your work among the orphans." Members of a Sunday school in Galashiels have sent 15s.; boys in an Eastern county Bible class their increased contribution of £3; an Ayrshire branch of the Scotch Girls' Friendly Society, 16s. 8d.; a friend in Hawick, £2, "in loving remembrance"; someone in Arbroath, 10s., part proceeds of work done; an Australian doctor, £5; one of our workers, 10s. for the Sanatoria; two ladies in Greenock, £5, with £5 more in memory of their brother; readers of the *Life of Faith*, £11 19s. 0d.; a helper in Sheffield, one guinea; a lady in Manchester, £5; one in Vancouver, £2; an old friend in the same city, 4s. 4d.; a lady in San Remo, Italy, £2; and another in Ashton-under-Lyne, 10s., the sender of whose gift writes, "I was telling a few friends in their home about my visit to the Orphan Homes at Bridge-of-Weir. They had never heard of the Homes. One of the friends gave me 10s. for the orphans. I was deeply impressed with all I saw during my visit. I do praise God for the wonderful way He led and blessed your father. What a marvellous testimony to answered prayer is your work! Everything seemed to say to me, 'Have faith in God.'"

Ten pounds, "simply a free-will offering from the Lord, a duty and a pleasure," has come from a doctor in Victoria, Australia; 20s. "from an anonymous well-wisher"; three guineas from a lady after her visit to a boy in whom she is interested; £10 from a Bathgate Women's Foreign Mission Association; 5s. 6d. from a friend in West Hartlepool; a cheque for one hundred pounds from another in Hampshire; 24s. from a Bible class in the neighbouring village; £15 from a friend in Blackheath; seven guineas from two others in Muswell Hill; 20s. "in loving memory" for the Sanatoria from Dunfermline; £69 from a club in Hankow, China; 10s., "a thankoffering from a well-wisher"; £102 from readers of *The Christian*; and £22 7s. 6d. from Strathblane and other friends. The lady who for many years sent the contribution having gone to her reward, her sister has stepped into the breach for this year, but in future the daughter will carry on her mother's good work.

We owe much to such friends as the donor of twenty pounds, who puts his expert knowledge at our disposal. Many friends by their useful gifts "in kind" have also saved us considerable expense in replenishing the stores with food and clothing. They are too numerous and their gifts too varied to detail here, but their help is none the less appreciated. Two legacies, amounting respectively to £250 and £1,321 5s. 0d., have materially assisted in meeting the heavy expenses of the current month. The cost of passages and railroad transportations for the Canadian party alone approaches seven hundred pounds, and the value of their outfits exceeds that sum considerably. At last there has come the glad news of their safe arrival at Fairknowe early in the morning of Saturday, 26th inst. Everyone is eagerly awaiting a detailed account of the journey, for the passage has apparently been a very rough one. A little gift is to hand from a girl already established in a Canadian home. She says, "It is not much to give to those who have done so much for me, but I hope to give more in the years to come." Another in this country, enclosing five pounds, writes, "This is just a short note thanking you for the New Year's Letter, to which I look forward with interest. I have now received the little money left me by my father, and have pleasure in sending you enclosed in the meantime. I have been to see my sister. She is getting on very well and hopes (D.V.) to go to Canada next spring."

APRIL, 1921.—To assist in supplying the needs of our big family this month, a Sunday school in Beaulieu has forwarded 7s. 6d.; another in Dublin, £1 7s. 6d.; and a third at Nethy Bridge, 10s., with 10s. more from the sender and his wife, making inquiry about a little chap recently admitted to the Homes from that locality. "It is not much in money, but there is a wealth of love and good wishes from the children along with it," is the encouraging message accompanying £3 from an Edinburgh Sunday school. From far away Brisbane, Australia, thirty-five shillings has travelled from another Sunday school. The letter in which it was enclosed reads thus, "We appreciate the labour of love of the dear children who set aside a little each Lord's day, and we are sure that the dear Lord will not let it pass unnoticed. Since last writing you, you will be pleased to hear that thirteen of the scholars have professed faith in Christ, and we are looking for greater blessing to come."

What a countless host of children the world over has shared in helping to maintain their brothers and sisters in the Orphan Homes. Many other Sunday schools, Christian Endeavour Societies, Bands of Hope, Bible classes, and various children's services have contributed to supply our needs besides those mentioned in these diary pages. One need only refer to the closely printed donation list at the end of the Narrative to realise just how many such organisations have made themselves our co-workers in this service for their brethren. We do rejoice with our friend in his "good news from a far country," which truly is "as cold waters to a thirsty soul." May his prayer have an abundant answer, and every gathering of young folks enjoy the same blessed experience in even fuller measure. A genuine, heaven-born revival of true religion is the restless world's greatest need to-day—the only permanent remedy for all its many ills. As we pray earnestly, "Lord send a revival," may grace be given to every Christian heart to add, "and let it begin in me."

Two new Australian helpers have sent £3 2s. 6d. saying, "We just heard about your Homes recently, so decided that from henceforth, with the Lord's help, we would fulfil our responsibility by doing our little bit to help you in your labour of love and work for Him. What a great work for eternity you are doing. Praying the dear Lord will abundantly bless you and supply all your needs in every way till He come." A letter signed by seven girls in Aberdeenshire has brought £1 17s. 0d., being money collected at a concert given by them with the help of their music teacher and some grown-up friends. Ten pounds was handed to us by a former worker in the City Home Mission when she called in the village recently, and from the same generous friend we had other five pounds later in the month. At the request of a farmer in Fife, an agent of the National Bank of Scotland has forwarded a draft for two hundred pounds.

During April payments in full or to account of five legacies, ranging in value from £14 8s. 8d. to £964 16s. 1d., have amounted to £1,362 1s. 0d. On the beloved Founder's principle that we should look only to God to supply our needs as they arise, we have never been in the habit of crediting legacies to a reserve account. Consequently this large sum is included with the ordinary income and will be used to pay the current month's accounts. Whatever balance we may have at any time is earning interest, else we would be liable to the same condemnation as the unprofitable servant who hid his pound in a napkin, but it is always available at call for immediate use if necessary.

Other gifts include £2 10s. from "Inasmuch"; £20 from a family in Elgin towards the support of a little girl in the "Dumbartonshire" Home; £3 from the members of a Lanarkshire Girls' Auxiliary; £1 10s. "In Memoriam" from Hampshire; £30 from a friend in the North of England who often sends a similar sum; £15 from a Glasgow tailor; 5s. from a junior Christian Endeavour Society; £1 from two helpers in Sheffield; 56 lbs. of sausages from a Lanarkshire butcher; 152 articles of clothing from the ladies of a church in Stewarton; £16 from an old personal friend; 5 dollars from a lady in Winnipeg; £4, "In loving memory of a dear husband"; 10s. from a missionary in Tunis; £40 from a city man of business; 8s. forwarded by a friend from two others in Western Canada; £3 from Lochfyne, "towards your Foreign Mission Fund, with the wish that the Lord may bless it for the furtherance of His work in the dark parts of the world"; 2s., "Just a little gift in remembering the past," from one of our girls in service in this country; and £10 from South Australia with the words, "May the Lord's blessing attend all the work and many children come to know Him as their Saviour and Friend," to which we fervently say "Amen."

MAY, 1921.—May God comfort the stricken mother who sends us an order for £5 3s. 11d. with the explanation, "Please accept the savings of my little boy who died as the result of an accident early this year. I have heard Mrs. — speak about your good work. I send P.O. for full amount as drawn from Savings Bank. We could not use it, but you do it for us in your good work." Eight pounds is the gift of a lady in Thurso; 10s. of a London donor; 30s. of another in Streatham; 2s. 6d. of someone in Perth; £50 of a chartered accountant in Glasgow; 15s. of a company of the Boys' Brigade; 5s. for the Colony of Mercy of a helper at Stepps;

£10 of another in Montreal; £5 for the Sanatoria of a couple in Giffnock; drafts for £13 and £2 5s. 3d. respectively of friends in New Jersey and British Columbia; and another draft for £17 of one of our grown-up girls in Canada. She is an earnest Christian and fills a good position in the civil service. After many years of unavoidable separation she is overjoyed to have her two brothers with her. It is only a few weeks since they left the old place here which had been their home since the younger was a baby. Here is part of her letter:—

Enclosed please find draft, for seventeen pounds, as a first small payment towards the boys' expenses. They are both here safe and sound, and I think they are happy. I am anyway, and I want to thank you for your kindness in managing to send them. God has indeed been very good to us, and I pray that He will continue to bless. S— started work here a week after he came. The only drawback is he has to be at work at seven, which necessitates his getting up at five-thirty, as his work is a good little distance away. However, he is quite happy about it, and seems to think it no trouble

at all. He is surely the happiest boy and keeps us laughing all the time. He seems never tired. D— started school before he was here a week, and I think perhaps too soon. It is near the end of the term and the others are far in advance of him. However, he will be starting in at the beginning of the form in September, and ought to feel all right then, as he will know more than the other lads. It is surely nice to have them here. They are very interesting, and I think they will get on all right. We are moving to a furnished flat. It will keep me busy morning and evening getting meals and lunches, but the boys are quite willing and eager to help. S— insists we do all our own laundry, so I said we would if they would do the washing, as I could do the ironing. Remember me to Mrs. Burges, and let me thank you both again for all you have done for my brothers. With love and gratitude.

"Honour the Lord with the first-fruits of all thine increase" are the words that accompany a gift of £1 from a friend in Orkney. Five pounds have been sent along by a teacher in the school; £10, the proceeds of a

concert, by the members of a Band of Hope; £15, for the Homes, with £1 for the Colony of Mercy by sympathisers in Largs; two guineas by a lady in Hertford who says, "It comes with prayer and may God bless it to you"; £2 by a missionary in China; £6 by a Massachusetts Sunday school; £5 by a Dundee Women's Guild; and 20s. by our familiar friend "Tweedside," who wishes thereby "to help some little one to have a holiday" and adds, "Even in these hard times we believe Psalm xxxiv. 9—'There is no want to them that fear Him.'"

Various Sabbath schools through the secretary of their Union have contributed £12 4s. 9d. The half-yearly grant of £150 from the Thomas Porter Equipment Fund has come to hand to help pay for outfits of boys and girls placed in situations; and £712 has been paid toward the cost of emigrating dependent children of sailors and soldiers who sailed with the last party to Canada. Among gifts remitted to the honorary treasurer is one of £100; a legacy of the same amount; and £50 from a trust fund. Exceptional gifts in kind during this month are 23 dozen fresh country eggs, most welcome to the patients in the hospital and other delicate ones in the village; 2 flanks of home-fed beef from a meat salesman in Glasgow; and 50 boxes of kippers from our old and faithful friend, "Fellowship."

JUNE, 1921.—On turning over again the letters from friends who have assisted in meeting this month's needs, the first to arrest our attention is from far-off Natal. The writer was a helper in the early days of the work, and she begins with a benediction, "May the blessing of the Most High be on you in these terrible days. I do hope you are getting coals. I am telling the Lord about you." Her gift of a guinea is "part of what I got in a present from Johannesburg." It has required most careful husbanding on the part of our "Mothers" to get through on the meagre ration of coal allowed, but the supply has always been available just when it was needed, and so far as we can learn our difficulties have been small comparatively. To all who, like our old friend in South Africa, intercede on our behalf we give thanks, and praise God that, throughout the trying years of war and the more trying after period, we have experienced the utmost consideration from authorities and been less seriously affected than the majority by food control and other necessary restrictions.

With eight pounds from Kilmacolm is the explanation, "I find that is the amount my husband subscribed last year, and I am anxious to continue subscribing to the Homes." Another friend has sent twenty pounds "in loving memory of mother," and an old lady in Clynder, whose daughter has just lost her husband, £1 "as a memorial instead of flowers." The largest gift of the month is also a memorial one and amounts to one thousand pounds. It is in memory of the donor's brother "who was an admirer and supporter of this institution," the donor's agent tells us. Other large sums to hand this month are two legacies of £100 and £604 11s. 7d., the former from Forres and the latter from Edinburgh. Yet, of the half-crown given by a dear old lady in Irvine, the Master, whose eye no gift escapes, however great or small, may say, "She hath cast in more than they all." "It is part of the first week of my old age pension," she writes. "I got it last week. I only got 6s., but I thought I would like to share it."

In a letter enclosing £1 for the work, an old friend and faithful servant of the Lord remarks, "I should think of others, for others think of me." A note from Tunbridge Wells with £5 enclosed reads, "I sent you our annual subscription in January, but we are sure funds must be much needed in these times of trouble and distress." Twice there has come during this month, from a frequent anonymous helper in Bishopbriggs, an envelope containing 10s. With £1 for the Homes from a lady in Edinburgh there is also 10s. for the Colony of Mercy; and a like sum from one who, for many years, while she was able, was a mother to a boy lately admitted to the Homes. She writes, "I will send as often as I am able with a heart full of gratitude to God for the way He has opened up for my boy to be cared for and trained. May God bless the means used for his upbringing and that he may be led to give himself early to his Saviour and used for

God's glory in after years, perhaps among his own people, leading many to Christ."

Three children who had been in the Homes for some time have recently been handed back to their mother who has married again and made a new home for them. Her husband says,

My wife and boys arrived home all right, and it is with heartfelt thanks I write to you of the great debt of gratitude we all owe to you for your great Christian work to suffering humanity. Dear benefactor, when opportunity more favourable than at present arrives may we faithfully recognise what you have done for us. Children shall arise and call thee blessed. May God bless you in your noble work is our fervent prayer, from your humble and thankful debtor.

Other tokens of gratitude have been received, £2 5s. from a girl in

domestic service not many miles distant, "remembering what was done for me in the Homes I can never forget"; £1 from one of the boys; and other 20s. from another of the girls. One fourth of a one hundred pound cheque has been earmarked by the donor "specially for sailors' and soldiers' orphans," the remaining £75 to be devoted, as the needs may dictate, either for the general fund or to help with emigration expenses. "Please put in the donation book 'Anon. 1 Chron. xxix. 14,' " is the further request and the passage referred to reads thus, "But who am I, and what is my people, that we should be able to offer so willingly after this sort? For all things come of Thee, and of Thine own have we given Thee." Again the donors of one of the boys' Homes have sent on their half-yearly remittance of £80 for the Homes and £20 for the Sanatoria, remarking, "Your large family will be much enjoying the sunshine." Yes, indeed they are, and with the closing of school for the long summer vacation of eight weeks on the last day of the month, all are eagerly anticipating the bright days in the big playfield at home or during their fortnight by the seaside.

JULY, 1921.—Reversing the order of twelve months ago the boys of the village are to have their holidays first this year, so this is their month. On its first day about two hundred and thirty of them with their "fathers" and "mothers" started for the seaside. After a fortnight of glorious weather, they returned home bronzed and happy to make room for as many more. What recollections they will have of these delightful days spent right on the shore at one of the prettiest spots on our beautiful Firth of Clyde. Boating, fishing, swimming, and building sand-castles; racing, rambling, and shopping; football, cricket, tennis, and all sorts of games and pastimes succeeded each other with never flagging interest. On rare occasions when a shower of rain drove them indoors, sing-songs kept them cheery. New potatoes, vegetables and fresh fruit grown on the spot in our own garden were special features on an already augmented bill of fare. During the first days they were hard put to for water owing to the phenomenal drought, and for gas on account of the miners' strike, but everyone tried to take his troubles cheerily, and ere long there came an end of them. Indeed, it was no sorrow to those possessed of a real boy nature that economy of water extended even to the washing of faces. The one drawback at Torr Aluinn and Hoop House is the water supply, which is quite inadequate to the needs of a family so large as ours. We have gone into the cost of connecting up with the Dunoon supply, but resolved to wait till prices became less prohibitive.

A girl in a North Berwick Sunday school writes, "It was the desire of our teacher that we should collect this money and send it to you to help to take fourteen or fifteen children to the seaside home. Our class consists of ten girls. The amount I send is 42s. 6d., which I hope you will receive all right." From some older girls employed in a factory of a border town we have also £3 12s. which the sender says "will fill up a corner for the little ones summer holidays." Three pounds ten shillings, the gift of a worker, is for the same purpose; 5s. 7d. from a frequent donor in the "hope that the bairns will have a good holiday wherever they go"; and 20s. "to general or holiday fund" from another frequent helper in St. Andrews.

Another young helper has realised ten shillings from the sale of lavender bags and forwarded the proceeds per a very old friend of the work in Airdrie. Seven pounds is "from the Kinross friends"; £1, "of Thine own"; 20s., "in memory of my beloved mother," together with 2s. from a friend of the donor's in Belfast; £2 for the Sanatoria from Oban "in loving memory"; £2 "from the children at — in loving memory"; 10s. from London, "in remembrance of a little daughter"; and £1 from Mount Vernon "in loving memory of my dear husband." To those and all others of our helpers who mourn the loss of loved ones we extend our

sympathy, and if it be that some have asked, "Can He be touched by the griefs I bear?" let us reply in all tenderness with the words, whose truth we have so often proved,

He knows, He loves, He cares,
Nothing this truth can dim,
He gives the very best to those
Who leave the choice to Him.

A Jedburgh friend forwards £6 3s. 6d. "being the proceeds of a garden party held by my little girl and a few of her friends"; another, 10s. for the Colony of Mercy; a friend in Paisley, £100, promising to continue his donation annually; a Glasgow firm, who frequently help with gifts "in kind," £50 each for the Homes and the Sanatoria, with £20 for the Colony of Mercy; and the honorary treasurer, £522 16s. 6d., being the amount of a legacy paid to him on behalf of the Homes.

On the 29th inst the second parties of boys returned from the coast, and the first large contingent of girls went off in high glee to spend their

holidays at Torr Aluinn and Hoop House, Dunoon, whilst the remainder of the boys will be provided for at our first seaside home, Benthead at Ardnadam on the Holy Loch. This month, too, the lads from the City Home have greatly enjoyed and benefited by their happy sojourn at Gullane, East Lothian. They are indebted to one friend for most comfortable camping quarters and to several others for welcome additions to their fare and various other treats.

AUGUST, 1921.—A very faithful donor's letter reminds us of a prophecy of which we are very fond—"The streets of the city shall be full of boys and girls playing in the streets thereof." What a happy picture of that blessed place of which we know so little definitely in detail. Does it not suggest that for each of us there will be occupation congenial, with neither the ennui of idleness nor the weariness of work? Without fear of error, may we not visualise the Master, who is the source and centre of all things yonder, in the midst again of that merry throng of boys and girls as in the days of His flesh when He took the little children in His arms and blessed them? A new donor sending 10s. says, "I have been reading the 'Narrative of Facts' sent to me by a friend and supporter of the Homes, and these words came to me, 'That which they have need of let it be given them day by day without fail.'" The half of a fellow-worker's donation is to be used for emigration expenses. The note accompanying it reads, "I lent a few pounds some time ago to a friend, and had thought I might not get it back, but it came to hand yesterday, and I am giving the first pound to the Lord's work."

To help supply the needs of our family this month we have received £1 from Belfast; £2 for the Homes, together with £2 for the Colony of Mercy from Lanark; 10s. also for the Colony from Dumbarton, "In memory of my deceased sister who was a regular contributor"; £5 from London in memory of the donor's wife who "was deeply interested in the work"; £5 more from a friend in Lanark along with £10 from her mother; 5s. from the aunt of a boy in the Homes; 10s. from a grateful girl; £1 from another; and £10 from Dunbar, having been forwarded by his sister at the request of one of our Canadian boys. Other gifts from beyond our shores include £1 from Oregon, U.S.A.; 20s. from Otago, New Zealand; £25 from Washington, D.C.; £10 forwarded by someone in Troon from a lady in Hong Kong; £5 from India; 6 dollars from Winnipeg; 10 dollars from Saskatoon; and 35 dollars from Alberta enclosed in the following letter:—

Enclosed please find money order value 35 dollars. Twenty-five of this is for the work of your Homes, and ten for you to forward when you are sending to Pandita Ramabai in India. This is a share of money just realised on a little property—long ago promised the Lord half the proceeds. It has come to us at a time of need, as my husband has been ill for fourteen weeks and is not likely to work for some time yet. We would greatly value your prayers on his behalf. The devil has been trying to stop me giving this money to the Lord, but we just want to testify to His saving and keeping power in this time of trial, for we have found Him a blessed Keeper and Provider.

The trial of their faith, "being much more precious than of gold that perisheth" will be "found unto praise and honour and glory at the appearing of Jesus Christ." Reward will not long be wanting to these friends, and, it may be, their experience here told will strengthen the faith of some reader in like circumstances. Among larger sums to hand this

month are £20 from two Lesmahagow friends; £50 from one in Kilmacolm; £100 from a Glasgow business man; £25 from other two Kilmacolm friends; a legacy of £250; another amounting to £57 6s. 0d.; and a regular contribution of £70 from the trustees of a friend who built one of the boys' Homes in the village. "Inasmuch," the sender of ten shillings, says, "Please accept this small gift from two whose hearts God has touched to help the good work carried on at the Orphan Homes." Other ten shillings from a visiting worshipper in the church on a recent Sunday brings this news of blessing received. "It was communion Sabbath, and Sir Samuel's message to the children and the minister's to the communicants did us good." A lady on holiday in the Island of Arran writes, "We are enjoying a happy holiday here, which makes me feel I would like to send you something to help with your little folks' holiday, so please accept this £2 with best wishes for a happy time for some little one. I have seen some of your boys down here and they seem happy and well, particularly A—. He has grown a fine sturdy lad, much improved from when we saw him two years ago."

With the return of the last parties from the coast on Friday, 26th inst., the children's holidays are once more at an end, and we are grateful to God that they are all home safe and well. Could the kind friends, whose hearts have been touched to provide this great treat, see our boys and girls as they return to school on Monday morning, they would read in their radiantly happy faces the thanks they might not be able to express in words.

SEPTEMBER, 1921.—One guinea from a Glasgow friend is "a payment received for a service rendered outside my regular business"; 30s., money that could not be spent on a motor drive on account of bad weather and was then vowed to the Lord's work; 10 dollars from one of our old girls now married in Montreal; £30, the first she has been able to give, from a grateful relative of a family who have been under our care for several years; £2 from a retired worker; £100 from "Teach us, Lord, how much we owe" who is "again honoured in having the privilege of sending on the enclosed cheque"; 15s. from a Glasgow mission Sunday school "in remembrance of our visit to the Homes"; 5s. from a grateful girl; £2 from New South Wales; 10s. from Durban; 4s. 6d. from Birmingham; 5s. from another grateful girl; £5 left at the Elise Hospital by a friend; and 10s. after a recent visit from a worker of the old days. In her letter she says, "I remember at one of the weekly prayer meetings, which in those days were held on Friday evening in the reception room at the Central Building, your late dear father used the words, 'God can bury His servant, but will carry on the work.'"

A dear old personal friend has also been recalling the memories of days gone by. The note accompanying her gift is as follows:—

You have been much in my mind since I wrote, and not only your excitement of this week memorialising a jubilee but the beginning of that jubilee and my interest in and connection with its commencement. In a wakeful spell I was living again in the atmosphere and interests of 50 years ago, and remembered that I was among the early donors when your dear father found that a £10 note would save a child. A boy was put down to my credit, and then I began collecting for a girl, and had got nearly the half when an Irvine aunt came to see me, made up the amount, and went with me to the Home in Renfield Street to choose the wee girl. I would be glad to repeat the donating and collecting, but I cannot. I felt, however, that I must gratify myself by sending something counting 10, and feeling sure that the Great Receiver would accord it due value, and that you would accept it lovingly.

In these days all our memories have been busy with the past, especially as the beloved Founder's birthday, chosen for the celebration of our Jubilee, approached. The number of memorial birthday gifts usually received at this season from fellow-workers and other friends, who knew Mr. Quarrier personally, has been greatly increased this year. In response to invitations to attend the Thanksgiving and Memorial Service, many friends have written their congratulations, and when unable to accept, have forwarded contributions towards defraying the expenses. We have been reading again the beloved Founder's own report of the *first* Thanksgiving Day—

The morning of September 17th—the day of opening—was one of the stormiest of the season, so stormy that a good deal of damage was done to the roof of Central Building. Unbelief was busy; but what was our surprise when the special train arrived about one o'clock bringing with it hundreds to bid us God speed, and when the dedication meeting assembled at two o'clock every part of the hall was filled, and numbers could not get in. We were entirely overcome by a sense of God's goodness in the practical sympathy expressed by so many friends coming at so much inconvenience to themselves.

No words of ours can better express our feelings on the occasion of the Jubilee of the Orphan Homes of Scotland, for the weather on 29th inst. was quite in contrast to the very fine spell of sunny days preceding it, and every corner of the great church was filled with our own family and the majority of the 1,500 visitors who had come to share our thanksgiving and rejoicing in person. Still true, but in far, far deeper and fuller measure, are the further words of the beloved Founder which also appeared in the 1878 Narrative, "That God has chosen the least of His children to do this work, we are truly sensible,

and to Him is all the glory due. As well might the instrument used by the mechanic glory in the work done as that we should glory in what the Lord has permitted us to do. 'God forbid that we should glory, save in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ.'"

We are grateful to the Press for their excellent pictures and sympathetic reports of the Jubilee celebration. The following extract from *The Glasgow Herald* of 30th inst., is printed as a permanent record and for the information of friends who may not have seen a report of the day's proceedings elsewhere:—

At Bridge-of-Weir yesterday afternoon the Jubilee of the Orphan Homes of Scotland, founded by the late William Quarrier, was celebrated. Among those present were Sir Joseph and Lady Maclay, Rev. J. E. Houston, and the Rev. C. J. T. Merrylees. The proceedings began with a thanksgiving service in the church, over which Sir Samuel Chisholm presided, which was attended by all the children and by visitors from all parts of Scotland. After the opening psalm and prayer, Sir Samuel said that they were present to keep in memory the holy, active, and benevolent life of the late William Quarrier, on the anniversary of whose birthday they met. No monument had been erected to him, but they had only to look around to see his great achievement in the happy village with its great church—a village which, although complete in every other way, had neither public-house nor police station. All over the world were to be found happy, prosperous homes which had been built up by those whose early lives had been spent at the Orphan Homes. These were the result of the tradition established by William Quarrier, whose great desire was to make his children healthy, happy, and prosperous, and who knew that the only sure foundation was to make them good.

Pastor Findlay, in his address, described the early days and outlook of his old friend, telling how, in spite of the fact that William Quarrier spent many of the earlier days of his life in one of the foulest parts of Glasgow, he remained clean in heart and mind. The idea of establishing Orphan Homes came to him very early, and he worked always for its achievement. When he had made progress and was in business on his own account his ambition was to make enough money to build the Homes himself. This he did not achieve, but the work was done by other means. Right down to the present day the Homes have been carried on in the way laid down by their founder—no collectors, no public appeals, no advertisement, no debts. The work—the village with its many buildings—was the greatest sermon in the world—a sermon on the text, "Them that honour Me I will honour."

After a solo, "The Lord is my light," by Mrs. Morton, and a hymn by a choir of the children, the Rev. Donald Fraser, a missionary from Central Africa, addressed the meeting, describing the Orphan Homes as one of the greatest missionary centres, having as its object the evangelisation of the whole earth. The service closed with the singing of the hymn, "For all the saints," and the Doxology and the pronouncing of the Benediction.

Immediately after the service the three daughters of the late Mr. Quarrier—Miss Quarrier, Mrs. A. Q. Burges, and Mrs. D. J. Findlay—each planted a copper beech tree near the Central Building in commemoration of the Jubilee. The incident came as a surprise to the three ladies, but they accomplished the task with ease, having Sir Joseph Maclay as an adviser. Miss Quarrier took this occasion to thank the visitors for their presence and interest; Mrs. Burges expressed the hope that many of those present would live to be present at the Jubilee of the trees planted.

During the afternoon all the Homes in the village and the Consumption Sanatoria and the Colony of Mercy for Epileptics were thrown open for the inspection of visitors. Refreshments were provided. The children of the school gave an exhibition of drill to music.

In the evening the turn of the children came, when they gathered for a concert in the church. At this meeting Sir Joseph Maclay presided. The programme consisted of songs, choral pieces, and recitations by the children.

At the close of the gathering Sir Joseph Maclay reminded the boys and girls of some of those who had worked in the Homes and are now gone, and in particular of the many boys of the village who fell in the war. He recalled that, in his first annual report, Mr. Quarrier told how he had been present at a meeting where the hymn "There is a happy land, far, far, away" was sung, and said that he wished it not quite so remote. His endeavour had been to bring that happy land nearer, and in the Homes they could see how he had succeeded.

At the close of the meeting as each child passed out of the church, sweets, the gift of a friend, were distributed, and they marched off to the playing field, where they watched the display of fireworks, which brought the programme of the day to an end.

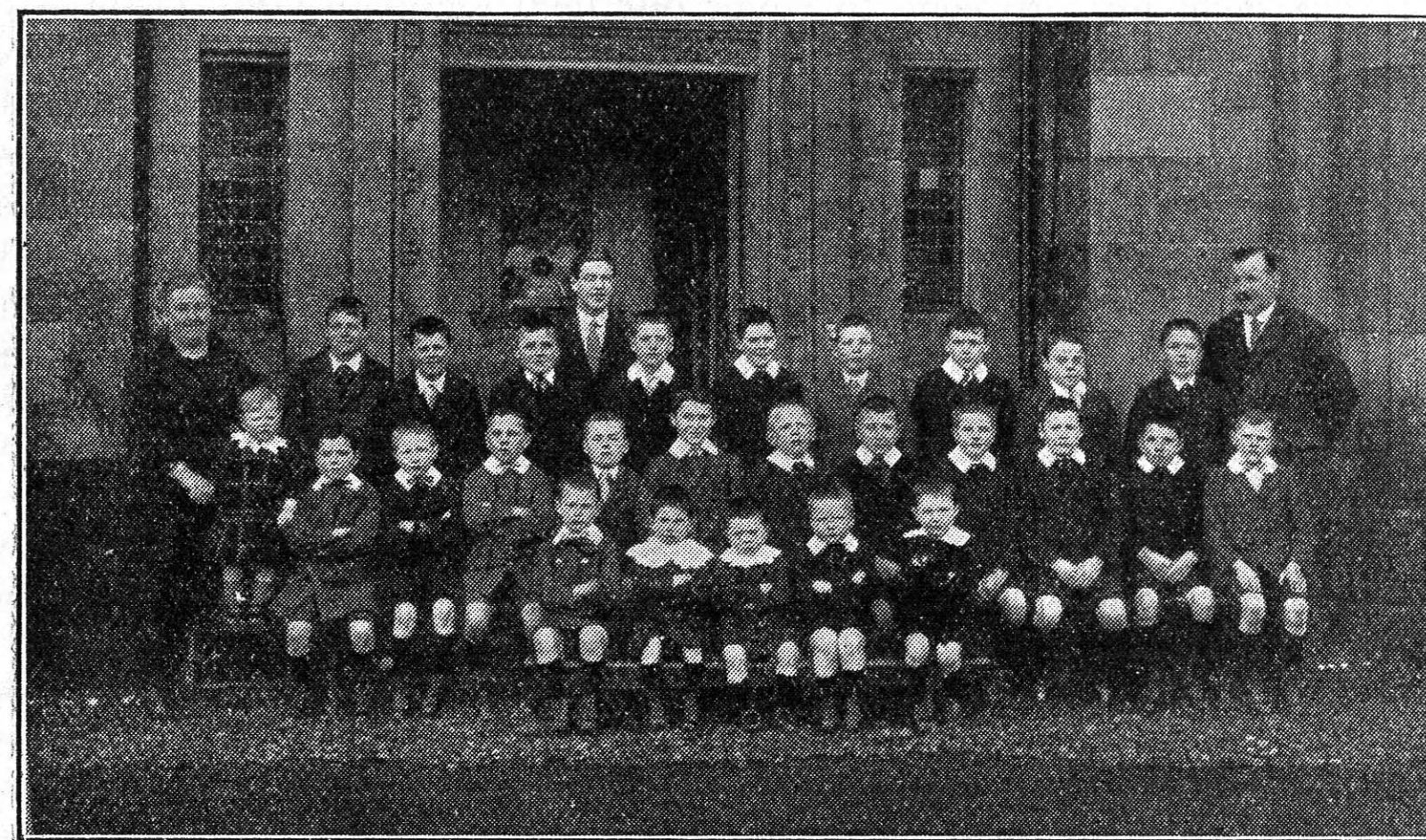
OCTOBER, 1921.—Three letters to hand on the first of the month are typical in spirit of many others. In the first, containing £5 towards the expenses of Thanksgiving Day, the writer says, "I regret that I was not able to get away in time to be with you. I am sure you would have very successful and memorable services. Fifty years is a long time to look back; but what a record of progress, and what an ever-extending influence for good all the work has been. It seems to me all those who have gone on before, and who were so interested in your father's great enterprise, will rejoice with you all to-day." From a county neighbour not many miles distant a cheque for £500 was enclosed in the second letter, which reads, "Yesterday was a memorable day for you all. I had hoped to be present at the Thanksgiving Service, but in the end had to change my plans. I was with you in spirit, at any rate, and know what the anniversary must mean for you. Your hearts must have been full of pride and thankfulness. I have just been reading the most interesting account of the day's proceedings. Please accept, with the enclosed, my very hearty congratulations and sympathetic good wishes." The third letter referred to brought six shillings from a bright Christian girl, one of our grown-up bairns. She writes, "I suppose you will have had a very busy day. Thanksgiving Day at Bridge-of-Weir will always be fresh in my memory. It was a day long looked forward to. I have enclosed a small gift which I wish could have been four times as much, but I know you will understand that it is given very gratefully. I will never be able to repay you for what has been done for us all at Bridge-of-Weir. Monday is a holiday here, so I was thinking of giving you all a visit. Remember me to all the old friends."

One of the old girls who was able to be with us on Thanksgiving Day has given 10s.; another visiting from Canada, 10s. more; a Cambuslang teacher, "Prayers plus £3"; a helper in Dundee, £2, "part of thank-offering for restoration of health"; an army officer in Fife, £25 each for the Homes and the Sanatoria; "George's sisters," £10 towards the support of "our orphan"; a friend in Birkenhead, 10s.; "with our prayerful sympathy"; another of our old girls of the days of long ago, £2; a Toronto Scotsman, 15 dollars; the writer of *The British Weekly's* account of our Jubilee celebrations, 3s. from "one of my members out of his poverty"; the employees of a Clyde shipbuilding establishment, £50, an increased donation from their Infirmary Fund; and a lady in New Zealand, £5.

The younger of two of our girls has just gone to serve in the same house as her sister. Their mistress, enclosing £5 for the work, writes appreciatively, "Both of them seem so happy to be together. They are nice girls, and—in time will be as useful a girl as her sister has proved herself to be, I am sure." Two pounds has been passed on to us from a bereaved mother, who tells that her daughter "had the money saved up for her holidays, and as she was not spared to use it, I know she would have wished it to be sent on to the Homes. It will assist to give some of your children a holiday. She spoke often of the Homes." The donor of £2 from Helensburgh says, "I remember the sewing meetings in James

Morrison Street." "Praying daily for God's blessing on the work," another friend has forwarded 5s. in postage stamps from Somerset. A guinea has come in a cheery letter from a farmer in Swift Current, Saskatchewan; and £1 2s. 6d. proceeds of a sale held by three little girls.

"We have still the opportunity to pray, and we shall continue to remember you all at the throne of grace" is the message of Edinburgh friends regretting that circumstances compel them to contribute less frequently to the work than formerly. From the income of a bequest fund the trustees have paid us £75. Other three legacies in order of receipt have amounted respectively to £2,000, £10, and £518 15s. 11d. Among the month's gifts in kind is a parcel of socks, scarves, mitts, and gloves, knitted in her spare time during the past year by a lady in Penzance, who writes, "It's such a joy to me to do even a trifle for 'Quarrier's,' yet I never saw the place, cannot even say what impels me to keep on doing what I can for it. God's prompting, most likely."

For the young folks the end of another financial year has been marked as usual by the old-time Hallowe'en festivities. Stormy weather postponed the picturesque lantern procession, but could not detract from the joy of parties, guising, and cinematograph.

Thus we find ourselves closing the Jubilee chapter in the annals of the Orphan Homes, but the story is not complete, for we believe, it will go on as during the past fifty years so long as the need for such work continues. In these diary pages, only the limits of space have prevented us giving more than a few samples of the constant encouragement that has come with the daily needs to strengthen our faith. If perusal of the Narrative prove as great a blessing as its compilation, the task—a privilege indeed—will not have been in vain. May this continued testimony to God's never-failing Providence be blessed as never before. "Not unto us, O Lord, not unto us, but unto Thy name give glory. But we will bless the Lord from this time forth and for evermore. Praise the Lord."

EMIGRATION WORK.

I BEG to present herewith our Annual Report on the work at Fairknowe.

In the first place it is fitting that we record our thanks to Almighty God for His great goodness. Guidance and strength for the task of each day have been assured, and we have been blessed by answer to prayers, both our own and those of friends who, we know, are keeping us before the throne of grace.

Our task, in these days, is not so onerous as at one time, but the multitude of little duties in connection with the supervision of the children on our lists, keeps our hands from being idle. In spite of the Canadian labour situation, which in many respects is critical, we have no trouble in placing our boys and girls. Girls are ever in great demand, and we are sorry that a party of girls could not have been sent this year. The fifty children sent to us in March were gladly received, and, on the whole, have made themselves useful and worthy of praise, which has been freely given.

It has been my privilege to cover our field again in connection with the annual visitation of the children in their homes. In this way we have come into personal touch with many of our boys and girls, which would not have been possible otherwise. It was a source of satisfaction and joy to find how, under Divine help, we have been able to select homes so remarkably suited to the individual needs of these young adventurers. This visitation and the continuous flow of correspondence reveal that, in point of conduct and progress, our large family has maintained its high record. These young people, and those who have come before them in years gone by, can claim to be making a real contribution to the land of their adoption.

In other years, reference has been made to the remarkable savings of our wards. It is sufficient to say that this year, in spite of the tendency to wage reductions, has been no exception to the rule. One boy of sixteen years has saved \$90.00 during his first six months in Canada. An unusually large number have attained their majority this year and therefore have claimed their savings of the years between their 14th and 18th birthdays. Many had to their credit between \$200.00 and \$500.00.

Most of our children are now beyond school age. Those who are at school, and others who are pressing on with their education, are maintaining their record. Several are in High School; one of the 1915 boys reports that he is studying in college, intending to become a minister.

It is not intended that it should be thought our life is all sunshine or that our boys and girls are all saints. The many weaknesses which "all flesh is heir to" appear frequently and sometimes cause depression in us. Yet these are but phases in the development of the manhood and the womanhood which we have as the ideal and of which we can proudly point to so many examples. Yes, we have apparent failures, but those who succeed so far outnumber the failures that we thank God that we have a little part in this great work.

Fairknowe has lost a real friend in the passing of Mr. John M. Gill, who has served as our honorary auditor. We deem it fitting that we should express hereby our feeling of loss and gratitude for having known this noble character. He was indeed one of God's noblemen.

HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS FUND.

IN addition to the great and inspiring services which are held every Lord's day in the church at the Homes, there is a mid-week service every Wednesday evening. This is specially for the children and as many of the workers as can attend. Frequently missionaries at home on furlough come to speak to the children, often illustrating their addresses by photographs of people and places, shown through the electric lantern. By this and various other means the missionary education of our young folks is carried on, so that there are probably few children in the land who have better opportunities of getting acquainted with what goes on in the different mission fields of the world. In the past year, representatives from China, various parts of India, and many fields in Africa and South America have given us vivid pictures of the conditions in which they live and serve God.

As always, the weekly offerings at the church were devoted to Home and Foreign Mission objects outside our own borders. The collections for the year exceeded £400, and with other specially earmarked gifts sent in, totalled over £1,400. On a recent Wednesday evening some account was given to the children regarding the thirty-six missions they are accustomed to support, and then they were asked to "vote" on the distribution of their gifts. This is each year an occasion of special interest to the young folks, and gives them some sense of stewardship, and of the meaning and responsibility of Christian giving.

And now the gifts are speeding on their way to many lonely missionaries in almost every mission field in the world, including even out-of-the-way places like the New Hebrides and Solomon Islands. All the missions and individual missionaries to which we contribute are of those who stand four square for the whole Bible as the Word of God, and have no sympathy with that destructive criticism which is such a blight in the homelands, and is, alas, also doing its desolating work in some of the mission fields.

Our own missionaries—Mr. and Mrs. Cuthbert Nairn, Marraksh, Morocco; Mr. and Mrs. John Ritchie, Lima, Peru; and Mr. and Mrs. James Haldane, Pernambuco, Brazil, have been preserved in health throughout the year, and send interesting reports concerning the important work in which they are engaged.

That "the coming of the Lord draweth nigh" is a fact that no intelligent reader of the Bible can doubt, and with this great event so imminent, we feel that we must do all that we can at home and abroad to prepare for His appearing, that we may be like those who with girded loins and burning lamps are ready and waiting for their Lord. We ask an interest in the prayers of our prayer helpers who read these lines on behalf of ourselves, the children, and all the missionaries to whom we are privileged to minister.

THE year 1921 has been one of great activity in the Sanatoria. At no time has there been a vacant bed, except for the brief period necessary for the sterilisation of the rooms, etc., vacated by patients leaving the institution.

During the year 258 patients were treated and discharged. 125 of these were males, 133 were females. There were on the average 152 patients in residence each day.

The great majority of the patients suffered from Pulmonary Tuberculosis. Two suffered from Tuberculous Spines, two from Abdominal Tuberculosis, and two from Adenitis. Three had no tuberculous lesion; one of these was suffering from the effects of gassing during the late war; one from Lymphadenoma; and one from Anaemia. Six patients were only a few days in the institution—four men and two women.

Our patients are drawn from all over Scotland—from the Solway in the south to the Shetlands in the north. The majority, of course, have come from the most populous district of Scotland—the Clyde valley.

Many occupations have been represented amongst those admitted and discharged. As usual, indoor and sedentary workers have formed the bulk of the patients (see Table I.). On the male side, shipyard workers have predominated. On the female side, while domestic workers were in the majority, the number of hospital nurses and teachers among the patients is striking. It is interesting to note that in no instance was the hospital nurse engaged in Sanatorium work prior to the onset of the disease. So far from work in a Sanatorium predisposing to tuberculosis, the safest thing for anyone who dreads the disease is life and work in such a place.

The patients dealt with have, in the main, been young. 86.3 per cent. were below 40 years of age. Tuberculosis affects all ages. In its pulmonary form, as our figures show (see Table II.), it is most prevalent between 15 and 40. One-third of all deaths at that period are due to this disease. 25 patients were school children, 133 were single individuals, 85 were or had been married.

On admission to the Sanatorium, 12.3 per cent. were in the early stage of the disease; 45 per cent. the intermediate stage, and 42.4 per cent. the advanced stage.

The number of lobes of the lungs which were affected, as tabulated in Table III., is of interest.

It is unfortunate that in so many instances we get the disease at such a late stage. Only in 10.6 per cent. of the cases was it unilateral. In many the disease was hopelessly advanced before they came under our care. The cause for this partly lies undoubtedly with the patients. Tuberculosis is insidious often in its onset. The temptation to strive against its symptoms is great. The dread of the stigma of being a sanatorium patient and of being bored for a prolonged period, keeps many from consenting to seek expert advice, or on advice, from immediately entering a Sanatorium for treatment. To some degree medical men are at fault. Many wait before diagnosing the disease, not only till there is sputum, but till the sputum shows the presence of tubercle bacilli. Tuberculosis may progress widely, and yet be characterised by the absence of spit. It may be very active, and yet on repeated examination the sputum may be negative. It is better to treat a few in error and save a large number, than to wait till the disease is so obvious, that not only is the diagnosis unmistakable, but the prognosis is quite as certain. To wait till tubercle bacilli appear, very often means that one has waited till it is too late to help permanently.

It is often asked if sanatorium treatment does any good. A visit to the institution is a sufficient answer to that query. The well nourished, healthy looking, and apparently happy individuals living there contrast

strikingly, not only with the usual type of tuberculosis patients outside, but with the general body of visitors who turn up on visiting days. Sanatorium treatment in suitable cases, quickly arrests the characteristic symptoms of the disease—wasting, cachexia, dyspnoea, sweating, indigestion, cough and spit—and gives a general sense of well-being, an increase of weight, a ruddiness of the countenance, a sharpened appetite, and freedom from cough.

Fifty-six, or 25 per cent., of the patients had the disease apparently arrested. 118, or 48 per cent., were very definitely improved, 59 were not improved, and 10 patients died in the Sanatoria.

A better test of the condition of patients after treatment is to be found in their fitness for work. Practically all the patients on admission were unfit for work. In treating them we go along the lines of graduated exercise—beginning with a period in bed; later they are allowed up gradually, and afterwards they are prescribed walks varying in distance according to their progress. After they are able to walk six miles per day without any adverse symptoms showing themselves, they are put on to garden work or some other outdoor job for two hours, and later, four hours per day. On discharge, 130, or 53.4 per cent., of the patients reached that final stage, and showed themselves fit for fairly strenuous effort without any untoward results accruing.

The heredity factor in Tuberculosis is a debated point, upon which Sanatorium statistics throw not a little light. It is an interesting fact, reflected year after year, that a little over 50 per cent. of the cases dealt with do not give any indication of a family history of the disease—they are the first apparently to be so affected. This year 113, or 46.5 per cent., of the cases only, gave a history of the disease having occurred in some member of the family or a near relative previously. Tabulated these were as follows:—

There is little doubt that such figures do not indicate that those patients had naturally a low degree of immunity or resistance. They rather indicate that there was in those instances increased opportunities for massive infection with the tubercle bacillus, and as has been definitely proved, any person or any animal will fall a victim to the disease if only a sufficiently large dose of the organism be received at the time of the infection, or if the infection be frequently repeated.

The figures indicate not the necessity of segregating all who already are infected with Tuberculosis. (It would be easier to segregate those who have not already been infected.) They indicate the necessity of dealing with the advanced and hopeless type of case whose condition is such that they cannot work, and who daily expectorate, sometimes criminally indiscriminately, thousands of millions of disease-producing organisms. Such individuals, too ill even for Sanatoria, are allowed to live at home and move about freely among others, and are merely vital centres for the manufacture

and distribution of virulent organisms. From them the majority who eventually develop the disease receive infection. Hospitals, homes, colonies ought to be provided for their care and comfort.

Sir Robert Philip has described Tuberculosis as a vicious by-product of an incomplete and ill-formed civilisation. His description is correct. As it exists in our midst to-day, in probably at least fifty per cent. of the cases, it is the direct result of the neglect of a large and needy class—those who are down and out because of Tuberculosis.

It has been very encouraging to deal with cases of so-called surgical tuberculosis—tuberculosis of bones and joints, tuberculosis of the glands, and abdominal tuberculosis particularly. These have yielded even more readily to Sanatorium measures than the pulmonary form of the disease. The application of plaster splints to joint cases; the use of tuberculin locally and hypodermically; the utilization of X-rays and ultra-violet rays have all, in instances where they were indicated, been resorted to with excellent results.

Three courses of lectures and demonstrations have been given during the year to University students. These are given partly, by the kind permission of Professor Monro, in the Practice of Medicine Class Room at the University, partly at the Dispensary at the City Home, James Morrison Street, Glasgow, and partly at the Sanatoria. The Sanatoria section of the work has been very interesting and encouraging. The students spend at least three and a half hours each Saturday afternoon throughout the term at the Sanatoria. The patients are invariably quite pleased to allow themselves to be examined. The benefit likely to accrue to others by the knowledge thus imparted is undoubtedly of real value.

At the close of the year 159 patients were in residence—70 males and 89 females.

Great credit is due to Miss Taylor, the Matron, for her hearty co-operation in carrying on the work. She has shown real interest in everything that had to do with the welfare of the patients and the institution generally. Her staff have loyally followed her example, and done well. The year has therefore been characterized by the pleasantest of relationships and good feeling on the part of the patients and of the staff.

COLONY OF MERCY FOR EPILEPTICS.

EPILEPSY is a peculiar disease, if it can be called a disease. While easily recognised in typical cases by the sudden loss of motility and the cessation of consciousness associated with convulsions, which sometimes merely consist of slight localised twitching of the muscles, and at other times of generalised purposeless movements of great severity, it is not easily differentiated from hysteria, and other conditions of which it is merely a part of the syndrome.

Probably epilepsy is not in itself a disease, but a symptom; and like fever, it may be the symptom of many conditions—some toxic, others circulatory, and others irritative. That fact is indicated by the observation of large numbers of patients. No two cases are alike. While all

are extremely resistant to treatment, some yield to one measure and others to another. Many cannot be affected by any form of treatment. For example, in dealing with cases in the Colony, we have one or two who have yielded to silver nitrate and remained free from fits for years. Silver nitrate has proved of no use to many others, and even in minute doses, decidedly harmful to a few. We have also several cases which have yielded to the bromides and remained free from fits for years. There is for example, one young man at present who has been perfectly well for nearly three years, and is therefore due for discharge in a few weeks' time, thanks, we believe, to the bromides. In the majority of the cases, however, the bromides do not prove of any real service. Again we have several cases which have yielded to injections of tuberculin. One particularly has kept well for five years, another for two and a half years, and another for nearly two years. On the other hand, during the past year we have given tuberculin regularly to a hundred patients each week, but it has had no influence on the fits in any of those cases. Some cases are amenable to the iodides, to luminal, or to mercury. Others are not to any degree influenced by these drugs.

This complicated etiological feature of epilepsy, involving patient search and careful watching for the causative agent, makes Colony life of importance for epileptics. Nothing can be promised, unfortunately with it all, that is of the nature of a definite cure. During Colony life the cases, however, can be studied more fully and various therapeutic measures tried. Success, as indicated above, sometimes does follow. Unfortunately, as our experience at Bridge-of-Weir has shown, epilepsy is often an early indication of the presence of very serious mental derangement, of imbecility, mania, or dementia. Not a few who are sent to the Colony require, sooner or later, to be removed to a mental hospital, with its stricter discipline. Several others so affected are not bad enough to be removed, and remain with us. Although their fits may be arrested, they are derelicts and useless for the battle of life.

The Colony provides accommodation for 103 patients—50 men, 27 women, 18 boys, and 8 girls. While each is definitely under treatment, the patients live as far as circumstances permit, normal lives. They are at work from 8 a.m. till 4.30 p.m. If children, they attend school. They take long walks from time to time in the country in charge of a nurse or attendant. They indulge in outdoor sports, and they attend the church at services. It is found that if fully employed there is not only better health enjoyed physically, but the mental outlook is brighter and degeneration does not manifest itself so frequently or so early. Thirty-eight patients were discharged from the Colony, and thirty-nine admitted during the year.

There is always a large number of patients waiting to be admitted. We are still the only institution in Scotland exclusively for epilepsy, and the accommodation is hopelessly inadequate.

The work of the Colony is difficult and often very discouraging. There have been practically no changes in the staff of the institution during the year. Loyally, and with interest, they have faithfully carried on. To the Matron and the Nurses generally, much of the efficiency of the work is due.

SUMMARY OF THE YEAR'S WORK.

ORPHAN HOMES OF SCOTLAND, BRIDGE-OF-WEIR, AND CITY ORPHAN HOME, GLASGOW.—On 1st November, 1920, there were resident in the Homes 1,115 boys and girls. During the year 185 new cases were admitted, making a total of 1,300 dealt with.

These have been disposed of as follows :—Outfitted and sent to Canada, 51; domestic service, trades, and situations 51; deaths, 4; children under 5 years of age adopted, 3; returned to relatives now in a position to provide for them, 88; left to go to relatives, etc., 21; sent to other institutions, 8; leaving in the Homes on 31st October, 1921, 1,074; of whom 607 are boys and 467 girls.

From the above it will be seen that 105 boys and girls were provided with outfits, given a start in life, and placed in positions to make their own way. The older girls having been trained for domestic service, situations were found for them, and the older boys were apprenticed to trades, or sent to farms. Most of those returned to relatives were the children of soldiers, who, on being demobilised, were able to take charge of their families again. Amongst those returned to friends many were old enough to work, and where necessary, we helped with outfits, so that a large proportion of these might be added to the number of the permanently helped.

CONSUMPTION SANATORIA OF SCOTLAND.—The year began with 148 patients in residence. 269 were admitted, 248 discharged, and 10 died, leaving 159 in residence on 31st October, 1921.

COLONY OF MERCY FOR EPILEPTICS.—The year began with 102 colonists in residence; 39 men, women, and children were admitted; 38 were discharged; leaving 103 in residence on 31st October, 1921.

THE YEAR'S INCOME.

The amount received during the year is as follows :—For the General Fund, which includes the maintenance of the Homes at Bridge-of-Weir and the City Home, including £1,662 17s. 5d. earned by working boys, and sundry amounts as per Cash Statement, £42,562 14s. 5d.; for Consumption Sanatoria, £21,833 3s. 7d.; for the Colony of Mercy for Epileptics, £5,660 6s. 2d.; for Home and Foreign Missions Fund, £1,471 18s. 8d.; making the total amount for all purposes, £71,533 2s. 10d., besides large quantities of clothing, provisions, and other useful gifts.

For the work accomplished we are, under God, indebted to our devoted fellow-helpers in the various Homes, and to the practical generosity of friends throughout the country; to ministers, evangelists, and all who have aided in the Church services and other gatherings; to Sabbath School superintendents, teachers, and scholars; to ladies who have made up garments for our little ones; to the Press which has given notices of the work; to the members of the Medical Advisory Board, and the Doctors who have freely given their time and skill for the benefit of the sufferers in the Sanatoria and Hospitals; and to the accountants Messrs. M'Farlane, Hutton & Patrick, who very kindly act as Honorary Auditors.

IN CONCLUSION.

OUR "Year of Jubilee" has come and gone, and at its close we desire to record our thanksgiving to Almighty God—our Heavenly Father—for the unfailing faithfulness which—for fifty years—has never failed to provide for all the constantly increasing needs of His great family of orphans and other dependent ones at Bridge-of-Weir. What a wonder it has been to us and others, and yet, should it not be the normal experience of all believing people? As all heads of households know, the past year has been more difficult than even the war years were, yet we have lacked no good thing, and a sufficient supply has been sent in to pay all bills and enable us to begin our fifty-first year with credit balances on all accounts. Best of all, the Lord Himself has been in our midst throughout the year in spiritual grace and blessing.

So far as we can budget for the needs of the new year, these are likely to include :—

£50,000 for maintenance of Orphan Children in Glasgow and at Bridge-of-Weir.

£3,000 for Emigration and maintenance of the Canadian Home.

Gifts towards maintenance of Consumption Sanatoria.

Gifts towards maintenance of Colony of Mercy.

Christmas-Tree Gifts for each of our large family of boys and girls. Required early in December.

£2,000 for Home and Foreign Missions Fund.

Consecrated Christian men and women to fill vacancies as they occur for "fathers and mothers" in the cottages.

We are fully aware that without the generous support of the host of friends whom God has raised up all over the world, it would not be possible to carry on, and to all of them and our valued co-workers, we are profoundly thankful. What we most of all covet is a real place in the prayers of all who know God and do business at the throne of grace. "Brethren, pray for us"—with thanksgiving.

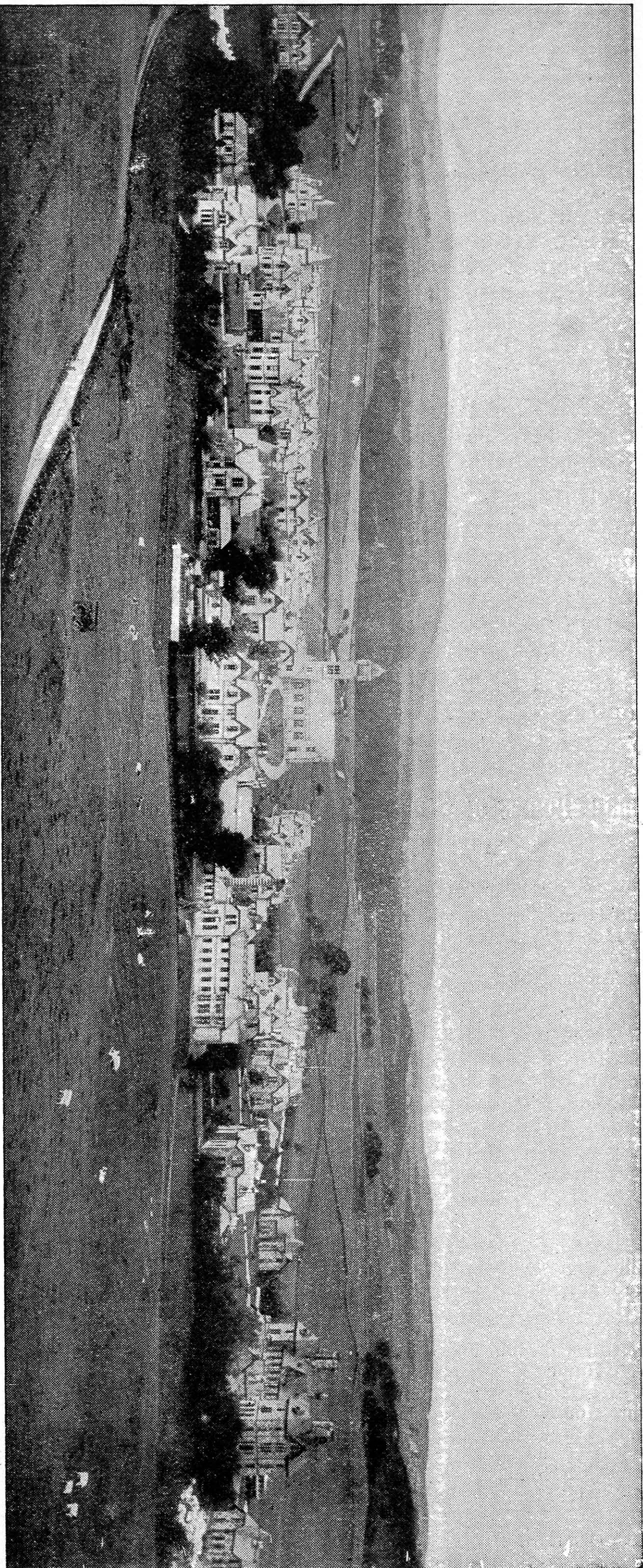
